John Foss (or Goss)

There are two Barre marriage records returned to the State (at Montpelier) from Barre. One reads that Phebe Batchelder married John Foss Apr. 29, 1810, and the other that she married John Trop of Walden Apr. 23, 1810. The Vermont Antiquarian for Dec. 1904, gives the latter as John Goss and _____ Batchelder, Apr. 23, 1810. I have not examined the originals; Foss or Goss may be correct.

Jonathan Moulton Batchelder (615), son of Nathaniel (61).

Dropped the "Jonathan", and known as "Moulton" Batchelder as early as his marriage. Lived in Lyndeborough until 1791, and probably until he moved to Vermont. Hemenway's Vermont Historical Gazetteer Vol. 4 (Hist. Washington County) p 717: - "The Lieutenant's brother Moulton Batchelder, about the year 1795 settled upon that portion of the Batchelder pitch now owned by the family of Wm. B. Foss. He began work upon it in 1794, his family living in the Wheaton district in Barre, and he passing to and fro by the guidance of marked trees.

Moulton Batchelder was chosen selectman and treasurer at the first Plainfield town meeting in 1798. Was treasurer 1799 and 1800, and held other town offices.

He married Judith Boutwell Apr. 26, 1787 (Lyndeborough). She late in life lived with her daughter

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Orlana and died in Barre June 5, 1861, ae 92.2.26. He died Oct. 8, 1827, ae 61, and both are buried on the "Cheney Batchelder Farm" in Plainfield. The probate record of his estate names his widow Judith and the eight children below.

Children, first two probably born in Lyndeborough; James born in Barre (Hemenway); and the others born in Plainfield. Births recorded at Plainfield.

Elijah Perry of Plainfield Jul. 10, 1808. (Plainfield).

"Elijah Perry of Middleboro, Mass., bought 100 acres of Batchelder's pitch next to lot 1, range 3, June, 1823, his daughter Sally, committed suicide by hanging, the only suicide ever committed in town. He was a brother of Elder James Perry. His son Daniel was the father of John Perry, of Rosette, wife of Charles T. Batchelder (613,111), and Harriet, wife of Daniel Batchelder (61,521)."

John Batchelder (621), son of Benjamin (62).

Blacksmith. Always lived at Hampton. He married Abigail Marston Nov. 20, 1785, daughter of Ephraim & Ruth (Batchelder, 32,v.). She was b. Dec. 2, 1755, and d. Oct. 20, 1837. He "died alone, sitting on the bed, without a moment's warning," June 14, 1821, ae 70.

Benjamin Batchelder (622), son of Benjamin (62).

In April, 1787, his brother John deeded him 130 acres in Parsonsfield, Me., adjacent to the New Hampshire line. He married Mary Brown Apr. 7, 1789, (Hampton), dau. of Nathan & Jane (Lamprey), born Jul. 5, 1764. He was of Parsonsfield according to the 1790 census, and lived there thereafter.

His wife was admitted to the Hampton Church Feb. 5, 1792, he being described as Benjamin Batchelder Jr. of Parsonsfield. She was dismissed from Hampton to Parsonsfield Jan. 12, 1795.

Benjamin deeded 50 acres in Parsonsfield to Daniel Littlefield of Barrington, N.H. Dec. 11, 1813. Littlefield is presumably the one who married his daughter Mary. Benjamin's wife Mary is named in this deed, but did not sign it. I find no later mention of her. She evidently died and he married second Betsey, widow of Robert Littlefield, who survived him.

Administration on the estate of Benjamin Batchelder of Parsonsfield "who d. intestate on 10 Dec. last", was granted to Harvey Moore of Parsonsfield, on request of the widow Betsey, Jan. 1, 1834.

His children as given below were named by his granddaughter, Mary C. (Libbey) Mathews, in 1908.

Joseph Batchelder (1111), son of Nathaniel (111).

Joseph bought a lot of land in what is now Andover,
N.H., Dec. 1, 1766, but did not settle there. He remained
on his father's homestead in Kensington. Married Rachel
Prescott Dec. 10, 1767, (Kensington town and church). She
was daughter of Jonathan & Rachel (Clifford).

Joseph enlisted May 29, 1775, in Capt. Winthrop
Rowe's company, which marched from Kensington to Winter
Hill, Mass., the day after the battle of Bunker Hill.
Joseph was a sergeant in this company, and remained on
active service until after January 1, 1776. Soon after
that date he returned home to Kensington. He sold his
place there Feb. 12, 1776, and on Mar. 19, 1776, bought a
lot in Gilmanton. He signed the Association Test at
Kensington, but sometime that year moved to Gilmanton. He
again went into the service, under Gen. Sullivan at Rhode

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Island, from June 26, 1778, to Dec. 30, 1778.

He sold his Gilmanton place Mar. 19, 1779, and next appears in Loudon, where his name is on the tax lists from 1780 to 1789, although I find no record of his buying land there, and he apparently left Loudon before 1789. The last record of him there which I have found is a suit by Joseph Batchelder of Loudon and his wife Rachel against William Davis of Meredith, gentleman. The writ, dated June 29, 1786, charges Davis with forcing Rachel out of the house, and throwing her from a certain table upon the ground, she being then with child and as a result having to have a physician and nursing etc. This encounter was on June 19, 1786, and the suit was not tried on its merits in the court of common pleas at which it was entered, but a formal judgement for defendant, on demurrer to the plea, was followed by a customary appeal to the Superior Court to be held in August, 1786. This was usual procedure, and actual trial would ordinarily be in the latter court. The appeal, however, was not entered. In other words, the case was dropped between the two courts, for what reason does not appear. What the row was all about is not clear; possibly disputed ownership of the table.

Rachel died in Loudon, and it may have been soon after this. At any rate, Joseph went to Falmouth Me. - about 1785 - according to his widow when applying for a pension, which is probably stated too early. He must have gone in 1786, or possibly 1787, and the continuance of his name on the Loudon tax lists may be due to his family's remaining in that town. His children by Rachel remained in New Hampshire.

Joseph's second marriage and children by it appear from the widow's pension application, which is dated Jan. 25, 1841. She was named Susanna, and was then living in Falmouth. She claims Joseph's military service under Capt. Rowe, but does not mention that at Rhode Island. She stated she would be 77 years old on Mar. 7, 1841 (so born Mar. 7, 1764), and was married to Joseph Aug. 15, 1788, at Portland by Justice Frothingham; also gave the names and births of six children (as below). The marriage was not recorded at Portland, but she furnished the recorded intention of marriage (at Falmouth). Joseph Batchelder and Susanna Leighton, both of Falmouth, Aug. 9, 1788.

Susanna further stated her husband went to Danville, Vt., in February, 1807, and died there Aug. 20, 1807, as evidence of which she filed a letter dated Danville Aug. 29, 1807, reading: - "Dear Maddam I now take pen in hand to inform you that my father and your husband is dead. He was taken sick the third day of May and died Aug. 20 he had a great desire to hear how it was with you and your children" (signed) Joseph Batchelder.

Dr. William Sanborn of Falmouth made affidavit that he treated Joseph, and understood from him he formerly lived in Kensington and Loudon; that his first wife died

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in Loudon, and his son Joseph came to Falmouth, and took his father to Danville with him.

Enoch Rowe of Exeter, N.H., son of Capt. Winthrop, also deposed that Joseph was a son of Nathaniel Batchelder of Kensington; his first wife was Rachel Prescott, and their children were Elizabeth, Joseph; and two others. He also gave information as to Joseph's service in his father's company.

Susanna's pension application was allowed May 20, 1842, but she had died July 18, 1841, and her children Samuel Batchelder and Elizabeth (or Betsey) Waite, both of Falmouth, applied in Feb. 1844, for the pension due their mother.

Susanna is buried in a cemetery at Pleasant Hill, Falmouth, in the woods behind the residence (in 1931) of Elmer Cleaves, and nearly opposite a school house. The stone states Susanna, widow of Joseph Batchelder, died Jul. 18, 1841, ae 78.

Children, first four born in Kensington, Mary probably in Gilmanton, and the others in Falmouth:-

The church record stating Polly Batchelder, daughter of Joseph, and Patty, daughter of Joseph Tilton, were then baptized on the account of widow Martha Tilton. (See No. 114). Mary married at Danville, Vt. Robert Green Nov. 18, 1801. Children recorded in Danville.

He was unknown to Mary T. (Skillings) Batchelder (111,162), who in March 1915, gave me an account of Susanna's children, naming or recognizing the other five of them. From this it may be inferred William died unm., but it is also possible he went away young, and thus not remembered in the family.

Nathaniel Batchelder (1112), son of Nathaniel (111).

Was a farmer. Lived in Kensington in early life. He sold most of the property received from his father in December 1769. He moved to Deerfield between 1772 and 1778. He may be the Nathaniel who was a corporal in Capt. Daniel Gordon's Company of Col. David Gilman's regiment from Jan. 5 to Mar. 15, 1777, but I cannot say there is proof of his identity. There are too many Nathaniels. Against it is the fact that neither he nor his widow applied for pension.

Nathaniel - of Deerfield - bought fifty acres from the northeasterly end of lot 13 in the 6th Range in Deerfield Oct. 19, 1778. This was adjacent to the Northwood line. He sold it May 11, 1781, and I do not find later real estate ownership. The town voted to abate his rates (taxes) in 1785, 1787, 1788 and 1792.

The 1790 census gives him a family of two males over 16, three under 16, and five females. The 1800 census shows two males 10-15, one 26-44, and one over 45; one female 10-15, and one over 45. The 1810 census shows one male 16-25, and one over 45; two females over 45. The 1820 census gives one male and three females, all over 45. This is the last item I find regarding him.

Nathaniel married Huldah Rawline Mar. 19, 1767 (Kensington). The N.H. Patriot of May 11, 1840, has this death: - "In Canterbury, April 19, widow Huldah Batchelder, formerly of Deerfield, aged 93 years 6 days. Printers in Maine, Indiana and Illinois are requested, etc."

Joseph Rawlings (Rollins) of Exeter married Hannah Philbrick of Hampton Falls Jan. 10, 1745 (Hampton Falls Church). His children baptized at Exeter were:

That this Hulda is identical with Nathaniel's wife is a matter of inference solely.

There was a Lowel Rawlins of Exeter who married Sukey Fogg of Exeter Dec. 28, 1801 (Exeter).

The 1790 census indicates Nathaniel had numerous children. Only his three oldest are positively identified. Huldah's death notice indicates relatives, probably descendants, living in the states named. I have noted below some I suspect may be children of Nathaniel, but that is purely inference from the data stated, and not proved.

Josiah Batchelder 3^d was elected a highway surveyor in Deerfield Mar. 12, 1806, and a culler of staves Mar. 10, 1807, Josiah (341) and Josiah (34131) were apparently the two older Josiahs indicated by the use of "3^d".

Josiah Batchelder Junr. of Deerfield, tailor, acquired land in lot 13, in 4th Range by deed of Edmund C. Lane Apr. 26, 1804, and an adjoining piece also from Lane Mar. 23, 1808. Both these deeds were witnessed by Nathl Bachelde.

Josiah, always junr. and tailor, deeded this last to Benjamin P. Batchelder (3214) of Deerfield Nov. 9, 1812. Benjamin reconveyed to Josiah Mar. 15, 1813, and Josiah again deeded it to Benjamin Oct. 30, 1813. This is rather puzzling. Benjamin was not a near relative. Josiah (34131) was regularly called "junr," but neither he nor any of the other Josiahs in Deerfield was a tailor, so far as shown by any record found. Josiah (3415) is the possible uncertain factor.

No further information regarding Josiah the tailor, unless he was the "Jos." Batchelder in the 1810 census with two males and one female, under 10, in his family.

- 3 v. Lowell(?) m.

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Lowell was found as a Christian name in the Exeter Rollins family (above). For data regarding Lowell Batchelder see post.

vi. Huldah(?)

A Huldah Batchelder, b. Feb. 14, 1778, m. William Brown Feb. 9, 1799, at Loudon. He was b. Jan. 7, 1778 in Loudon, son of Philip & Elizabeth (Batchelder, 114.1), settled in Canterbury soon after his marriage, and lived there until his death Nov. 24, 1849. Huldah died Feb. 10, 1864. See the account of them and their family in Lyford's History of Canterbury II, 40. Note that Huldah (Rawlins) Batchelder died in Canterbury in 1840, and Brown's wife was also Huldah.

There was a Samuel Batchelder in New Sharon Me. in 1801 and 1802. He married Nancy Smith of Sidney, Me. Sep. 6, 1801 (Sidney). He moved to Sidney by 1813, and was living there in 1826. Served a few days in 1814, at Augusta, in War of 1812. Nancy apparently was the Nancy who married Samuel Sanders of New Sharon May 5, 1847. Samuel had children:

The fact that Lowell Batchelder was living in Sidney in 1850, does not prove Samuel was his brother, or otherwise related. Samuel is unidentified. Mary (Batchelder) French (21,xvi) also lived in New Sharon.

John Batchelder (1113), son of Nathaniel (111).

Farmer, but is called "cooper" once (1786). He moved from Kensington to Deerfield about the time of his marriage, and lived there the rest of his life. He was called John Junr., to distinguish him from John (312), up to 1789. At various dates between 1768 and 1786 he acquired the rights of his seven brothers in lot 13 in the 6th range in Deerfield, and he and his son after him lived on it.

John married "Mrs. Hannah Rowlings" (Rollins) Feb. 2, 1775 (Deerfield). "Mrs." probably is the equivalent of "Miss." The N.H. Patriot of June 15, 1840, has the death: - "In Deerfield, April 13, Widow Hannah Batchelder, aged 83. Morning Star will insert this." (Morning Star was a Freewill Baptist paper, of Me. and Dover N.H.)

Cogswell's History of Nottingham 408, states that John served in the Revolution. With John (312) of Deerfield in the army, I am unable to identify any service

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as that of John Junr., but Cogswell's statement I do not doubt.

John's will, Aug. 1, 1812 - Sep. 16, 1812, names his wife Hannah, son Timothy, daughters Hannah James, and Margaret and Joanna Batchelder.

Children, born and recorded in Deerfield:

She was b. Nov. 4, 1776, dau. of Benjamin, and was living 1860. Timothy was known at first as Timothy Jr., to distinguish him from No. 3433 and No. 34324. He lived at Deerfield and died between 1831 and 1850. He had only one child.

i. Sarah m. Joseph Hoag of Deerfield.

ii. Hannah b. Oct. 31, 1775: m. Jonathan James Mar. 23, 1802 (Deerfield). He was b. Apr. 13, 1779, son of Benjamin. They were both living in Deerfield in 1850. Children:

She d. Aug. 4, 1833, in 29th year (N.H. Patriot). Her father was Ebenezer Marden Dalton. She left one child, Mary Esther Dalton (or Mary Batchelder Dalton - will of E. M. D.)

iii. Margaret b. Mar. 2, 1784: d. unm.

Res. Deerfield. Her will, Oct. 28, 1840 - Jan. 13, 1864, names her four nephews and two nieces (above).

vi. Joanna b. Jan. 29, 1778: living unm. in Deerfield 1822. Apparently died s.p. - probably unm. - before 1850.

Ephraim Batchelder (1114), son of Nathaniel (111).

Described as tailor up to 1782, later, and probably also earlier, was a farmer. Described as of Kensington Jul. 3, and Jul. 4, 1770, when deeding land in Rockingham County, N.H., but called of Pearsontown, Cumberland County, Me. Jul. 2, 1770, when he bought land there. Pearstontown is the present day Standish. He sold his place there Nov. 18, 1782, to Silvanus Lowell of Newburyport, Mass., and moved to Flintstown (now Baldwin), Me., where he bought land Nov. 1, 1783, and settled on a farm in that town which in 1908 was owned by Rishworth A. Burnell of West Baldwin (grandson of 11,141).

Ephraim served in the Revolution in 1775, from

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Pearsontown (Mass. Soldiers & Sailors of the Rev. War).

Pierce's Genealogy has Ephraim's family badly confused. His brothers, Samuel, Timothy and Josiah, and his nephew Edward, are made his children.

The following record is from Ephraim's family bible, furnished me in 1909 by Rishworth A. Burnell (above). Ephraim, born May 15, 1749. (evidently new style date, equivalent of May 4 old style, since adoption of the Gregorian calendar in 1752), died Jan. 15, 1815. Married first Apphia Lowell Sept. --, 1772, born Apr. 14, "1742 or 3", died Nov. 2, 1807. (The Lowell Genealogy gives Moses & Frances (Colby) Lowell a daughter Apphia b. in Amesbury, Mass. Apr. 21, 1741, and a son Silvanus).

Ephraim married second Lydia, (widow of Moses) Richardson of Standish, May 27, 1808, born Apr. 13, 1744, d. Nov. 12, 1823. (The record at Baldwin gives the marriage as May 29, 1808. Lydia's maiden name was Hall, and she and Moses Richardson came from Newton, Mass. to Standish, previously living in Brookline and Dorchester, Mass.)

Pierce gives the date of marriage as Sept. 11, 1803. She died Oct. 31, 1804 (Ephraim's bible). A letter from Samuel Hardy, dated "Poland, March 22nd 1818" to "Dear Brother" (Evidently Silvanus 11,141), speaks of his wanting very much, "to see Sally, and all the rest of you", and asking "whether Sally is contented or not." Was Sally a daughter of this marriage?

iv. Margaret b. May 26, 1781: m. Joseph Edgerly Apr. 28, 1805, (Danville Vt.).

Thomas Bachelder and Margaret Edgerly of Covington, Genesee County, N.Y. quit claimed to Silvanus Bachelder of Baldwin all right to Estate of Ephraim Bachelder, late of Baldwin, Mar. 31, 1819. This deed was witnesses by Thomas Egerly.

Margaret was living with her brother John in Danville at the time of her marriage. Her brother Thomas married Sally Edgerly, and letters to Ephraim (1114) and Silvanus (11141) preserved at Baldwin contain some Edgerly information. Thomas (11143) and Joseph Edgerly "moved to Leicester" (N.Y.) in March, 1811, and "Old Mr. Edgerly" in January (1811). The following September Joseph was expected at Danville to get "his father's family." Thomas (11143) and Joseph Edgerly bought a farm in Perry, N.Y., prior to October, 1816,

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"about 5 miles from the old place....David takes the old folks and the old place. Tom and Jem (or Tem?) trades." In Sept., 1828, Thomas (11143) wrote that "Mother Edgerly" died Jul. 9, 1827. "Sister Mary" is dead also, and "Father Edgerly" in a very low state of health. On May 31, 1812, Samuel (1117) wrote Ephraim from Danville and mentioned that "Margaret has got a Son."

Josiah Batchelder (1115), son of Nathaniel (111).

Shoemaker and farmer. Lived in Kensington until his marriage. Served in the Revolution, for which he was later pensioned. His service not in the N. H. Rev. Rolls. His pension application states that in December, 1775, he went from Kensington to Cambridge, Mass., to substitute for a soldier whose furlough expired Dec. 31. That after that term expired he enlisted under Capt. Winborn Adams in the N. H. Line, remaining at Winter Hill until Mar. 27, 1776, then marched to New York City, Albany, Fort George, and Lower Canada, then back to Crown Point, to Mt. Independence, where being one of the invalids and his term nearly expired, he was permitted with others to go home under care of Lieut. Joseph Huntoon, who accompanied them to No. 4 (Charlestown, N.H.).

Josiah was taxed in Kensington in 1777 and 1778. He married Mary Brown Sep. 3, 1778 (Kensington). The will of Samuel Brown of Hampton, dated Aug. 12, 1790, mentions his daughter Mary Batchelder. Dow's Hampton, p.621, gives her as b. Feb. 29, 1756, daughter of Samuel and Mary (Philbrick).

On his marriage Josiah moved to Deerfield, and settled near his brother John. His wife Mary died Mar. 15, 1796 (Danville), and he married second Deborah Allen of Deerfield Feb. 28, 1798 (Deerfield). He was of Deerfield Dec. 15, 1799, but very shortly thereafter moved to Danville Vt., where he died Feb. 19, 1832. Deborah was born 1772-5, according to her age as given at various times. She was also pensioned as Josiah's widow, and was living in March, 1855.

Pierce erroneously places a Timothy in Josiah's family, probably No. 1118 being confused.

BATCHELDER GENEALOGY

is a mortgage for \$81.83 to Thomas Batchelder of Danville, Vt., husbandman, dated Mar. 29, 1813, from John Webber 2^d of Rumney, N.H.

John C. Batchelder (111,511) wrote in 1908 that Thomas married and had children. Josiah Batchelder (111,523) wrote in 1908: - "Thomas went to Cleveland Ohio, about the time I was born, 74 years ago" ---- and was never heard from by his relatives after." Another tradition (stated by John C.) was that he went to (Genesee County?), New York, earlier - (about 1812?).

A account of the Shepard family by Chester Brown (below) printed in the Orleans County Monitor, of Barton Vt., in May, 1911, gives the following information.

Milo Shepard was born Nov. 28, 1790, son of Horace, who d. in Hardwick, Mar. 2, 1829, ae. 63, (grst.) and "Mariba" who d. Jan. 17, 1830 ae.62 (same grst.) Milo d. Apr. 8, 1859, ae 68 (grst. at No. Craftsbury). Sally (Batchelder) d. Nov. 29, 1855, ae 65 (grst. at No. C.) They had eight children:

Samuel Batchelder (1117), son of Nathaniel (111).

Farmer, although called "taylor" in 1781. He
followed his brother Ephraim to Standish Me., and served
in the Revolution from that town, then called Pearsontown,
in 1778 and 1779 (Mass.. Soldiers and Sailors of the
Rev.). He deeded his rights in his father's estate to his
brothers Joseph and John in 1781 and 1783 and was then of
Pearsontown. He bought land in Baldwin, Me., (then
Flintstown) Sep. 22, 1788, but sold it Oct. 10, 1795, and
moved to Danville, Vt. He lived there until about 1813,
when he moved to Hartland, N.Y., where he died Oct. 8,
1819, ae 60. (Bible of Ephraim (1114), and widow's pension
application).

Samuel married Anna Richardson Dec. 11, 1783, (her
pension application). The intention is recorded at
Gorham, Me., Nov. 5, 1783. She was born June 5, 1765, in
Brookline, Mass., Daughter of Moses and Lydia (Hall)
Richardson. She was, therefore, a daughter of the second
wife of Ephraim (1114).

Anna applied March 27, 1845, for a pension as widow
of Samuel, she was then living in Hartland. The
application was rejected for lack of proof of Samuel's
army service. With this application she filed a family
record which gives Samuel's birth, Apr. 21, 1760, her own
birth and births of the ten children below, and also the
deaths of four of the children and marriages of four of

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the others. This record also includes birth of Caroline on Nov. 5, 1809, and her death Aug. 6, 1811, as though she were also a child of Samuel and Anna, but from other sources it appears she was a grandchild, child of Levi (11171).

This record is mentioned thus fully because of the confusion regarding Samuel (1117) in Pierce's Genealogy. Samuel is Pierce's No. 274 on p. 142, but has been transferred to the family of Ephraim (1114) as Pierce's No. 635 on p. 169 and p. 635. To make this shift seem possible Samuel's date of birth was changed from 1760 to 1765. The above record is conclusive of the facts.

Ensign Samuel Batchelder (1121), son of Samuel (112).

Farmer. Lived in Kensington until 1781, or later; but from 1784, or earlier, he lived in Deerfield, where he bought land Oct. 25, 1780. Lived on South Road, Deerfield. He enrolled as a minuteman in 1775 (Hurd's Hist. Rockingham & Strafford Counties, p. 362). His grave at Deerfield has the G.A.R. marker, placed at graves of Revolutionary soldiers. Which Samuel was the fifer in Capt. Moses Leavitt's company in 1777 - a company in which Jere (351) was Second Lieutenant, and Thomas (1116) a member - both Kensington men? See Samuel (426), and Pierce's Genealogy, p. 168. Samuel was called "Ensign" in 1793 and up to 1803.

Samuel married Jemima Sanborn Oct. 26, 1780, (Epping). She was daughter of Josiah Sanborn of Epping, as proved by a deed recorded at Dover, N.H. (Book 61, Page 105), by which Samuel Batchelder and wife Jamima of Deerfield, and Dudley Gilman and wife Molly of Epping convey two thirds of a lot in Sanbornton given to Jemima and Molly by will of "our father" Josiah Sanborn; deed dated June 10, 1784. The Sanborn Genealogy, p. 134, following Runnel's History of Sanbornton, gives Josiah Sanborn a daughter Molly (m. Dudley Gilman), and a daughter Jemima b. Aug. 11, 1768 (m. 1783 Jonathan Farrar). Evidently this is an error both in regard to Jemima's birth and name of her husband.

The family cemetery of Samuel, on South Road, Deerfield, appears to have had the original gravestones (so far as such originally existed) removed, and flat

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uniform markers sunk, flush with the turf. These substituted stones have dates, some few of which are not accurate. Jemima (Sanborn) is given as born 1757; died 1835.

Samuel died Aug. 1, 1809, ae 53. His will, dated Jul. 28, 1809, names wife Jemima and the eight children given below.

He was under 14 years of age when his mother was appointed his guardian Jan. 20, 1813, and must have been the child who was under 7 at Samuel's death, and supported for 2 years 4 months by the estate. This would make his birth about 1804. Pierce gives his birth as Jan. 1805, and death May 7, 1815, which is probably nearer correct. He was dead before 1832 (above).

Joshua Batchelder (1131), son of Joshua (113).

Left Kensington early in life. Was of Berwick, Me., Aug. 21, 1772, when he sold part of his father's real estate in Fremont. Moved to Sanford, Me., from which town he marched in Capt. Morgan Lewis' company, in April, 1775, on news of the battle of Lexington. This service, according to Mass.. Soldiers & Sailors of the Rev. War, was of three days duration.

Joshua resided in Sanford the rest of his life. He was by occupation a bloomer in the Iron Works there. He married in 1774 Abigail Hazelton, or Heselton, of Buxton, Me., dau of Timothy & Anna (_____). Emery's History of Sanford states she is "said to have been a niece of Governor Hancock." She was born in Buxton Oct. 7, 1755, and died 1842.

Joshua died Feb. 2, 1826, and Abigail was appointed administratrix Feb. 20, 1826. She left a will, dated Jan. 15, 1835, proved Sep. 5, 1842.

He lived in Sanford up to 1828, when

 Eunice were minors over fourteen years of age, in
 1843, so born 1822-9. Sally is, however, "Sally
 Batchelder of Sanford, singlewoman" Aug. 10, 1830.

John Batchelder (1221), son of Nathan (122).

This John has to be distinguished from other Johns, -
 Nos. 162, 1113, 1251, 1621 and 14141. "John Batchelder to
 Martha Parsons, both of Epsom March 21, 1782," is the
 Deerfield record of his marriage. His step-father,
 Francis Locke of Epsom, died in 1787, and John and his
 mother returned to Kensington. The 1790 census,
 Kensington gives him as Bachelor John, 1-1-2. In 1791 he
 moved to Concord and kept an inn there until 1806, when he

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moved to Epsom, where he is taxed 1807-15 (not taxed 1816-1823?). He sold his Epsom real estate in 1815, (but apparently remained in the town). He is called "trader" 1808-15, and kept a store. In 1833 he was of Chichester, but back in Epsom 1840, in the family of Levi Locke (Census).

The 1800 Census of Concord lists his family as two males and one female 26-44; one male 16-25; one male 10-15; and one female under 10. The 1810 census of Epsom shows a family of one male and one female over 45; and one female 10-15. The 1820 census of Epsom has only one John, whom I identify as No. 14141.

John served in the Revolution under Capt. Simon Marston and Col. Joseph Senter from Jul. 30, 1777, to Jan. 7, 1778, and in 1833 was granted a pension.

In the library of the N.H. Historical Society is a Record of Deaths in Epsom, 1815-1892 kept to 1857 by Jonathan Dolbeer. In it are these entries:

1829 May Wife of John Batchelder
1843 Nov 20 John Batchelder 80.

The N.H. Patriot of June 8, 1829, records the death: - "In Epsom, May 19, Mrs. Martha, wife of John Batchelder, of Epsom, formerly of Kensington, aged 70. Printers in Vermont and Canada are requested, etc."

The only information as to possible children is in the above census entries, and this death notice, except that returned from Kensington to the State Vital Statistics at Concord is the birth of Elizabeth Batchelder Aug. 14, 1788, daughter of John & Abigail. The John with wife Abigail is No. 1621, who could hardly have had such a daughter. At that date the Kensington Johns were John Senr. (162), John Jr. (1221) and John 3^d (1621). I suspect some error, and that Elizabeth belongs to John (1221), but have not examined the original record.

John Batchelder (1251), son of Benjamin (125).

In 1788 he was living in Candia and engaged in small scale lumbering. He was probably living with his father at the time of the 1790 census. He was of Protectworth (now Springfield N.H.) Jan. 25, 1794, when he and John Webster of New Grantham (now Grantham) were sued by John Jones of Allenstown on a \$7.00 note dated at "Pembrock" (Pembroke) June 11, 1793. The writ was originally dated Jan. 1, 1794, and described both defendants as of New Grantham, but was altered as above. This and following suits are at Exeter.

The next item I find in John's short and somewhat lively career is a suit by Job Winslow, of Falmouth Me., previously of Lewiston. The story disclosed by the papers on file shows John bought a one half of tract of land on the Androscoggin River, with sawmill and ferry connected, giving in payment a note of \$324.16, dated Lewiston Mar. 19, 1796, receiving a bond for a deed, and also possession of an unrecorded deed from Phineas Frost to Winslow, the

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seller. John took this deed to Frost, and sold him the property for \$300.00 in cash on Apr. 5, 1796, surrendering the unrecorded deed, to leave title in Frost. Winslow was left with a note to Collect. John went to Corinth, Vt. after this piece of high finance, and Winslow sued him there "in the summer of 1796," but dropped the action because John had no property there.

John was in Corinth in August, 1797, when he sued Thomas Calnan, and May, 1798, when he sold land in Trecothick (now Ellsworth), N.H., but moved to Danville before September of that year, when he sold another lot in Trecothick. The next year John returned nearer home, and he and Aaron Ward, both of Danville, traders, bought a place in Lee, N.H., near Wadleigh's Bridge. Here John started to keep a store, and his creditors went into action. First, Josiah Hook of Brentwood attached on a note dated Nov. 27, 1792, which called for payment in 5 ewes and four lambs in three years, with a rental of 9 lbs of wool per year, - none of which had been paid, (principal or interest). Then Job Winslow sued on his note and recovered, although Zeruah, Dorothy and Nathan Batchelder deposed that John had left the bond for deed with Lieut. Benjamin Batchelder of Candia, and Winslow had come there and agreed to accept the surrender of the bond as payment of the note.

Next John's own lawyer, William Plumer of Epping, in June, 1800, sued him for legal services in these and various other actions, and had him arrested on the writ. Probably he was bailed soon, and went again to Vermont, - Washington this time, where he died in or about 1802.

Rev. Frederick L. Batchelder (12525) in 1865 wrote that four years previous to that date he had attended a Free Will Baptist convention at East Orange Vt., and had inquired of a man acquainted in the adjoining town of Washington about John's family. He was told two sons - John and Robinson were dead, "and could not learn" that they left any children, - and a daughter Sally married Peter Hoyt. Peter was then in the poor house and Sally had gone to New York state to live with her children."

John married Fatty Robinson of Deerfield. She and the four children were warned out of the town of _____, _____ 1801.

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Although not named by Rev. F. L. B. above, I suppose she was the Nancy Batchelder of Corinth who m. Oliver Knapp of Corinth Dec. 1, 1814 (Corinth). Worcester Vt. records the birth of A. Sprague (or Sprague A.) Knapp Apr. 7, 1828, son of Oliver & Nancy F. (Batchelder)

Odlin Batchelder (1252), son of Benjamin (125).

His name was Odlin, not Odlin Prescott, Batchelder. He was a farmer and shoemaker. On Jan. 5, 1813, of Candia, he deeded Candia land, and moved to Andover N.H. In or about 1832 he moved again to Holliston, Mass..

Odlin married first Huldah Searle of Rowley, Mass., int. Oct. 12, 1799 (Rowley). She was dau. of William & Mary (Nelson), born June 16, 1777, and died Dec. 13, 1846 in Holliston. His second wife was Millicent Barrett, dau. Amos, whom he married Oct. 31, 1847 (Holliston). She d. Aug. 1, 1859, ae 68 (or July 15, 1859 - family record). Odlin died Apr. 29 (or 30) 1860 ae 84.7.14 at Holliston.

Family record gives his birth as Nov. 22, 1786, but the Candia record reads 1784. He was a shoemaker. Was of Candia 1808, and I suppose he was the "Batchelder Nathan cordwainer" listed in the Boston, Mass., directories of 1810 and 1813. He moved to Bridgewater N.H. by 1816, and was living in Bristol, N.H., in 1829 and 1830. Not long after he moved to Holliston, Mass., and finally went to his son, (Rev. T. H.), and died in Wilton, Clinton County,

Nathan's first wife was Mary Shedd, but I have not found any record of the marriage. The N.H. Patriot of Jul. 13, 1829, reports her death in Bristol June 30, 1829, in her 47th year, leaving a husband and five children. His second wife, according to family records, was Mrs. Lucy Farmer Knowlton. The Patriot of June 7 & 14, 1830, reports the marriage in New Chester (N.H.) of Mr. Nathan Batchelder of Bristol to Miss Lucy Knowlton of Wentworth. The death record at the State House, Boston, from Holliston, gives her death Jan. 4, 1873, aged 84.5.20, born in Londonderry, N.H., daughter of _____ Stevens & Kate (Pierce).
