REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Prudential School Committees have been very fortunate in selecting Teachers for the various schools the past year. In five of the seven schools the same teacher has been employed throughout the year, much to the advantage of the schools. In District No. 2, the teacher enlisted into the military service of his country, which was the occasion of a change of teachers, and notwithstanding a faithful teacher was employed for the second term, the school suffered by the change. With a new instructor comes a new code of laws and tactics,—new methods of instruction, &c., and at best it requires time for the teacher to put his school machinery in motion, and the scholars to get the hang of their new “Master;” and the “chances” in exchanging a good teacher for a better are not in our favor. A change was also made in No. 3, which we regret, as we have been unable to see its advantages.

Eight of the fourteen terms of school were taught by citizens of Hampton, and received *faithful* and *thorough* instruction. And here permit me to remark, that Hampton has faithful and competent teachers for all our schools, *and they should* be employed.

Our schools the past year will compare favorably with those of previous years, or with those of the county. In a conversation with Commissioner Cate, after he had visited nearly all the schools in the county, he remarked, that the schools in Hampton ranked with the first in the county, and that there were few better schools to be found than in District No. 1.

That the community has been interested in our common schools the past year is apparent by the numerous names of citizens on the school registers, and the more constant attendance of the children at school.

Many scholars were prevented from attending school by sickness. Measles and scarlet fever were so prevalent as to occasion the suspension of three of the schools, and the number attending the others was comparatively few. Abating those retained by sickness, the attendance is much larger than reported.

Agreeably to a promise made the schools, the names of such scholars as have attended school every half day during the term, (unless prevented by sickness,) are mentioned in this report.

In conclusion, permit me to recommend that the interest in our schools be increased rather than abated, as the character of the rising generation will in a great measure depend on the education and influence they receive in our common schools.
