### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

### SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

CITIZENS OF HAMPTON: -In accordance to law and custom, the following report is respectfully submitted:

### DISTRICT NO 1.

The spring and fall terms of the Primary Department were taught by Miss Ella M. Lamprey, and the winter term by Miss Alice I. Palmer, both of whom governed the school pleasantly, and the scholars made good improvement.

The Grammar school was under the charge of Miss Carrie C. Lamprey, of this town, a young lady of excellent abilities, who gave good satisfaction. In the fall term Miss Lucy M. Clapp, of Boston, a graduate of the Boston Normal school, was teacher. The school was rather small in number, and, for some reason, not as much interest shown as has been at times before; still, improvement was made by scholars who were disposed to make the most of their school privileges. The Pludential Committee were dilatory in securing a teacher for the winter term, and, at a late day, engaged Mr. David G. Jackson, of North Hampton, a young man of excellent literary attainments, but lacking experience and other points necessary to make a good and successful teacher. He, consequently, failed to give satisfaction, and a change in teachers was made, by which, the services of the Rev. R. A. DeLancey were secured, who taught, we think, but five weeks, and, I understand, gave good satisfaction. I visited the school but once while it was under his charge, and, owing to the small number of scholars present, could not, perhaps, judge correctly of its efficiency. He is a practical teacher, and, to his praise be it said, does not consider it his duty to be wholly confined to the text-book.

### DISTRICT NO. 2.

Miss Anna M. Lamprey, the teacher of the Primary department last year, was retained in the same position for this year and sustained her former good reputation as a Primary school teacher. The good order and improvement in this school are evidence of the propriety of an unfrequent change of teachers.

In the Grammar department, Miss Ena F. Drake was the teacher during both sping and fall term. There did not seem to be the respect and good will on the part of the scholars toward the teacher that there should have been, and, we think, Miss Drake's services would have been more appreciated in some other locality. Mr. S. Albert Shaw was secured as teacher for the winter term, who we think has profited by his experience in teaching. We have visited the school twice, and a considerable degree of interest was manifested. The school, at this writing, is still in session.

### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Miss Alice I, Palmer, of this town, a young lady of no previous experience in teaching, taught the school in this district during both the spring and fall terms and gave excellent satisfaction to your committee, and also, I think, to all interested. Miss Palmer has shown tact for teaching, which, with experience, will make her a good teacher. The winter term, which is still in session, has been under the charge of your committee. The scholars, by their punctual attendance and good habits of study have made commendable improvement.

### DISTRICT NO. 4.

The services of Miss Adelle Frink, of Newington, N. H., was secured for the spring and fall terms, during which good

order was observed, and the scholars made advancement in their studies. The winter term was under the charge of Miss Ena F. Drake. As the school is still in session and having visited it but once, we cannot give a full report, but my impression was, at that time, that the school compared favorably with other terms of school taught in the district during the preceding two or three years.

#### DISTRICT NO. 5.

Misses Nellie Chase and Fannie F. Carswell, both of North Hampton, were the teachers in this district, the former in the spring and part of the fall terms, and the latter the rest of the year. Both teachers gave entire satisfaction to your committee, and the scholars have been favored with a good school during the whole year.

#### DISTRICT NO. 6.

The teacher of the school, for the entire school year was Miss Winifred M. Brown, of Hampton Falls. Miss Brownhas had no former experience in teaching, and, we think, with more confidence and experience, she will make a good teacher.

DISTRICT No. 6.—Blanche A. Williams, (year), Grace Williams, (year), Ida Williams, (two terms), Frank H. Coffin, (two terms), George C. Leighton, (two terms), Myron C. Williams, (year).

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

During the past year our schools have not been more than moderately successful. The principle reason, we think, is that our Prudential Committee, as a rule, have been apt to delay securing a teacher until too late to secure an efficient one, and when we have a second-class teacher, a second-class school will surely follow. We have known of instances where parents and scholars were pleased with their teacher, when to a frequent visitor it was evident that good work was not being done—lessons half learned and recited, poor order, but the teacher very pleasant. While we regard the art of pleasing one of the best points of a teacher, yet it is not all that is necessary. A good teacher must mildly but firmly say "No" to all unnecessary and unreasonable requests of his scholars.

#### TEXT BOOKS.

The Progressive Speller, which has been in use during the past twenty years, has been exchanged for Warren's Class-

Word Speller without cost to the scholars, or even exchange being made. We hope that it will not be a distant day when a new text book on the subject of Grammar will be introduced into our schools.

#### BUILDINGS AND APPARATUS.

The buildings in each of the several districts are in very good repair; a more suitable place, however, is still needed in district No. 5, for the storage of fuel. At each visit we made to the school in district No. 2, during the past winter term, we found the rooms so cold as to be, to us, uncomfortable. I would commend to the consideration of the people of the district, the propriety of an exchange of stoves by which wood could be used for fuel instead of coal. Dictionaries should be furnished every school-room, also a set of mathametical blocks to each Grammar school. As teacher in district No. 3, the past winter we have felt very much the need of the above articles.
