Let us cherish and protect the interests that cluster around our public schools, adapting our methods to the living demands of the times, so we may discharge the responsibility we owe not only to the present, but to succeeding generations.

Annual Report of the Board of Education.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS.

We wish to testify to the honest, diligent work done the past year by our teachers; three of the schools have been taught by the same instructors a number of years in succession. In this respect we were exceedingly fortunate. The fact that they have been retained speaks well for their work and is highly complimentary to them. We cannot have good schools without good order and, if the pupils know that the teacher will be upheld by the parents in keeping order, they will be inclined to be more orderly themselves. In the matter of school discipline we should regard the mildest means that can be successful the best, but the means must be successful at all hazards, and corporal punishment considered justifiable properly inflicted.

An ability to govern is one of the most important qualifications of a teacher, without that there can be no success.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

The harmony evident in our Grammar school this year, the increase in punctuality and the new impulse gained in certain branches of study are very encouraging indications.

The school question is not a new one. Its provisions are continually before us to be freely discussed, wisely amended and efficiently adopted. No subject is more important in its bearing upon the well being of our community. Every school year should record some good thing accomplished, or at least honestly attempted. May we be kept wisely zealous and level-headed in all educational matters.
