## School Report.

It becomes us as good citizens, and as those interested in the welfare of our state and government to try to improve our schools.

We should do what our means and influence will allow. All parents should visit the school room and form their judgments from their own observation. In this way each can see whether good and proper discipline is maintained and can learn of the advancement. By doing this your own knowledge will be refreshed and augmented, you will become interested and therefore will interest and benefit your children.

All failures are not due to the inability of the teacher. Parents and others often make remarks before pupils, about the way the school is managed, which begets a prejudice on the part of the scholars and destroys any teacher's power for doing good. The defects in our schools can be remedied if not obliterated, by an in-

crease of interest in educational matters on the part of our citizens, when they realize the importance and value of an education to their children and act on the assurance that the greatest benefit can be had only when school officers, teachers, citizens and scholars are in unison, working for the greatest success.

The winter term has been unfavorable to a full attendance, the attendance has been much lowered on account of illness among the pupils, and fear of contagious diseases. While some latitude may be allowed those who are absent on account of illness and other causes, over which neither pupils and parents have control, in general only those pupils who are in constant attendance can expect to maintain their position. We think there is valid reason for the enforcement of the law in regard to compulsory school attendance. The required notices have been duly posted, but we doubt the adequacy of such a remedy for the existing evil.

By a vote passed at the last session of the legislature, towns are authorized to appropriate money for the purchase of text books, for the use of their schools. Some of the scholars have not been properly supplied with books. This will remedy this evil.

In conclusion let us remember that colleges and seminaries may educate the few, but it is for the common school to educate the many.
