Number of volumes in library 1703. Number of volumes taken out for the year ending March 1, 1891, 2575. Largest number of books issued any one evening, 81. Least number, 30. Average, 50. The books may be classified as follows: History, 287 volumes; Travels and adventures, 181; Biography, 182; Fiction, 582; Poetry, 61; Natural History, 41; Science, 27; Agriculture, 28; Moral and religious, 49; Miscellaneous.

While there has been a decrease in the number of volumes circulated, it is gratifying to notice an increasing interest in works of

history and travels. This result is partly due to the course adopted by your committee in purchasing works of fiction, based on or illustrating some fact or incident in history, and the reader thus becoming interested and wishing to know more of the subject, has procured and read historical works he otherwise would not have become interested in.

It also has been the earnest endeavor of your committee to exclude every book not of a strictly moral tone, or that would be apt to leave a harmful impression on the mind of a youthful reader.

And while we regard with pride our fine schools, and the opportunities they offer to the young for obtaining an education, every citizen should be just as interested in having a good library in our midst, for it is second only to the common schools as a means for creating a greater degree of intelligence in a community, and in a certain measure is more far-reaching than even the public school.

School Report.

Our school system aims not so much to aid the coming man and woman to earn their living, as to promote the intelligence, good order, happiness and prosperity, of communities. The many need the habits of systematic industry and quick observation, the ready subordination to wholesome law, the democratic spirit, which regular and judicious training in the common school tends to foster.

We would urge parents to personally inspect our schools frequently to see that they are answering the end for which they have been established, to call the attention of the proper officials to discoverable defects and to encourage and stimulate pupils and teachers whenever found worthy of praise.

This year has been one of change in our school system; the introduction of the free text book. In regard to the wisdom of the change and its success, we can give it our approval and speak in the highest terms of its workings. The year has proved that it can be improved to the best advantage of our schools. Many needful books and other needful supplies have been furnished, that would not have been, under the old system, and in consequence better work and more of it has been done by the scholars and teachers.

All pupils stand on an equal footing. Your committee desire to improve the condition of our schools by providing everything that shall aid our scholars to keep pace with the age. Books in the schools have been well taken care of, and supplies have not been wasted.

We regret that so many changes in our teachers have been necessary during the year. No teacher can do her best work the first term, thorough acquaintance is essential on the part of scholar and teacher and takes time, therefore if equally good are secured it is a disadvantage.

The winter term has again been unfavorable for a full attendance, not on account of illness among pupils, but from the fear of a contagious disease and a severe winter. Notwithstanding this, the attendance has been fair at the High School with resident pupils,

We consider our schools are in a comparatively prosperous condition and are generally under the direction of earnest, faithful, competent teachers ; and are composed of obedient, intelligent and happy pupils, and that they maintain an honorable name in comparison with other schools and constitute one of the most valuable blessings of our community. Let us regard them with pride and cherish them with paternal care.
