School Report.

TO THE CITIZENS OF HAMPTON:

Our High School, in my opinion, is in a flourishing condition.

It labors under disadvantages from lack of conveniences in the Academy building,

Repairs are needed. Also new settees are required.

The building has been much improved by the removal of the old seats and by substituting the Chandler adjustable desk and chair.

Although the cost was about two hundred and fifty dollars, the comfort derived from them will doubly pay the expense of putting them in the building.

It is certain that the people of Hampton demand schools — and good schools — with experienced teachers. This is manifest in the readiness with which they contribute their money for their support, and their interest in them in various ways.

Supported and encouraged by proper public sentiment, we should be nerved to still more vigorous action in the future and labor to make our schools the very best. Give the pupils of all our schools all they need to make them comfortable and happy.

It is not to be believed for a moment that the citizens of Hampton are ready to part with our High School. We know that there was never a system, however good, which had not its opponents. Thousands of towns throughout the United States furnish ample evidence of increased intelligence, promoted industry and enhanced value of property through the influence of their High Schools. The High School should give the elements of liberal culture and lay the foundation of broad thinking.

We would urge upon the parents of the pupils of the High School, as well as those of the lower grades, the importance and the absolute necessity of encouraging both teacher and pupil. Aid your children at home. Do not criticise the schools you have never seen. Sympathize with them in their trials and their efforts for improvement. Do this and you will contribute to the success of the teachers, to the progress of your own children and to the permanent good of all the schools in town.

THE GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

This school is under the care of Miss Norris. The pupils, as usual, are making rapid progress in their studies. There has been great enthusiasm exhibited in all the exercises required. The discipline is perfect, or as near perfect as can be.

We have introduced, the present year, Barnes' Geography, both the complete and primary. The result has been satisfactory. In this department, scholars should understand something of the physical features of the country and the character and occupations of its inhabitants. The memory of the pupil should not be burdened by dry detail. The most prominent parts should be set before them. By this means a fair knowledge may be obtained.

Spelling has received more attention, the past year, than heretofore, and good results have been obtained. By a test in spelling, instituted by Mr. George W. Libbey, our scholars made a higher mark than most of the schools in this state and many in Massachusetts. We believe this branch should receive more attention.

By the advice of the State Superintendent, we have introduced a new work in Physiology for use in the Intermediate Grade, and also in the Grammar School, and special attention has been given to hygiene.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS.

In our primary Schools the instruction is more varied than in other grades. No definite method can be prescribed for imparting primary instruction. Each teacher must act according to her own judgment. The present year has been one of progress in these schools. Nothing has occurred to disturb the usual course.

We were very fortunate to retain Mrs. Harris and Miss Carswell. At the close of the summer, Miss Sadie M. Hobbs of the North District School, after years of faithful labor, resigned her position, and Mrs. Harris from the East District took her place. She is an earnest worker and will maintain the high

character which the school has acquired under her predecessor.

The East Primary is fortunate in being under the instruction of Miss Emma D. Shelton, a faithful and zealous teacher. It affords me great pleasure thus to testify to her competency and success.

Miss Carswell, who has for several years been connected with the different primary schools in town, still retains her position in the Centre Primary, and yearly leaves the impress of her character, energy and intelligence upon the minds of those who are so fortunate as to have been among her pupils.

Our school year will hereafter close with the summer term.

Let parents and all other citizens understand that our schools are at all times open to them; that teachers at all times will be pleased to receive them.
