Your committee congratulate the town on the condition of the High School. The attendance has never been so large and the results so satisfactory. The school has no superior of its class in this part of the state. We doubt if it has an equal. The discipline is good, and the classes show careful training. The scholars now understand that they go to learn, not to loaf and play. And they do learn. The school is doing excellent work. For the condition of the school we are largely indebted to the principal. No other principal has done so much for the school, and given himself so unsparingly to the work. He is sometimes strict, and he has to be. He has not spared himself. His self-sacrificing zeal, devotedness to the work, untiring industry, and effective management are rarely equalled. Not only has he labored faithfully in strictly school work, and achieved grand success, but to him we are indebted for fine laboratory facilities, the furniture and piano in the upper hall, the hardwood wood floor, the adornment of the room, and other decided improvements. And he has untiringly worked for the school with but little encouragement, if any, from outside. And his assistant, so long identified with the school, has also done excellent work. The order and dicipline of her room and the high character of the recitations merit all praise. Neither of these teachers can we spare, if the school is to retain its rank. It has reached a high state of efficiency, but we aim at still better things. The large number of pupils and the requirements of the state superintendent necessitate a second assistant. To pay her we need increased funds. Hon, Mr. Tuck has helped us out the first year, but we can scarcely call on him again. We have raised the tuition fees, but shall have to ask an increased appropriation from the town. The small increase of one hundred dollars will not be be appreciably felt by the tax payers, and we know that it will be cheerfully granted. The value of the school to the scholars and the credit it reflects on the town will not permit of any backward steps. What would Hampton be without its Academy?
