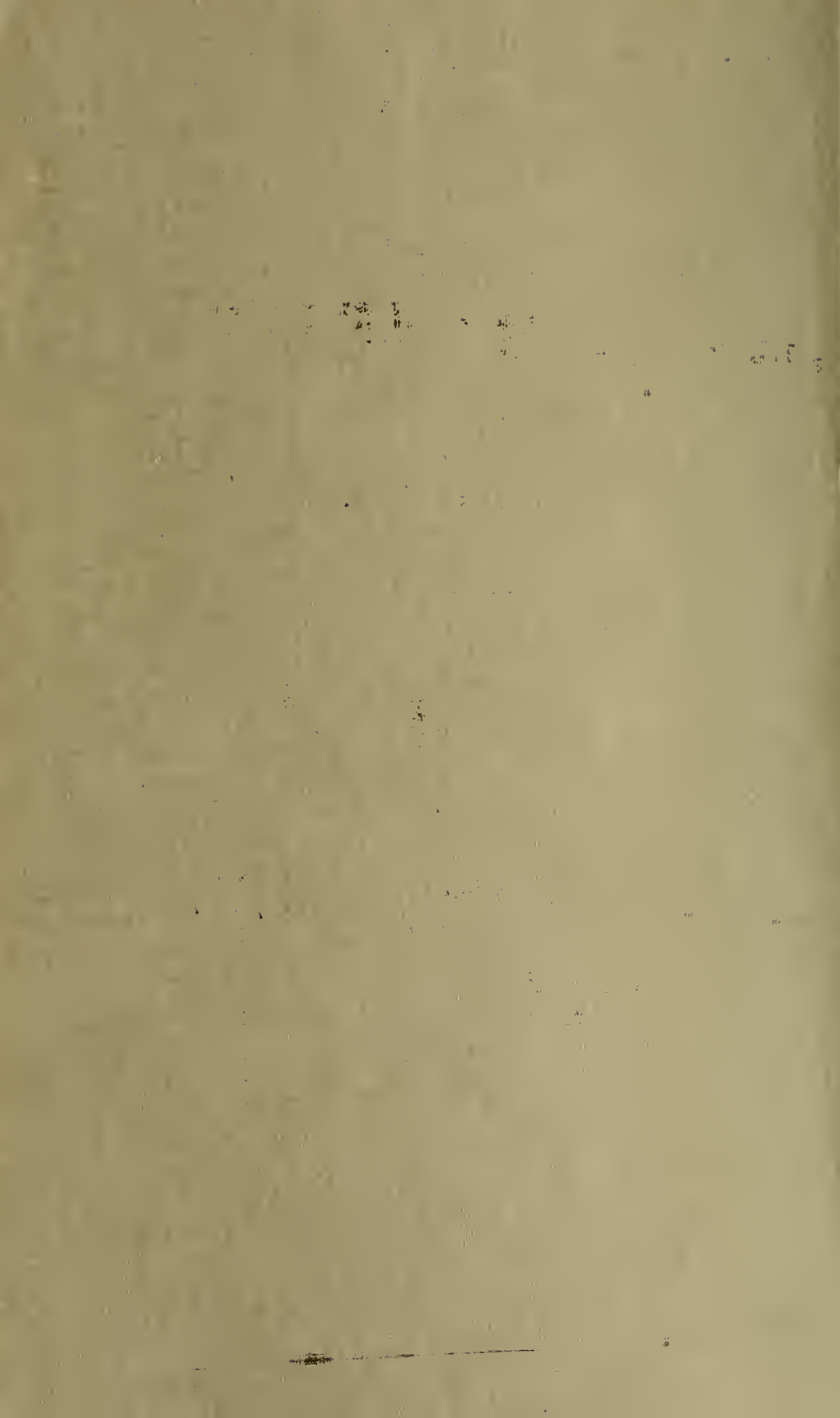

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
MARCH 11, 1924

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

Article 1. To elect delegates at large, Alternate delegates at large, Delegates and Alternate delegates to the National Conventions of the Republican and Democrat parties, to be held to Nominate party Candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

Article 2. To choose a clerk for ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for three years.

Article 4. To choose Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Trust funds, Auditor, Library Trustees, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers Salaries, Town Officers' Expenses, Elections and Registrations, Municipal Court, Care and supplies for Town Hall, Police Department, Fire Department, Moth Department, Health Department, Red Cross, Highways and Bridges, Street lights, Library, Town Poor, Memorial Day,

Parks and Playgrounds, Cemetery, Sewer Department, Interest, Sidewalks, Comfort Station, Breakwater, Town Notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to buy a motor chemical to be centrally located for use in Hampton village.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to build an outside stairway on rear of Town Hall to be used in case of fire, also to buy new settees for use in Town Hall.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make a contract with the Exeter and Hampton Electric Co. for a term of five (5) years, in regard to street lighting.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to have all night lighting service for streets, and appropriate money for same.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote that the Town Hall shall be of free use to our churches and school benefits, (except to pay the janitor a nominal fee for his services) and leave the same recorded in the town records for indefinite time.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Estate of Joseph B. Brown the sum of Five Hundred Dollars in recognition of services rendered the Town of Hampton.

Article 13. To see if the Town will appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of establishing a Town forest and make recommendations at the regular Town Meeting in March, 1925.

Article 14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying two (2) traffic beacons, one to be placed at "Lane's Corner" and one at "Whittier's Corner."

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to buy a new gravel pit, or see any old gravel pits now owned by the Town.

Article 16. To pass any other vote or votes that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
HELD MARCH 11, 1924

In accordance with a notice duly signed and legally posted, the legal voters of the Town of Hampton assembled at the time and place therein named and were called to order by the Moderator, Byron E. Redman, who read the warrant.

Prayer was offered by Rev. John Cummings.

Article 1. Howell M. Lamprey was appointed temporary Moderator to receive votes for delegates at large and Alternate Delegates at large to the National Conventions of the Republican and Democrat parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States, Charles F. Adams acting as Clerk for said purpose. It was voted that the Polls close at 3 o'clock P. M.

Chose—Warren H. Hobbs, Town Clerk, who was duly sworn.

Chose—Edwin L. Batchelder, Selectman for three years, who was duly sworn.

Chose—Chester G. Marston, Town Treasurer.

Chose—William Brown, Collector of Taxes.

Chose—Kenneth N. Ross, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, who was duly sworn.

Chose—Simeon A. Shaw, Charles F. Adams, and Howell M. Lamprey, Auditors for the ensuing year, who were duly sworn.

Chose—Charles M. Batchelder, Library Trustee, for three years.

Voted—All other necessary officers of the Town be left to appointment by the Selectmen.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate \$125,500.00 to be distributed according to the recommendations of the Budget Committee.

Voted—That the Selectmen be given power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. John W. R. Brooks gave data as to a Ford LaFrance Fire Truck.

Voted—That the Selectmen be instructed to look into the advisability of buying a fire apparatus and that they be empowered to appropriate \$2,400 for the same.

Voted—That the sum of \$1500.00 be raised and appropriated to build fire escapes on the Town Hall.

Voted—That all work of the Town be done by contract.

Voted—To take up Articles 9 and 10 jointly.

Voted—That the Selectmen be given power to make a contract for all night lighting service, for a term of five (5) years.

Voted—That Article 11 be left to the Selectmen.

Voted—That Article 12 be indefinitely postponed.

Voted—That Article 13 be indefinitely postponed.

Voted —That the sum of \$265.00 apiece for two beacons be appropriated, one to be placed at "Lane's" corner, and one at "Whittier's Corner" so called.

Voted—That the sum of \$265 be appropriated for a beacon at Elmwood corner.

Voted—That the Selectmen be empowered to sell any or all gravel pits owned by the Town and to purchase any other gravel pits, as they may see fit.

Article 16. Rev. I. S. Jones reported for the Cemetery association.

Voted—That \$300.00 of the Cemetery Fund be set aside to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen on the Pine Grove, South and the Old burying lot at the Landing.

Rev. Edgar Warren made a report of the Ordinance Committee.

Voted—That the Report of the Ordinance Committee be accepted.

Voted—That the Town adopt the Code of Ordinance as suggested by the Ordinance Committee.

Voted—That it is the sense of this meeting that the Selectmen be instructed to find parking space for Automobiles at or near the center of Hampton Beach.

Voted—To adjourn.

RECORD OF PRIMARY ELECTION, SEPTEMBER
2, 1924.

In conformity with a notice posted at the Town Hall, the Post Office and the office of the Town Clerk the Direct Primary for the Nomination of Candidates for the following officers: Governor, United States Senator,

Representative in Congress, Councilor, County Solicitor, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Register of Probate, County Commissioners (3), Supervisors of the Check-list (3), Moderator, Delegate to the State Convention, was called to order at the Town Hall at ten-thirty o'clock in the forenoon of September 2nd, 1924, by the Moderator of the Town.

The Moderator announced the purpose of the primary and it was then Voted:

That the polls close at six-thirty o'clock P. M.

The Moderator appointed Edward J. Brown and Walter E. Brown to have charge of ballots and Charles D. Palmer and Eugene M. Leavitt to assist voters in preparing their ballots when requested.

The ballots were then distributed to the ballot clerks and the voting proceeded until the appointed time when the Moderator declared the polls closed.

Selectmen's Report

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF HAMPTON

We herewith submit for your consideration the Annual Report of the Town for the Year ending January 31, 1925, and in connection with same, we are making a few general remarks, which we believe will be helpful in understanding the Town Operations for the Current Year.

The Appropriations for the Year, including State and County Taxes, were \$130,495.00. We assessed \$130,310.03, leaving a balance of Unassessed Appropriations of \$184.97, which was paid from other income.

We have expended during the Year \$5,451.42 for a Tractor, which has enabled the Town to keep all of the Roads properly plowed this winter and we believe this venture to be a good investment.

We have also built a Parking Space for Automobiles at Hampton Beach at a cost of \$2,558.50, which has brought in a Net Income of \$1,480.69 for the Current year.

The Tax Rate was reduced from \$30.00 to \$28.00 on a Thousand this Year; this was made possible by an addition in New Taxable Property of \$259,024.00 and also by an increase in other Income.

If due care is used in the Appropriations for the

ensuing Year, we believe, it will be possible to keep the Tax Rate at \$28.00 and also create a surplus for next year, to be taken up by the Town for the redemption of the Railroad Bonds.

The Outstanding State, County, Town and Precinct Taxes of \$16,063.78 and Poll Taxes of \$620.00 have been verified by a reconciliation with the Individual Uncollected Taxes as set forth by the Tax Collector's Commitment Book.

We verified the Amounts due on Tax Sales \$2,305.07 and Land Rents \$1,805.00 and found them to be correct.

LIABILITIES

The Notes and Bonds Outstanding at the end of the Period, aggregating \$164,000.00, we verified and found the same to be in order.

REPORT OF THE WORK OF THE HAMPTON RED CROSS BRANCH FOR 1924

The Hampton Branch of the American Red Cross has during the past year, with the exception of four months following Miss Chadwick's resignation, continued its work of supporting the community Nurse. Miss Eldridge came on duty September fifth. Her principal activity has been at the Centre School where as School Nurse, under the direction of the School Board, she has been on duty daily from 8.30 A. M. until 12 M.

Miss Eldridge is on call for district and emergency visits at any time during the day or night. Since September she has made 366 districts visits and it is hoped that during the coming year the people of Hampton will avail themselves still more of this privilege.

She has taken different groups to the Tuberculosis Clinics for examination, she has reported cases and asked for help whenever conditions seemed to require it, and has received willing aid from different organizations in the town. She has kept in touch with all the new babies and expectant mothers and hopes before long to start a Baby Clinic.

The Committee would like to express its appreciation of the hearty co-operation that this work has had from the Superintendent, and all the teachers in the schools, as well as the parents who have shown so much interest.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Hampton:—

I herewith submit to you my second annual report as superintendent of your public schools. The statistics and general recommendations pertain to both the Center School and the Academy.

THE SITUATION

We are working for improvement. A more regular attendance is resulting and a growing disposition of pupils to conform to standards necessary to building of character and improvement in school work. "Do it Right" and "Better Scholarship" are ideals set for the year. Attainment seems slow but persistent effort of teachers supported by intelligent cooperation of parents will in time bring results desired.

Acknowledgement should here be made of the generous contributions received from the Mothers' Circle, Monday Club, Mens' Club and the Parent-Teachers' Association, and from individuals who have taken such a keen interest in the school's welfare and progress.

TEACHERS

Our teaching staff as a whole has been strengthened. Of a total of eleven teachers seven were new in September. This is a 64% turnover. Such a change is a handicap to the schools, especially when the loss of strong teachers is involved. It takes time for a new staff to adjust itself and the schools suffer in the process. Changes will occur but our policy should be to make conditions of living, work and salary so attractive that superior teachers one employed may be retained on permanent tenure.

JANITOR SERVICE

The care of the Center building particularly during the winter season is becoming too great for one man to handle effectively. Our standards of cleanliness, temperature and ventilation during the day, plus an average of two to three evenings a week cannot be maintained with one janitor. The burning of soft coal and the increasing use of the building for community purposes is beginning to produce a deteriorating effect upon the building which can only be offset by more frequent cleaning. I suggest a part-time assistant for this purpose. The service at the Academy has greatly improved and is now as satisfactory as it is possible to make it in an old building of its type.

THE ACADEMY

Work at the Academy is constantly improving. Needed repairs, electric lights, athletic activities, with higher standards of effort, have furnished incentive to both teachers and pupils. The school is now facing a brighter future and a wider usefulness. The outstanding need still is a closer application that will result in a higher degree of scholarship. Few pupils can do the work required in a high school of standard grade with less than two hours a day of serious study at home. This must be expected if Hampton pupils are to compete successfully with those from other schools.

ORGANIZATION

By combining two grades in each room the number of elementary schools has been reduced from four to three. Unless future first grade entering classes increase in size this organization may well become per-

manent. On the other hand the Junior High School, grades VII., VIII., and IX., has increased from 83 to 106, due in part to an unusually large seventh grade and in part to the number of tuition pupils from North Hampton and Hampton Falls. In 1923-1924 there were 13 non-resident pupils registered in these classes, this year there are 27.

HEALTH

The annual medical inspection was completed in September. The following cases were found and reported:

Many parents have made serious attempt to remedy these defects and with excellent results. The work of the school nurse, the dental clinic and the recess milk service, all contribute to improvement. 59 vaccinations have occurred during the year. An average of 60 pupils out of total of 210 take milk regularly at recess, and 25 take the hot lunch served at noon. This service is entirely self-supporting. Following is the report for the school year 1923-1924:

MUSIC

The persistence with which the school orchestra has kept to its practice under discouragement and loss of membership reflects much credit upon its members and director. A complete set of drums has been secured and fully paid for. A mandolin club of twenty members recently started will add much to the musical life of the school. I hope soon to see a glee club at the Academy.

IN THE COMMUNITY

The Centre building is rightly becoming a real community center. The frequent gatherings of community organizations in hall and lunch room have been very gratifying. In just this way is the building serving its real purpose.

During the year 1923-1924, 26 moving picture entertainments were given on Friday or Saturday evening. An extended trial proved Friday to be the more desirable for the larger number. Following is the financial report:

This deficit was wisely met from school funds available. This year the attendance has thus far averaged 103 per night. There must be at least 106 persons in attendance for the program to be self-supporting.

SUPERVISION

In a Union like ours time will not permit close supervision of class room work. The best a superintendent can do lies in the assistance he can render to School Boards, in transmitting aims and encouragement to teachers, and in providing adequate material for good teaching. His heaviest responsibility is in finding suitable teachers. School visits for their own sake mean little. Monthly bulletins to teachers have been issued throughtout the year. The assistance of an efficient clerk in the office has rendered relief from much of the necessary routine and provided more time for the larger affairs. Each town is a separate unit with a distinct individuality of its own making widely different demands upon the superintendent's time. There has been little chance for organizing the Union as a unit. For further data I refer you to the tables following.

Street Railway

ANNUAL REPORT

To the Stockholders of the Exeter, Hampton & Amesbury Street Railway:

Your Directors submit herewith General Balance Sheet showing Assets and Liabilities as of December 31, 1924, also figures on Railway Operating Income and Expense for 1924, the latter showing a deficit of \$9,261.74.

Analysis of the report shows a slight improvement on the actual operating loss over last year, but after accounting for special income and interest charges the final figure shows a small increase over that of 1923.

We have made a consistent reduction in the expense accounts but loss of revenue has practically offset the saving.

The year of 1924 was the last in which the Street Railway was obligated to assist in the expense of amusements at Hampton Beach, and in view of the conditions the Directors feel that the Railway should be relieved of this expense in the future. Since taking over the Railway we have contributed \$9,252.76 toward band concerts and fireworks at Hampton Beach, and in considering the deficits which have been incurred the Street Railway should receive credit for this item. If the Railway had not contributed toward this expense, without doubt the business interests at Hampton Beach would have been called upon to meet this expense.

The Directors believe that the increase in fare be-

tween Hampton, Hampton Beach and North Beach has not operated to the disadvantage of the Road. It is reasonable to suppose that our deficit would have been larger without it when it is pointed out that other railways operating to Hampton Beach showed a loss of riding of between 25% and 30% during June, July and August, 1924, as compared with 10.8% loss for the same period on our own Road.

The snow expense was very much less this year and considerable more was done to improve the roadbed and overhead lines than was done in 1923.

Although the Railway operated more car miles in 1924 than in 1923, the cost of power has been less and, as the rate per kilowatt hour for electric current has not changed, this saving is attributed to the continued use of the new one man car. It might be interesting to state that since its purchase the new car has been in operation nearly continuously and has not needed any repairs to electrical equipment, whereas we are continually spending money for repairs to electrical equipment on the old cars.

In view of the fact that more money was spent in improving the roadbed this year and that we operated more miles than in 1923 at a less cost for power, it would seem that our results of operation are better than is indicated by the deficit, and with business conditions on the upward trend, coupled with relief from expense of amusements at Hampton Beach, we feel that the results of operations for 1925 should be better.

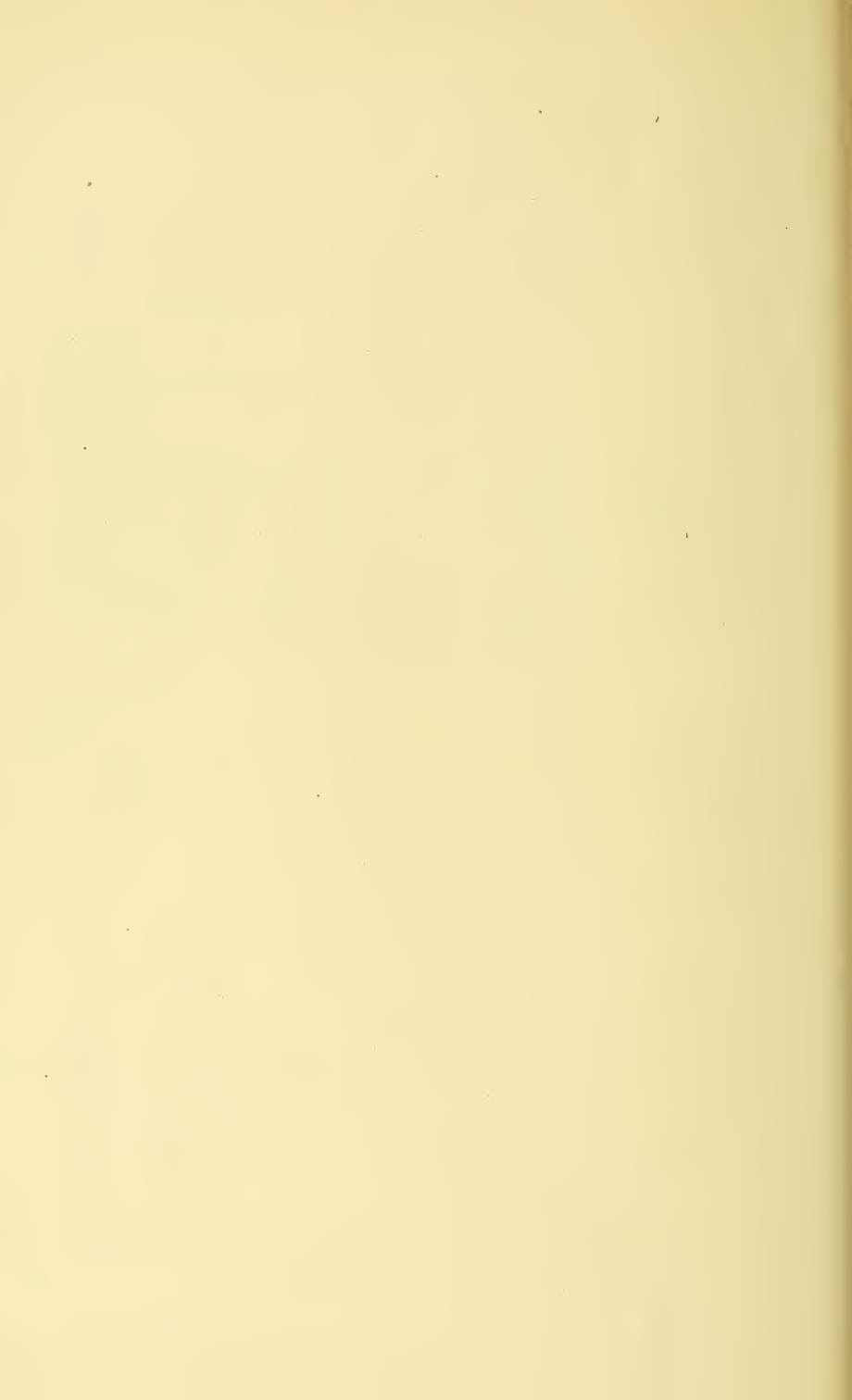

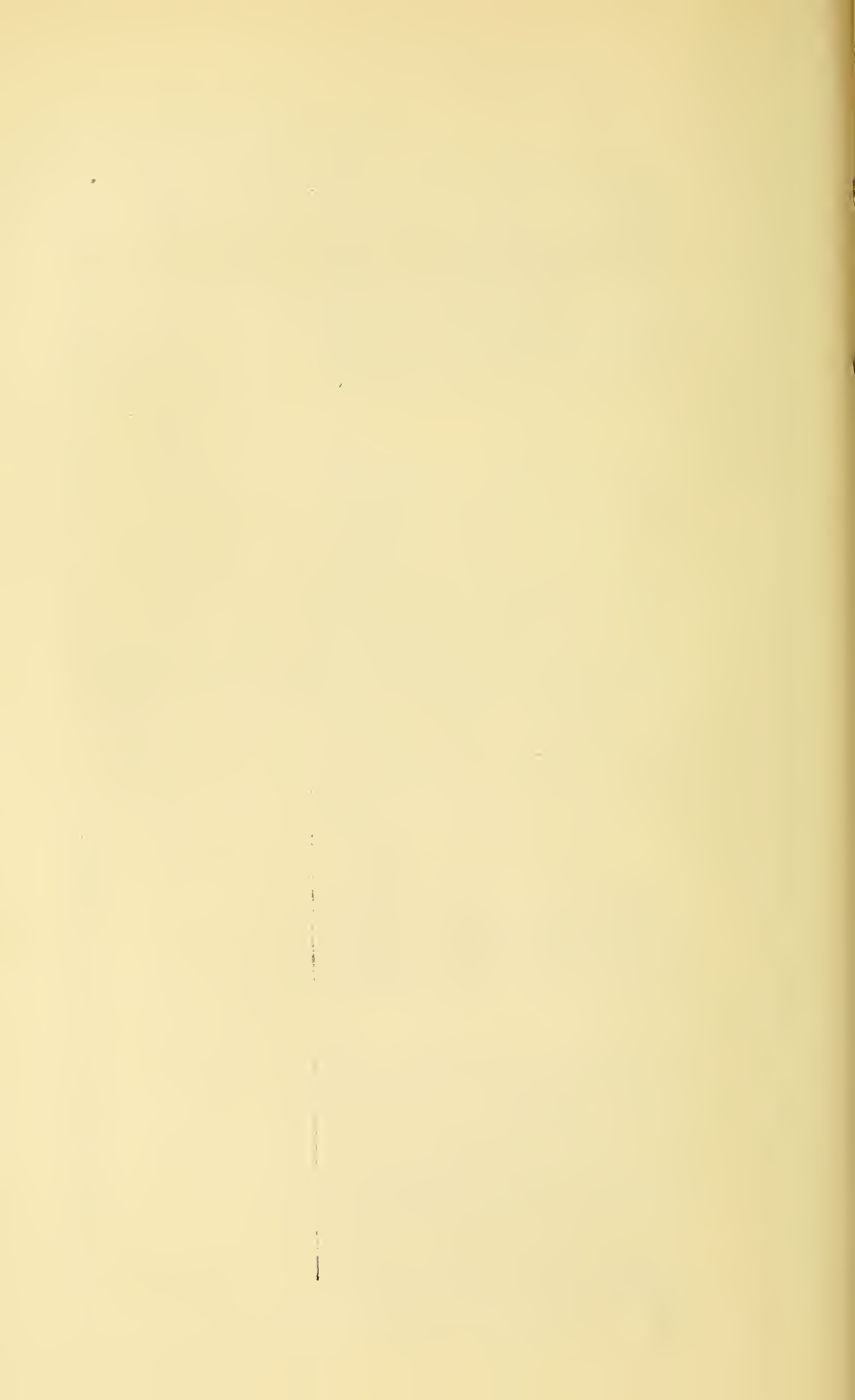
