WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 10, 1925

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Hampton in the county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are notified to meet at the town hall, in said Hampton, on Tuesday the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
Article 2. To choose one Selectman for three years.

Article 3. To choose Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Trust Funds, Auditors, Library Trustee and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town officers salaries, Town officers' expenses, Election and Registration, Municipal Court, care and supplies for Town hall, Police Department, Fire Department, Moth Department, Health Department, Red Cross, Highways and Bridges, Street Lights, Library, Town Poor, Memorial Day, Parks and Playgrounds, Cemetery, Sewer Department, Interest, Sidewalks, Comfort Station, Breakwater, Town Notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to turn over to the school district the land adjoining the school property, now belonging to the town.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400 to be used for the suppression of Pine Blister.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to take over the street known as Highland Avenue.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2500 to help maintain the band at Hampton Beach.

Article 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to removing the bath houses south of the Coast Guard Station at North Beach.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000 to be expended on the highway from Nook Run, so called, toward North Beach.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to permanently adopt the Code of Ordinances with suitable amendments if necessary.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to install fire alarm boxes in town and raise money for same.

Article 13. To pass any other vote or votes that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, HELD MARCH 10, 1925

In accordance with the foregoing notice the legal voters of the Town of Hampton assembled at the place therein named, and were called to order by the Moderator at 10 o'clock A. M., on the day specified in said notice.

The Moderator read the warrant and prayer was offered by the Rev. John Cummings.

The Town Officers being elected by the Australian Ballot System.

Howell M. Lamprey was appointed Moderator Pro Tem.

Charles F. Adams acted as Clerk Pro Tem.

Ballot Clerks Ernest W. Towle and Eugene M. Leavitt were appointed to take charge of the distribution of the ballots and Clyde W. Brown and Frank S. Mason to assist in marking ballots for those needing assistance.

The Moderator asked for and received the ballots from the Town Clerk and they were distributed to the election officers.

Voted: That the polls for balloting for Town Officers be closed at Three o'clock P. M.

Chose: Abbot L. Joplin, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Chose: Sarah M. Lane, Library Trustee for three years.

Voted: That \$13,500 be substituted for \$9,000 as asked for in the budget.

Voted: That the budget be adopted as amended, and that the sum of \$98,350 be raised and appropriated as called for therein.

WARREN H. HOBBS, Town Clerk. Voted: That the land adjoining the Central School House extending as far back as the back line of the J. Freeman Williams estate be turned over by the town and become the property of the School District.

Voted: That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the suppression of the White Pine Blister.

Voted: That the town accept as its property Highland Avenue, so-called.

Voted: That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 to help maintain the band at Hampton Beach, provided, that one band concert shall be given by said band at the village each week.

Voted: That the Selectmen be instructed to cause to be removed before the end of the year the bath houses south of the Coast Guard Station at North Beach.

Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized to erect a public bath house at North Beach or to issue a permit to a responsible person to erect and run the same under the supervision of the Town as in their judgment seems best.

Voted: That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to be expended on Nook Run road, so called.

Voted: That the Town Ordinances adopted by the Town in Annual meeting, assembled March 11, 1924, be hereby amended by inserting in Article X Paragraph 1, the word, "victualer's license \$15.00"; that the said Ordances so amended be adopted as the rules and regulations of the Town of Hampton and entered upon the records of the Town Clerk.

Voted: That the Town install a Fire Alarm System in the village and that the sum of \$4500.00 be raised and appropriated for the same.

Voted: That the Town is in favor of cooperating with the Meeting House Green Memorial Association in the exercises to be held October 14, 1925, and that the following committee be appointed to that end:

Town Ordinances

The following are the Town Ordinances as amended and adopted under Article 8 of the Warrant for 1925.

CHAPTER I

Classification

SECTION I. The Rules and Regulations for the guidance of the various departments of the municipal government of the Town of Hampton, and for convenient use of citizens generally, as hereinafter presented shall be known as the Code of Ordinances of Hampton.

SECTION II. Rules and Regulations in this code shall be classified in the following departments: Town Meetings, Town Officers, Police, Fire, Public Health, Highways and Sidewalks, Public Parks and Playgrounds, Building Laws, Miscellaneous.

CHAPTER II

Town Meetings

SECTION I. The annual town meetings for the election of officers and transaction of business shall be held

on Tuesday after the second Monday in March.

SECTION II. The election of major officers shall be by the Australian ballot. The following officers shall be so elected: one member of the board of selectmen for three years; a town clerk; a treasurer; a collector of taxes; three auditors. All other necessary officers shall be chosen in open meeting or by appointment by the selectmen as the annual meeting may determine. Questions of policy and matters of extraordinary importance may be placed upon the Australian ballot when feasible to do so.

SECTION III. The polls for the Australian ballot shall open with the opening of the annual meeting at

such hour as the legal warrant for the same shall determine, and shall be closed at 4 o'clock in the afternoon unless otherwise voted by the meeting in which the election occurs.

The transaction of other matters legally in the warrant may proceed in the usual manner and no appropriation may legally be made unless the subject matter to which the appropriation applies has been definitely expressed by an article in the warrant, except in cases where committees or agents appointed at a previous meeting may be voted sums of money necessary to continue or complete their work.

SECTION IV. Notice of every town meeting shall be given by publication of a copy of the warrant in at least one issue of a newspaper published in said town, the first publication to be at least seven days before the date of the meeting; also by posting copies of the warrant in three or more public places in said town fourteen days at least before the date of the meeting.

SECTION V. All voting in town meetings, except in cases for which the Australian ballot provides, and in cases where the meeting otherwise orders, shall be by a show of hands. If the result is in doubt the Moderator shall count or cause to be counted the uplifted hands. If still in doubt, or if the result is questioned by seven voters, the Moderator shall poll the house or cause the checklist to be used.

SECTION VI. No motion, the effect of which would be to dissolve the meeting, shall be in order, except by unanimous consent, until every article in the warrant has been duly considered and acted on, but this shall not preclude the postponement of consideration of any article to an adjournment of the meeting at a stated time.

SECTION VII. No person shall address the meeting unless recognized by the Moderator, nor speak more than once on the same subject to the exclusion of any other who may desire to speak.

SECTION VIII. Any person who is employed as an attorney by another interested in any matter under discussion at a town meeting shall disclose the fact of his employment before speaking thereon, nor shall he speak

until granted the privilege by the meeting.

SECTION IX. The Moderator shall appoint all committees at the town meeting unless the town otherwise directs. He may direct that only voters be admitted to the place of meeting or to a definite portion thereof.

SECTION X. All committees shall report as directed by the town. If not report is made within a year after the appointment, the committee shall be discharged unless, in the meantime, the town grant an extension of time.

SECTION XI. The Moderator shall be guided by a standard manual of Parliamentary Law, so far as the same is applicable to a town meeting.

SECTION XII. These ordinances may be amended at any annual meeting by major vote, provided specific notice of the proposed amendment is given by an article in the warrant for such annual meeting.

CHAPTER III

Officers of the Town

SECTION I. General provisions applicable to all

permanent boards and officers.

All officers, boards and committees having permanent clerical assistance shall keep their offices open for public business from 9 A. M. to 4 P. M. every week day except Saturday and then from 9 A. M. to 1 P. M.

SECTION II. All officers, boards and committees shall notify the Town Clerk of their organization and office hours of time of stated meeting and all officers of the town shall have their qualification through the administering of the oath of office recorded with the town clerk, and no officer shall perform his duties until such recording has been made.

SECTION III. No contract, involving an obligation of the town, exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars shall at any time be made, except by vote of the committee or board thereunto duly authorized having supervision of the department to which the same relates. Such vote shall be recorded and such records shall be open to inspection.

SECTION IV. No contract, involving an obligation of the town exceeding the sum of five hundred dollars, shall be binding upon the town, unless it is in writing and is signed by at least a majority of the board or committee in charge of the work on the part of the town.

SECTION V. No board or officers shall make any contract in behalf of the town, the execution of which shall necessarily extend beyond one year from the date thereof, unless specific authority so to do has been given by vote of the town.

SECTION VI. The duly elected officers of the town shall perform their statutory duties and such other duties as these ordinances and amendments hereafter at any time may describe.

SECTION VII. Selectmen. The Board of Selectmen shall be the recognized head of the several departments enumerated in Chapter 1, Section 2, with the authority of appointment of chief and subordinates, and their removal from office; they shall issue all licenses not otherwise provided for and they shall cause the enforcement of these ordinances and prosecute officers of any of the provisions therein; they shall cause this Code of Ordinances to be printed in pamphlet form at the expense of the town; and shall keep a supply on hand for free distribution upon application.

- 2. The Selectmen may appear, either personally or by the town counsel, or by special counsel before any court, or any State or County board, or commission, to protect the interests of the town, but are not authorized by these ordinances to commit the town to any course of action.
- 3. All conveyances of land or interest in land shall be signed by a majority of the Board of Selectmen, unless otherwise provided by law or by vote of the town, and sealed with the town seal.
- 4. The Selectmen shall defend all suits brought against the town, and may settle at their discretion any claim or suit to which the town is a party, which does not require the payment of more than One Thousand Dollars. Any settlement requiring a payment greater than One Thousand Dollars except as authorized by law shall be

made only when authorized by the voters at a town meeting. The selectmen shall bring any necessary suits to collect sums due the town.

SECTION VIII. Town Clerk—The Town Clerk shall keep and cause to be permanently bound, one or more files of the town reports. He shall notify, or cause to be notified, all persons chosen or elected by the town or appointed on committees, of their election, choice or appointment. He shall furnish all boards and committees with a copy of all votes affecting them. He shall not allow original papers or documents of the town to be taken from his office, except as they remain in his custody, or by authority of law.

- 2. He shall furnish blanks, with appropriate headings, upon which petitions, reports and other papers in the ordinary course of town proceedings, may be prepared.
- 3. The Town Clerk shall furnish the various town officers and committees a copy of such action of the town as effects them respectively immediately after the town meeting.

SECTION IX. Collector of Taxes—The Collector of Taxes shall have committed to him the land rents for collection in the same manner as poll and property taxes. He may be a clerk to the Selectmen and perform all the clerical and financial duties of such office.

SECTION X. Treasurer—The Treasurer if required by the Selectmen, shall maintain an open office as provided in Chapter III, Section 1. He shall be present at the regular weekly meetings of the selectmen for the payment of bills, and shall issue his checks for all orders drawn upon him by the Selectmen at the said meeting.

- 2. The Treasurer shall make a record in a book kept for the purpose, of each appropriation, with the list of the warrants drawn against such appropriation, and he shall also make a record in a book, kept for the purpose, of all bonds, notes, or other evidence of indebtedness of the town.
- 3. He shall be the custodian of all deeds, contracts, bonds and insurance policies, belonging to the town, ex-

cept that the bond of the Treasurer shall be in the custody of the Chairman of the Selectmen.

SECTION XI. Auditors—The Auditors are empowered and directed to carefully audit the accounts of all town officers required by law to keep accounts; to see that the same are kept in accordance with an approved system of bookkeeping; to examine into the source of receipts and expenditures with full authority to obtain evidence from banks or individuals pertaining to the same, and to call in an expert accountant whenever, in their opinion, such advice is necessary; to see that all accounts are properly cast and well vouched; to report in full to the town the state of its finances and all their findings thereon.

SECTION XII. Appropriation Committee—The budget for town expenditures to be voted at each annual town meeting shall be made by a committee which shall be known as an appropriation committee, said committee to be composed of the board of selectmen, clerk, treasurer, school district treasurer, auditors, highway agent, president of the street railway and seven property tax payers, the latter to be elected annually in town meeting or appointed by the selectmen. Said committee shall hold meetings in January and February of each year, to study the needs and resources of the town and make up therefrom a budget of minimum appropriations, for town expenditures, and to have said budget printed in the annual town report preceding the town meeting from which the budget is made. The members of the committee shal serve without pay.

CHAPTER IV

Police Department

SECTION I. The appointment, control and compensation of the police shall be in the hands of the selectmen.

SECTION II. As soon as possible after the annual town meeting the selectmen shall designate a chief of police and patrolmen; and members of the force shall hold office until their successors are appointed or they are removed by the selectmen.

SECTION III. Charges against any officer for incom-

petency, immorality or neglect of duty may be preferred to the selectmen by any responsible person; and the selectmen shall immediately investigate such charges and take such action as they think the occasion demands.

CHAPTER V

Fire Department

SECTION I. The Fire Department shall be under the authority of the Selectmen. They shall have the power of appointment, dismissal, control and compensation of any or all members of the force, prescribe rules and regulations for the department and for the public.

CHAPTER VI

Public Health

SECTION I. Suitable galvanized iron garbage cans with covers shall be provided at every store, hotel, or dwelling house, and at such other convenient points as may be designated by the Selectmen, by the owner or lessee of the property, for the disposal of garbage and refuse, such as may become putrid or offensive. The contents of these cans shall be removed daily by direction of the selectmen at the expense of the town, and the material buried or burned so as not to create a nuisance or provide a breeding place for flies. All ashes and other waste material shall be removed at such times and in such manner as may be prescribed by the Seelctmen. Any violation of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

SECTION II. It shall be unlawful for any person to spit upon any sidewalk, in the compact part of the town or beach, hall or public place, or street railway car, except into spittoons or receptacles provided for that purpose.

SECTION III. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw upopn the sidewalk, in the compact part of the town or beach, hall or public place, any waste matter from any fruit or any paper or other offensive or unsightly substance, except into receptacles provided for that purpose.

SECTION IV. Any person violating either of the two preceding provisions shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

SECTION V. The term "public place" shall be construed to include all territory between Ocean Boulevard and low water mark, from the North Hampton line to the mouth of Hampton River, except such land as may be subject to private ownership or control.

SECTION VI. No entrance to the public sewer shall be permitted until after application to the selectmen has been made and a permit issued to the applicants, and the entrance fee of fifty dollars paid.

Extracts From Public Health Laws of the State of New Hampshire

- (a) If any person shall place, leave, or cause to be placed or left, in or nera a highway, street, alley or public place, or shall allow to be exposed, unburied, any animal or other substance liable to become putrid or offensive, or injurious to the public health, he shall be fined not exceeding twenty dollars; and the health officers shall remove the same.
- (b) If any person place, leave or cause to be placed or left, in or near a pond, reservoir, or stream tributary thereto, from which the water supply for domestic purposes of the town is taken, in whole or in part, any substance or fluid that may cause the water thereof to become impure or unfit for such purposes, he shall be fined not exceeding twenty dollars, or be imprisoned not exceeding thirty days, or both.
- (c) The board of health of the town, or commissioners or proprietors having charge of the water supply, may remove such substance or fluid; and may recover the expense of removal from the person who placed the same or caused it to be placed in or near the water as aforesaid, in an action in the case.

CHAPTER VII

Highways and Sidewalks

SECTION I. As soon as feasible after the annual town meeting the selectmen shall appoint a highway agent, who shall have the same power and perform the same duties as a highway agent elected by the town. Such agent shall be sworn to the faithful discharge of his duty, give bonds to the satisfaction of the selectmen, and be responsible to them for the expenditure of money and discharge of his duties generally. The compensation of said agent shall be fixed by the selectmen, and he shall render to the selectmen a weekly statement of his expenditures and receive money from the treasurer only on the order of the selectmen.

2. No person shall drive any horse upon any sidewalk, nor allow any truck or vehicle to stand upon or obstruct any sidewalk or cross walk, except when loading or unloading goods or crossing the walk necessarily.

No person except a duly authorized of-SECTION III. ficer of the town shall, without a permit from the selectmen, dig up any portion of a public way or obstruct any public way for the purpose of erecting, repairing, altering, or removing any building. Every permit granted, as aforesaid, shall specify the length of time it shall continue in force, and a copy shall be given to the Highway Agent, and every person receiving such permit shall execute a written agreement to indemnify and save harmless the town against all damages or cost by reason of any claim for damages on account of the existence of such obstruction or excavation, and the selectmen may impose such conditions, terms and limitations as they shall see fit in respect to erecting barricades, maintaining lights and taking other precautions for the safety of travelers.

SECTION IV. The laws of the State relating to crimes and offences against highways, such as putting ashes, glass or other dangerous substances on the roadbed, riding bicycles on the sidewalks, digging up highways unlawfully, defacing of signboards, lights on vehicles, etc., shall be enforced.

SECTION V. The selectmen shall provide suitable dumping places, conveniently located, for rubbish, waste paper, ashes, boxes, barrels, metal containers, and other unsightly substances, and shall designate each dumping place by a sign with the words, "Public Dump" painted thereon.

SECTION VI. Any person dumping rubbish, waste paper, ashes, boxes, barrels, metal containers, or other unsightly substance, by the side of any highway in any part of the town, shall be fined \$10, and the fine shall be for the benefit of the person making and sustaining the complaint; but if the complaint is made by an officer or employee of the town, the fine shall enure to the town.

SECTION VII. Automobilists stopping their machines and eating lunch on or by the side of any highway in the town are forbidden to leave any food, waste, paper

or paper boxes, or any unsightly substance on or beside the highway or on any land adjacent, under penalty of a fine of \$10, to be paid to the person making and sustaining the complaint.

CHAPTER VIII

Public Parks and Play Grounds

The establishment, development and maintenance of public parks and playgrounds shall be under the direction of the selectmen.

They shall make rules and regulations for governing the same, and may receive private subscriptions for

the benefit of the department.

In the development of the Center school playground the selectmen shall recognize as a policy of the town a general scheme of scientific layout under direction of a competent landscape architect.

CHAPTER IX

Building Laws

SECTION I. The Town of Hampton having adopted Chapter 40, Section 1 of the Public Statutes, as amended by Session Laws of 1903, Section 1 and 2 in regard to an Inspector of Buildings, shall elect or appoint some suitable person who shall act as Building Inspector and some suitable person to issue permits and some suitable person to act as Inspector of Electric Light and Wiring.

SECTION II. Any person who shall hereafter erect or remodel a building in said Town of Hampton, if there be a chimney in said construction or remodeled building, such chimney must be built from the ground, and all chimneys shall be constructed with a flue-lining. All buildings remodeled or constructed, shall have fire stops between each story, and all wood-work shall be free and

clear of the chimney.

SECTION III. Any person who intends to erect or remodel a building in the Town of Hampton, shall first have received a permit from that person elected or appointed to issue said permit, for which permit, he or she shall pay the sum of ten dollars, to that person issuing said permit. Said person qualified to issue any building permit, shall receive the sum of two dollars. Said Building Inspector shall be paid four dollars and the Wire Inspector, shall be paid four dollars.

ARTICLE X

Miscellaneous Provisions

1. LICENSES. The selectmen are authorized and empowered to issue licenses to and to collect the prescribed fees from persons engaged in the following pursuits:

- 2. No person shall go from place to place in this town selling or bartering, or carrying or exposing for sale or barter, any fruits, vegetables, fish in or from any cart, wagon or other vehicle, or in any other manner, without a license therefor from the Board of Selectmen; provided, however, that this section shall not apply to any person who sells only fruits or vegetables raised or produced by himself or his family within the limits of the town, or fish, lobsters or clams which he obtained by his own labor or the labor of his family.
- 3. The Board of Selectmen shall have authority to grant such license to any person of good repute for morals and integrity who is, or has declared his intention to become, a citizen of the United States. Said licenses unless sooner revoked by the Board of Selectmen, shall expire one year after the granting thereof, and each person so licensed shall pay therefor a fee of \$10 (ten dollars.)

Nothing in these ordinances shall be construed as conflicting with any license issued under the authority of the State.

4. Payment of Bills. Orders upon the town treasurer by the selectmen in settlement of claims against the town shall be issued only at regular sessions of the board each Friday afternoon from 2 to 4 o'clock, or such other time as the selectmen may establish, and no such order may be issued unless a majority of the board are present and sign the order. The treasurer shall attend these sessions and issue checks to correspond with the orders issued by the selectmen.

- 5. Where no specific penalties for fractures of these ordinances are stated said penalties shall be as provided or permitted by the Statutes in such cases.
- 6. By the adoption of the foregoing rules and regulations into this code of ordinances, the validity of any previous vote of the Town is not impaired, except insofar as any previous vote conflicts with these rules and regulations, and in each case such votes are hereby repealed.
- 7. With the adoption of this code of ordinance, or any amendment thereto, or any part thereof, by a majority vote at a legally called town meeting, the same shall forthwith become the by-laws of the Town of Hampton and the said adoption carries with it the adoption of any sections of the public statutes as are necessary to make the provisions of such sections legally part of these by-laws.

TOWN WARRANT

I S. THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose by Australian ballot the following officers: Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and Auditor.
- 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Expenses, Election and Registration, Municipal Court, Care and Supplies of Town Hall, Police Department, Fire Department, Moth Department, Health Department, Red Cross, Highways and Bridges, Street Lights, Library, Town Poor, Memorial Day, Parks and Playgrounds, Cemetery, Sewer Department, Interest, Sidewalks, Comfort Station, Breakwater, Town Notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.
- 4. To see if the Town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500 to be used to put a roof on bandstand in Depot yard.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a seal for use in Town printing provided there be no expense to same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to have the clerk's record codified, and made more accessible for examination under the direction of the Town Clerk and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Code of Ordinances by striking out the word "three" in the fifth line Section 2, Article 3, and inserting the word "one". So that the Town will not be bound to choose more than one auditor by the Australian Ballot.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue all service on Exeter, Hampton and Amesbury Street Railway and see what disposition will be made with the property.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action of the Directors of the Street Railway in discontinuing with operation.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Railway Committee as follows: That street car service shall not commence before May 30th or continue after September 30th, and that only that part of the system extending from the Car Barn to Hampton Beach and along the Beach to the North Beach Transfer shall be operated.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Railway Committee to dispose of the materials in the

Smithtown Branch, and that part of the system from the car barn to Exeter, either at auction or private sale, as may be deemed best by the committee, together with such other materials as may not be needed for the curtailed operations contemplated and that the proceeds be applied to reducing the amount of outstanding Railway Bonds.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to purchase a tractor and snow plow.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money equal to the sum appropriated by the State to build a breakwater south of the Coast Guard Station.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to help maintain the band.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1500 to be expended on "Guinea Road" so called.
- 17. On the petition of Mary C. Toppan and fifteen others, to see if the Town will vote to rescind a vote passed at the annual meeting which called "for the removal of bath houses near the beach on that part known as the North Shore."
- 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Old Home Week Celebration.
- 19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Breakwater at the Pines.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I hereby recommend that the Town Commissioners and the Beach Commissioners take some step to stop the increasing fire menace of the dump on Marsh avenue, which is increasing each year very largely; it being in one of the most highly valued districts of the Beach. The Chief believes that an incinerator to be erected at the foot of Highland avenue and Gravel pit, would do away with this fire menace is this highly valued district. That \$400. be appropriated for a new fire alarm box to be located near over-head bridge on Lafayette road going toward Hampton Falls. This would also increase the box system on Exeter road, one or two boxes, going North. That the Department be increased three permanent men. This would only add two working men to the force, as one man would be on "day off" every day of the week, as each man has one day in five.

All persons in Town of Hampton and Beach starting fires shall obtain written permit from me before doing so. If you wish for permit telephone Central Fire Station, (telephone No. 202) and permit will be issued or delivered to persons asking for same.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton:

I herewith submit to you my first annual report as superintendent of the Hampton Schools.

My term of office began October 1, 1925. During my four months of service I have endeavored to become acquainted with the people of the town, with the schools of the town, the teachers and the pupils, and to obtain a thorough knowledge of the situation with its problems and with the plans for future development.

The citizens of Hampton and the School Board especially are to be congratulated for the splendid school building which you have provided for the elementary and Junior High School pupils of the town.

Of ample size for its purpose, fitted with modern conveniences, provided with an assembly hall for both school and community purposes, and located on a lot spacious enough for wide lawns and shrubbery and for all sorts of games and sports, our school building ranks as one of the best for its purpose in the State.

I found the school well-organized with three elementary rooms containing two grades each and with the grades seven, eight and nine united in a Junior High School with departmental work. The latter is recognized by the State Educational Department as a Standard Junior High School, and as such is entitled to receive tuition students from surrounding towns. Hampton Falls sends practically all of its seventh and eighth grade pupils and many of its ninth grade pupils, and Seabrook and North Hampton send several ninth grade pupils to our Junior High School.

I consider that Hampton Academy, which serves as the Senior High School for the town, is in excellent condition at the present time. It has an efficient corps of teachers under the principalship of Russell H. Leavitt. The number of pupils enrolled and the average membership have increased over those of last year, and are now approaching the limit of the capacity of the building.

It is not too early for steps to be taken to start a building fund for the erection of an adequate building for the use of the Academy. Meantime we must add to our available equipment and maintain the standard of the teaching force.

A savings bank organized last April to encourage thrift among the pupils has at present 146 depositors and bank balances amounting to \$760.00.

Owing to the scattered population of our town many of the pupils are obliged to bring their noon lunch. This is supplemented by a hot dish served in the lunch room under the charge of the Domestic Science department.

A mid-morning lunch of milk and crackers is served to the younger pupils, especially to those who are under weight and under-nourished.

A Red Cross nurse looks after the health of the pupils, supplementing the work of the School doctor. For this service we are indebted to the generosity of the American Red Cross, aided by an appropriation by the town. A report of this health work appears among the statistics.

I am glad to find in the town an active Parent-Teacher Association. Such an organization can, and this one is, doing much to secure cooperation between parents and school officials.

I feel that much credit should be given to you and your predecessors on the School Board as well as to my immediate predecessors, Superintendents Moore and Walker, for the broad foundation which has been laid for one of the best of modern school organizations.

It remains, First, to provide additional equipment for the building; Second, to increase the efficiency of the teaching corps by encouraging our present teachers to take further training for their work and whenever new teachers are hired by selecting those best fitted in training and experience. Third, to perfect the organization of the school that the best results possible may be obtained.

Several steps have been taken along these lines.

An intelligence examination was given to all of the pupils in the Centre school. This indicates, at least approximately, the mental ability of classes and individual pupils and enables the teachers better to fit the length and difficulty of the work to the capacities of the pupils and the classes. Mr. Sears, principal of the Centre school, was in charge of this examination in Hampton.

An examination in the fundamentals of Arithmetic was given to all pupils of the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. This was the same examination that was given on the same day to all pupils of those grades in most of the towns of Massachusetts. This examination showed that more emphasis needs to be placed on the teaching of the fundamentals of Arithmetic in our elementary grades.

Pupils should enter the seventh grade well grounded in knowledge and skill of these fundamental operations so that in the Junior High School the more advanced work in Mathematics may be successfully undertaken.

The monthly bulletins have been continued.

To incite the teachers and pupils to efforts to increase our percentage of attendance and punctuality, a weekly comparison of the records in these two particulars of the 32 schools and the 7 districts of the Union is being issued from the Office. This has called attention to the fact that there is more tardiness in our schools than is necessary and that some parents do not place a sufficiently high value on their children's regular attendance in school. The only excuse for absence or tardiness that is sufficient in the eyes of the law is that of personal illness

of the pupil. For no other reason except in cases of extreme emergency should parents allow their children to be absent or tardy.

Under the efficient leadership of Mrs. Coombs as supervisor of Music and of Principal Sears, a healthy interest in instrumental music and orchestral work is developing in the Junior High School. This has been greatly aided by your generous appropriation for the purchase of instruments.

A change has been made in the management of the moving picture entertainments and outside help secured to manage this service.

The town of Hampton and the Supervisory Union have wisely continued the engagement of the services of our efficient office clerk. This insures the performance of many duties that contribute to the efficiency of the school and frees the superintendent from clerical work that would keep him from many larger duties and would decrease his opportunity for supervision.

I would recommend, First, that each year an appropriation for new equipment be made until our teachers cease to be handicapped for the lack of up-to-date apparatus and supplies. Second, that some systematic plan for the development of the spacious grounds of the Centre school be adopted and that each year some part at least of this plan be completed. Third, that an arrangement be made whereby some systematic development of our pupils physically shall be carried out. This can be accomplished by organized play, athletic games, athletic contests between classes, clubs, etc. I would suggest placing some one of the women teachers definitely in charge of this program for the girls, and the principal or some other man trained for this work, in charge of the boys. By inaugurating such a program much needed training can be given to our pupils. Mrs. Smith by the

formation of an Athletic Club for girls has already made an encouraging start on this program.

I would call your attention to the statistics which follow this report.

In grateful acknowledgement of your assistance in my work for the schools of Hampton, I submit this report.

STREET RAILWAY

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXETER, HAMPTON AND AMESBURY STREET RAILWAY FOR THE YEAR OF 1925

Together with this report is submitted usual financial statement showing results from operations for the year ending December 31st, 1925. From this statement it will be observed that the deficit has been reduced by \$1876.83 from the preceding year.

While this showing is encouraging as far as it goes, nevertheless the management of the Road are convinced that the time has come to put a stop to deficits even of this amount and have formulated plans to this end which will be outlined in succeeding paragraphs.

For a correct understanding of the proposed plans it should be borne in mind that the summer operations of the Company have been profitable from the time the Railway was taken over. The summer of 1925 was no exception, showing profits of \$4336.11 for the months of July, August and September. But when deficits running from a thousand to fifteen hundred dollars or more a month are incurred for the other nine months it does not take long to wipe out the summer profits and build up a substantial deficit.

Another fact that should be kept in mind is that by far the larger part of the summer revenue is derived from that part of the line running from Hampton Depot to and along Hampton Beach. Even during the summer months the Smithtown Branch, so called, is not profitable and that part of the line extending from the Car Barn to Exeter is of doubtful value for summer operations only, as the cost of maintenance of track and overhead in good

operating condition will be considerable.

With the idea, therefore, of putting a stop to the heavy losses incurred through winter operation the Directors in the Fall voted to discontinue street car service during the winter months and later voted to apply to the Public Service Commission in the name of the Company for permission to operate motor busses over the route now covered by the Railway, when it became obvious that control of this permit was necessary in order to safeguard the investment in the Railway properties, and prevent competition for the summer business from Hampton Depot to the Beach.

Permission to operate motor busses was granted the Railway in due course by the Public Service Commission.

While a majority of the Directors were of the opinion that the Railway should have control of the bus permit they felt it would be unwise for the Company to actually operate under the permit and, therefore, arrangements were made with the Exeter, Hampton & Amesbury Transportation Company, a corporation organized by interests friendly to the Railway, to furnish by means of a bus or busses the essential service while the Railway was not operating.

The principal points of the arrangement between the Railway and the Transportation Company provide that the latter shall furnish such essential transportation service as will be self-sustaining by means of a motor bus or motor busses, that it shall not operate busses in competition with the Railway when the street cars are in service, and if at any time the Railway should wish to take over the Transportation Company it may do so by paying a fair price for its equipment, etc.

At the time this report is being written ,early in February, the Transportation Company has been functioning for about a month, furnishing service between Hampton, Exeter and Hampton Falls, which service will be expanded in the near future to include Hampton Beach and possibly a limited service to Seabrook as well.

By these steps the management have saved the Railway the heavy expense that would have been incurred through continued operation through the winter and spring months; by the arrangements with the Transportation Company have assured the public of essential service, so far as it will be self-sustaining, while the Railway is not operating, and have cleared the way for a fair trial of summer operation by the Railway and bus operation the remainder of the year.

The plans formulated by the management on which the stockholders will be asked to take definite action, contemplate the operation of the Railway only from Hampton Depot to and along Hampton Beach and only from about the middle of June to about the middle of September. Bus operation being resorted to for the balance of the year. Under this plan the trackage from the Car Barn to Hampton Depot would be retained, the reasons for which are, of course, obvious.

It seems reasonable to believe, and a careful analysis of operating results supports this belief, that confining the Street Railway operations to those months in the summer season that have been profitable heretofore and still further confining these operations to that part of the system, viz., Hampton Depot to and along the Beach, from which the greater part of the revenue is derived, should place this property in a position where it can earn its expenses, including proper maintenance of track, overhead and equipment, and a substantial part if not all of the bond interest.

In the event of these plans meeting with the approval of the stockholders it would doubtless be advisable to dispose of that part of the track and overhead, poles, etc., for what it would bring and apply the proceeds to reducing outstanding bonds.

The management, therefore, offer the following recommendations for consideration:

- 1. That the action of the Directors in discontinuing winter operations be ratified.
- 2. That until otherwise instructed, Street Car service shall not commence before May 30th or be continued beyond September 30th.
- 3. That only that part of the system extending from the Car Barn to Hampton Beach and along the Beach shall be operated.
- 4. That the material in the Smithtown Branch, so called, and in that part of the system from the Car Barn to Exeter be disposed of either at auction or at private sale as may be deemed best by the Directors, together with such other material as may not be needed for the curtailed operations contemplated, and the proceeds applied to reduction of outstanding bonds.
