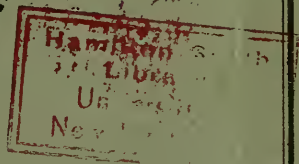

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TOWN CLERK'S RECORDS

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1931

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Hampton, in the county of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Hampton on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, moth department, health department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To choose a wire inspector and a building inspector for the ensuing year, whose reports shall appear in the annual town report.

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Article 4. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To choose a wire inspector and a building inspector for the ensuing year, whose reports shall appear in the annual town report.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to reduce the building permit fee from Ten Dollars to One Dollar.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to revise the building code and wiring rules, and to combine them in one set of ordinances, and to appoint a committee for the same.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to require a permit for electricians, and charge a fee of Twenty-Five Dollars; this fee to revert to the town.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars to be expended for lighting the tennis courts at Tuck Memorial Field.

Article 10. Upon a petition signed by Mathew A. Cregg and twenty-six others, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to build a wooden approach from the main Boulevard to the water's edge to take the place of the concrete approach that was destroyed.

Article 11. Upon a petition signed by E. D. Spinney and fifty others requesting the selectmen to install a fire hydrant at Five Corners for the protection of the community. This to be installed as soon as possible. To see what action will be taken.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 to illuminate the town clock on four sides.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen power to provide a skating rink 200 ft. by 75 ft., by having four inches of loam scraped off, of the above size, on the east side of the park.

Article 14. Upon a petition signed by Edgar Warren and Ten others requesting the following article to appear in the town warrant for the annual meeting in March:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars for the purpose of installing a fire alarm box at or near the junction of the Little River and the Black Swamp roads in the town of Hampton.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars for a break-water at North Beach, this amount to be raised as follows: Five Thousand Dollars this year and Five Thousand in the year 1932.

The above article to be contingent on the passing of a bill now being introduced in the State Legislature, which calls for a like appropriation of Ten Thousand Dollars to be spent by the State for this purpose.

Article 16. A petition signed by Mrs. Sarah Ash and forty-one others respectfully requests that steps be taken to grade and otherwise improve Island Path. The petitioners are anxious that proper action shall be taken at this meeting to the end that their request may be granted..

Article 17. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to recommend to the State Forester a person to act as tree warden.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to accept as a public highway, by warrantee deed from the Hampton Associates, Inc., that tract of land which forms an extension of Dearborn Avenue to Ann's Lane.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purpose of constructing a building at Hampton Center to be used as a fire station and for the storage of highway equipment.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the following property which the town owns under tax deeds. Property of Corrine Bigley contains one acre of Collins Lot No. 181 Sheet I. $\frac{1}{2}$ acre of Brown Common.

Property of Charles Taylor contains 4 acres of spring marsh. Property of William Parsons $\frac{1}{2}$ acre Home Place and Buildings. Property of George Felch Jr. $\frac{1}{2}$ acre tenement and store, 3 cottages, one house lot.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action, according to the terms of leases, against certain or all lease holders, leasing land from the town of Hampton, who have not paid their ground rent or taxes or both.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to extend the drain from Charles H. Brown's to the residence of Adna D. Garland.

Article 23. (Section A.) To see if the town of Hampton will vote to create a Parks and Playgrounds Commission which shall have charge of all matter pertaining to the Parks and Playgrounds of the Town of Hampton.

(Section B.) This commission shall be composed of three members, one of whom shall be elected at each annual Town Meeting for a period of three years. .

(Section C.) The first commission shall be elected from the floor and their terms of office shall be one, two, and three years respectively.

Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

RESULT OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 10, 1931.

The meeting was called to order at 10:05 a. m. by the Moderator, Dean B. Merrill. The warrant was then read by the Moderator. Prayer was offered by Rev. Herbert Walker.

Business was resumed at 12:45 P. M. under the article of Fire Hose.

Discussion by Mrs. Wingate was answered by Homer B. Whiting.

Motion by Warren H. Hobbs that all complaints under this article be lodged with Town Clerk and that **all complaints** be taken up with proper authorities.

Article 11. Voted: To raise and appropriate \$300. for hydrants for Five Corners.

Article 12. Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 13. Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 14. Voted: To raise and appropriate \$300. for two fire alarms. One to be installed at the Junction of Black Swamp and Little River road, the other at Mace's Corner. and that these fire alarm boxes be installed immediately.

Article 15. Voted: To pass over for the present.

Article 16. Voted: To expend \$750 and that this amount be taken from Highway appropriation.

Article 17. Voted:

Article 19. Voted: That this article be referred to a committee to report at some future time.

Article 20. Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized to take possession and let or sell all property sold for taxes—and bought by the Town of Hampton, after three years.

This is from the Plaice Cove on the North to Haverhill Street on the South. Those appointed were:

Motion: by Ernest G. Cole was that in case a breakwater was constructed that we raise and appropriate \$5000. for a sidewalk supporting this breakwater.

Reasons for this Motion were explained by Mr. Cole.

After discussion by Warren H. Hobbs and Harry Munsey an amendment by Harry D. Munsey to Mr. Cole's motion was accepted by Mr. Cole.

The amendment was that we raise and appropriate \$5000. for sidewalks but in case this sum is not used for sidewalks it may be used for breakwaters.

Discussion by Mr. Ashworth.

A Motion to indefinitely postpone by Mr. Ring was not voted.

The original amended motion was then in order.

An amendment by Mrs. Wingate—that the State Committee be called in by the Selectmen, that they be asked to inspect this building and report their findings.

Yearly Calendar of Activities :

February—A Clinic for "Underweight Children" was held at Portsmouth under the direction of Dr. Kerr. I took several children in to this clinic for examination and advice.

March—We had a very interesting visit from the Field Supervisor of the John Hancock Life Insurance Co. in connection with our nursing service for that company.

May—May 1st. was celebrated as National Child Health day in the Centre School. The main feature of the day was an entertainment pertaining to Health in the School Auditorium. This program was furnished by the different grades.

June—On June 30 we held our annual Child Health Conference under the direction of Mrs. Eunice Gosselin of the State Dept. of Infancy, Maternity, and Child Hygiene. We were well pleased at the large number that attended, and we hope to have a still larger clinic next year. These conferences are put on to give every child of pre-school age a free check-up so that any defects may be treated before the child enters school. . . . Parents, keep up your interest and come again next year!

September—Under the supervision of our School physician, Dr. A. M. Fernald, we completed the physical examination of every child in school. A new ruling was enforced in regard to vaccination. No child was admitted to school without showing a scar of successful vaccination, or presenting a Doctor's certificate which exempted the child because of medical reasons. It is certainly gratifying to realize that we are so fully protected against small pox—especially when we have had an epidemic recently in our next state.

October—We conducted a very successful Dental Clinic under the direction of G. Arthur Danforth, D. M. D., of Manchester, N. H.

November—We conducted a very successful Red Cross drive throughout the Centre School. A leader was appointed from each room to conduct the drive in his room. I am pleased to say that in spite of the depression the drive was very successful.

I also took several children to Portsmouth to Dr. Kerr's Underweight clinic. In fact, I have made many visits to it throughout the year. We should be very grateful to the Portsmouth Board of Health to allow us to do this as it has helped us in our underweight problem a great deal. I am in hopes that I will be able to promote one here in Hampton in the near future.

December—Most of the work done during this month could more correctly be classified as "social service". I know that every organization in town did all that they could to make the Christmas of the unemployed as happy as possible—I certainly appreciated those efforts and I am grateful to everyone who helped.

January—We had several donations for free milk for our underweights. The result of this is very encouraging as the weight of each one has shown a definite increase. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the townspeople who made it possible.

The milk and cookie service has been conducted each morning as usual. During the winter months there have been hot lunches served at noon under the direction of Miss Eleanor Janvrin. This has given the children the opportunity of having a warm lunch at a minimum cost.

At this time I would like to thank all individuals and organizations especially the Hampton Red Cross for the generous way they have helped out during the past year.

My appreciation also goes to the people of Hampton, the Selectmen, the Health Officer, the Superintendent of Schools, the School Boards, the faculties of the Academy and the Centre School, for the cooperation in my undertakings of the past year.

MEMORIAL PARK

MEETING HOUSE GREEN MEMORIAL AND HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

In the absence of the president, Mr. Ashworth, the Recording Secretary makes the following report:

The seventh annual meeting of the association was held at Tuck Hall, Oct. 10th, 1931, with Mr. Ashworth, the president, in the chair. The exercises consisted of music and speaking. The speaker of the afternoon was Mr. John C. Chase of Boston, president of the New England Historical and Genealogical Society. Other speakers were Mr. Leonard Smith, who had been president of the Haverhill Historical Society for twenty-five years and curator of its museum, and Mr. Louis Hovey, its new president, also Mr. Leonard Philbrick of Haverhill, Mr. Warren Perkins, (96 years young) of Newburyport. Mr. Fred Weare of Seabrook and our neighbors Mr. Harland Little and Mrs. Caroline C.

Shea who are all members. The regular business meeting was then held, officers' reports were read and the same board reelected for 1932. The president reported \$1500. received from Mr. Tuck, in Sept. 1931, \$1,000. for grading north and south approaches and \$500. for preserving old trees, which were found to be in such poor condition and with no historic value, that with Mr. Tuck's approval, it was thought more sensible to use it for beautifying in other ways. Flower beds and lawns have been improved, many vines put along the curbing, new shrubs on new lawns and a row of pines on the north side. During the late fall and early winter, Mr. Bradbury did much to improve the general appearance of the grounds and later, of the interior of Tuck House. As the much needed power mower had not been purchased, that the parks and lawns be well kept, they had to be mowed by hand, twice a week, on account of so much rain, during the entire summer. On account of weeds in the newly graded park, extra help had to be hired, for which Mr. Ashworth gave \$95. and Mr. Bradbury \$65. The flower beds have been kept in beautiful condition, by Mrs. Bradbury, who increases the number of perennials each year. Among other gifts was a unique oil painting of Boar's Head on a piece of hearthstone, a relic of the fire, from Mrs. Wendell Burt Folsom, of Exeter, a valuable antique chair from Mrs. Joshua James, many articles of historic value from Mr. Warren Perkins, many historic papers from Miss Jenny Brooks, of Salem, Mass., (of the Hampton Moultons) Mr. and Mrs. Howard G. Lane and Mrs. Clara Miner and a good safe, once belonging to Charles M. Lamprey, Esq., from his son, Mr. Uri Lamprey, in which to preserve valuable documents. People from different parts of the United States have shown great interest, by their letters, as well as by visits to the Memorial, 227 registered during the past summer, besides many who visit the grounds. The membership has increased to sixty.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. and Mrs. Bradbury, for their untiring efforts in improving the property.

LIBRARY REPORT

REPORT OF TRUSTEES

“After the church and the school, the free public library is the most effective influence for good in America.”

— THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

When the trustees began the task of transforming the Hampton Public Library into a modern institution, they did not realize what was before them. Had they done so they would hardly have had the courage to begin. The time had come, however, when it was necessary to enlarge the library building or discard many books, for the capacity of the structure was exhausted. They chose the latter alternative. They thought that it was the psychological moment to make other changes that had long been needed. The Hampton library was the only library in the State where the people were not given access to the books. Open stacks had long been desired by the public. They could not have carried out their plans had it not been for the efficient supervision of Miss Dorothy Annable, secretary of the State Public Library Commission, who devoted several weeks of her time to the work, with no expense to the town except her board. The library was closed to the public Saturday, September 12, and reopened on Wednesday, November 18. On that day 231 books were taken out.

About two thousand books were discarded. Some of these were sold, and some given to individuals and institutions. After the process of culling was completed, there remained the task of pasting pockets into nearly seven thousand volumes, rearranging and reclassifying the books, and writing the name of each volume and the author on separate cards. This was a monumental task. The trustees acknowledge with gratitude the great assistance they received

from unpaid and volunteer helpers, both girls and women, who gave many afternoons to the work, and without whose assistance it would have been impossible to reopen the library before Spring. They also appreciate the patience of the public who were deprived of books while the library was closed.

The trustees discovered that the library building itself and some of its equipment needed attention. There was a leak in the roof which threatened to do serious damage. The coving needed to be repainted. The furnace was broken and required new parts and resetting. Book cases had to be built. They found that the funds available were entirely inadequate, and they have been compelled to practice the most rigid economy.

The trustees feel that the town should appropriate at least two thousand dollars a year for the support of the library. The library building was built and dedicated in 1910. So far as we can find out not one cent has been expended on it for repairs and upkeep since that time. There is no water in the building. As it is now there is no place for the librarian to wash her hands when they become soiled in handling books; no water available to extinguish a fire in its early stages in case one should start; no water to use when the building is cleaned. The introduction of water would require a special appropriation, which the trustees will not ask for this year.

The town report shows that in 1910, the year the library building was constructed and dedicated, the town appropriated for the library \$322.50, for police \$397.69, for schools \$4,476.39. In 1930, twenty years afterwards, the appropriation for library had risen to \$1200, police \$9,488.58, schools \$35,000. Had the appropriation for the library mounted in proportion to the appropriation for police it would have been around \$8,000, and in proportion to schools around \$3,000. They feel that the sum they ask for, \$2,000, is mod-

est indeed.

Much to the regret of the trustees, Mr. S. Albert Shaw, the librarian, tendered his resignation in November and could not be induced to recall it. Consequently there was nothing left for the trustees to do but to acquiesce. Mr. Shaw has been librarian for nearly fifty-eight years. The trustees wish to bear witness to his deep interest in the library, his unfailing courtesy, and the high moral and literary standards he has kept in mind in the selection of books.

Mrs. Margaret S. Noyes was appointed to fill the unexpired term. Mrs. Noyes attended the Summer School for Librarians at Durham last Summer, and has assisted Mr. Shaw and Miss Annable in their task of remodeling the library. The trustees feel that Mrs. Noyes will receive the support of the public and will do her best to make the library one of the best in the State.
