





TOWN WARRANT FOR 1934

TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the town of Hampton, in the county of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, moth department, health department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- Article 5. To vote by Australian ballot whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act. Laws of 1933, Chapter 99 Section 22.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$100 for one additional hydrant for the extension on High Street to the Five Corners; the same to be discontinued when the domestic consumption on this extension reaches the sum of \$200 per year.
- Article 7. To see what action the town will take and appropriate money for same to install a hydrant at head of Watson's Lane and Lafayette Road.
- Article 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$1416.50 for a new motor and pump complete with radiator and shell.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300. for maintenance of fire alarm.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500. for New Equipment and Hose.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for repairs to the American Legion Hall.
- Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- Article 13. On petition of L. M. Crosbie and others to see if the town of Hampton will resurface, widen and oil the Plaice Cove road at Hampton North Beach and appropriate sufficient money for such improvement.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to adopt certain changes in the Hampton Code of Ordinances, as recom-

mended by the report of the Ordinance Committee, such changes to effect the following sections of the Code:

Chapter 3, Section 12. Appropriation Committee

Chapter 5, Section 1. Fire Department

Chapter 7, Section 8. New Section regarding wearing of bathing suits

Chapter 10, Section 5. Penalty Section. Traffic Rules. New Section to protect trees.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to approve the following ordinance: Athletic games and athletic sports may be played on Sunday in accordance with Chapter 155, Laws of 1931, provided such games and sports are conducted at such places and times as are approved by the Selectmen.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to appoint a zoning commission composed of ten tax payers representing the various sections of the town to recommend the boundaries of the various or ginal districts and make proper regulations to be enforced therein in accordance with Chapter 42 of the Public Laws of 1926 or any amendment thereof.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to lease, in accordance with Chapter 90 of the Public Laws of 1929, certain land or lands for an airport, said land or lands to be situated between the Winnicummitt Road, High Street and the road leading from East End School House to Five Corners, and to authorize the Selectmen to sign, for and in behalf of the Town, said leases for a term of 5 years, providing the Town receives aid in the above project from the CWA of at least \$1000.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing land from the

Town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent or taxes, or both.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money to pay for the construction of a part of the Hampton Sewer Project pending the sale of the General obligation bonds of the Town of Hampton to the U. S. Government.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to install a White-Way in Hampton and increase the street lighting appropriation to maintain same.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote that the check list be employed to admit only registered voters to any regular Town Meeting excepting only persons to whom the Selectmen give permission in writing to attend the meeting.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote that all town expenditures which can be expended through local business sources shall be so expended, and all such expenditures shall be equally distributed between all registered voters established in such business in the Town, except in the case of competitive bids.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$9000 for material to renovate the Town Hall if the CWA will approve the \$20,000 project; the present Town Hall to be enlarged and renovated according to plans already proposed.

Article 24. Upon a petition of the following legal voters of the town: Fred R. Batchelder, Lavinia M. Clair, Annette M. Batchelder, Emily C. Hutchings, James H. Hutchings, Ellsworth D. Spinney, Abbie M. Spinney, Frank H. Meader, Margaret M. Wingate and Marvin F. Young.

(a) To see if the voters of the Town of Hampton will

adopt the following resolution with reference to the duties of police officers and to the head of the police department:

Resolution

WHEREAS it may have been customary in some instances for officers of the Hampton Police Department to engage in the work of soliciting voters to go to the polis and to use automobiles belonging to the Town of Hampton for the purpose of transporting these voters to the polls at regular and special town meetings and elections, and

WHEREAS it has, in some instances, been the practice for one member of the Board of Selectmen to act, either directly or indirectly as Chief of the Hampton Police Department and

WHEREAS the offices of Selectmen and Chief of the Police Department are not compatible in that a selectman acting as police chief would in a certain degree be answerable for his official conduct only to himself, NOW THEKE-FORE

BE IT RESOLVED that the voters of the Town of Hampton in annual Town Meeting assembled on March 13, 1934 instruct and order the present Board of Selectmen and all future Boards of Selectmen to forbid, under pain of dismissal, all police officers, regular or special, of the Town of Hampton to spend any portion of their time or to use automobiles belonging to the Town of Hampton for the purpose of bringing voters to the polls to vote for any candidate for any office, either local, county, state or national or to vote for any other purpose, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that from this date henceforth no selectman of the Town of Hampton shall serve the town either directly or indirectly as Chief of the Hampton Police Department or as the acting head thereof and THIS RESOLUTION SHALL take effect immediately upon its passage and shall have all the effect of a Town Ordinance.

- (b) To see if the town of Hampton will vote to employ a competent public stenographer to take down in shorthand, under oath, the minutes of the annual town meeting to be held on March the 13th, 1934 and each subsequent town meeting and to transcribe the same; said shorthand notes when transcribed to constitute the official minutes of the town meetings; and to appropriate a sum not exceeding fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for said service for each town meeting.
- (c) To see if the Town of Hampton will vote to have all passenger automobiles owned by the Town of Hampton marked plainly so as to designate the ownership and the department in question.
- Article 25. To see what recommendation the voters will make in regard to Daylight Saving.
- Article 26. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the power to make a contract with the Exeter & Hampton Electric Co. for street lights for the term of three years.
- Article 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ASSETS

The Cash in the Treasury January 31, 1934 (\$19,644.63) was verified by a reconciliation of the Receipts and Disbursements as disclosed by the Cash Book with the Deposits and Withdrawals as listed on the Bank Statements.

The outstanding 1933 Tax Receipts were checked with individual amounts as entered in the Tax Collector's Commitment Book and Valuation Book, reflecting a total of unpaid 1933 Taxes and Costs of (\$21,283.78) January 31, 1934.

The Outstanding Tax Sales of Previous Years (\$9,094.08) and Land Rents of (\$4,686.75) were verified, and found to be correct.

LIABILITIES

The Outstanding Bonds and Notes aggregating (\$29,500.00) and Trust Fund Notes of (\$9,630.75) were verified, and found to be correct.

GENERAL REMARKS

The Summary of Inventory April 1, 1933 was examined with the Individual items as set forth in the Valuation Book.

The items and values as disclosed by the Schedule of Town Property January 31, 1934, were accepted as being correct, as submitted by the Selectmen.

The Cash Balance of January 31, 1933 of \$30,299.27 was

reduced by \$5,000.00 by paying one of the Bonds in 1933 as per vote of the Town; and further reduced by additional unpaid Taxes.

The Cash Balance should not be reduced by Appropriations as this procedure will cause temporary loans to be carried over and impair the credit of the Town.

In connection with the Exhibits of the Report, a careful examination was made of the various Accounts, and, in my opinion, the Statements attached, set forth a correct report of the Operations, for the Period under review.

Exhibit "A" also, fairly sets forth the Financial condition of the Town of Hampton, as at January 31, 1934.

The Statements embodied in the Report, subject to the comments in this Preface, I hereby certify to be correct and in accordance with the Books, Accounts and Records of the Town of Hampton, as at January 31, 1934.

This past year has been a very busy one. Some of the activities I will present in the following summary:

A new course was introduced in the school last year entitled "The Girl Today—the Woman Tomorrow." This course was divided between Mrs. Coombs, Miss Janvrin and myself. At the same time I continued my regular classes in "Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick."

Last Spring I put on a Health Play for the P. T. A. entitled "The Nurse's Dream." The cast was made up of thirty pupils from the Centre School. This was a success and was to be repeated for the observance of National Child Health Day on May 1st. Unfortunately on that date I was confined to my home with the mumps so the day went by unobserved. During my absence I employed Mrs. Clifford Lindsey to take my place for the two weeks.

A year ago we were allotted fifty bottles of Federal Milk for the undernourished children. This winter the amount was raised to sixty-five bottles. I have had charge of the distribution of this along with the usual mid-morning milk and cookie service.

During this past year we have had very little insurance work from either the John Hancock or the Metropolitan Insurance companies.

There have been very few fees collected during the year as most of my work has been in those families who were unable to pay the usual fee. Therefore, these fees have not been asked for as much as previously.

Early last summer the New Hampshire Music Festival came to Hampton Beach. I was on duty there for two days in case of sickness or accident.

At the present time we are serving free noon lunches at the Centre School. Most of the money used for these lunches has been given by the teachers, some by the clubs, and small amounts by different residents of the town. I have stayed at the school during my noon hour and have assisted in serving. Also I have done a great deal of the collecting of vegetables, canned goods and money that different people have been kind enough to give us for our cause. We hope that in the near future we may have some assistance from the CWA in our project.

I have made considerable use of the Pre-natal clinic at the Portsmouth Hospital. This Clinic is free to any Mother who cares to make use of its service. I have taken a great many patients to this clinic and feel that we are very fortunate to have such a service at our disposal.

I have also made use of the Tuberculosis Clinics at Portsmouth, and at Manchester. These have been conducted once a week at Manchester, and once a month at Portsmouth. I have made trips to one, or the other nearly every month during the past year with underweight children.

I have taken a great many patients to hospitals, doctor's offices, and to dentists for various treatments during the year.

It has been necessary for me to do a great deal more welfare work this year than has been customary in previous years. I have delivered donations of fruit, food, clothes, shoes, and bedding to a great many needy homes. The materials came from those who were more fortunate.

This winter we were allowed Cod Liver Oil from the CWA for our underweight children in the schools. I took advantage of this and sent in my order and have made special trips for my consignment, but at this time I have only been allotted twelve bottles. These twelve were very welcome and I hope that it will be possible to obtain more soon.

Last June we held the annual Child Health Conference at the Centre School under the direction of the N. H. Department of Infancy, Maternity and Child Hygiene. We examined fifty-nine pre-school children and checked up their defects.

This year we were very fortunate in the selection of our School Dentist, Dr. Hanrahan. I certainly appreciate all the good work that he has done and I am very proud to say that the number of corrections done this year nearly doubled that of last year.

This has been a very eventful year as well as a very busy one, but summing it all up I wish to say that it has been a very pleasant one—pleasant due to the splendid cooperation that I have had from all members of the School Department, from the Town Officials, and last but not least from each and every one of the residents. Everyone has been very loyal, considerate, and willing to assist me

in all of my undertakings. I extend to each and every person in the Town of Hampton my sincere thanks and appreciation.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association

In the absence of the president, Mr. Ashworth, the Recording Secretary makes the following report:

The ninth annual meeting of the Association was held on October 14, 1933 at Tuck Hall with the president, George Ashworth presiding. There were about sixty members and guests present, among them being, Prof. James A. Tufts and Miss Tufts of Exeter, Mr. John Carroll Chase of Boston, and Mr. Fred A. Weare of Seabrook. The program consisted of music by an orchestra composed of young townspeople and songs by Mr. Norman Leavitt of North Hampton. The speaker of the afternoon was Dr. James W. Bixler of Exeter who opened his remarks by paying tribute to the Rev. I. S. Jones and Hon. Edward Tuck for providing the Green and House and preserving those things the loss of which would be irreparable.

At the business meeting a committee to further historical interest was chosen, consisting of Mrs. Sarah Lane, Mr. Harland Little, Mr. Norman Leavitt and Mrs. Elizabeth Folsom. A committee consisting of Mrs. Sarah Lane, Mrs. Vina Jones and Rev. Herbert Walker was appointed to present resolutions on the death of valued members, Mrs. Caroline C. Shea, Mr. Lemuel C. Ring and Captain Randall Kernan.

The president reported the grounds as having never looked better than at present and that many compliments have been paid this unique park by out of town visitors.

It is highly desirable that more of our townspeople come to realize what this association represents and by your added interest increase its usefulness. The largest project on the grounds this year has been the grading of a considerable area. The \$20.00 expended for plants and bulbs was well worth while as, with Mrs. Bradbury's care, they gave a profusion of bloom throughout the summer. Last winter the interior of the house was thoroughly renovated. Mr. and Mrs. Bradbury did the puttying, painting of woodwork and painting and waxing of floors, extra help being required for papering.

Among valued gifts this year are a clock and chair and a Dow's History of Hampton, the latter left in his will by Mr. Warren Perkins. The Association would be very glad to receive any antiques or relics and fulfill its purpose of preserving and exhibiting them for the enjoyment of all. Doubtless there are many articles in town for which this is, a proper place.

The visitors at the park this year, while not as many as last, numbered 150 who registered, besides many who did not. People from all parts of this country and Canada as well as some guests from Wales came, most of them because they had some particular interest here.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES

"Our Starving Libraries" is the name of a book just published by the Houghton, Mifflin Company, and is an account of first-hand investigation of public libraries in ten representative cities of the United States. In only one of these cities, Springfield, Mass., has the library been adequately maintained. Boston has dropped to such an unimportant place that it is not even listed. It must be a matter of pride to every citizen of Hampton that our Public Library has been well kept up during these distressing years and is now in better condition than ever before.

During the year that is past many improvements have been made in the physical property. Ornamental shrubs and flowering plants have been set out in the grounds about the Library, and in a few years will furnish a framework of verdant beauty. The entrance to the Library building has been made more dignified by a new door, and the interior of the building has been thoroughly cleaned, the floors shellaced, the walls and ceilings morescoed. New shades have been hung at all the windows. Oil heating has been introduced. The great advantage of oil heating for a library is that the amount of dust that comes up through the floors and the registers is reduced to a minimum and the books better protected. The Library property is adequately insured.

The Librarian's report will show that nearly four hundred volumes have been purchased during the year. More books have been taken out than ever before. While this is gratifying, it means increased wear and tear for the books and the need of constant replacement. Like everything else, books have advanced in price. Books that formerly cost \$1.50 to \$2.00 now cost from \$2.00 to \$2.50, and higher-priced books in proportion. Still, if the town will keep up the present appropriation of \$1800 a year, the trustees are confident they can maintain the present high standing of the Library.
