#### **TOWN WARRANT FOR 1937**

# TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the Ninth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, health department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

- Article 4. To see if the town will give the selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to pay to the trustees of the trust funds the trust fund notes of \$9630.75, the same to be paid from the surplus now on hand.
- Article 6. To see what action the Town will take concerning the following question, Is it expedient to revise the constitution?
- Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax deeds.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing land from the Town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent or taxes, or both.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote a discount of 3% on current year's taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1937.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to buy land for a gravel pit.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will appoint a planning board to consist of 5 members, who will serve without compensation and who shall have the duties and powers conferred by Chapter 55, of the Laws of 1935.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for making studies, preparing maps and for general expenses of the planning board, if the Town votes to appoint such board under the preceding article.
  - Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to buy a lot of

land adjoining the Library on Academy Avenue, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for same.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract with the Exeter and Hampton Electric Co. for street lighting for three years.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to attempt to secure lower hydrant and domestic water rates, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for this purpose.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Hampton Associates, Inc., a deed to and maintain as a highway a certain tract of land 40 feet wide and 200 feet deep running from the easterly side of Lafayette Road to the Northwesterly corner of land of the Hampton Industries, Inc., to be known as Kershaw Avenue.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Hampton Associates, Inc., a deed of and maintain as a highway a certain tract of land 49.5 feet wide and running from High Street to the Beach Road, as the same is now laid out in accordance with a plan recorded in Rockingham Records, Plat I, Page 3, to be known as Towle Avenue.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to prepare for a tercentenary celebration to be held in 1938, to authorize said committee to invite all towns formerly a part of Hampton to participate, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the preparation of said celebration.

Article 19. .To raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for the purpose of building and equipping an incinerator plant and providing a site therefor.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to

A. Raise and appropriate the sum of \$1512.50 for one

new man to enable the department to go on the two platoon system.

B. Raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the maintenance of the fire alarm system.

C. Raise and appropriate \$300.00 for equipment and equipment repairs.

D. That an oil burner be installed in the boiler at station 2.

E. Raise and appropriate \$150.00 for painting and furnishings at station 2.

RESOLVED that the selectmen be requested in the event that the state votes to build the proposed traffic artery at Hampton Beach, to take whatever steps that they shall deem necessary to secure legislation to enable the Town of Hampton to secure lands adjacent to said roadway or parking space, or both, for the purpose of owning or leasing the same.

Be it further resolved: that at such time as the Selectmen shall elect during the Tercentenary of the town of Hampton, appropriate and fitting ceremonies shall be held to carry out the purposes of this resolution by publicly burning certified copies of all official documents relating to the false accusations against Eunice (Goody) Cole, and that the burned documents together with soil from the reputed last resting places and from the site of the home of Eunice (Goody) Cole be gathered in an urn and reverently placed in the ground at such place in the town of Hampton as the Selectmen shall designate.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to sell R. H. Lovely a strip of land near the incinerator plant.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

### LIBRARY REPORT

### TRUSTEES' REPORT

During the past year the Library has kept the even tenor of its way, supplying our people and many summer residents with wholesome reading. Visitors from out of town often express surprise that a town as small as Hampton should have such an up-to-date library. They tell us that they can find the latest books in our local library much sooner than they can find the same books in city libraries. In 1936 the City of Boston spent seven cents per capita for new books, while Hampton the same year spent in the vicinity of fifty cents.

One purchase during the year, in which the trustees take considerable pride, is the "Dictionary of American Biography" in twenty volumes. This monumental work is seldom found in libraries as small as ours. In these twenty volumes are to be found the life history of every prominent American, deceased, from the days of the settlers down to the present. Colonial governors, statesmen, explorers, ministers, authors, inventors, judges, physicians, pirates, Indian chiefs, stalk through the pages, and each biographical sketch, whenever possible, is accompanied with a bibliography. Supplementary volumes will be published from time to time. This work never will be outgrown, and will be even more valuable one hundred years from now than it is to-day.

The lot adjoining the Library on Academy Avenue has been bought by the town. This will give the town the control of the lot, and will insure that no building that will detract from the beauty of the Library will ever be erected on it. It will also make possible the expansion of the Library building to the rear in time to come.

Our problem now is to find room for our books. The shelves are filled from floor to top. There are also about two thousand volumes that are not in popular demand stored in the basement.

The trustees feel that the town has been very generous in the past in granting an annual appropriation of \$1,800, and desire to reciprocate that generosity. So far as we now can see, there will be no extraordinary expenditures the coming year, and we feel that we can get along if our appropriation is cut to \$1,600. We make this as a gesture of good will. The tercentenary celebration will cost the town of Hampton a considerable sum. Perhaps if each department should economize a little, the burden upon the tax payers might be lightened.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton:

I herewith submit to you my annual report as superintendent of your schools. It will summarize in general the achievements and activities of the schools of Hampton during the year from July 1, 1936 to June 30, 1937—the last completed school year. Incorporated herein will be the recommendations of the Headmaster of the High School, the Principal of the Centre School, the Supervisor of Music and the School Nurse.

The Hampton Schools opened on Sepetember 8, 1937, with an annollment of 370 pupils. Of this total 277 were in the Centre School and 93 in the Academy. This Fall's registration continues the increase that has been evident year by year. This total of 370 pupils compares with 366 of last year, 341 of the year before and 325 for the fall of 1934.

The September registration for the first six grades is 179, or a per teacher load of 36 pupils. The housing of grades four, five and six in two rooms has given two teachers charge of 43 and 47 pupils respectively. This condition necessitated the installing of extra desks and seats in the front of the rooms. Each of these rooms was built for a maximum of 36 pupils. To accomodate a larger number so crowds the room that efficient work is difficult of accomplishment. The number of pupils who will enter these three grades next fall is 91, plus any additional pupils that may enroll through transfers from other schools or new citizens that may enter the town. Because of this condition it seems vital that an additional teacher be employed next September. This new group can be accom-

modated in room six. It will deprive the Junior High grades of one recitation room and may compel the holding of recitations in the library. Although this is not an ideal condition, it seems preferable to the present arrangement. This is taken care of in the budget prepared by the School Board.

The ancient ideal of "A sound mind in a sound body" is becomming more and more the objective of modern education. By a sound mind we mean one that can analyze, arrange thoughts and come to a definite conclusion. This is the reason that mere memorizing of facts has been subordinated to thinking. Facts are learned to furnish the tools with which to think rather than as ends in themselves. We believe the type of citizen resulting from such training is the intelligent citizen and the one to vouchsafe a continued enlightened democracy. We believe this the safeguard for democracy as contrasted with the dictatorships which we see in some foreign countries.

Occasionally, weak bodies contain strong minds but there are noted exceptions to the rule. We therefore find the modern school built to safeguard physical health. Ventilation is carefully watched. Lighting is arranged according to the best known system. It is for this reason that new lights were placed in the Domestic Arts room at the Centre School. The recent increase in attention to outdoor athletics has for its purpose the guarding of physical health. Mr. Eastman has continued his program in this department of the school activities. Not only has he developed football, baseball and basketball teams but he has given all boys the opportunity of development through games at noon and recess. Supervision of the playground by the teachers tends toward healthy exercise.

A definite health program has been introduced into the

schools of Hampton as an integrated part of the curriculum. This plan was worked out by the cooperative effort of the school nurse and the teachers. Its purpose is to instruct the pupils in the elementary health rules and to inculcate essential health habits in tre daily life of each pupil. Its value will be realized as these pupils grow to adulthood.

Below is the school nurses report.

### THE CENTRE SCHOOL

The school plant is always in fine condition due to the policy established by the school board several years ago, of refinishing a small part of the building each year. This obviates the necessity of a large outlay at any one time. The chairs used in the dining room of the school, were bought when the building was new. They have received constant use and it became necessary to replace them last year. The new ones are of all-metal construction and are proving satisfactory.

An innovation this year was the installation of Venetian blinds in a room where the lighting was rather poor. These blinds let in the light, but keep the direct sunrays from the pupils desks. This equipment is a help to both pupils and teachers.

We shall continue as in previous years to emphasize the teaching of reading in the lower grades, believing this skill to be foundation of scholarship in other subjects. This year Hampton pupils again rank unusually high in this subject. Hampton school people are proud of this achievement.

With three of the five lower grade rooms crowded and with special problems in the other two rooms, only skilled teachers and experienced teachers such as we have in our Hampton schools can achieve satisfactory results. That they have done this is proven by the tests given to all the grades last December.

The progressive schools of the nation are attempting to train children from the earliest grades, in accurate observation and experiment. They are teaching the youngest pupils to use real information and accurate methods of thinking toward a better interpretation of their environ-Heretofore, this has been impossible because no texts were available written in the limited vocabulary of the lower grades. All leading text book companies are now publishing such books. These establish an advancing course in elementary science from the first grade through The two functions memtioned above are served by these courses. I am recommending the gradual introduction of some complete course of this kind, preferably in the lower grades first and, as they advance, into all grades. The expense would be little since we are continually replacing readers under any plan.

The schools are this year, in conjuction with three other towns, employing a teacher of art. There are a large number of children in Hampton who have ability in this type of work and who not only enjoy it, but receive lasting benefit from it. The object is not so much to develop artists as to create an ability of appreciation and perhaps an avocation. The cost when a teacher is employed by several towns is small.

### THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Hazen, the Principal of the Junior High School, in his report states as follows:

Probably the greatest advance made in the purely educational policy of the Junior High School has been the change to the hour period. This has proved itself very much worthwhile, particularly, because it allows pupils to prepare the majority of each lesson directly under the supervision of the teacher best trained in that particular line of work. It is of great assistance in aiding the child to make the adjustment to Junior High School work.

The results of the Standard Achievement Tests given in grades seven and eight were, in general, good. Again our pupils were outstanding in their ability to read. It is of interest to note that there was hardly a pupil, who had come up through the grades in Hampton, who rated below the standard median. Spelling was the only subject tested in these grades, below the national standard. The new spelling books introduced in the lower grades should help to avoid this pitfall in the future. Remedial work is now being carried on in the upper grades.

### HAMPTON ACADEMY AND HIGH SCHOOL

The Academy has an unusually fine staff of teachers. My first recommendation to the trustees is that they budget enough money to administration to assure the continuation in our school of the present teaching corps. The crowded condition of the building makes this doubly necessary.

Facts learned and abilities acquired are quickly forgotten through disuse. For this reason we find high school pupils, well versed in the subjects studied in high schools, who have forgotten much learned in the elementary grades. Hampton Academy is therefore devoting some time to a quick review of the fundamental subjects for those pupils who, by tests, are proven to need such review. At the present time the subjects reviewed are; English (including Spelling, Grammar and Silent Reading). Handwriting and Geography. In Geography, special attention is given to the rivers, cities and resources of New Hampshire.

Miss Fowler has inaugurated a unique system of credits for physical exercise for girls. Her account of its methods follow.

### THE W. A. A. OF HAMPTON ACADEMY

In order to organize the girls of Hampton Academy into a more compact unit and to create an incentive sufficiently strong to bring the majority of them out for sports, we organized, in late September, a Women's Athletic Association. Every girl in the school automatically became a member of the association, and at the first meeting the entire group was divided into two teams under the leadership of two girls elected by the members of the teams.

At this first meeting we also drew up what we call our "point system" whereby every sport is given a credit rating. By this we mean that for every sport a girl engages in she is given a certain number of points toward an award.

In the fall our major sports were field hockey and tennis. But many of the girls, who did not care for these strenuous forms of exercise, spent hours on bicycles and hiking, thereby gaining as much benefit as those who played the hockey and tennis.

Since we have no gymnasium and, until recently, no

place where we could have callisthentic classes, our winter program was limited to individual sports such as skiing and skating. Recently, however, we received permission to use the Hampton Town Hall one afternoon a week for callisthentics. The enthusiasm with which this after school class was welcomed was most encouraging and I feel would warrant its renewal next year as soon as the fall sports are over.

This spring we plan to have three major sports—soft ball, volley ball, and tennis. In addition to these there will be an occasional organized hike and, of course, individual sports such as swimming and bicycle riding. By this program we hope to reach all the girls in the school and make it possible for every one of them to find at least one form of recreation in which she is interested.

Our whole program this year is more or less experimental and we may find it necessary to make a few changes next year. So far, however, it has been most successful, and I feel that it will function even more satisfactorily when it becomes an established part of the school program.

Athletics for the boys is under the able direction of Mr. Sulloway. The football team completed a successful season by defeating St. John's High of Concord. The football banquet at the end of the season testified to the interest the town of Hampton takes in its High School team.

### THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The following paragraphs are parts of Mrs. Coombs' report.

The new method of instruction in the grades seems to be aiding very considerably in teaching the pupils to read

more rapidly. It is meeting with the approval of the teachers of those grades. A new set of books purchased for Miss Whitney's pupils is delighting both pupils and teacher, and is helping decidedly to improve the work in that room.

At no time has the work in chorus music of the Junior High School been so successful as at the present time. There is not one pupil this year that is not receiving a real benefit from the singing—both in the smaller class group and the large chorus. The eighth grade particularly has some very outstanding singers, and work in "a capella" has been started there, something never done here before in Junior High School. I have put on two Music Appreciation programs during the year for Assembly periods. The regular work in Appreciation continues to be enthusiastically received.

The Academy Chorus numbers over seventy voices. An extra row of seats is provided by a row of chairs in the center aisle. Hampton produces few tenors, and it is necessary to use baritones and second altos to make up for this lack. We do this very successfully. We all feel sorry that such a fine chorus has no opportunity to perform to advantage. There is no place in Hampton large enough for this group to show our townspeople what they really can do.

The Girl's Glee Club, made up of all but two or three of the Academy girls is fine, well balanced three and four part chorus work, including some very good a capella work. The girls are enjoying some of the very finest music ever written, and it gives me satisfaction to be able to say just that.

The Boy's Glee Club feels the need of tenors. Nearly every year the Sophomore boys, with only partially changed voices, take the tenor part. This creates a condition

where one entire part is sung by the most inexperienced of the group.

Two Academy pupils attended the All New England Orchestra; four attended the Band; and two Junior High pupils attended the chorus. This great Festival Concert was held at Hyannis, Mass., last March. Over seven hundred pupils from all over New England spent four days in Hyannis in a musical experience they will never forget. In May several of our pupils attended the State Festival at Claremont.

I feel the work in music is fulfilling the needs of our times. It has the loyal, whole-hearted support of the pupils themselves. I have had the loyal assistance of the teachers, to whom I owe a debt of gratitude.

### THE PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

Hampton has an unusually active Parent-Teacher Association. Such an organization through its interest in the schools, is a great help in bringing teachers and parents together on a common basis. When each understands the problems and the aims of the other, mutual helpfulness is the result. I bespeak for the organization the support of all citizens of Hampton, whether parents or not.

As a school board you have been always helpful to me in the duties of my office, and watchful for the welfare of our pupils. I wish to express my appreciation for this. The schools of Hampton should be, and I believe are, a source of pride to the citzens of the town. With your continued guidance we shall maintain our place in the forefront of New Hampshire schools.
