TOWN WARRANT FOR 1941

TOWN OF HAMPTON

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the 11th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing lands from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes, or both.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$397.60 for State Aid roads, if the State contributes \$1590.40.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and advantages of the town in co-operation with other towns co-ordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$515.00.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to buy a new piece of fire apparatus to replace engine No. 2 at a cost not to exceed \$7,000, and to pay for the same by raising and appropriating \$2,000 and to pay for the balance over a period of two years by the issuance of Town notes.
- Article 10. On petition of Theda T. Hobbs and twelve other legal voters to see if the Town will vote to accept from the Estate of Warren H. Hobbs a deed to and maintain as a highway a certain tract of land fifty feet wide running from the northerly side of High Street to the Mace Road, providing the Estate of Warren H. Hobbs first builds a road over the said land.
- Article 11. To receive the report of the Planning Board and to see if the Town will vote to adopt a zoning

ordinance for the Town of Hampton, the same having been prepared by the said Board in accordance with a vote of the Town and public hearings having been held thereon by said Board.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



To the School Board of Hampton, N. H.:

I herewith present to you my annual report as Superintendent of your Schools. It will consist of the statistical reports of the school year 1940-1941 as reported to the State Board of Education, the financial statement of the Hampton School District as of June 30, 1941, the enrollment of pupils in September 1941 and the attendance roll of honor for the past complete year. The Report of the School Treasurer and a statement of the bond account as shown by the balance sheet are also included.

The school year began September 3, 1941 with an enrollment of 468. This compares with the September 1940 figure of 442. During the past five years our school population has increased from 336 to the present 468. These same years see an increase in the number of tuition pupils from 27 to 84. The Senior High School has a total enrollment of 191 but due to unsettled conditions there have been more pupils entering and leaving than usual. The number of actual attendance has held at about 170. A school of two hundred pupils can be operated more efficiently than a school of one hundred. A wider variety of subjects can be taught, teachers' fields of instruction narrowed and specialized and the pupils' interests better guarded under the larger set-up. For this reason, I believe it is definitely to the advantage of our own children that tuition pupils be welcomed into our high school.

THE TEACHING STAFF

With two teachers added to the staff of our schools, Hampton now employs eighteen regular teachers in its system. Seven are on the Academy staff and ten at the Centre School with Miss Tobey devoting her mornings to the Academy and afternoons at the Centre School. Mrs. Coombs and Mrs. Naves are in charge of Music and Art respectively.

We have five new teachers in Hampton—three replacing teachers and two additional teachers. Miss Velna Adams is instructor in the Junior High School. She is a graduate of Bates College in the class of 1941. Her subjects are those formerly taught by Stuart Carter who left us to take the principalship of the North Hampton Center School, Miss Arlene Waite replaces Mrs. Dorothea Stevens in the Academy. She is a graduate of Worcester Teachers College and a teacher of two years' experience. Our Commercial teachers is Miss Lucille Smith. She has taught for two years and is a member of the Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1939, graduating from the commercial teacher course. Miss Ruth Wight is the teacher of French and Latin, a graduate of Bates College with five years' teaching experience in the State of Maine. Mr. Forrest Parker, a Keene Teachers' College graduate, has charge of the new Mechanic Arts work, which the School Board established this year as explained in the School District Meeting of March 1941. There has been no change in the personnel of the grade teachers. These are the people fundamentally responsible, not only for the work of their grades, but for the success of the pupils in their later school life. It is all important that skillful and experienced teachers meet the child during the years in which first foundations of education are being laid.

Our Nation is now at war. From the President and his spokesmen come pleas that our people continue to develop their varied avenues of interest and pleasure. The morale of the country must be kept high. Our part in the schools is to work with the children. We are trying to keep this objective before us. In our regular classes, in our school assemblies, in our school parties and in all our contacts one with another the morale of democracy is foremost in our minds.

We must not neglect the broadening activities of the school. Of these Music and Art come first to mind. Hampton has long made Music a part of its regular course. In recent years it has placed Art in its curriculum. Each course is under the supervision of a successful teacher. The Music work is known by the appearances of the children in assemblies, P.T.A. meetings, patriotic exercises and at graduation. While these opportunities to appear in public are beneficial, it is evident that more occasions should be presented. In comparison with Athletics, the public appearances of our Music organizations are very

limited. At least one or two musical events should be allotted each year on the regular school calendar.

The work in Art is continually on exhibit in the school. For the public, there have been two fine displays of the pupils' art work at the school office in the Lane Block. The large numbers of people coming to see this exhibit bespeak the wide-spread interest in school work.

HAMPTON ACADEMY AND HIGH SCHOOL

Hampton is justly proud of its new high school building. It is commended by state school officials and by school architects. Its plan has furnished the basal groundwork for other school building committees. With the introduction of the Mechanic Arts Course the entire building is now in use. With the introduction of this work Hampton is abreast of the demands of wooden education. Our school is serving nearly 100% of its pupils—those with manual skills as well as those with purely book skills. We were fortunate in securing the machines necessary for our course before they became unobtainable. The first year of the planned four-year course will be satisfactorily completed next June. Forty boys are enrolled in it. They are being trained for a world in which manual skill will be in increasing demand.

Mr. Parker is teaching a night class in Elementary Electricity under the Out-of-School Youth Organization of the National Government. Twelve and fourteen boys attend this class regularly fifteen hours a week through a total of one hundred and twenty hours. This is one of the Schools' contributions toward national defense and the training of defense workers. I hope that Hampton may continue this service either under the O.S.Y. sponsorship or as a part of its own program. Other courses to be given during out-of-school hours to out-of-school people will surely follow the present electricity course. There will be

opportunities for our graduates to receive training in skills which were not available to them in their high school years. There will be opportunities for the adults to lay the groundwork for future training in specialized fields. There is a probability of offering machine skill work to women who desire this training for active defense work. Because of our proximity to the Portsmouth Navy Yard it seems suitable that such courses be offered in Hampton.

The Headmaster reports on the athletic program as follows:

"The athletic program has been unusually successful this year because of the fact that we have a large number of big boys in the school. They, and their coach, have worked hard with most gratifying results. As a result of our successes, attendance at the games has been large, taxing our seating capacity until we feel that bleachers to increase the capacity and save the chairs is advisable. The type that folds against the wall, although costing more, would be most desirable for we use the room for many other purposes. The increased attendance at the games has given us more money to finance our activities than ever before. This we have used to stock equipment for both boys and girls."

It is always of interest to learn of the activities of our recent graduates. The following paragraph is from Mr. Russell's records:

"Of last year's graduating class, two are attending the University of New Hampshire, one the University of Michigan, two Wentworth Institute, and one Lynn Burdett. The reports we have had thus far are satisfactory. Of the remainder of the class, two are taking post-graduate work, one is in the Coast Guard, and the others have found employment in many cases in defense work."

I wish to congratulate the boys of our basketball team. Their record is one of which Hampton is proud. A year with but one defeat in a complete schedule is a credit to the school. The clean sportsmanship of the entire team is commented upon favorably by all of its many followers both at home and in visited towns. For the second consecutive year Hampton is represented in the State Tournament at New Hampshire University. The Junior Varsity has played some thrilling games this year with the same sportsmanship that characterized the Varsity. This group promises fine games in coming seasons. The girls' team has, this year, met teams of greater experience and larger establishment. It has returned many victories to its credit. Congratulations are due them also.

THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

In the report of Mrs. Coombs, our music supervisor, appear the following summaries:

"In the elementary grades the music work has continued along the same lines previously followed. A new set of books in grade six has added to the enjoyment of the class and has helped the continuity of the work in the three upper grades. We are now using the new series 'The World of Music' in grades four, five and six.

"At Christmas time the grades joined in presenting a pageant, 'The Nativity' to the Parent Teachers Association and the members of the Centre School.

"The Junior High work is now presented in three weekly half hour periods: one seventh grade, one eighth grade, and one chorus period including both grades. We were fortunate this year in having a group enter our seventh grade from Hampton Falls which is very musical, and very capable musically. This is especially true of the boys.

"Music in the High School is presented in the same groups as formerly—Mixed Chorus, Girls' and Boys' Glee Clubs, Orchestra and Band. In the vocal classes, a large percentage of the members of the entire school are singing together. There are about seventy girls and forty-five boys in the groups. The greatest number by far of the pupils taking music in the High School, are members of the two upper classes. And by far the greatest musical ability is in those two classes.

"The Band and Orchestra are carrying on as usual, having taken part last year in the New England and State Festivals. The Band playing for Hampton and East Kingston, Memorial Day, the Orchestra for graduation."

The following paragraph is a recommendation of Mrs. Coombs. It calls attention to a serious lack in our program. I hope it may have careful consideration.

"All our music organizations suffer for lack of opportunity to appear before the public. I feel that every form of school activity in whatever field, should have a point, an aim toward which the pupil may strive, with a view to acquitting himself favorably. Unless this opportunity is provided, the work falls lifeless."

The present war situation has brought to the minds of our people the importance of training our pupils to be nationally valuable in time of emergency. One definite means of accomplishing this is by instruction in First Aid. Hampton has always taught First Aid to its girls in the Home Economics course. During the current year the standard Red Cross course was taught to the Senior Class group. As a result ten girls are to receive the regular Red Cross certificates. It is recommended that this work be not restricted to the girls in one course but that regular classes be conducted for all pupils in either the

Senior or Junior year. These should probably be voluntary classes with the Red Cross certificate as the goal.

Teachers are devoting much extra time to war work and will continue to do so. Some are air raid wardens, some are taking their turn at observation posts. Some are in Red Cross work and a large number are attending first aid classes. As citizens and teachers they are under a double obligation since by the very fact of war, children are placed in added dangers. Children who must hear of a confused and war-torn world wherever they turn are by that fact less easily taught. This necessitates added skill and added preparation on the part of the teacher. This fact will be recognized I am sure.

The American Legion Posts of the third New Hampshire District together with their Auxiliaries, purchased an Audiometer and presented it to the State Board of Education for use in the schools of the third district. This machine is the best known method of accurately measuring the degree of "loss of hearing" for each individual. When the amount of hearing loss is known the teacher can arrange the work to the best possible advantage of the pupil. This knowledge is of great value eliminating unnecessary hardship and possible failure. Our thanks for this valuable contribution is rendered the Legion Posts.

Hampton's Parent Teacher Association is actively engaged in promoting the welfare of the schools. By means of its regular meetings, parents and teachers consider common problems. Frequently specialists are called in to the meetings to discuss the particular phases with which they are familiar. The teas given after school, in the individual rooms, are even more valuable. The smaller group encourages a free exchange of opinion and is inclined to restrict discussion to things of mutual interest. Its officers and members are to be congratulated upon their organization.

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Following is the yearly report of health work in the Hampton Schools:

The results of physical examinations for the current year may be seen in the figures below. The athletic teams at the Center and High Schools, and grades one and five at the Center School, were examined by the school physician, Dr. Bryer. As often as possible, home visits have been made in an effort to bring about the correction of defects, and to give any aid or advice in regard to illnesses.

A successful dental clinic is again in progress with Dr. Harold Pierson as the school dentist. The dental examinations were held at the Center School, and repair work is being done in Dr. Pierson's office.

The school children had the opportunity of a hearing test given with the audiometer, which was made available to us by the American Legion. There were 371 pupils examined, 174 at the High School, 186 at the Center School, and 11 teachers. Hearing Defects were found in 3 pupils.

The various civic organizations have been generous again with donations for projects. The Monday Club, American Legion, and Parent-Teacher Association have given toward the cod-liver oil and hot lunch funds, and the Red Cross has helped in the dental clinic. Much of this work would be impossible without such help.
