TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1942

TOWN OF HAMPTON

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.
- Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

- Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing lands from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes, or both.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$399.04 for State Aid roads, if the State contributes \$1,596.14.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$515.00.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the Clerk of the Municipal Court from \$250.00 to \$400.00.
- Article 10. To receive the report of the Planning Board in regard to zoning ordinances for the Town of Hampton and to take any proper action in connection therewith.
- Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF ZONING COMMITTEE

In accordance with instructions from the 1941 Town Meeting your Committee continued a study of the problem of zoning. One public meeting was held in the Precinct Hall at Hampton Beach on September 5, 1941. This meeting was well attended and the great majority of people seemed to be in favor of zoning, but there was some difference of opinion as to just what should be The question of overnight cabins was the main point of discussion. Your Committee believes that overnight cabins should be permitted in some sections of the town but not in all sections. It was planned to have another public meeting prior to Town Meeting, but after war was declared in December it did not seem advisable to proceed at this time. Your Committee believes that zoning is desirable in Hampton but does not feel that such a task can be undertaken while everyone is engaged in defense work.

It is therefore, recommended that the study of this problem be continued with the idea of some thing final being taken in the future, after we have successfully dealt with the more important problem such as defeating Hitler and his yellow henchmen, the Japs.

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1943

TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.
- Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.
- Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing lands from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes, or both.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$399.54 for State Aid roads, if the State contributes \$1,598.17.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to purchase a chlorine machine for the sewer system and to construct a building to house the same.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter for advancement of the interests of the town, its resources and natural advantages and to assist in the promotion of developments for the benefit of the town in co-operation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of \$515.00

Article 10. To receive the report of the Planning Board in regard to zoning ordinances for the Town of Hampton and to take any proper action in connection therewith.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to lay a sewer line on Nudd Terrace so that the property owners on the street may be able to connect with the main sewer.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to grant a tenpercent increase in salary or pay to the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Firemen and Policemen, and to raise and appropriate the money therefor.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton, New Hampshire:

I herewith submit to you my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. It will consist of the statistical reports for the school year 1941-1942 as reported to the State Board of Education, the financial statement of the Hampton School District as of June 30, 1942, the enrollment of pupils in September 1942, and the attendance roll of honor for the past completed school year. The report of the School Treasurer and a statement of the bond account as shown by the balance sheet are also included.

The current school year began September 9, 1942 with an enrollment of 477. This compares with the September 1941 enrollment of 468 and reflects the steady increase of recent years. The Senior High School registered 185 at the beginning of the year. The number of our tuition pupils in both Junior and Senior High School has increased to ninety. Seventeen of these attend Junior High from Hampton Falls. The number of tuition pupils will decrease during the year owing to the demands of a nation at war. It is estimated that the number leaving will be between fifteen and twenty.

The task of securing teachers of the qualifications Hampton demands has been particularly arduous this year. The district was fortunate in the fact that it lost only five teachers from last year's staff. Two men, Mr. Sulloway and Mr. Parker entered the army. Miss Lucille Smith resigned as teacher of commerce to accept a similar position in Hinsdale, New Hampshire. Miss Angwin, second grade teacher, married and is now living in Washington, D. C. Mrs. Norman Leavitt, who took over the teaching of Mr. Hazen's subjects, felt that she should accept no regular teaching position.

During the preceding year Mr. Edward Hazen, who had been principal of the Centre School for five years, resigned. Under his direction the standards of the school were effectively maintained as is proven by the results of standardized tests given during the past years. Upon his resignation, Mr. Clifford Eastman, who has been a member of the Centre School teaching staff for fourteen years was elected principal. The first year of his administration has proven a complete success. He has won the confidence of all school people with whom he works. The Centre School is a unit in its endeavor, in its purposes and in its organization.

The mechanic arts work has been taken over by Mr. Neal Perkins. We much appreciate his services, especially since it has been at a personal sacrifice to himself. The commercial department is in charge of Miss Aune Heino, a teacher of successful experience in Rhode Island, Since we were compelled to await her release from her former position, a temporary appointment was made during the first four weeks of the year. Mr. Weston Root, a graduate of Springfield College was engaged early in the summer to coach our athletic teams and teach in the social science field. It is my belief that he will develop into a thoroughly successful teacher. He has the welfare of his pupils at heart and they know it. In athletics his has been a particularly difficult assignment. With so many outstanding athletics leaving school, he has been compelled to build The fundamentals of any activity must be learned before success is achieved. Our boys are getting these fundamentals. Good results are assured from this procedure.

Miss Mary Dodge, a graduate of Gorham Normal School, has taught Social Science in the Junior High School and Business Practice in the High School. While it is not ideal that a teacher should divide her time between the two schools, it was necessary this year because of subject assignments to the various teachers and the increased

enrollment at the High School. Mr. Henry Shelley of North Hampton, a master craftsman, has taken over the mechanic arts work in the Junior High School. The second grade teacher is Mrs. Annie Tewksbury, an experienced teacher who is carrying on the work of that grade in successful unity with the adjoining grades.

The teachers of grades below Junior High have done outstanding work in spite of the frequent interruptions in school time because of war contributions. They have been in Hampton for several years and therefore understand the pupils whom we send to them. Added difficulties have only resulted in intensified effort on their part. Theirs is the responsibility of building the ground work of all the later education.

The list of teachers employed by the Hampton School District follows. It is an important duty of all school officials to build up the most efficient teaching staff possible. It is my recommendation that the present corps of teachers be retained. To do this it will be necessary that the salary schedules be revised. In the long run, it is more economical to pay well for a superior service.

Of necessity, the war will bring changes to our schools. There will be changes, not so much of subject matter as of emphasis. There is a definite need that more time be devoted to Geography of the entire world. New maps are now available which show the northern hemisphere. By use of this, the future interrelations of the different parts of the world are more clearly seen. The air routes, trade channels of the future, can definitely be traced. Our pupils will be better world citizens because of this map and its study.

The army tells us that a definite program for physical fitness must be an important part of our activities. Although this work must be done mainly in the secondary schools, the elementary grades must do their part. Care must be taken that our pupils have suitable physical exercise, that they understand the fundamental rules of health and that they guard their own welfare by exercise, rest and food, each in the right proportion. It is one duty of the schools to see that this is understood by the pupils. This will not be a group program, but must be based upon the need of each individual. Some pupils will need much exercise, some will need little. Sometimes more rest and sleep is required. Sometimes a better balanced diet. The individual must be the key-note of this program.

It is the secondary school that the physical fitness program will become a definitely organized part of the sched-

ule. Our athletic program, as now set up, takes care of a large group of our boys and girls. To this extent it is a success. However, it is the considered recommendation of leaders in civil and military life that physical fitness programs must reach every student in the senior high school. In preparation for this work Hampton High was represented at a meeting of physical directors called by the State Board of Education. The outline considered at that meeting is patterned to the needs of boys and girls. Its purpose is to bring each student to the best physical condition possible. This is surely one aim worthy of our best efforts. It will receive the support of the citizens of Hampton.

The schools are willingly fulfilling their part in waging a successful war. The teachers and pupils are buying war bonds and stamps—regularly. Three national registrations, those of sugar, gasoline and oil, have been entrusted to the teachers of the nation. It seems probable that War Ration Book Number Two will also be distributed by the schools. The children in both elementary and high schools have worked long and diligently in the gigantic task of collecting the metal and rubber so badly needed by our armed forces,

The Hampton Schools have a certified record of 35,398 pounds collected in its scrap drive of three weeks duration. It may be of interest to note that the pupils in the seven towns of this supervisory union gathered a total of 155,965 pounds. This is the material measure of our endeavors up to the present time. The schools stand ready to do that which may be further asked of them.

The Headmaster reports on the new activities of the high school occasioned by the war effort:

"As the war progresses there is an increasing demand for war courses. Aeronautics is being taught to eleven boys of the senior class. They like the work and do well in it. I think it should be continued. We have incorporated units of work recommended by the government in some of our older courses without changing their name. The two which are the most affected are physics and shopwork.

What we will do with our shop courses is going to be difficult to decide. It will probably hinge more on getting a teacher than any other factor. We have the program, the place, and the equipment. I hope it will be possible to find a solution to this problem.

There has been an increasing demand for physical education as a regular part of our program. Both the federal and state dapartments of education urge us to start. During the spring months, we may be able to include classes for seniors by dropping work in subject matter classes. I am in favor of including it in our regular program for next year, provided teacher time can be made available. This can be done by either dropping courses to free teachers or by hiring a teacher for this work."

Concerning the extra curricular activities in the Junior High School Mr. Eastman reports as follows:

"The Junior High School has maintained its usual athletic program. Last spring the baseball team had a very successful season. This fall touch football teams were organized. Practice was held twice a week and games were played once a week. Outside games could not be scheduled. Around twenty-five boys participated. This represented an enrollment of boys in spite of the handicap of having many of the boys unable to stay after school because of riding in the bus. At present the Junior High School has the best seventh and eighth grade basketball team in its history. All the games we would like to play are not forthcoming because of present day conditions.

Under Miss Adams the girls have had a very complete athletic program but the interest has been lacking because

of inability to schedule outside contests. Intramural contests in small schools do not arouse the interest.

In evaluating the teams to a school the stimulus that these teams make upon all the youngsters of the school should be considered. Our Junior High School teams have inspired almost all of the children to play some sort of competitive game. A visit to the school yard in the spring or fall during the recess and lunch periods will show every available space being utilized by groups playing baseball, basketball or football. For years, when on noon duty, I supervised touch football, baseball and basketball. Practically all the Junior High School boys took part in this play. Many of the boys found themselves for the first time and graduated to the regular Junior High School teams. This side of the picture has always been overlooked in the past.

Under the direction of Miss Adams the eighth grade put on a play last June to raise money for the class treasury. It was well received by the public and another play is planned for this spring.

To Miss Dodge and Miss Adams goes the credit for an innovation tried out this year. Instead of having our Junior High School socials Friday evenings we are holding them after school. Everyone seems to like the new arrangement, especially parents."

Miss Adams this year is offering a new service to our children. It is called by the name of "Guidance". Its aim is to aid boys and girls to analyze themselves — their strengths and weaknesses and to help them utilize the former and correct the latter. By conference with the teacher, pupils are guided in their choice of courses in school as well as in activities outside the school walls. It is proof of the value of the course that pupils bring their difficulties to their teacher with all confidence.

The music department has always been a source of pridto the town of Hampton. Mrs. Coombs is continuing he endeavors in behalf of our children. Due to conditions caused by the war effort, her task is particularly difficult this year. The public appearances of the band at the dedication of the service flag was a credit to the organization and its instructor.

The following is quoted from Mrs. Coombs' report:

"The New Hampshire State Music Festival was cancelled in the spring of 1942 because of difficulties in transportation.

The All New England Orchestra, Band and Chorus Festival was held in Keene, New Hampshire, in March. Mrs. Edwin Batchelder accompanied the Supervisor and pupils attending. Six pupils participated in the Chorus, two in the Orchestra, and four in the Band. It was one of our finest festivals.

Several pupils have started the study of instrumental music, using school equipment. There are several Instruments—strings especially— that are not being used. These represent a real opportunity for someone. Most of the new members of our Band are younger pupils."

Miss Perkins has been working out a new instrumental development with grade four that is very successful. This is the study of the little instrument called the "Tonette". Very good results have been obtained in the amount of time devoted to this work."

Hampton has a strong Parent-Teacher Association which—in spite of transportation difficulties—is carrying through its busy program for the current year. Its work in thalf of the school is appreciated by those of us in the field.

As Superintendent of schools I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board for its ever helpful guidance in the duties of my work. Such help can have but one result—the continued improvement of the schools of Hampton.
