TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1943

TOWN OF HAMPTON

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.
- Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing lands from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes or both.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$399.54 for State Aid roads, if the State contributes \$1,598.17.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to purchase a chlorine machine for the sewer system and to construct a building to house the same.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter for advancement of the interests of the town, its resources and natural advantages and to assist in the promotion of developments for the benefit of the town in co-operation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of \$515.00.
- Artcle 10. To receive the report of the Planning Board in regard to zoning ordinances for the Town of Hampton and to take any proper action in connection therewith.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to lay a sewer line on Nudd Terrace so that the property owners on the street may be able to connect with the main sewer.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to grant a ten percent increase in salary or pay to the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Firemen and Policemen, and to raise and appropriate the money therefor.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOR

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

June 1, 1943

TOWN OF HAMPTON

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham in said State:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in the said Hampton on Tuesday, the 1st day of June, 1943, at seven-thirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinances in relating to clams:

(1) In order to protect, propagate and conserve the clams within the limits of the Town of Hampton, the Selectmen are hereby granted authority to determine what section or sections of the clam flats or creeks shall be open for the digging or taking of clams, and what section or sections shall be closed and the Selectmen may from time to time open or close sections of the flats or creeks. On closed sections the Selectmen shall cause to be erected such notice or notices as they may deem sufficient, and no person shall dig or take any clams from any closed flat or creek.

- (2) No person shall dig, take, buy, sell, give away, expose for sale, or possess for any purpose clams in their shells measuring less than two inches in length by their longest dimensions, and the possession of more than ten such clams less than two inches in length shall constitute a violation of this section.
- (3) No person shall dig or take clams from any open clam flats or creek in the Town of Hampton unless he has a license or permit therefore, as follows:
 - (A) The Selectmen may issue a boni-fide resident of the State of New Hampshire an annual license which shall entitle said licensee to dig and take clams, not in excess of three bushels in any one day, from the open flats or creeks, upon payment of a fee of five dollars.
- (B) The Selectmen may issue to a boni-fide resident of the State of New Hampshire, or to a non-resident owning or leasing real property within the Town of Hampton, an annual permit which shall entitle said permittee to dig or take clams for his own consumption or that of his family, not in excess of one-half bushel in any one day. There shall be no fee for such annual permit.
- (4) All licenses and permits shall expire March 31, following the date of issuance. No license or permit shall be transferable.
- (5) If any person is convicted of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance his license or permit may be suspended or revoked by the Selectmen for such period of time as they may determine.
- (6) If any provision of this ordinance is held invalid, it shall not effect the validity of the remaining provisions thereof.
- (7) Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following ordinances relating to taxicabs:

- (1) No person shall operate a taxicab in the Town of Hampton without first securing a license therefore from the Selectmen, the annual license fee shall be \$25.00 and all licenses shall expire on the March 31st following the date of issuance. No license shall be issued unless and until the applicant furnishes the Selectmen with proof of reasonable insurance or bond for the protection of passengers riding in said taxicabs. No license shall be issued except to a boni-fide resident of the Town of Hampton. Any person operating more than one taxicab must secure a license for each taxicab. A license may be transferred upon request to another taxicab acquired by the licensee but shall not be transferable to another person. The license must be carried in the taxicab at all times,
- (2) Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$25.00 to inure to the use of the Town.
- (3) If any provision of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid, it shall not invalidate the remaining provisions thereof.

Article 3. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton:

I herewith submit to you my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. It will consist of the statistical reports for the school year 1942-1943 as transmitted to the State Board of Education, the financial statement of the Hampton School District as of June 30, 1943, the enrollment data in September 1943 and the attendance roll of honor for the past completed school year. The report of the school treasurer and a statement of the bond account as shown by the balance sheet is also included.

The current school year began September 13, 1943 with an initial enrollment of 461. This compares with the September 1942 enrollment of 477. The Centre School continues to increase. The total enrollment in the High School is 168 as compared with 188 last year. There have been more withdrawals than usual due to work opportunities and enlistments in the armed forces. The number of pupils attending our schools from other towns is now 74. Since it is the older pupils that the services are calling, a further drop should be anticipated.

Three teachers, new to the Hampton system, are now employed by the district. Miss Margaret Tobey, for four years our Home Economics teacher, resigned during the summer to marry. Miss Beverly Parker, a graduate of New Hampshire University, is now in charge of that department. The number of girls taking this course is smaller than its value justifies. The equipment is adequate and the teacher qualified. Girls should be urged to inquire into the advantages of this course before deciding

definitely upon their high school work.

To more efficiently teach our pupils by means of smaller classes and also to allow the teaching of the physical fitness program recommended by the Army, an additional teacher was employed this year. We were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Virginia Johnson, a teacher of successful experience in the schools of Concord, New Hampshire.

Mr. Edward Oleson, came to us from Keene Teachers' College to take charge of the work in our mechanic arts course. We have at the present time, six mechanics with the usual equipment for the cabinet making and general shop courses. We are attempting to complete necessary machinery for working with metal. Due to the priority system established because of the war we have experienced difficulty in securing this. However, we now have a drill press and a shaper for metal work. Two metal lathes have been on order for some time now. With the delivery of these our shops will be fairly well equipped.

The school system that retains its teachers from year to year gains their acquired experience. This must be reflected in the work of the pupils. Hampton believes in this policy. With the exception of the two replacing teachers mentioned before, all teachers returned to us this year.

The teachers of the elementary grades are coordinating their work with frequent conferences among themselves. When each teacher understands the methods of instruction used by the other teachers whom her pupils have had, she is better able to understand the groundwork upon which her pupils must build. There must of necessity be a period of adjustment to new environment and a new teacher. Hampton teachers are reducing this period to a

minimum. United effort and similarity of procedure reduce the time spent unproductively. Continuous and even progress produces less spectacular but more permanent results.

The roster of teachers is published herewith, together with the subjects or grades each teaches and the salaries scheduled. In most cases the figures given include the bonus voted as a result of war conditions.

We are attempting, this year, a more accurate form of personal analysis and vocational guidance. Too often pupils adapted to one type of education attempt a type entirely unsuited to their interests or capacities. The result is poor work and discouragement on the part of the pupil. If he can be carefully analyzed, his aptitudes tested and varied achievements measured, he will be better enabled to find the school work that is best for his particular need. Sometimes this is attempted in one school only to have a

succeeding school operate without the results obtained earlier. Sometimes the philosophy of succeeding schools is unresponsive to previous findings. It seems that there must be united effort among all schools concerned if we are to serve the pupil to his own best good. Hampton is trying to do just this. A Junior High School teacher and Senior High School teacher are working together with the purpose of applying a more direct approach to the individual pupils needs. Miss Adams and Miss Johnson, by their cooperative efforts have advanced the service of the schools to our children. The ideal sought is that every child shall be placed in the school situation that will give him the greatest benefit.

A more definite geography course seems to be demanded by the present world situation. After the war a knowledge of the geography of the world as a single unit must be the foundation of international diplomacy and trade. The Junior High School is none too soon to emphasize this view. Hampton has, therefore, displaced the so called social sciences by definitely aligned geography and United States history courses. The most modern texts have been purchased. I believe this is a definite step in advance.

The following paragraph is quoted from Principal Eastman's report:

"The War Time demand for a more complete physical education program was met in the Junior High School by scheduling two periods a week for each grade in Physical Education. On Mondays the eighth grade has one period of Physical Education and on Tuesday the seventh grade has one period. On Thursday the seventh and eighth grades have a Physical Education period together. The Thursday afternoon period on days that there are no assemblies is one hour and half in length. This allows sufficient time for varied activities. With the Winter season

upon us, however, it will be necessary to cut down our activity until Spring as the High School Gym. will be available only one afternoon a week and the time must be shared by the girls and boys. Mr. Oleson and Miss Parker have graciously taken groups on Thursdays making it possible to keep every student active. The Junior High will again field a basketball team this winter and run off in addition an intramural basketball series."

The change of emphasis as regards subject matter in the Academy and High School is noted by the Headmaster as follows:

"Hampton High School is fully aware of the seriousness of the situation that confronts our country today and stands ready and willing to do everything possible to prepare its students so that they will be able to make the greatest possible contribution within their powers to the war effort. In an endeavor to do this we have added courses in Aeronautics and Physical Education and changed the content of many courses to include material particularly requested by our various branches of government. The armed forces request us to give all boys as much science, mathematics, history and English as possible and to keep them in good physical condition. This we want to do and have set up conditions to bring it about. In addition we are training girls in clerical and stenographic work, first aid and care of the sick, besides a host of less important things."

Much of value is taught through extra-curricular activities. Hampton is active in this department, both in Centre and High School. The majority of this work is contributed by the teachers from their own time and is almost wholly outside of school hours. Following is a list of extra-curricular activities at the Junior High School:

Miss Adams — Girls' Athletics; Dramatics; and eighth grade Guidance.

Mr. Eastman — Boys' Athletics and Boys' Physical Fitness Program.

Mr. Oleson — Boys' Physical Education.

Miss Parker - Girls' Physical Education.

The list of activities is given in the High School by Mr. Russell:

"I wish to especially commend the work of the teachers in charge of the extra-curricular activities. Their willingness in giving their time is responsible for many of our successes. Following is a list of extra-curricular activities:

Mrs. Brown — Assemblies, dramatics.

Mrs. Rayner - Girls' Athletics.

Mr. Root — Boys' Athletics.

Miss Heino - School Paper.

Miss Wight — Assists in Athletics and Dramatics.

Miss Johnson — Girls' Tri Hi-Y.

Mr. Russell - Senior Advisor and Student Council.

Mrs. Coombs — Band, Orchestra and Glee Club.

Mr. Oleson — Hi-Y".

Hampton Academy and High School is cooperating with the Army Institute. The Institute is an organization set up by the Army whereby men in the armed forces may continue their secondary or college work while in the service. This is accomplished by schools placed near camp or battle areas or by correspondence with the head office. With the completion of the required units, credit is transferred to the high school or college designated by the student. Large numbers of soldiers are using this service. It is suggested that friends of former Hampton Academy students, especially non-graduates, notify them of this opportunity to study while they serve their country.

Hampton's music department is well and favorably

known. Mrs. Coombs is responsible for its success. With the increasing number and variety of extra-curricular activities in the high school the number of pupils upon which she may call grows less. This makes the teacher's work more arduous. Training in music is a valuable part of a school service to its children.

Mrs. Coombs reports in part as follows:

"The work in the elementary grades has continued as in the past, with the singing of folk songs, for the most part, by note and by rote. Appreciation and interpretation has been aided by stories about the different countries from which the songs came. Rhythm work has continued in Rhythm Band and Folk Dancing, altho' a much shorter time has been used for these Activities."

"The pupils of the Junior High School continue to receive instruction in four-part chorus singing, with music appreciation."

"In December, the grades and Junior High School united in producing a Christmas Pageant, of a religious character. Speaking parts were furnished by grades five and six. A choir of Junior High pupils sang appropriate carols. Background characters and singers were provided by pupils from all grades. It seemed to me to be successful both as a production and as an activity."

"The High School vocal music is carried on in three classes—Girls' Glee Club, Boys' Glee Club, and Chorus—a uniting of the two clubs. By selecting the best readers and singers, the pupils gave some of the best musical programs in the history of the school, last year. The boys sang at a patriotic church service; the girls, with Mrs. Benoit as soloist, performed a Cantata, "The Lady of Shalott' 'for the P. T. A.; and both groups, together and separately,

sang exceedingly well for graduation. A double quartette of boys sang for the opening meeting of P. T. A. in October."

"For two years a course in Music Appreciation has been presented to Freshmen, only, at the High School. In September, last, those who had received credit in this first year course were offered an advanced second year. And the Freshman course was continued. The two classes are meeting three times a week, each, and altho' small, are exceedingly enjoyable."

"The Orchestra played at the first meeting of the "A. in the Fall. It also played at a lecture in the High School Auditorium."

Hampton Schools, for a number of years, lare been fortunate in having the office of the nurse in the school building. This results in unusually careful service for our children. Miss Smith's report is included herewith. The physical examinations of all students in the high school is a decided advance over previous years. Although it was established as a procedure recommended by the Army if would be well if this were adopted for all pupils during their first year of attendance in the high school. When this is done, each of our children will receive three thorough physical examinations during his school life—two in the Centre School and one in High School.

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Following is the annual report of health work in the Hampton Schools:

The yearly physical examinations have been completed. Dr. C. B. Bailey, the school physician, examined grades one and five at the Centre School.

This year in conjunction with the accelerated physical fitness program for all high schools, physical examinations and histories were done on all students at the High School Dr. Bailey did the examinations. Some follow-up and corrective work has been completed. This reaches a vital age group, and it is hoped that these examinations will become an annual policy in the school system.

This spring we again plan a chest clinic. These are under the sponsorship of the New Hampshire Tuberculos's Association, with all materials furnished by this organization. The students who wish this service are given a simple test for indication of infection. Positive reactors are given x-rays at nominal cost at the school.

The dental clinic with Dr. Harold Pierson, is in progress. Examinations have been completed, and the dental repair is being done in Dr. Pierson's office. The Hampton Red. Cross gave us financial aid in this clinic in the spring.

The trustees of the Academy have generously helped with the purchase of needed equipment in the Practical Arts department. This equipment is costly but necessary. Its purchase is giving Hampton Academy and High School a modern and well equipped department. As more machines are released by the government more will be added to our present intsallations. This contribution of the trustees is one that will increase the effectiveness of our school program and will return definite dividends in the lives of our children.

Mr. Albert S. Shaw has presented to the school district his extensive collection of mounted birds and animals. These are now placed in the Centre School. As an aid to nature study they are invaluable. No longer are our children restricted to pictures and descriptions as found in text books. The thanks of the school staff, the pupils and their parents is due Mr. Shaw.

An active Parent-Teacher Association is an asset to any school system. Hampton has such an association. Its membership is large and made up of interested citizens. It is now engaged in a campaign to raise money for a sound-motion picture machine. This will be an educational tool for use in both Centre and High School. Films are available for work in science and history classes, in language classes and also in elementary subjects. It will be in almost constant use.

The war effort is actively reflected in our program. The distribution of War Ration Book Four was entrusted to the teachers of the nation. The Hampton staff received 754 applications and issued 2,121 Ration Books. A constant drive for the sale of war bonds and stamps is a recognized school activity. The Centre School reports sales of twenty-three hundred dollars in war stamps and bonds from the

opening of the year in September to January first of this year. The High School is conducting an active compaign with student groups in charge.

In closing this report, I wish to express my thanks to the principals and teachers, the parents and pupils for active help received this year. Without such cooperation little can be accomplished. You, as a board, have made your decisions with the welfare of the children the controlling factor. This fact has resulted, and must always result, in continually improved service to the schools and through them to the community. My thanks, as Superintendent, is due you for your help and guidance in my work.
