TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1944

TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, break-water, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing lands from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes, or both.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$199.93 for Town Aid roads, if the State contributes \$799.71.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter for the advancement of the interests of the town, its resources and natural advantages and to assist in the promotion of developments for the benefit of the town in co-operation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of \$515.00.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to purchase land for a parking space and Police Station at Hampton Beach, the same to be in such location as the Selectmen may determine and the Selectmen are authorized to either purchase said land or take the same by Eminent Domain proceedings and all matters in connection therewith are to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.

Article 10. To receive the report of the Planning Board and to see if the town will vote to instruct the Planning Board to prepare a zoning ordinance and report to the next annual town meeting.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to lay a sewer line on Island Path.

Article 12. On petition of Charles E. Filley and twenty other legal voters of the town, to have town place three street lights in Hobbs Road, one on the first pole, one on the middle pole and one on the last pole on the road.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase land for cemetery purposes.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

MARCH 14, 1944

Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, John W. R. Brooks, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

The warrant was then read by the Moderator after which prayer was offered by Rev. Edgar Warren.

"Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed by Thy name. We come to Thee this morning, as men have always come, to thank Thee for Thy goodness in the past and ask for a continuance of Thy mercies.

"We thank Thee, O God, for the town where we have our home and for the great Republic of which we are citizens. Continue to bless and guide us in the future as Thou has in the past. Bless Thy servant, the President of the United States, and Thy servant, the Governor of this Commonwealth, and be with all those who this day are elected to office in this and other towns; that they may be so guided and governed by Thy good spirit that they will discharge the duties of their office wisely and well. May we who are gathered here this morning do our work so carefully and conscientiously that the welfare of our town will be promoted and its good name protected.

"O God, as we meet here this morning in security and peace, we would remember that our country is at war and that many of its best and bravest have been called to its defense. Bless our arms, we beseech Thee, and grant to us a speedy victory and a permanent peace. Be with our forces on land, sea and air. Bring our boys and girls safely back, if it be Thy will; but if they are called upon to make the supreme sacrifice may they make it gallantly and gladly and may their souls enter into Thy eternal peace.

Purge out of our national life all that is wrong, selfish and sinful, and may we be a better and more consecrated people because we have passed through the fiery crucible of war.

“Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet,

“Lest we forget—lest we forget!

Amen.”

The Moderator then appointed the Ballot Clerks, who were Charles F. Adams, Moderator for Ballot, and Arthur L. Penniman, Clerk. Ballot Clerks: Solon Gremmels, Charles Raymond, Willard Emery, Ernest W. Towle, Howard Lambert. Then the ballots were given to the Ballot Clerks and votes were then called for.

A Motion: To close the polls at 6:30 P. M.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500) to be used for sewer extensions.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to continue the purchase of land for a parking space and police station at Hampton Beach, the same to be in such location as the Selectmen may determine and the Selectmen are authorized to either purchase said land or take the same by eminent domain proceedings and all matters in connection therewith are to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen; and to further authorize the Selectmen to use any part of the aforesaid Ten Thousand Dollars (10,000) for the purchase of a gravel pit.

Article 11. In accordance with Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 to ascertain the sense of the people of the State on United States membership in a general system of international co-operation having a police power to maintain the peace of the world:

To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international co-operation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

Article 12. On petition of Harlan Teague and seventeen other legal voters to see if the town will vote to take over and maintain all roads in Norseman's Rest.

Article 13. On petition of Lawrence Hackett and fourteen other legal voters to see if the town will vote to purchase a piece of heavy highway equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand (\$13,000) Dollars for the same.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton:

I herewith submit to you my fourteenth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. It will consist of the statistical reports for the school year 1943-44 as transmitted to the State Board of Education, the financial statement of the Hampton School District as of June 30, 1944, the enrollment data in September 1944 and the attendance roll of honor for the past completed school year. The report of the school treasurer and a statement of the bond account as shown by the balance sheet is also included.

The current school year began Monday, September 11, 1944 with an initial enrollment of 483. This compares with the corresponding figure of 461 the previous year. The total enrollment in the High School at the present time is 187. Of this total the number of tuition pupils is seventy-two.

Hampton Academy and High School has a staff of ten teachers. Two of these are new to our school. The commercial department is in charge of Miss Alice Hingston, a graduate of Boston University in the Class of 1944. Miss Dorothy Perkins, a teacher of Home Economics in Coe-Brown Academy during the past year, is on our staff this year, conducting the work in both senior and junior high school. Each of the teachers is a valued member of our school organization.

Three new teachers in the Centre School are graduates respectively of New Hampshire University, Hyannis Teachers College and Keene Teachers College. Miss Nelson comes to Hampton after a year of teaching in the Elliot, Maine High School. She received her training at our State University. Miss Williams, the other junior high teacher is a graduate of Hyannis, who had worked for the Navy since

her graduation. Mrs. Edna Berry is teacher in the second grade. She has had several years experience in the schools of Rye, New Hampshire and in Massachusetts. Mrs. Janice Naves, our art teacher, is now instructing at Camp Devens. To the present time we have been unable to secure a successor. Mrs. Naves' work was a source of satisfaction to everyone. She is greatly missed by teachers and pupils alike. The teachers are working hard to keep alive and to further develop the abilities of the pupils discovered and enriched by Mrs. Naves. It is our intention that this department of a "complete" education shall not be neglected.

The list of the teachers is published herewith together with the subjects taught and the salaries scheduled. In most cases the figures given include the bonus voted as a result of war conditions. It should be understood that the figures given are those on the contracts and include the withholding tax which is paid directly to the Collector of Internal Revenue by the school district.

According to the Journal of Education, New Hampshire leads all forty-eight states in the amount of reading by its citizens. The public libraries of this state contain the greatest number of books per capita. The statistics show the range to be from 3.58 books to .15 books with New Hampshire the former figure. This may be the result of the emphasis on reading in recent years in our schools.

It is the opportunity of the first three grades to teach the mechanics of reading. Building upon this the middle grades introduce the pupil to rich and varied experiences through their reading. They should develop a deep and permanent interest in reading since it is the means by which lifelong study is carried on. The children in these grades have the opportunity to hear about fine books in their class-rooms as well as regularly over special children's radio broadcasts.

The University of New Hampshire broadcasts a program called "Good Books for Boys and Girls." Our fifth grade has integrated this with their regular reading work. Appreciation of good literature is the purpose of this activity. The local librarian is cooperating with the school and is a valuable help in activating the program.

Guidance work has been a little advertised part of our service to our pupils. It is an attempt by educational leaders to acquaint the pupils with opportunities which should be available to them as a vocation. Studies are made of the advantages and disadvantages that accrue to the various occupations, the numbers of people engaged in each and the probable future stability of each. Guidance is a two-fold study—the suitability of the occupation for the pupil and the suitability of the pupil for the occupation. The second

part is the most difficult and requires the most searching analysis. Many tests have recently been devised to measure aptitudes for definite types of work. These will be given in the course of guidance work. The immediate objective will be to guide the pupil into the school courses and subjects for which he seems to be best fitted. The ultimate objective will be to assist him in choosing the type of life work in which he will be happiest, most interested and most capable. By this procedure it is planned to lessen the number of misfits occasioned by thoughtless choice of school subjects or an ill-considered selection of occupation. We believe the pupil who knows himself best is the most likely to succeed.

The need for an adequate vocational program has become increasingly evident. It is an important part of school training to see that our pupils shall be better prepared for entering useful employment. Hampton Academy and High School has made a beginning of meeting this need. We have the start of a good machine shop. Recently we have received the promise of at least eight more machines from the government within the next few weeks. More machines will probably be available later. This will give us the opportunity to offer more and varied work to our students. Although the so-called G. I. bill will apply mainly to colleges and universities there will be some call for vocational instruction in high schools. We should be prepared for such a demand. With more machines and with a larger variety of courses, this demand could be met so far as it applies to the high school level.

It may be that short courses of ten or fifteen weeks should be introduced to prepare returned veterans for a definite job within a short time. Preparation for these should be made with the first evidence of a possible demand. (Several such courses have been given in the Hampton schools in previous years. Two courses in bookkeeping and typewriting were offered four evenings each week under the auspices of the N. Y. A. Last year's elementary electric course, su-

pervised by the O. S. Y. A. was also a short evening course. More of such courses should be offered in the future.)

Hampton schools have a definite program in physical fitness for all youth. The course has been arranged in cooperation with the Army officials and is carried out as nearly as possible to their recommendations. Organized athletics are of definite value and must be continued. They provide physical training for a limited number, however.

Herein lies the value of the Army program—that all, or nearly all, benefit thereby. The schedules were outlined in last year's report and remain in substance the same this year.

Principal Eastman of the Junior High School makes the following suggestion in regard to the school plant: "There is one long range recommendation I would like to make. The Centre School Auditorium will not now accommodate the entire school body. There are times when for administrative purposes, Memorial Day exercises and other similar occasions it is desirable that the entire student body be brought together. If the present trend for Physical Education continues a proper place for indoor activity is needed. The High School Auditorium does not meet this need because the High School has its own program and with the Centre School limited to daytime activities there is just not time available. This is a project that cannot be realized under present conditions but should receive favorable consideration in the future."

Mr. Eastman is continuing his athletic work for Hampton boys and girls. He reports that the Physical Education program inaugurated last year in the Junior High School has been carried through this year. The boys had a winning "Touch Football" team and for the sixteenth straight year the Hampton Junior High School is represented by a bas-

ketball team. Mr. Oleson is assisting Mr. Eastman in boys' physical education, while Miss Nelson and Miss Perkins are in charge of the girls' physical education program. The boys had a successful baseball season, splitting its series with Hampton's old rival, Exeter. The girls played a limited softball schedule with Hampton Academy girls and teachers as opposition. At the exercises on closing day June 16, 1944, the American Legion awards went to Paul Moore and Arlene Tobey.

Hampton schools have been active in the war effort. The school children purchased war bonds and stamps to the value of \$2,436.05 during the past school year. The pupils were also active in the collecting and processing of milk weed pods, the total gathered being 125 bags. It will be of interest to note that the number of bags of milk weed contributed by the seven towns of Union 21 was 487. It is estimated that two bags will furnish material for one life jacket.

Mrs. Coombs, supervisor of the Music Department, reports in part, as follows:

In the elementary schools, work has been carried on in much the same way as in the past. Work in melody and rhythm has been presented to grades one, two and three. Work in melody, rhythm and harmony has been presented to grades four, five and six. Music Appreciation has been presented to all grades.

For the first time in my teaching experience, I have found a graded course of study in Music which seems to have the same qualities of excellence throughout the grades. We are now using this in all the elementary grades, "The World of Music," published by Ginn and Company. In this course, pupils are made acquainted with the folk songs and dances of all countries. Our pupils seem to enjoy this course of study.

In the Junior High School, in addition to the regular chorus work, the girls have had some folk dancing, which has been very enthusiastically received. This has now been discontinued because of lack of time. A new text has been used and appreciated in grades seven and eight.

Work at the High School has followed the same plan of previous years. This fall a very much larger class elected Music Appreciation than we've had for some years. This is gratifying since we have excellent material for this course.

This fall, also, a girls' choir of eleven members was organized. This gives an opportunity for those having outstanding voice to receive a more specialized training. The Boys' and Girls' Glee Clubs are somewhat larger this year.

The Orchestra and Band carried out the usual activities for the year. The Band marched Memorial Day, the Orchestra appeared at Graduation.

Mr. Root has helped the Band very much this last fall in their marching practice. It has seemed to me that the marching of the Band has improved very much since the introduction of a regular course in Physical Training.

The annual report of health activities in the Hampton schools follows:

Physical examinations were completed in grades One and Five in the Centre School by Dr. C. B. Bailey, school physician. At the High School, the Freshman class and athletic teams had physical examinations by the school doctor. These examinations always include any other children about whom advice is needed. Many physical handicaps or defects found in this way have already been corrected, especially in the increasing number of children requiring vision correction.

This spring the schools will again have the use of the audiometer for hearing tests in all grades from the Fourth through High School.

Since the last annual report a Patch testing clinic was held at the High School. All positive reactors were taken to Portsmouth for chest x-ray and report. The materials for these are always furnished by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

The Dental Clinic, with Dr. Harold Pierson as school dentist, is in progress. Examinations were done at the Centre School, and dental repair is done in Dr. Pierson's office each Thursday morning. The clinic is large, and usually lasts from October until June. Approximately two-hundred children have complete dental repair in the clinic. The school is indebted to the Hampton Red Cross for making dental repair possible to a limited number of children who would not otherwise have it.

The Hampton Parent-Teachers Association is always active for the welfare of our boys and girls. Recognizing the importance of visual aids in the education of today, the association purchased for the school system a 16mm. sound motion picture projector. When priorities permit, which we are assured will be soon, this will be available to both Centre and High School. Pictures are now made to parallel class work in nearly every subject. Particularly valuable are those in science and history. This gift of the P.T.A. is much appreciated.

The dancing classes sponsored by the Association are proving of real worth. The instructor is really capable and the results socially are favorable. The value of school dances after such training is an asset to the students.

Concerning our graduates of last year the Headmaster reports: "Last year we graduated a class of twenty-five, seventeen girls and eight boys. Of the boys, five are in the armed forces, one in the reserves, one attends Phillips Exeter Academy and one is employed in Boston. Of the girls, one is at the University of New Hampshire, one at Green Mountain Junior College, three attend business schools, one is a Cadet Nurse, three are in the Navy Yard, six are employed, one at home and one married. The record is a creditable one and indicates our graduates are taking an active part in the service of our country and our community."

In athletics Hampton Academy has been represented by teams of which we may well be proud. The football team of last fall was one of the best in recent years and was unanimously declared champion of New Hampshire Class D schools. Usually playing against schools of larger enrollment, Hampton's sportsmanship is noticed by its opponents as well as its supporters. The teams are now carrying through their basketball schedule with the same spirit. Headmaster Russell comments on one of our difficulties as follows: "Transportation is difficult. Mostly we rely on the

parents, teachers and friends of the school. They may not continue if the gasoline situation gets worse. The use of a school bus for transportation would be a big advantage. We will of course do the best we can."

The trustees of Hampton Academy and High School are generous in their support of the practical arts work in the school. They have purchased all of the machines in our shop and much of the newest equipment in other departments. Their assistance guarantees the continuing and increasing efficiency of our school. In proportion as our pupils become familiar with modern machines will their entrance into the modern world be intelligently made.

I wish again to express my appreciation for your valued help in the work of my office. The schools of Hampton should be, and I believe are, a source of pride to the citizens of the town. With your continued guidance they will always be so.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
