TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1945

TOWN OF HAMFTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways, and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing lands from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes or both.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.30 for State Aid roads, if the State contributes \$1,601.21.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter for advancement of the interests of the town, its resources and natural advantages and to assist in the promotion of developments for the benefits of the town in co-operation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of \$515.00.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500) to be used for sewer extensions.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to continue the purchase of land for a parking space and police station at Hampton Beach, the same to be in such location as the Selectmen may determine and the Selectmen are authorized to either purchase said land or take the same by eminent domain proceedings and all matters in connection therewith are to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen; and to further authorize the Selectmen to use any part of the aforesaid Ten Thousand Dollars (10,000) for the purchase of a gravel pit.

Article 11. In accordance with Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 to ascertain the sense of the people of the State on United States membership in a general system of international co-operation having a police power to maintain the peace of the world:

To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international co-operation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

Article 12. On petition of Harlan Teague and seventeen other legal voters to see if the town will vote to take over and maintain all roads in Norseman's Rest.

Article 13. On petition of Lawrence Hackett and fourteen other legal voters to see if the town will vote to purchase a piece of heavy highway equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand (\$13,000) Dollars for the same.

Article 14. To receive the report of the Planning Board and to see if the town will vote to adopt a zoning ordinance for the Town of Hampton, the same having been prepared by said Board in accordance with a vote of the town and public hearings having been held thereon by said Board.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, 1946, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways, and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter for advancement of the interests of the town, its resources and natural advantages and to assist in the promotion of developments for the benefits of the town in co-operation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of \$515.00.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a truck for the health department and raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) for the same.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a sidewalk plow and raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Hundred Dollars (\$1,700) for the same.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to erect an Honor Roll in honor of the Veterans of World War II and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) therefor.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for the purchase of fire hose.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for the the purpose of developing the new parking area at Hampton Beach and to authorize the Selectmen to proceed with the development thereof, to make such parking charges as they deem reasonable and to do all things necessary to operate the same.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Clam Ordinance, so called, adopted at the Special Town Meeting held June 1, 1943, by amending said ordinance as follows:

Article 1, Section 1. By inserting after the word "clams" in the second and fifth lines the words, "and clam worms" and after the word "clams" in the tenth line the words "or clam worms."

Article 1, Section 3. By inserting after the word "clams" in the first line the words, "or clam worms."

Article 1, Section 3.

(A) By inserting after the word "day" in the fourth line the words "and to dig clam worms,"

By adding after Sub-Section B a new Sub-Section C and a new Sub-Section D as follows:

(C) The Selectmen may issue to a non-resident a permit to dig clam worms not in excess of one pint per day for his own use upon payment of a fee of one dollar,

(D) This ordinance shall not prohibit a resident of the State of New Hampshire from taking clam worms for his own use and not for re-sale,

so that the whole ordinance as amended shall read as follows:

(1) In order to protect, propagate and conserve the clams and clam worms within the limits of the Town of Hampton, the Selectmen are hereby granted authority to determine what section or sections of the clam flats or creeks shall be open for the digging or taking of clams and clam worms, and what section or sections shall be closed and the Selectmen may from time to time open or close sections of the flats or creeks. On closed sections the Selectmen shall cause to be erected such notice or notices as they may deem sufficient, and no person shall dig or take any clams or clam worms from any closed flat or creek.

(2) No person shall dig, take, buy, sell, give away, expose for sale, or possess for any purpose clams in their shells measuring less than two inches in length by their longest dimensions, and the possession of more than ten such clams less than two inches in length shall constitute a violation of this section.

(3) No person shall dig or take clams or clam worms from any open clam flats or creek in the Town of Hampton unless he has a license or permit therefore, as follows:

(A) The Selectmen may issue a bona-fide resident of the State of New Hampshire an annual license which shall entitle said licensee to dig and take clams, not in excess of three bushels in any one day and to dig clam worms, from the open flats or creeks, upon payment of a fee of five dollars.

(B) The Selectmen may issue to a bonafide resident of the State of New Hampshire, or to a non-resident owning or leasing real property within the Town of Hampton, an annual permit which shall entitle said permittee to dig or take clams for his own consumption or that of his family, not in excess of one-half bushel in any one day. There shall be no fee for such annual permit.

(C) The Selectmen may issue to a non-resident a permit

to dig clam worms not in excess of one pint per day for his own use upon payment of a fee of one dollar.

(D) This ordinance shall not prohibit a resident of the State of New Hampshire from taking worms for his own use and not for re-sale.

(4) All licenses and permits shall expire March 31, following the date of issuance. No license or permit shall be transferable.

(5) If any person is convicted of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance his license or permit may be suspended or revoked by the Selectmen for such period of time as they may determine.

(6) If any provision of this ordinance is held invalid, it shall not effect the validity of the remaining provisions thereof.

(7) Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars.

Article 15. To receive the report of the planning Board and to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Planning Board to prepare a zoning ordinance and report at the next annual Town Meeting (and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) therefor) and to authorize the Board to engage the services of a zoning expert.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Arthur W. Brown and Louis B. Janvrin of a certain tract of land to be used as a public way, said tract being 25 feet wide and commonly known as Brown Street and extending eastward from the Lafayette Road 366 feet.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton:

I herewith submit to you my fifteenth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. The statistical reports included are copies of the figures deposited with the state Board of Education for the fiscal year 1944-1945. In addition, enrollment by grades as of September, 1945 and the latest school census will be printed. The report of the School Treasurer and a statement of the bond account are included.

The current school year began on Monday, September 10, 1945 with an initial enrollment of 473. Of this number, 180 are enrolled in the high school, 71 of whom are tuition pupils. There are also registered fourteen tuition pupils in the junior high school. The large number registered from the other towns tends toward a "Hampton united" and will result in mutual understanding and cooperation between the towns. The presence of these pupils renders a valuable service to our towns and to the local school system.

Hampton has been unusually fortunate in retaining the majority of its teachers. I believe a word of appreciation should be extended to those who have remained with us despite opportunities elsewhere, both in war time jobs and in other teaching fields. It is this spirit of service upon which the welfare of our schools must depend.

On the Centre School staff there was but one change. Mrs. Dorothea Stevens returned to us until the Christmas vacation at which time her husband returned from service in the Army. Mr. Robert L. Hill, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and a teacher of experience in New Hampshire schools has taught in our junior high schools since Mrs. Stevens left us.

Hampton Academy and High school has four teachers new to Hampton. Mr. Weston Root entered the army during the last weeks of the past year. His subjects have been under the direction of Miss Evelvn Hooper. She is a graduate of Boston University with teaching experience in the schools of Massachusetts. Mrs. Virginia Matthews resigned at the end of last year to accept a position in Maine. Miss Catherine Martin, a graduate of New Rochelle was employed by the district to take over the work of Mrs. Matthews. Mr. Oleson resigned during the summer to accept a position in Connecticut. Mr. Lough who is at present in charge of the Mechanics Arts course, came to us after teaching in the schools of Salem, Mass. He also taught special courses under the direction of the Massachusetts State Board of Education in the General Electric School at Lynn, Mrs. Ruth Y. Junkins comes to us after a number of years teaching Science and Math in institutions of higher learning. She has taken over the Mathematics courses formerly taught by Mrs. Rayner.

After a year without Art instruction, the subject is again offered to the pupils. Miss Dorothea Martin, a graduate of the Massachusetts School of Art is Supervisor of Art in the schools of Hampton, North Hampton, Rye and Hampton Falls.

It is a distinct service to the schools and to the community that Mr. William Elliot consented to take over the direction of athletics during the present emergency. He has worked long hours and faithfully for the welfare of our athletic program. He has the confidence of his teams, the morale is high, the games have uniformly been a credit to the boys and the coach. Mr. Elliot has given of his Saturday time to help boys who are not, for one reason or another, equipped for a place on the regular school team. This comes very near being athletics for everyone.

Miss Dorothy Perkins has done successful work as coach of the girls teams. The fundamentals of basketball are taught to our girls and, for this reason, each one benefits from each practice and each game. As an inspiring coach, Miss Perkins is superior.

HAMPTON ACADEMY AND HIGH SCHOOL

Hampton Academy and High School at the present time offers five courses of study: Academic, Scientific, Commercial, Home Economics and Vocational. These courses are taught by nine teachers. The work is evaluated by recognized standardized tests. The program is approved by the State Board of Education. The work of the school is designed for immediate entrance into life activities or as a preparation for further schooling. How well it fulfills the second objective may be shown by the record of last year's graduating class. This record Headmaster Russell reports as follows: "We graduated a class of 36, the largest to ever graduate from this school. There are twenty-six girls and ten boys. Of the boys, seven are in the armed forces, one is at the University of New Hampshire, one at the New England School of Theology and one is at home. Of the girls, one attends the University of New Hampshire, one attends Colby College, one attends Boston University, two attend Junior College, one attends Art School, one attends a school of Physiotherapy, four attend commercial schools, one Leland Powers School, two Beauty Culture schools, one the Mary Brooks School, seven are working, two are at home and two are married."

The trustees of Hampton Academy and High School continue their generous policy of purchasing equipment for the several departments of the school. This money will enable us to install modern machines and equipment in these departments—machines such as are used in the establishments where our pupils may later be employed.

A Burroughs Bookkeeping and Listing machine has already been received. Other equipment will be added as available. From the Surplus Commodities Corporation two metal working machines have been acquired. A Taylor and Fenn, two spindle, model S, Floor type drilling machine was shipped to the school from Hartford, Conn. We have also received a Burke, Number 3 Milling machine. A microscope for the Biology department is on order.

Hampton Academy and High School must now offer its services to returning veterans, especially to its former students who entered the armed services before graduation. It should be possible for any veteran, who so desires to take courses that will lead to a high school diploma or prepare him for the college of his choice. Since the Armed Forces Institute establishes courses for men and women while in the service, transfer of credits to the Academy can be made. It is earnestly desired that veterans, interested in securing credits contact the school officials.

HAMPTON JUNIOR HIGH AND CENTRE SCHOOL

The foundation of any school system is laid in the elementary grades. The work of the first three grades is a unit with the objective of teaching the mechanics of reading to a successful conclusion. Fundamentally, good readers are good students. The work of these grades is noticeably good.

Upon grades four, five and six falls the responsibility of training the pupil to work independently. Study habits must be established and improved to the point where the pupil will be enabled to enter upon the work of the junior high school. Reading habits must be established and the fundamental operations of arithmetic mastered. Three experienced and skilled teachers guarantee results in these grades.

One definite reason for the training for war is an increased realization of the importance of visual aids in teaching. The local Parent Teacher Association has purchased a sound picture machine for the use of the local schools. Moving pictures speed up learning since the presentations are more impressive when offered to the sense of sight. This machine is now used in regular class instruction, in athletics and in extra curricula activities. Its value will constantly increase as more films become available.

It is in the Junior high grades that the pupil first experiences departmentalized work and a more elastic program. Mechanic Arts is offered to the boys, Cooking and Sewing to the girls, music clubs and organized athletics. The Stanford achievement tests prove the work of the grades seven and eight to be well up to standards. Since the classes of this group are large, the teachers are to be complimented upon this accomplishment.

The Junior High athletic teams are having their customary success. It is important that correct training should start with the early years of team play. In this also, the plan is to give physical training to all pupils. Thursday afternoons are regularly assigned to this activity for all junior high girls and boys alike. Of this work, Miss Nelson and Mr. Eastman are the directors.

Under the direction of Mrs. Coombs, Music is an integral part of the school program from grades one through twelve. The children in our lower grades like to sing. It is here that they learn the mechanics of Music and it is also here that they like to take part in school assemblies and holiday programs. In the upper grades, their first interest is aroused as preparing for membership in the band and orchestra. Programs have been put on for the

Parent Teacher Association. The Women's Club, school graduation and school assemblies. The Band has appeared as usual in the Memorial Day parade. The backing of the Legion and Auxiliary and their interest, year after year, is greatly appreciated and means much to the children. It is now planned that the Hampton Schools will be represented in the New England Music Festival at New Britain, Connecticut and at the State Music Festival in Nashua, N. H.

One of the seven cardinal principles of education is the development of health. The importance of this is bein, recognized so that school systems are assigning more pupil time to physical training. Where a system has sufficiently large enrollment, a trained director is frequently employed whose duty it is to see that all pupils benefit by a physical program set up through all the grades. Pupils with minor physical weaknesses are discovered and given corrected drill which helps alleviate any existing difficulty. Careful guidance throughout the twelve grades, at the hands of a skilled director, should materially aid in the development of all the children enrolled in the school. While the health of our children is well guarded by our school nurse, doctor and coaches, it might be well to consider the possibilities of employing a specialist or of releasing a qualified teacher or teachers to supervise work of this nature.

Waste motion frequently results from unguided choice of subjects by the pupils. On such occasions students with abilities in one field may choose a field unsuited to them. In an attempt to ascertain actual interests and aptitudes a guidance service has been established in Hampton Academy. Tests to determine general interests under nine classifications are administered. Having determined the interest group, test of aptitude follow. The correlation of these two test series gives some idea of the type of activity in which success seems most evident. When this is followed by conferences with guidance teachers and investigation into the possibilities and demands of the vocations indicated, there is established a definite objective toward which teacher and pupil may work. It is the present plan to improve this service by securing a working agreement with Boston University whereby Hampton may have the advantage of their guidance service. It may also be possible to secure representatives of various businesses and professions to consult with the pupils as to the preparation for the demands of their own particular field. The purpose is three fold-to give the pupil an understanding of himself, his interest and abilities: to acquaint him with the demands of his prospective occupation and to give him an idea of the possible rewards in this field.

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The P. T. A. of Hampton is rendering two valued services to the schools this year. The moving picture machine is a distinct teaching aid in class instruction. The children receive real pleasure from the pictures and the lessons are learned so much the more easily. The dancing school under the auspices of the P. T. A. is popular with our children. It is hoped that these dancing lessons will continue under the same auspices for a number of sessions.

A review of the war bonds and stamp sales for the Hampton Schools during the past academic year shows a total sales of \$1,740.85 in war stamps and \$1,393.75 in bonds. The purchase of \$796.90 in bonds is recorded for the Victory Loan drive. Our pupils have been active in war drives whether bond sales, milk weed pod drives or scrap collections. Our teachers have given of their time to work on the distribution and recording of ration books. Physical education has been given the place in the program suggested by the armed forces. Time schedules have been rearranged to make possible an economical bus timetable.

It is our purpose to base the program of studies upon proven principles, to incorporate the most modern and efficient methods of learning and to offer the pupil a complete mental and physical program adapted to his own capabilities and vocational interests. For valued help and advice, I am 'indebted to you as a School Board. Under your guidance, progress is assured.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

February 12, 1946

Following is the report of the health work in the Hampton Schools:

The annual physical examinations are under way, Dr. C. B. Bailey, the school physician, is doing grades one and five at the Centre School and the Freshman class at the High school. In addition, participants in athletics at the High school are examined.

The Dental Clinic is in progress with Dr. Harold Pierson in charge. Examinations were held at the Centre School. Each Thursday morning the students are taken to the office for repair.

In October a clinic for the purpose of inoculating children against diphtheria was held at the Centre School. Members of the first grade who hod not had this advantage previously were inoculated at this time. Thirtythree were done.

On January 18, a Patch testing clinic was held at the High School for the purpose of testing against any previous infection of tuberculosis. This is held with the help of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Society.

The audiometer was available last spring for use in the Centre School for ear testing, and will be used this year in the High School.

The Red Cross has given us the privilege of milk at no cost when necessary for undernourished children. It also has donated generously to the dental clinic.
