REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN AND TOWN MANAGER

The fiscal year 1961 ended successfully with a net budget surplus of \$22,221.39. Funds have been reserved to complete all projects voted at the 1961 Town Meeting, and \$20,000 will be used as cash surplus to reduce the 1962 tax rate.

During 1961 the community was affected by the following changes. The \$1,160,000.00 sewer construction bond issue was finally approved. In accordance with state law, almost seven miles of state-maintained roads reverted to the town. The southerly route to Hampton Beach was approved. Land rent schedules were revised to provide an additional income of \$25,980.00 to be used to reduce the tax rate. The new band shell for Hampton Beach was approved.

Hampton is still growing at a rapid pace. During 1962 it is estimated that one hundred new homes, and two miles of roads will be constructed. Even though the developer pays for the cost of public improvements within his subdivision, an increase in the budget from 2% to 5% is required for the expansion of services. As long as the shift from a rural resort community to an urban resort community continues, budgets will continue to grow. How increasing budgets will affect the tax rate depends upon the comparative growth of seasonal property and industry in relation to single family homes.

The 1962 recommended budget reflects our opinion of the wishes of the majority of the people.

The Polls were declared open for voting by Australian Ballot.

Upon motion of Douglass E. Hunter it was voted that the Moderator dispense with the reading of the entire warrant as it has been published and printed according to law.

ARTICLE 3

Budget

The Report of the Municipal Budget Committee was given by the Chairman, Herbert Casassa.

TO THE HAMPTON TOWN MEETING:

The gross budget recommended by the Municipal Budget Committee for the ensuing year is \$559,927.00. This is \$60,089.00 more than the 1960 approved budget and results in a figure of \$439,710.00 to be raised by property taxes.

The Budget Committee held three Executive Sessions and two Public Hearings in preparing its recommendations for this Town Budget. The completed budget has been posted as required by law, published in the paper and included in the Hampton Town Report.

Special Article No. 7 concerns an appropriation of money and this article has been recommended by the Budget Committee and is included in the gross budget total mentioned above.

Special Article No. 8 concerns an appropriation of money for the purpose of equipping and providing the services of crossing guards for school children at designated intersections in the Town. This article was not recommended by the Budget Committee as it was believed that this matter was within the jurisdiction of the Police Department.

Special Article No. 9 concerns an appropriation of money and this article has been submitted by the Budget Committee without recommendation.

Special Article No. 10 concerns an appropriation of money for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Rice Terrace. It was voted not to recommend this article as provision for this installation has been made in the \$6,000.00 item recommended by the Budget Committee under Highways and Bridges, Sewer Construction on Page 64 of the Town Report.

Special Article No. 12 concerns an appropriation of money for the installation of an adequate surface drain on River Avenue. It was voted not to recommend this article as the Town Manager indicated that a difficult and serious problem exists in this area requiring a survey prior to taking appropriate action. It is planned to make such a survey.

If you will kindly turn to Page 63 of the Town Report I will review the major items of the budget as recommended by the committee in column 3.

We would like to express at this time our appreciation for the complete cooperation which we received from the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and Department Heads during the preparation of this budget.

Item 1 — GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Town officer salaries show an increase of \$1,475. over

last year due to salary increases of \$1,000. for the Town Manager, \$400. for the Tax Collector and a new salary item of \$75.00 for the Moderator.

Town officers expenses are primarily the administrative costs of maintaining the Town Office including stenographic help, office supplies, printing, and postage. They are approximately the same as in the 1960 expenditures.

Election and Registration expenses budgeted for 1961 reflect a decrease of approximately \$900. over 1960 due to the off year on State and Federal Elections.

The increase in Municipal Court expenses is due to a provision of \$400. for the salary of an Associate Justice. Requests under Town Hall and Building Expenses include \$750. for a new furnace at the town office and \$250. for storage cabinets necessary in handling the new Commercial Code.

Item 2 — PROTECTION OF PERSONS AND PROPERTY

The Police Department budget was thoroughly reviewed with Chief Roden, the Town Manager, and the Selectmen. Finally after considering the many phases of our police protection problems it was voted by the committee to recommend a sum of \$64,940. This sum is approximately \$10,700. higher than the 1960 expenditure and provides for an additional two officers plus increments for the regular force.

The increase of \$2,794 in the Fire Department budget over 1960 expenditures is due primarily to wage increases recommended in order to bring the earnings of fire department personnel on a level with members of the police department.

The Insurance item of \$7,925 represents the amount required to meet all insurance obligations of the Town. In previous years an item for insurance has been included under the several departments but for better cost control purposes it has now been brought into one sched-

ule. This action was recommended by the Town Manager. Under Damages and Legal Expenses the \$3,000 increase requested is for anticipated land damage cases on the new causeway road used for dumping.

Item 3 — HEALTH

The increase of \$700. for expenses at the Comfort Station is necessary in order to keep the place clean.

Health Department costs will increase approximately \$1,110 over 1960 expenditures due to additional streets requiring rubbish collection services.

The amount for Sewer Maintenance is lower than in 1960 as \$4,000. in Sewer Permit fees will be credited to this account.

Increases under the Town Dump and Garbage Removal classification are due to increase in rubbish collection and cost of maintaining the new road to the rubbish disposal point.

Item 4 — HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES

Additional streets in the town account basically for increases in summer and winter maintenance costs. The committee also voted to recommend an additional amount of \$3,000 for adequate snow removal operations.

Street lighting expenses of \$33,232 reflect an increase due to new street lights recommended for G to M Streets by the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company. Wage increments and equipment repairs account for the budgeted increase under General Expense, Highway Department.

Item 8 — RECREATION

The \$2,130. item for the Recreation Commission includes a request for an additional supervision to handle the summer program. Reports from the Commission indicated an average daily attendance of 71 and on many occasions it exceeded 100 children.

The recommended amount of \$10,150.00 for Parks and Playgrounds is \$1,250. less than the 1960 approved budget.

Item 9 — PUBLIC SERVICE ENTERPRISES

A \$500. increase in the Advertising and Regional Association classification results from higher advertising costs with no expansion of the present program.

Additional Life Guard requirements, higher sweeper operation costs and need for new waste containers at the Beach account for the \$2,000 increase under Special Activities.

Item 11 — OUTLAY FOR NEW CONSTRUCTION AND PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS

The Budget Committee recommends \$20,000. for Storm Drains Construction which is \$18,000 less than the approved budget for 1960. Within the limitations of these funds drainage construction will be effected in the following areas: Intersection of Exeter Road and Josephine Drive, High Street, Homestead Circle to Mill Road Drain, Extension Norton Road or Park Ave. to Marsh, and the Ashworth Parking Lot. If feasible some drainage will be constructed on Philbrook Terrace and Naves Road.

The amount of \$3,500 for Tuck Field represents cost estimates for repairing the Band Stand and reconditioning the Tennis Courts.

Repairs and painting projects at the Court House and Comfort Station account for the \$4,750 request under New Lands and Buildings Expenses.

New Equipment in the amount of \$21,800 and recommended by the committees includes a Police Station Wagon, Dump Truck and Plow, Pick-up Trucks (2), Fire Alarm Boxes, Tractor with Loader, Truck - Beach and Highway and Radios.

Mr. Casassa then made the motion that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$552,427.00 for Town purposes. Motion seconded. So Voted.

(Note: The Gross Budget included \$7,500. recommended for Article 7 by the Budget Committee, which makes the Gross Figure \$559,927.00)

Later in the meeting the sum of \$1,500 was voted for Moulton Road sidewalk, which made the final Gross Budget \$561,427.00.

ARTICLE 4

Borrowing Money in Anticipation of Taxes

Mr. Douglass Hunter made the motion that Article 4 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 5

Disposal of Real Estate

Mr. Kenneth Langley moved that Article 5 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 6

Federal Grant For Sewer

(Refer to July 12, 1960 Special Town Meeting)

This article was not recommended by the Budget Committee. Mr. Robert Bridle moved indefinite postponement of Article 6. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 7

Marsh Reclamation

Mr. Carl M. Lougee, Chairman of the Marsh Reclamation Authority gave report — which is on record.

A map was displayed showing boundaries of the Marsh Reclamation Authority project. This caused a great deal of discussion as the majority of citizens had not been aware that the boundaries of the project included so much developed land, and dwellings.

Mr. Robert Bridle asked why the original Authority as set up, had to be changed as provided in the proposed "House Bill No. 108". He also said that the original plan as outlined at a previous Town Meeting called for the development of marginal land and we were told that private capital would finance this project. Mr. Bridle's home is included within the new boundaries.

Mr. O. Raymond Garland asked how many dwellings are included in Project I. Mr. Lougee replied that there were many on Glade Path and Island Path. He said that all the marshland in Hampton is under the Authority.

Bonding Council advised that exact boundaries must be set. Any objection should be taken up with the Authority. Mr. Bridle replied that the "Authority was created by the N. H. Legislature."

Mr. Kenneth Langley asked if House Bill No. 108 is passed by the Legislature can the Authority act as directed by that bill without any vote of the Town.

Reply: "House Bill No. 108 and present statute only cut a pattern for the Authority to serve the Town." The Authority must present a preliminary plan covering all aspects of any proposed project, to the Selectmen and the Planning Board. A Public Hearing follows. The Authority then develops the final plan which goes through the same procedure again.

The Town must vote at either the Annual Town Meeting, or a Special Town Meeting whether or not they wish to back the Bond Issue of the Authority.

Mr. Norman Royal, of the Advisory Board of the Authority, stated that he was the principal deterrent to House Bill No. 108. He desired a safeguard that the Authority must do as the Town votes. Fears that the credit of the Town may be jeopardized by the voting of a handful of people at a Special Town Meeting.

Mr. Bertrand Roy made the Amendment that action on Article 7 be postponed until such time as agreements agreeable to the townspeople can be reached. Seconded. This amendment was not carried. Vote — 72 in favor of amendment. 93 against.

Mr. James Rush felt that more publicity should have been given to House Bill No. 108 so that the townspeople would be informed of the proposed boundaries. He said the people of Hampton would not have known anything about it if he and Mr. Royal had not gone to Concord, and objected to some portions of the bill.

Mr. Carl Lougee said that refusal of the Town to vote the \$7,500.00 requested in Article 7 would necessitate termination of the Authority. There is \$2,605.32 left

from last year's appropriation, with fees for legal counsel and Bond Counsel not yet paid. He said the income from Authority projects would exceed the cost, and in the long run would enable the Town to reduce taxes.

Mr. William Dunfey moved the previous question. (Vote recorded under Bertrand Roy's amendment.)

Mr. Hunter moved that Article 7 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 8

Crossing Guards at Schools

Not recommended by Budget Committee. Mr. Wwear Rowell moved indefinite postponement of Article 8. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 9

Sidewalk — Moulton Road

Mrs. Margaret Wingate moved that Article 9 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. Not Carried.

Discussion regarding type of sidewalk, and actual length of walk needed to continue present sidewalk to High St.

Town Manager Kenneth D. Boehner said that he recommended hot top sidewalks, and that the cost would be approximately \$3.00 per running foot.

1st Amendment. Mr. Edmund Langley amended Art. 9 to read \$1,500.00 instead of \$900.00. Seconded. Article 9 Voted as amended. (\$1,500.00)

Note: (This article had been presented "without recommendation" by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 10

Rice Terrace Sewer

Mr. Herbert Casassa moved indefinite postponement of Article 10. Seconded. So Voted. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 11

Acceptance of Auburn Avenue

Mr. Herbert Casassa moved the acceptance of Article 11 as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Discussion concerning acceptance of "Dead End" streets followed. Mr. Raymond Goding, Chairman of the Planning Board, said that in rare instances they approved their acceptance. The Board can do little about past developments.

ARTICLE 12

Drainage for River Avenue

Money for a survey of conditions in this area is included in the Budget, but not under this article.

Selectman David F. Colt moved that Article 12 be definitely postponed. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. Howard Page moved that the meeting be recessed for lunch until 1:00 P.M. Seconded. So Voted.

Town Meeting re-convened at 1:00 P.M.

Marilyn Dubois sworn in as ballot clerk to replace Mary Coellner.

ARTICLE 13

Dogs

Mr. Robert Bridle moved that Article 13 be accepted as read. Seconded.

1st Amendment. Mr. Carl Bragg amended Article 13 to read "between the hours of 6 A.M. and 9 P.M." Seconded. Not Voted.

2nd Amendment. Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved that Article 13, paragraph 1, be amended to read as follows: "It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of a dog to permit his dog to run at large or to be restrained, in such a manner so as to be a nuisance or disturb the peace." Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

The status of hunting dogs working with owners was clarified at the request of Mrs. Harry Parr. Hunting dogs working with owner are not running at large.

Section 1 of Article 13 voted as amended by Wilfred Cunningham.

Section 2. Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved that this section be deleted from Article 13. Seconded. So Voted.

Section 3. Mr. Leston Perkins moved that Section 3 be stricken from Article 13. Not Passed.

Mr. William Elliot moved that Section 3 of Article 13 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section 4. Mr. Cunningham moved adoption of Section 4 as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Article 13 voted as amended, with Section 2 deleted.

ARTICLE 14

Taxicabs

Read by Moderator. Mr. William Elliot moved adoption of Article 14 as read. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 15

Town Beaches

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved that Article 15 be adopted as read.

Mr. Robert Dunfey objected to the time limit of 11 P.M., and made the amendment that "11 P.M." be stricken from Article 15 and "1:00 A.M." be put in its place. Amendment seconded.

Mr. John Dunfey said that he recognized the need to keep young people off the beach during the night, but felt that the proposed 11 o'clock restriction was ridiculous when people are spending their money to vacation at the beach.

Mr. William Elliot said that the Chamber of Commerce requested this article because of "beer parties" on the beaches.

Mr. Robert Dunfey's amendment was voted in the affirmative. Article 15 voted as amended.

Mrs. Irving Jones expressed the opinion that something should be done about people sleeping in cars parked in door yards and public parking places.

Town Counsel John W. Perkins said no "by-law" could be added to Article 15, but the Selectmen could act upon the recommendation.

ARTICLE 16

Zoning

Article 16 read by the Moderator.

Mr. Raymond Goding moved that Article 16 be taken up section by section. Request granted.

Mr. Goding made the motion that Section A, Article 16, be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. D. Malcolm Hamilton said that all sections of Article 16 were approved by the planning board, and he moved adoption of Section B as read. Seconded. This was voted in the negative.

Mr. R. Goding made the motion that Section C be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. Richard Dunfey expressed the opinion that we have enough "sign" laws on the books without Section D.

Mr. William Elliot made an amendment to Section D which was withdrawn.

Mr. Richard Dunfey said that there are distinct ambiguities in Section D which should be clarified, not voted on the intent of the Planning Board.

Mr. Clifford Bean said many traffic accidents had been traced to rotating or occulting lights.

Mr. Roland Paige moved that Section D, Article 16 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section E was read by Mr. R. Goding who then made the motion that Section E of Article 16 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. R. Goding moved adoption of Section F as read. Not seconded.

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Section F. The meaning of Section F was discussed. When called upon Town Counsel agreed that the meaning is not too clear.

Mr. John Dunfey made the motion that action on Section F of Article 16 be postponed until the Planning Board can bring in a clearer wording of this section. Seconded. Motion carried.

Section G. Mr. Raymond Goding moved acceptance of

Section G, Sec. 6 & 7, as read. Seconded. After discussion this was voted in the affirmative.

Discussion: Mr. Kenneth Langley's amendment to indefinitely postpone Section G of Article 16 was not passed. Mr. Langley said that there were, to date, no proper signs to help local business men. He would be glad to eliminate Bill Board advertising when that happens.

Mr. D. Malcolm Hamilton said that he recommended passage of Section G because it would give the town control over the erection of signs even though no fee might be charged by the Building Inspector.

Many states have legislation pending which will prohibit bill boards.

Mr. William Dunfey expressed the opinion that more business men should be consulted when regulations such as "Section G" are to be proposed.

Town Manager Kenneth Bohner said that any individual who wished to erect a sign should first find out if the sign will be in violation—before he spends his money.

ARTICLE 17

Fish House Area — Court Case

Mr. William Elliot moved that this Article be indefinitely postponed.

Selectman Noel W. Salomon explained that the so-called "Fish House Case" is still open. It cannot be closed without a vote instructing the Board of Selectmen not to collect this money.

After consultation with Town Counsel John W. Perkins, Mr. William Elliot made the following motion: "I move that the Selectmen be instructed that no further action be taken to hold the defendants accountable for rents and profits." Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 18

Zoning on Winnacunnet Road

Article read by Moderator.

Mr. Roger Heaslip moved indefinite postponement of

Article 18.

Mr. D. Malcolm Hamilton said that Article 18 was recommended by the Planning Board, and written up in accordance with the request by Postal Authorities. He recommended adoption of the Article.

Question: Is it a firm commitment that the Post Office Department approve the Winnacunnet Road site for a building?

Reply: Letter was received from Senator Bridges stating that he had received word from the Real Estate Dept. of the Post Office confirming Winnacunnet Road location.

Mr. Heaslip said that the majority of the merchants favored the Lafayette Road location. A Post Office located on Winnacunnet Road would allow the business district to grow.

The Moderator reminded the assembly that Article 18 contained no mention of a Post Office.

Mrs. Virginia Blake said that everyone knew that the reason for the proposed re-zoning of Winnacunnet Road was to allow a Post Office building to be built on the vacant lot adjacent to the Library, so why not discuss it? She stated that such a location would be convenient to the Town Offices where a great deal of business is done, and that it would help to distribute traffic and not create a worse bottle-neck in Hampton Center.

Mrs. Deborah Kirwin said traffic on Lafayette Road is so heavy in the summer that it would be difficult for the large mail trucks to turn in to the office, and out from an office in that area.

Mr. Richard Dunfey said that Article 18 as submitted has no mention of a Post Office in it, and advised of the dangerous precedent of "spot zoning."

Mr. Henry Norwell asked if Article 18 would have been submitted if it had not been for the desire to have a Post Office located on Winnacunnet Road. Reply: No, probably not.

Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, David F. Colt said that Mr. Wheaton Lane wished, eventually, to give the 50 feet of land adjoining the Library property to the Library for purposes of expansion. If the option given by Mr. Lane to the Post Office Dept. is not used, the request will be made to have the land in question rezoned to Residence "A".

Mr. R. Dunfey said that there is no guarantee when the ten year lease expires that it will be renewed. It might be possible to have some other business, less desirable, move into the building.

Mrs. Alfred Casassa asked if anyone had ever seen a grocery store installed in a ten year old post office building.

Mrs. Louisa Berry said that everyone understood that a building such as a Post Office could not be amortized in ten years, but we need a Post Office, and let's have it now.

Mr. William Dunfey said that there was no firm decision in Washington as to placing a Post Office on the Winnacunnet Road location.

Mr. Colt replied that the Boston Office of the Post Office Dept. has in their hands such a decision, but someone went to Washington, and perhaps that decision had been changed since the Boston Office notified Senator Bridges that it had been confirmed.

Mr. William Dunfey explained that he was approached by a group of business men who felt that they had not had a fair hearing from the Board of Selectmen. He said that he was the person who contacted the Bureau of Facilities in Washington.

Selectman Noel Salomon said that the Board of Selectmen tried to represent the whole community. This is the opportunity for the people to decide what they want.

Mr. Howard Paige moved the previous question. Seconded. So Voted, by more than the required $\frac{2}{3}$ vote.

Mrs. Louisa Berry made the motion that Article 18 be

accepted as presented in the Warrant. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 19

Zoning — Exeter Road

Article read by the Moderator.

Mr. Robert Dunfey moved adoption of Article 19 as read. Seconded. So Voted. (following discussion)

Mr. Goding said that the Planning Board would like to see Article 19 postponed until further study could be made. Only two years ago this area was zoned.

Mr. John Dunfey said that Article 19 was put in the Warrant by the Building Inspector because an industry wished to settle near the Toll Road and a portion of the lot desired is not in the Industrial District.

Mr. Richard Dunfey and Mr. William Elliot both spoke in favor of accepting Article 19.

Mrs. Margaret Rich asked what type of industry wanted to locate in the area. Reply by Robert Dunfey: Precision Measuring Instruments.

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner wished to go on record as favoring the decision of the Planning Board to request postponement of action on Article 19 at this time. He stated that all business is not good for the town, and frequently costs the town more money than it brings in.

Mr. Robert Dunfey said the type of industry coming to this site is approved by the State Planning and Development Commission.

ARTICLE 20

Other Business

A report from the Chairman of the Shade Tree Commission, Mr. Roland Paige, was placed on file.

The following joint resolution was presented by Mr. Raymond Goding and Mr. James W. Tucker, Sr.

WHEREAS the chair at the Selectmen's table, oc-

cupied by Harry D. Munsey at Town Meetings for over 30 years, is now vacant, and

WHEREAS during his long term he rendered service to Hampton in many and varied fields and in many important offices, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the citizens of Hampton, in Town Meeting assembled on March 14, 1961, express sincere regret at his passing and appreciation for the service he has rendered the community, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the records of this meeting and be sent to members of Mr. Munsey's family.

WHEREAS there is need for an entrance and exit to Hampton Beach South of the Town of Hampton to relieve congestion and to contribute to the proper development of the so-called Marsh Lands, and

WHEREAS location of said highway South of the Town of Hampton will assure that the New Hampshire Seacoast will receive its best exposure for the thousands of tourists and visitors, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the voters of the Town of Hampton in Town Meeting assembled on March 14, 1961, favor the location of the proposed highway South of the Town of Hampton, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Wesley Powell, Gov-

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

July 24, 1961

Held at Hampton Academy Jr. High School Auditorium

The Meeting was opened by Moderator Edward S. Seavey, Jr. at 7:30 P.M.

The Moderator read the Warrant and return.

Non-voters were asked to sit at the side of the Hall.

Article 1. Mrs. Virginia Hale made the motion that Article 1 be passed as read. She spoke briefly in favor of Article 1. Motion seconded.

Intervening discussion included:

Mr. Charles Butler spoke in opposition to the Article because he felt that it would not serve the purpose for which it is designed. He said that Lafayette Road had been open territory for business developments for many years and it appeared that someone was trying to "throw a road block" to prevent the building of a Post Office. He mentioned that the Lafayette Road area would not be used for development of new homes because of traffic — therefore was the natural place for business development and location of a Post Office.

Mrs. Virginia Blake spoke in favor of Article 1 stating that the town's people had already expressed their desire to have a Post Office building on Winnacunnet Road by their vote at the Annual Town Meeting.

Mr. Philip Toppan spoke in opposition to any re-zoning of the area mentioned. He said he had no axe to grind as far as location of a Post Office, but disliked having the Post Office made an issue that would divide the zoned business area.

Mrs. Allaire Nownes reminded the meeting that the townspeople had already expressed their wish to have the Post Office on Winnacunnet Road.

Mr. Willard Emery said "traffic" should be left out of the argument. The town needs to grow.

Mrs. Louisa Berry expressed the opinion that being within walking distance of a Post Office was no argument as nearly everyone rode to the Post Office if it was merely around the corner. She said the present location was far better than the Lafayette Road site.

Mr. Lewis Joslyn said that Hampton has a Master Plan, and that any move to shorten the business area is wrong because of the growth of the town. He asked if the Planning Board consulted the Master Plan before favoring the Zoning Article 1.

D. Malcolm Hamilton replied, "Not in regard to this specific article."

Attorney Seth Junkins said that the validity of Article 1 was open to question. Hampton has been involved in a great deal of litigation in recent years — at a considerable expense. He considered there would be a possibility of court action if Article 1 passed. Mr. Junkins read a letter from Mr. Wheaton Lane, owner of both the present proposed sites for a Post Office. Mr. Lane did not favor re-zoning of the section mentioned in Article 1. Mr. Junkins asked that "traffic hazards" be defined, and said that passage of Article 1 was an improper manner in which to decide the location of a Post Office.

Mr. Stanwood Brown, Chairman of the Merchants' Division of the Hampton Chamber of Commerce introduced Attorney David Engle, and requested that he might speak to the assembly. Request granted.

Mr. Engle said that the proposed road to be built by the state in this area might help the traffic situation on Lafayette Road. He said the definition of "Traffic Hazards" is a matter solely up to the board of appeals and varies considerably. Legality of Article 1 open to question. The U. S. Supreme Court has ruled that no town,

state, or county may make regulations governing the placement of Federal Buildings.

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner said that Article 1 does not prohibit business. 1,400 cars per hour are at present passing the proposed site of the Post Office on Lafayette Road.

48 in favor of Article 1.

208 against Article 1.

Negative vote on Article 1.

Article 2. Mr. Herbert Casassa, Chairman of the Municipal Budget Committee said that Article 2 had been approved by the Budget Committee and report placed on file with the Town Clerk.

Town Counsel John W. Perkins explained that Hampton has an ordinance that settlement of any suit involving over \$1,000.00 must be voted by the Town Meeting, not by the decision of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 2. The motion was made by Herbert Casassa that Article 2 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted. Meeting adjourned.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School Auditorium in said Hampton, on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March 1962, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Selectman for Three Years; on Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes for one year; four members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

(The polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$739,065.00.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired through tax deeds, any sale to be at Public Auction.

ARTICLE 6. To vote upon the following question: "Shall the powers and duties of the Office of Collector of Taxes be transferred from said office to that of Town Manager?"

(This question will be on the official ballot in accordance with Chapter 37:17 of the N.H. Revised Statutes annotated, 1955 as amended.)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a deputy, with the approval of the selectmen, in accordance with the authority granted in Chapter 41:38 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955 as amended.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the purpose of hiring a full-time engineer to prepare property tax maps for the town.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell at public auction the Philbrick land so-called, at 239 Exeter Road, and the Horace Batchelder land so-called, by the proposed Exeter & Hampton Expressway.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell at public auction the East End School House lot so-called.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a right-of-way from Ocean Drive to Seabrook Beach.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing Lot No. 409 as per Sun Valley Corporation plan for a parking lot, and to authorize the selectmen to establish fees for the use of the lot.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to have the vacant town land at Plaise Cove bounded on the north by Lot 537 and on the south by Lots 536 and 528, and land opposite the North Shore Lots between North

Shore Boulevard and the old layout of the Ancient Highway surveyed out into lots to be leased to private persons by the Board of Selectmen in the best interests of the town.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to name streets in accordance with the authority granted in Chapter 251.1 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, and to rescind the vote taken on Article 20 of the 1958 Town Meeting requiring the selectmen (A) to obtain approval by a majority of the legal resident voters of the street and, (B) requiring a public hearing to be held before changing a street name.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 for the purpose of hiring five policewomen for school crossing guards.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purpose of buying liability insurance for the police dogs.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to participate in the Federal Urban Planning Assistance Program for a Hampton Village Business District Study, and a Town Building Survey, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 as the town's share of the cost.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to restrict access to all town parking lots to locations approved by the Planning Board, and to direct the Planning Board to deny all requests for access that are not for the sole purpose of ingress and egress for off street loading or the extension of off street parking.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949 and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as following:

By changing the following described tract of land from the "Business District-Winnacunnet Road" to "residence A", and amend such change to the "residence A

Village and Beach District", said change to be bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the westerly sideline of Academy Avenue projected southerly to the centerline of Winnacunnet Road, thence running northerly along said westerly sideline of Academy Avenue to a point 200 feet northerly from the intersection of the westerly sideline of Academy Avenue and the northerly sideline of Winnacunnet Road, thence turning and running westerly 271.3 feet to a point, thence turning and running southerly 200 feet to the northerly sideline of Winnacunnet Road, thence continuing southerly to the centerline of Winnacunnet Road, thence turning and running easterly along said centerline of Winnacunnet Road 278 feet to the point of beginning.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949 as amended at subsequent town meetings, as follows:

A. Amend Article III, Use Regulations, Section 2, Residence B Districts, by inserting after paragraph 4 thereof the following new paragraph: 5. In the Residence B. Districts, no building or land shall be used for the sale of intoxicating liquors or intoxicating beverages of any kind, whether by the bottle, by the can, by the glass or otherwise.

B. Amend Article III, Use Regulations, Section 3, Business Districts, by inserting after Section 3, the following new section: Section 3-A. Seasonal Business and Recreational Districts. In Seasonal Business and Recreational Districts, no building or land shall be used for any purpose except one or more of the following:

1. Any use permitted in a Residence B District.
2. General, outdoor recreation of a non - commercial nature.

3. Shops, restaurants, and warehouses.
4. Garages, parking lots and filling stations.
5. Offices, Banks.
6. Theatres and halls.
7. Coal, coke, woodland building material yards.

In a Seasonal Business and Recreational District, all manufacturing, except that clearly incidental to the business lawfully conducted on the premises is specifically prohibited. In a Seasonal Business and Recreational District, no building or land shall be used for the sale of intoxicating liquors or intoxicating beverages of any kind, whether by the bottle, by the can, by the glass or otherwise.

C. Amend the zoning districts now in effect by re-zoning the Business District-North Beach, "High Street and Boulevard" and the Business District-Hampton Beach, "First Street to Hampton River", as Seasonal Business and Recreational Districts, as follows:

SEASONAL BUSINESS AND
RECREATIONAL DISTRICT NORTH BEACH
HIGH STREET AND BOULEVARD

Beginning at a point in the westerly sideline of Ocean Boulevard 571 feet southerly from the southerly sideline of North Shore Road; thence running southerly by Ocean Boulevard to High Street; thence westerly by High Street to King's Highway; thence southerly by King's Highway to a point 150 feet northerly from the northerly sideline of 19th Street; thence turning and running at right angles to King's Highway westerly to a point distant 600 feet from the westerly sideline of King's Highway; thence turning and running northerly by a straight line to a point 750 feet westerly from Ocean Boulevard and 200 feet southerly from the southerly sideline of North Shore Road; thence turning and running by a line at right angles to Ocean Boulevard 750 feet to the point of beginning.

SEASONAL BUSINESS AND
RECREATIONAL DISTRICT HAMPTON BEACH
FIRST STREET TO HAMPTON RIVER

Beginning at the intersection of First Street and the Ocean Boulevard; thence running southerly by the westerly sideline of said Boulevard to a point opposite Dumas Avenue; thence turning at right angles and running easterly to a point 100 feet easterly from the easterly side of said Boulevard; thence running southerly by a line parallel to and 100 feet easterly from the easterly side of said Boulevard to the Atlantic Ocean on the southerly shore of Great Boar's Head; thence turning and running westerly across said Boulevard to the westerly sideline thereof; thence running in a general southerly direction following the westerly sideline of said Boulevard to a point opposite Haverhill Street; thence easterly across said Boulevard to the northeast corner of the lot fronting on Haverhill Street and the Boulevard; thence running in a general southwesterly direction following the rear lines of the lots fronting on said Boulevard to the State Park; thence turning and running westerly by the State Park and a continuation of the northerly line thereof to Hampton River; thence running northerly by said river to a point on the center line of Bragg Avenue; extended westerly; thence turning and running easterly by the centerline of Bragg Avenue extended to a point 137.5 feet westerly from the town intercepting sewer; thence turning and running northerly by a line parallel to and 137.5 feet westerly from said town intercepting sewer to Church Street; thence turning and running in a straight line to a point in a line at right angles to Ocean Boulevard through the intersection of Dumas Avenue and 300 feet westerly from the westerly sideline of Ocean Boulevard and westerly by a line parallel to and 300 feet southerly from Winnacunnet Road to a point in the extension to the westerly sideline of Ring's Restaurant Land, so-called, in a southerly direction; thence turning and

running northerly by the projection of and by the westerly sideline of Ring's Restaurant land to a point 300 feet northerly from the northerly sideline of said Winnacunnet Road; thence turning and running westerly 300 feet from the northerly sideline of Winnacunnet Road to Eel Ditch; thence turning and running northerly by Eel Ditch to the centerline of First Street extended westerly; thence turning and running easterly by the centerline of First Street and its extension westerly to the point of beginning.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the town of Hampton, adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949 and amended at subsequent town meetings as follows:

A. By adding in Subsection 1, Section 1, Article III, after the words "or others", the words "generally recognized as the learned professions normally requiring a degree", so that Subsection 1 as amended shall read as follows:

"Single family residence, including other purposes accessory to their use as residences, by the owner or tenant, such as offices for doctors, engineers, architects, lawyers, or others generally recognized as the learned professions normally requiring a degree, where the number of persons employed on the premises, beside the owner, shall not be more than two, and private garages, except that present single family residences, or single family residences under construction, on the date of the passing of this amendment, (September 29, 1952) shall be exempted from the restriction to a single family residence, to permit the alteration or remodeling, to not more than two family residences. The letting of rooms to five or less lodgers, tourists, or boarders shall be considered accessory use."

B. Amend Article IV by adding the following new section:

"Section 3A. In the Residence B. District no Building

shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than 7,500 square feet in area and less than 75 feet in street frontage and less than 75 feet in average width unless such lot is on record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the adoption of this section; and no lot shall be reduced in size by division into component lots with less than 75 feet of street frontage and less than 75 feet of average width, and with less than 7,500 square feet in area for each component lot."

C. Amend Article IV by adding the following new section:

"Section 3b. No structure shall be placed closer than 7 feet from the street frontage on Lafayette Road between the Hampton Falls Town Line and the extension of Brown Avenue, and between the extension of Rice Terrace and the North Hampton Town Line; and on High Street from the extension of the westerly boundary of the town parking lot to the westerly boundary of the land of the Advent Church. Steps or ground level terraces shall not be considered a part of the structure for the purpose of this section, but all porches, piazzas, and other similar elements shall be considered a part of the structure."

ARTICLE 22. To see whether the town will take any action permitted or required under Chapter 358 of the New Hampshire laws (1961) with reference to the development or redevelopment of the marshland area within the town including, without limitation, authorizing or approving to the extent required under said Chapter 358, the financing arrangements set forth in the Final Plan for Project Area No. 1 of the Hampton Municipal Development Authority, or to take any action incidental to or connected with the foregoing matters or any of them.

ARTICLE 23. On petition of George A. Smith and eleven other legal voters of the town of Hampton; To

see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to build a Public Pier in Hampton Harbor from which no services will be sold. These funds shall be used for no other purpose than as stated above.

ARTICLE 24. On petition of John P. Dunfey and thirteen other legal voters of the town of Hampton; to see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be the contribution of the Town of Hampton which is to be supplemented by \$100,000.00 in State funds to be requested at the next session of the New Hampshire State Legislature. These two sums combined shall make up the so-called "Local Share" of the Hampton Harbor Improvements Project as outlined in the recommendations of the United States Army Engineers. Said sums shall also include the costs for the building of the proposed groin at the Church Street Location at Hampton Beach, New Hampshire. The "Local Share" shall be supplemented by the Federal Government, and the entire project shall be completed under the supervision of the United States Army Engineers. These funds shall be used for no other purpose than as stated above.

ARTICLE 25. On petition of William I. Elliot and thirteen other legal voters of the town of Hampton; To see if the town will authorize the expenditure of \$10,000.00 to build a portion of the Brown Avenue Extension southerly, pursuant to Article 16 of the Town Warrant of 1957 and passed March 12 of that year, and subject to a layout presented to the selectmen by Leach and Hunter, engineers.

ARTICLE 26. On petition of Elvin F. Cann and eleven other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if provision will be made for the removal of snow in front of Business places at Hampton Beach, to allow the parking of at least two cars, off the plowed street.

ARTICLE 27. On petition of James W. Tucker, Jr. and seventeen other legal voters of the Town of Hamp-

ton; to see if the town will adopt the following Article:

We, the legal voters of the Town of Hampton, in Town Meeting assembled, hereby authorize and direct the selectmen, on behalf of the town, to restore a clear and acceptable title, with the exception of existing easements, to the marshland on the westerly side of Marsh Avenue, now known as Ashworth Avenue, which was taken away from James W. Tucker, Jr. of Hampton, by the Town of Hampton, through eminent domain proceedings in the year 1945, said land being that section consisting of about 60,000 square feet or about one and one-half acres removed from the center of a three and one-half acre tract fronting on Ashworth Avenue and being the same land described in notice of taking as recorded in Rockingham County Records Office on May 28, 1945, at 10:20 A.M. Book 1038, Page 188. Said Proceedings, arising from Article 10 of the Town Warrant for 1945 which authorized the selectmen to purchase, or take by eminent domain proceedings, land for a parking space and police station said land having been condemned and taken from the owner, as necessary for the public good for the parking of automobiles, and has never been required, or used to any accountable extent for said purpose. Said title to be restored at no expense to the dispossessed owner in consideration of his loss of use for a seventeen year period, and legal costs incurred in his defense of said property. Said title to be restored by means of a deed executed for the Town of Hampton by its empowered officials, in favor of said James W. Tucker, Jr. Wherein the Town of Hampton relinquishes any and all claims and/or demands that the said Town may have, or had, or have made against said marshland of James W. Tucker, Jr. of Hampton.

ARTICLE 28. On petition of Ruth G. Stimson and 153 other legal voters of the town of Hampton; To see if the Town of Hampton will vote to acquire a portion (350 acres or more) of Hampton marshland, east of

U. S. 1, to be preserved forever in its natural state for wildlife and conservation purposes, under the protection of the U. S. Dept. of Interior (Fish and Wildlife Service) or similar state agencies by :

1. Gifts of marshland from interested owners.
2. Purchases from marshland owners by the U. S. Dept. of Interior, or by similar state agencies,

So that New Hampshire's only section of salt wetlands may always remain a part of the state's heritage; and that a committee of seven conservation minded citizens be appointed by the Moderator to make an immediate study of the situation and report to the Board of Selectmen at the earliest possible date.

ARTICLE 29. On petition of Donald A. Ring and fourteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows :

By striking out all of sub-section 1, Section 1, Article III, and substituting therefor the following :

1. Single or double family residence or residences, including other purposes accessory to their use as residences, by the owner or tenant, such as offices for doctors, engineers, architects, lawyers or others where the number of persons employed in the premises, besides the owner, shall not be more than two, and private garages. The renting of rooms to five or less lodgers, tourists, or boarders shall be considered accessory use.

ARTICLE 30. On petition of Donald A. Ring and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows :

A. By adding at the end of sub-section 1, Section 1, Article III, the following sentence: "A swimming pool for the use of the occupants, and their guests, shall be considered accessory use."

B. By adding at the end of Section 6, Article III, the following sentence: "A swimming pool for the use of the occupants, and their guests, shall be considered accessory use."

ARTICLE 31. On petition of Donald A. Ring and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows:

A. By adding to sub-section 1, Section 3, Article 1, after the words "additional buildings" the words "and/or substitute buildings" so that sub-section 1, Section 3, Article 1, as amended shall read: Permit the erection of additional and/or substitute buildings or enlargement or alteration of existing buildings on the same or an adjacent parcel of land for a trade, business, or other, use prohibited in such district.

ARTICLE 32. On petition of Howard Page, Jr. and seventy-seven other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Committee of five (5) to study the possible sale of Town owned land at Hampton Beach, now being leased (excepting the land leased to the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, Inc.) and such other matters as may be related thereto, and to authorize said Committee to engage engineering, legal and other services, to hold public hearings, to prepare a report, and to submit its report and recommendations to the next annual town meeting, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for the reasonable expenses of said Committee.

ARTICLE 33. On petition of Christine A. Montgomery and seventeen other legal voters of the Town of

Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$5700.) Fifty-seven Hundred Dollars to build a sidewalk from Five Corners along the westerly side of Locke Road to Winnacunnet Road.

ARTICLE 34. On petition of Hollis M. Shaw and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, New Hampshire to see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949 and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows:

By creating a new Industrial District and adding the same to the Zoning Ordinance after "Industrial District Turnpike."

Beginning at a point in the centerline of Exeter Road at the easterly sideline of the Hadley's Garage parcel projected, thence running southerly by a projection of said Garage parcel's easterly line to the centerline of Towle Road; thence running southwesterly by said Road to the centerline of the New Hampshire Turnpike; thence turning and running northerly by said Turnpike to the centerline of Exeter Road; thence turning and running easterly by the centerline of said Road to the point of beginning.

Said area being presently in the general district and by this proposed rezoning will become a part of the Industrial District Turnpike.

ARTICLE 35. On petition of Fred J. Schaake and twelve other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,500.00 toward the cost of erecting a Lift Station and Forced Main, with the understanding that the Lift Station shall be installed at the most appropriate location on Hedman Street at a cost of no more than \$22,500.00 to the Town and further that the Forced Main shall be tied into the Lift Station and run to a point to

tie into the proposed New Main that shall be installed on or nearby Kimball Lane in accordance with the Proposed Sewer Project approved at the last town meeting and as more accurately set forth on a plan of Haley and Ward, Engineers, depicting North Beach Sewerage System, dated November 1952 (which plan is on file in the Hampton Town Offices and may be seen during any regular business hours).

The above work is to be performed in conjunction with the construction of said proposed Sewer Project which is about to get underway and the within appropriation shall be further conditioned upon the town's entering into a contract with Fred J. Schaake, Contractor or his Nominee in which contract the contractor shall agree to assume any cost in connection with the installation of the Lift Station and Forced Main up and above the within appropriation by the town. The contract that shall be entered into by the town shall also set forth the requirement that the contractor or his successor in title shall construct a sewer system for any houses constructed within the development off Hedman Street known as Glenview Subdivision, the lots for this proposed subdivision being more accurately set forth as plan submitted to the Hampton Planning Board and conditionally approved on February 2, 1962. The contractor shall further agree to bear the sole expenses for the construction of such a sewer system which may be connected to the Lift Station to be constructed.

This proposal is made in the best interest of the town as it shall provide additional sewerage to owners of properties along and off High Street from Locke Road to Hedman Street, as well as the proposed subdivision residences and other existing residences located within the area of the Lift Station. This can be done all in keeping with the overall Master Plan of Haley and Ward, Engineers, at a minimum of cost to the town by virtue of the contractor's assumption of costs.

ARTICLE 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

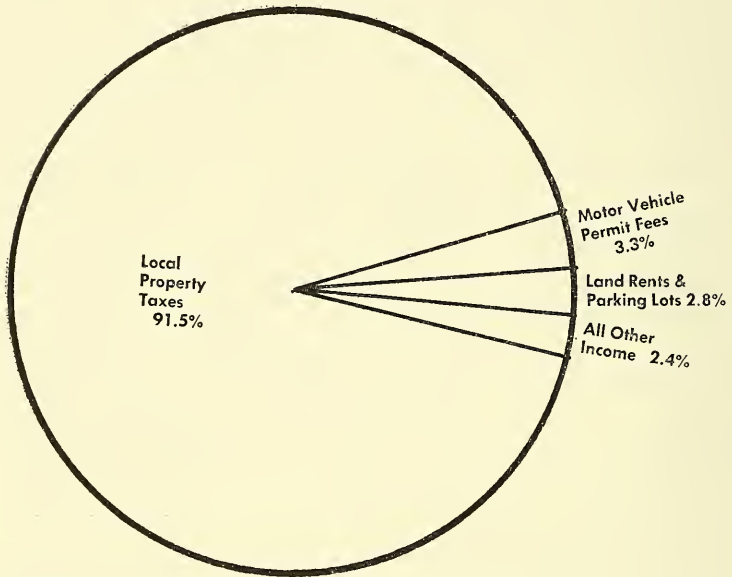

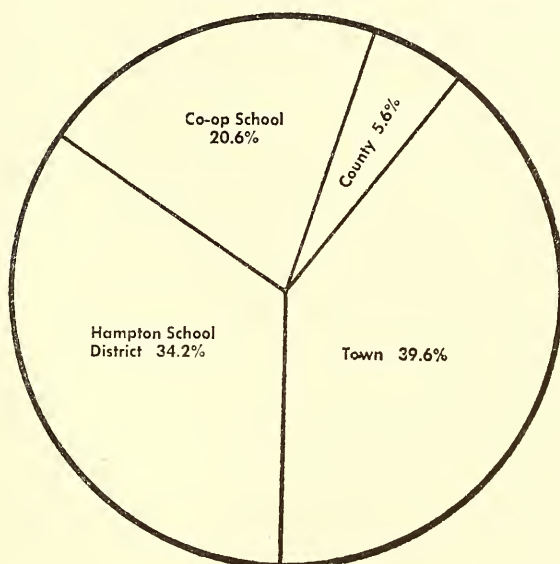
SOURCE OF 1961 INCOME DOLLAR

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Library, Cemetery Association, Trustees of Trust Funds and Marsh Reclamation Authority.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - Dec. 31, 1960—Dec. 31, 1961:
(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1960 and December 31, 1961, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$28,128.42 in the year 1961.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures**Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$25,486.58, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,265.19, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$22,221.39.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1961, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1961, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$12,462.42, from \$129,990.03 to \$142,452.45 during 1961, as indicated herewith:

Appropriation Overdraft and Application of Municipal Budget

Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$3,265.19. In other words, total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount as indicated herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, under date of August 9, 1961, the Tax Commission, at the request of the Board of Selectmen with the approval of the Budget Committee, issued a certificate of emergency authorizing the expenditure of \$4,325.00 in excess of the appropriation for Damages and Legal Expenses.

Surety Bond of Town Treasurer:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer should be increased from \$20,000.00 to \$30,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be commensurate to the amount of funds in the custody of the Treasurer.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of

transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hampton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF THE
Shade Tree Commission

TOWN MEETING, MARCH 14, 1961

TO THE CITIZENS OF HAMPTON:

This Commission was established on March 29, 1960 by the Board of Selectmen, as requested by Article No. 21 of the Town Warrant, for 1960.

The purpose of this Commission was to recommend means to coordinate all phases of Town expenses in regard to trees, and to set up a long range program for planting, removal and professional protection of trees on Town property, and for an annual appropriation committed to this program.

The committee consisting of the following citizens; Miss Ruth Stimson, Mrs. Gertrude Wright, Philip N. Blake, Jr., and Roland W. Paige, met several times during the year to consider and discuss issues which we feel are sorely needed.

This brief report cannot touch upon all the ills of the shade trees in our Town, but we will try to point out several which, we believe can be improved.

Once this Town had many streets which were lined by beautiful trees, most of which now have been removed due to lack of care, disease, and lack of replacement program.

Action by this generation will resolve the future of the public shade trees in our Town. Your interest in this program is most vital if our community is to plan for its future.

Many roads, which once had been lined with beautiful trees, will have to remain without replacements as

time has eliminated the width necessary to insure protection and preservation for replanting on these locations.

The problem of diseased trees on private property is still with us and will continue to be a source of trouble until removal by the owners.

In this past year, 1960, the shade tree committee, with permission from the Selectmen, met with Mr. Boehner and offered several recommendations which the Town Manager carried out in his very efficient manner.

The results were: Experts advised no planting in Fall of 1960, due to low water table. Removal of 7 Elms: 22 Maples and a few Pines. Removal of 40 stumps. Pruning and removal of trees in Pine Grove Cemetery. Pruning and removal of trees in Ring Swamp Cemetery. Pruning trees on the park at Five Corners. Pruning trees on Academy Avenue. Pruning trees on High St. Pruning trees on other streets.

Requested bids for spring planting of Maples. 38 twelve foot Maples with 2 year guarantee. Therefore we submit for your consideration and execution the following recommendations.

- (1) All expenditures used for planting, removal, and care of trees be grouped as one account in budget.
- (2) Establish and maintain a Town Tree Map. One by Manager, and one by Commission.
- (3) Advocate all future roadway of at least 60 feet width necessary in this age to insure protection of trees and public safety.
- (4) Advocate Town Ordinance for protection of trees and public safety.

- (5) Tree wells in locations where protection is necessary for survival.
- (6) Encourage Schools, Clubs, and other groups to promote tree planting both on public and private grounds.
- (7) Recommend that all tree work be done by professional tree companies.
- (8) Advocate all future subdivision developers provide plans for shade trees which could contribute to preserve the beauty of the area.
- (9) Advocate separation of the mosquito control funds from the shade tree spraying expenditures.
- (10) Annual appropriation of \$4,000.

In closing, we should like to express our appreciation to the various citizens, Board of Selectmen, and our Town Manager, Kenneth Boehner, whose interest and guidance were most gratifying to our committee.
