# REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN AND TOWN MANAGER

The year 1962 ended with a net budget surplus of \$12,279.85. Funds have been reserved to complete all projects voted at the 1960, 1961 and 1962 Town Meeting.

During 1962 the use of police dogs was instituted in the Police Department, an underwater rescue team was started in the Fire Department, a full time engineer was hired to prepare tax maps, and the efficiency of the Highway Department was increased by changing the summer rubbish collection schedule to a sixteen hour day. Land was purchased for a parking lot, and a rightof-way at Seabrook Beach. A new tennis court was built at Tuck Field. Highway, drainage, and sewer construction was seen throughout the town. During the year 1963 a new Police Station will be built, and sewer construction will continue.

An effort is being made by us to halt the rising tax rate. This can be accomplished by only two means: increased efficiency in our operation, and the reduction of services. We have made some progress, but no major step can be taken without a vote at Town Meeting.

# Town Clerk's Report

# PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 13, 1962, HAMPTON, N. H.

The Annual Town Meeting was held at the Junior High School Auditorium and opened at 10:00 A.M. with Moderator Edward S. Seavey, Jr. presiding.

Reverend J. Thomas Raisner, Pastor of the Baptist Church, gave the invocation as follows:

"We come before Thee this day, O God, asking for Divine Guidance. It is our prayer that all things might be considered in a way worthy of their importance, not lightly, but with sincerity and gravity. We pray that our town will be a better place for all to live because of our decisions today. In the Spirit and Name of Christ, we pray, Amen."

The following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator: Clifton Woodes, Lena Emery, Ethel Hamilton, Clara Gale, Barbara Barker, Ruth Simons, Alice Downer, Mary Coellner, Marilyn Dubois, Natalie Hockenhull, Yvonne Crapo and William Leonard. Assistant Moderator, Raymond Sturgis.

The Moderator read the first two articles of the Warrant, and the return. Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett made the motion that the reading of the Warrant be waived, as it has been posted and printed according to law. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. William Elliot made the motion that the Polls remain open from 10:00 A.M. until 8:00 P.M. Seconded. So Voted.

The Moderator stated that a motion to re-consider will be entertained **only** immediately following action on an Article. He also requested visitors to sit in the seats at the side of the hall.

Articles 1 and 2 — on Australian Ballot.

# ARTICLE 3 Budget

Mr. David Drummond, Chairman of the Municipal Budget Committee, gave their report. The Gross Budget of \$739,065. was recommended. (Report on file in Clerk's records.)

Mr. Drummond explained that Article 11 and 12 must be voted under "Warrant", not "Budget", therefore the amount of \$4,500. should be deducted from the Gross Budget figure. He made the motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$734,565.00. Seconded. (After taking up the Budget item by item, this was voted in the affirmative.)

Mrs. Margaret Wingate asked the Budget Committee if amounts of specific items in the Budget were binding. Reply, "No." Only total amount is binding.

Mrs. Wingate made the motion that the Budget be considered item by item, subject to amendment of individual items. Seconded. So Voted.

To the Hampton Town Meeting

March 8, 1962.

The gross budget recommended by the Municipal Budget Committee for the ensuing year is \$739,065. which is \$186,638 more than the current town budget and a reduction of \$28,321. from the budget submitted by the Board of Selectmen. Anticipated income during 1962 is \$111,666. more than anticipated in 1961 due mainly to the expected increase in Federal Aid available in connection with the sewer (water pollution aid): vehicle permit fees, and Interest and Costs on the sewer bonds and taxes. This results in a figure to be raised by taxes of \$74,972. more than was raised last year.

The Budget Committee held 8 Executive Sessions and 2 Public Hearings in preparing its recommendations for this town budget and the completed budget has been published in the newspaper as required by law: included in the town report and has been posted. Special Article No. 8 concerns an appropriation of \$6,000. for the purpose of hiring a full-time engineer to prepare property tax maps for the town, and has been submitted WITHOUT RECOMMENDATION.

Special Article No. 11 concerning an appropriation of \$500. for the purpose of purchasing a right of way from Ocean Drive to Seabrook Beach has been RECOM-MENDED by the Budget Committee and is included in the budget total mentioned above.

Special Article No. 12 concerns an appropriation of \$4,000. for the purpose of purchasing lot No. 409 as per Sun Valley Corporation Plan for a parking lot and has been RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee and is included in the gross budget total mentioned above.

Special Article No. 15 concerns an appropriation of \$2,300. for the purpose of providing for services of crossing guards for school children at designated intersections in the town, is NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee, as it is believed that this matter falls within the jurisdiction of the Police Department.

Special Article No. 16 concerns an appropriation of \$1,500. for the purpose of purchasing liability insurance for the police dogs. Not enough information was available at our last Executive Session for the Committee to know whether or not the present liability insurance that is carried by the Town would cover these dogs. It was pointed out by the Selectmen that this information would be available by town meeting today and therefore, this Article is submitted WITHOUT RECOMMEND-ATION in order that a decision can be made today.

Special Article No. 17 concerns an appropriation of \$4,000. as the town's share of the cost to participate in the Federal Urban Plan Assistance Program for a Hampton Village Business District Study and a Town Building Survey. This Article is NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee as we feel this is both a Planning Board function and the Town Manager's function. Special Articles 23 and 24 are submitted by the Budget Committee WITHOUT RECOMMENDATION. These funds have to do with the "local share" of the Hampton Harbor Improvements Project as outlined in the recommendations of the U. S. Army Engineers. The total sums of the two articles have to be passed in the town meeting in order for the town to receive a supplement of \$100,000. in State funds to be requested at the next session of the New Hampshire State Legislature. These two articles are submitted WITHOUT RECOMMEND-ATION.

Special Article No. 25 is submitted WITHOUT REC-OMMENDATION. It was felt by the Budget Committee that the wording of Special Article No. 25 definitely tied down the expenditure of \$10,000. to a plan that was submitted to the Selectmen in 1957. We feel that this Article has merit but believe that the money should be spent in such a manner that Brown Avenue will tie into the present plans of where the new state road will end.

Special Article No. 32 concerns the sum of \$1,500. for a study concerning the possibility of selling town owned land at Hampton Beach which is not being leased (excepting the land leased to the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, Inc.). This Article is submitted WITH-OUT RECOMMENDATION.

Special Article No. 33 concerns a sum of \$5,700. to build a sidewalk from Five Corners along the West side of Locke Road to Winnacunnet Road. This Article is NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee as the Selectmen already have a sum of money for sidewalks and construction so that if a sidewalk is needed in this area, the Selectmen can draw on these funds for sidewalk construction.

Special Article No. 35 concerns the sum of \$22,500 to erect a lift station and forced main at the most appropriate location on Hedman Street. This Article is NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee as it was decided that it was not the town's responsibility to put in these improvements for a private contractor.

If you will kindly turn to Page 49 of the Town Report I will review the major items of the budget as recommended by the Budget Committee in column 3.

We would like to express, at this time, our appreciation for the complete cooperation which we received from the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and Department Heads during the preparation of this budget.

Article 3. (continued)

Mr. Russell McGuirk made an amendment to the item of Police Department expense reducing that amount by \$1,200. Seconded. (As this was the amount allowed for care of the police dogs — a vote in the affirmative would prevent having them.) This amendment was defeated.

Following discussion on Sewer Department Maintenance, Mr. John Mahon made the amendment that the amount of \$42,000. be reduced by \$3,588. (This would eliminate \$1,300. for new pipe, and \$2,288. for wages) Seconded. Amendment defeated.

Mrs. Leroy Leonard asked that there be a count of hands on the amendment proposed by Mr. Mahon.

Tellers appointed: Roland Paige and William Stevens. In favor - 93. Against - 103.

A second amendment by Mr. J. Mahon to eliminate \$1,300. from the \$42,000. Sewer Maintenance appropriation was Seconded. Amendment defeated.

It was moved, seconded and voted to recess the Town Meeting until 1:15 P.M. for lunch.

An expression of opinion was taken in regard to having Town Meeting vote upon articles in the Warrant on the Saturday following the regular Town Meeting date. Town Counsel John W. Perkins said that voting for Town Officers and any articles printed on the ballot would have to be on the regular Town Meeting day. The assembly favored such a plan.

The Town Meeting re-convened at 1:15 P.M.

Mr. Kenneth Langley made a motion to re-consider the amendment to take up the budget item by item, and vote the entire budget at this time. Seconded.

Mrs. Harry Parr expressed the opinion that discussion of the budget item by item helped to clarify many questions.

Mr. Langley said that he had served on the Budget Committee and knew how much time and study went into the decisions of the group. He felt that people had an opportunity to ask questions at the Budget Hearings which are publicized, and should do so at that time instead of in Town Meeting.

In reply to question, Mr. Drummond said that a letter to the Budget Committee would be given consideration the same as an expression of opinion given orally.

A motion by Mr. John Mahon to reduce the budget by \$39,000. was seconded, but defeated. Those in favor — 93: Against — 139.

In reply to question Chairman of the Selectmen, David F. Colt said that the value of a house lot increased by \$500. if a town sewer line was put in on the street.

Mr. Kenneth Langley moved the previous question. Assembly nearly unanimous In Favor.

Mr. David Drummond's motion that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$734,565. Previously seconded, was voted as read.

# Power to Borrow Money

Mr. Roland Paige made the motion that Article 4 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 5

# Sale of Land Acquired by Tax Deed

Mr. Roland Paige made the motion that Article 5 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 6

# Shall Powers of Tax Collector be transferred to the Town Manager

This Article is on the Australian Ballot. Result of count — voting on this article: Yes — 365. No — 796.

# ARTICLE 7

# Authorizing Tax Collector to Appoint a Deputy

Selectman David F. Colt made the motion that Article 7 be accepted as read. Seconded.

Mr. Russell McGuirk made the motion that the matter be laid on the table.

Town Counsel John W. Perkins explained that even though a Tax Collector was elected on the Australian Ballot, and Article 6 was also voted in the affirmative, unless Article 7 is passed the Town Manager who would then be the Tax Collector, could not appoint a Deputy to do the actual work. Much discussion followed.

Mr. R. Bridle made an amendment to Mr. Colt's motion that the words "upon approval of Article 6 on the Australian Ballot" be added at the end of Article 7. Period at the end of Article as it stands in Warrant to be changed to a comma. Seconded.

Mr. B. Roy moved the previous question which limits debate and requires a  $\frac{2}{3}$  vote. Seconded. Nearly unanimous vote in favor of Mr. Roy's motion.

Mr. Bridle's amendment passed 107 to 91. Tellers — R. Paige and Wm. Stevens.

Article 7 passed as amended.

# ARTICLE 8

### Tax Maps

Article read by the Moderator who stated that this article had been submitted by the Budget Committee "without recommendation."

Selectman Noel W. Salomon made the motion that Article 8 be passed as read. Seconded.

Mr. Salomon showed a Tax Map of the town of North Hampton which has recently been prepared and explained the necessity of having good tax maps in order to properly assess property. It is necessary to have someone assigned to this work who has the time to do it as soon as possible. It will probably take more than a year.

Mr. Douglass Hunter made the amendment to Mr. Salomon's motion that Article 8 read "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000. for the purpose of hiring a full time registered or graduate engineer to prepare property tax maps for the town." Seconded. Discussion as to cost and time required to do this work.

Mr. Russell McGuirk made the motion to lay this article on the table. Seconded. Motion defeated.

Mr. Hunter's amendment to Article 8 was defeated by vote. (nearly unanimous)

Article 8 was then voted as read.

# ARTICLE 9

# Sale of Philbrick and Batchelder Land, So-called

Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett explained the location of this property, and made the motion that Article 9 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 10

# Proposed Sale of East End School House Lot, So-called

Mr. Roland Paige spoke against this article and made the motion that Article 10 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded.

Mr. Russell McGuirk said that the value of land is increasing, so why not keep land that the town owns.

Mr. O. Raymond Garland spoke against selling this property and said that parks enhance the attractiveness of a town more than anything else. A large portion of this tract was purchased by the Town for \$100. so the investment is not large.

Mr. Colt gave the area of the property as: 327 feet along Winnacunnet Road, 74 feet along the island, 329 feet along Locke Road, 242 feet along abuttors in the back.

Mrs. Harry Parr said that the Hampton Monday Club was interested in developing this area as a park and already had plans formulated to do so.

Mr. Paige's motion to indefinitely postpone this article was Voted. Nearly unanimous vote in the affirmative.

# ARTICLE 11

# Right of Way from Ocean Drive to Seabrook Beach

Selectman Noel Salomon made the motion that Article 11 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

It was explained that at present there is no right of way to the Beach in this area. The proposed right of way will be 5 feet wide and 100 feet long. A footpath easement.

# ARTICLE 12

# Purchase of Lot No. 409 at Seabrook Beach

Selectman Noel Salomon made the motion to adopt Article 12 as read. Seconded. Traffic at Seabrook Beach is now an intolerable situation due to the fact that a Town of Seabrook Ordinance prevents parking on the streets. Consequently the cars are brought over the line to the Hampton section. Revenue from Seabrook Beach area belonging to Hampton, is \$19,000. per year. The town took the space that was used for parking for a street, therefore it is only fair to provide a space for people to park.

Mr. Russell McGuirk made the motion to lay this article on the table. Seconded.

It was explained that landowners will be given the right to reserve a parking space in this area, and Mr. McGuirk asked if this was using public funds for private individuals. Town Counsel replied that that could not be done, but in a situation such as this the State of New Hampshire does the same thing. Count of hand vote on Mr. McGuirk's motion was: In favor — 74. Against — 121.

Article 12 was then voted as read. (Mr. Salomon's motion)

# ARTICLE 13

# Leasing Vacant Land at Plaice Cove Area

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham made the motion that Article 13 be adopted as read. Seconded.

Mr. Donald A. Ring asked if a right of way to the beach was being reserved.

Reply: 20 foot wide space for access to the beach being reserved. Lots would be leased for a 10-year period as present leased land is being handled. Purchase of lease-hold interest would go to the highest bidder. Land would have to be built upon within a two-year period. Residential District only.

Selectman David Colt said that the same procedure would be followed in screening applicants for leases that is used on the rest of the leased land. Business and personal references. Much discussion.

Lewis Joselyn urged the assembly to defeat this article. John Breen moved the previous question limiting debate. Seconded. So Voted. By more than the  $\frac{2}{3}$ required vote.

Article 13 then voted as read.

# ARTICLE 14

# Naming of Streets by Selectmen

Mr. Roland moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. Motion not carried.

Mrs. Frank Fitzgerald spoke in favor of this article. She said that there was much confusion caused by some streets being divided — with a different name in between — and by duplication of names of streets and avenues.

Mr. Leston Perkins believed that the article passed in 1958 should remain in force.

Judge John Perkins said that the State Statute is very

clear. It gives the Selectmen power to change names of streets, or name streets. A record of the same must be given to the Town Clerk at the time.

Mr. Roland Paige thought that the town should go on record as opposing the state law giving such power to the Selectmen.

Motion to adopt Article 14 as read was seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 15

# Policewomen at Cross Walks

This article not recommended by the Budget Committee. Selectman David Colt made the motion to indefinitely postpone Article 15. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 16

# **Insurance for Police Dogs**

This article submitted without recommendation, as Budget Committee did not have sufficient information on the subject of insurance on the Police Dogs at this time. This insurance not necessary as the Town already has insurance that covers these dogs.

Motion made to indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 17

# Federal Urban Planning

This article not recommended by Budget Committee. Mrs. Harry Parr moved indefinite postponement of this article. Seconded. So Voted.

Recess: Mr. Carl C. Bragg made the motion to recess for supper until 7 P.M. Seconded. So Voted.

The meeting re-convened at 7:00 P.M.

# ARTICLE 18

# **Restricting Access to Town Parking Lots**

Mr. Frank Fitzgerald, Clerk of the Hampton Planning Board, spoke in the absence of Mr. Raymond Garland, Chairman, and made the motion that Article 18 be accepted as read. Seconded.

Mr. Bridle asked if this would affect access to Palmer's

Drug Store and the Launderette which now abut the High St. Parking area. Reply — no, but it would affect any future business that might be built bordering any Town Parking Space.

Mrs. Parr said that the town paid for the Parking Space, why can't we use it no matter where we are doing business.

Mr. Alfred Casassa of the Planning Board explained that Article 18 will not change existing use, but will prevent more stores being built that would monopolize all the parking space if they were built on the border abutting the Parking Lot.

After much discussion Lewis Joslyn moved indefinite postponement of Article 18. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 19

# Zoning

Article 19 was read by the Moderator. Mr. Larry Whitman made the motion that Article 19 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

### ARTICLE 20

### Zoning

This article was read by the Moderator.

Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett made the motion that this article be amended by correction of one word, making the 49th word from the end of the article read "easterly" instead of "westerly." Seconded. So Voted.

Before the vote on this article numerous questions were asked. Mr. L. Joslyn asked if this type of zoning is legal. Several people thought that the action would be discriminatory.

Mr. Seth Junkins spoke opposing Article 20, saying that by passing this article we would prevent conventions from coming to Hampton Beach as well as curtailing business in first class hotels that might wish to serve liquor. He felt that they could do this without injuring Hampton Beach.

The fact was brought out that at present Hampton

Beach has no adequate facilities for large conventions.

Mr. William Elliot spoke as an individual, not as Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, in favor of this article. He also said that the Chamber of Commerce had many letters complimenting Hampton Beach in not having liquor sold there.

Mr. David Drummond moved the previous question, limiting debate. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. Russell McGuirk said that he had a motion before the assembly to lay Article 20 on the table. The Moderator replied that he had heard no "second" to Mr. Mc-Guirk's motion.

Mr. Norman Royal said that later sections of this article had not been discussed, and that it should be allowed. He challenged the ruling of the Chair that Mr. McGuirk's motion had no "second."

The Moderator asked the assembly to vote — Do you uphold the ruling of the Chair?

The assembly voted to uphold the ruling of the Chair.

Mrs. Parr asked if the assembly can vote on Article 20 and then vote to reconsider it immediately. Reply—Yes.

The vote to adopt Article 20 as amended by Mr. Hackett was nearly unanimous.

Mr. Lewis Joslyn made the motion to reconsider Article 20, as he felt that Mr. Royal should have the opportunity to present his problem.

The assembly voted not to re-consider.

# ARTICLE 21

### **Zoning Ordinance Amendment**

Article 21 was read by the Moderator who stated that this article would be taken up section by section.

Mr. H. C. Bean made the motion to approve Section A. or Art. 21 as read. Seconded.

Mr. Robert Bridle made the amendment to Article 21 that the words "generally recognized as the learned professions normally requiring a degree", be removed from this Section A. The Moderator explained that this amendment was unnecessary. If opposed—just vote "no".

Mr. H. C. Bean, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Adjustment explained that this section was merely for clarification. This has been a standard pattern of Zoning. Much time and money could be saved by clarifying this article — as zoning hearings are expensive.

Mr. William Dunfey said that a degree may now be obtained as a Real Estate Consultant or Appraiser or an Insurance Consultant. He asked if it would be possible for Real Estate and Insurance people having such degrees to have business in restricted zones.

Mr. Bean replied that in former court cases the opinion that Real Estate, and Brokerage of Insurance, are considered Commercial Business — not professions has been upheld. They are not understood to be socalled "learned professions."

Mr. Kenneth Langley spoke in favor of leaving the Zoning Article as it is, and deciding each case on its own merits.

Mr. Bean said that until clear instruction is given, the present Board will act as it has in the past.

Mr. Richard Dunfey, who is interested in a Court Case now pending concerning uses described in Article 21, said that in his opinion the four learned professions mentioned were used as examples, plus "or others where employees number not more than two." Also, in Article 21 is the statement "so long as primary use is for a residence."

Mr. Bean's motion to adopt Article 21, Section A, as read was defeated.

Section B. Motion was made by H. C. Bean that Section B of Article 21 be approved as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Prior to the vote, Mr. Normal Royal said that more time was needed to study Section B, and moved indefinite postponement of this section. Seconded. Motion Defeated.

Section C. Motion made by Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett to adopt Section C, Article 21 as read. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 22

# Hampton Municipal Development Authority

Report given by Chairman Carl M. Lougee as follows: To The Citizens of Hampton:

The past year has been a most active one for the Authority. Foremost among the Authorities' accomplishments was the completion and the approval of the Preliminary Plan for Project Area No. 1.

Through the efforts of the Authority, House Bill 108 was presented to the 1961 Legislature. This Bill was subsequently passed with some revisions, and became Chapter 358, N. H. Laws 1961. The original legislation is now Chapter 412 N. H. Laws 1959.

Concurrent with the development and approval of the Preliminary Plan for Project Area No. 1, and along with the legislation, the Authority has been working on all of the many aspects of Financing. It was finally decided to follow the path of working with the Federal Government's Community Facilities Administration of the Housing and Home Finance Agency both for financial assistance in preparing the Final Plan for Project Area No. 1, and also for the actual reclamation and development work. The application for funds to prepare the Final Plan which included all necessary work such as Final Plan Design, with working plans and specifications, Topography studies, Soil Borings and Marine Investigations received regional approval last November and was sent to Washington for final approval pending clarification of questions concerning land acquisition. In the meantime, the Authority and their Engineers, Anderson Nichols & Co., Inc. proceeded on a limited basis with the Final Plan for Project Area No. 1.

Not until March 6, 1962 was a letter written by the Housing & Home Finance Agency advising us that they could not see any way possible for them to assist us in our Final Plan because of one of their Administrative Rules which states, "that unless the property involved is owned by the applicant, or unless the property is under option, or condemnation proceedings have been started they cannot participate.

If we do not have the funds to complete the Final Plan we obviously are not in the position to ask for the Faith and Credit of the Town. On display here you will see the Final Plan for Project Area No. 1 as we have developed it, but we need the work previously mentioned to support our cost estimates before we can ask you for your confidence.

We, therefore, must ask you to pass by Article 22 as there is nothing at this time that can be acted upon.

In conclusion, may I again repeat that the continued detailed studies and investigations conducted by the Authority and their consultants have confirmed the original concept that a Marsh Reclamation Program, as envisioned by the Authority and as outlined in Preliminary Plan for Project Area No. 1 which is the basis for our Final Plan for Project Area No. 1 is feasible and economically sound, and will add considerable stature to Hampton and Hampton Beach as the foremost recreational area in New England. Furthermore, the reclamation our Marsh area is the obvious answer for the future economic prosperity of the Town of Hampton.

Mr. Lougee asked that Article 22 be passed by at this time. Motion made by Mr. Douglass Hunter that Article 22 not be considered at this meeting. Seconded.

In reply to question Mr. Lougee said that this matter

would have to be acted upon at a regular Town Meeting —not a special meeting. He said that about \$30,000.00 has been appropriated by the Town of Hampton, so far, for purposes of Marsh Reclamation or development. Early committees had \$11,000. of this money. Present Authority has had only \$19,000. of which \$3,250. is left in their checking account.

Mr. Hunter's motion was voted as stated.

# ARTICLE 23

# Pier at Hampton Beach

Mr. Douglass Hunter made the motion to adopt Article 23 as read. Seconded.

He explained that the harbor entrance needs a jetty. A "groin" is needed opposite Church Street to control the "wash" from the current striking Great Boar's Head which takes the sand back toward the jetty and away from the beach in that area. A pier is needed at the harbor.

Mrs. Harry Parr asked how much the tax rate would be raised if this article were voted. Reply: Approximately \$1.00 on every \$20,000.00 appropriated.

Mr. Irving Jones explained that there are 109 boats taxed in Hampton with an assessed value of \$37,000. The number is increasing all the time. He felt that over a period years the tax on boats alone would pay for Hampton's share of the proposed pier.

Mr. Hunter explained that the town must agree to raise \$20,000. on each article, No. 23 — No. 24, in order to be able to obtain State and Federal Funds to make up the balance necessary for the before mentioned projects. It takes time to obtain Federal and State funds, and it is necessary for the town to start proceedings by appropriating the money.

Mr. Robert Bridle made the amendment that the money appropriated for this purpose — pending passage of Federal Approval — be invested, and income used to reduce taxes. Town Counsel John W. Perkins said that this could only be invested for one year. Mr. Bridle's motion seconded. (Later, So Voted)

Mrs. Louisa Berry moved the previous question limiting debate. Seconded. Almost unanimous vote.

Motion to adopt Article 23 as amended. Seconded. So Voted.

Count: In favor - 101. Against - 79. Tellers: O. R. Garland and Karl W. Forward.

Article 23 voted in the affirmative, as amended.

Reconsideration of Article 23 was requested.

As it was nearly 11 P.M. and many people had left the hall it was moved and seconded and voted, to adjourn the Annual Town Meeting until Saturday, March 17th at 1:00 P.M.

In reply to question the Moderator said that Article 23 could be re-considered on Saturday at the adjourned meeting if this was done before any other business.

# Saturday, March 17th, 1962.

The Annual Town Meeting re-convened at 1:00 P.M. at the Hampton Academy Junior High School Auditorium. with Moderator Edward S. Seavey, Jr. presiding.

Mr. John E. Mahon asked if the Moderator would consider a motion to re-consider Article 23 at this time. Reply: "Yes."

Mr. Mahon so moved. Motion seconded. So Voted.

Article 23 was read by the Moderator who said that it was now open for discussion.

Mr. William Elliot, Secretary of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, spoke in favor of Article 23.

Rep. Douglass E. Hunter spoke again in favor of this article. He said that if the Town of Hampton voted to appropriate the \$40,000, asked for in Articles No. 23 and No. 24 the town would benefit in the amount of \$342,000.

Mr. John Mahon asked if this article was postponed for one year would the town suffer. He also asked if this article was postponed, how would it affect chances of obtaining Federal and State funds at a later date.

Mr. Hunter felt that we should show the good faith of the town by voting the sum of money requested.

Mrs. Wingate asked what the tax rate will be as of votes taken at the time of the Town Meeting on March 13th. Reply — Estimate \$63.50 without Precinct tax.

Mr. Walter Vanderpool said that about 50% of the assessed valuation of the town lies in the Hampton Beach Precinct, and recreation is the main business. The Beach should receive some consideration and some of the money paid in taxes.

Mr. Lewis Joslyn made a motion which was declared out of order by the Moderator.

Mr. John Mahon made the motion that discussion and decision on Article 23 be postponed until the Annual Town Meeting of 1963. Seconded.

(This is a subsidiary motion, postponing to a definite date.)

Mr. William Elliot, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Alfred Gauron, President of the New England Party Boat Association and Secretary and Treasurer of the New Hampshire Lobster Fisheries Association, and Representative Douglass Hunter all spoke of the need of improvement of the harbor of Hampton River.

Reports of the U. S. Army Engineers were quoted. The present condition of Hampton River is hazardous to fishermen. Earning their living by its use, and also to summer pleasure boat owners who are not familiar with the sand bars. In the summer 500 people a day cross the most dangerous bar. Recreation is Hampton Beach business, and boating a popular recreation. There are at least 40 lobster fishermen working out of Hampton Harbor.

Tellers on Mr. Mahon's motion vote were: Harold Fernald and Barry Lougee. Count: In favor of postponement — 95. Against postponement — 94.

(There must be an article in the Warrant for the 1963

Annual Town Meeting, as Article 23 is postponed to a definite date.)

# ARTICLE 24

# Hampton Harbor Improvements

Article 24 was read by the Moderator.

Mr. Douglass Hunter explained that \$20,000. was the Local Share of the Hampton Harbor Improvements Project. If the assembly votes in favor of raising this money it will show the good faith of the Town. The first ones to bring in proposals for projects get available money. Mr. Hunter asked that the assembly back up their representatives in Concord.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham made the motion that Article 24 be accepted as read. Seconded.

Mr. Seth Junkins made the motion to amend Article 24 to read \$40,000. instead of \$20,000. Seconded.

Mr. William Elliot made a second amendment to Article 24 to cross out "these two sums combined" and made the motion read "this sum shall". Not seconded.

Mr. John Mahon made the motion that Article 24 be postponed until the Anuual Town Meeting of 1963. Seconded.

Count on vote on Mr. Mahon's motion: (of postponement) In favor — 105. Against — 110.

Attorney Russell McGuirk and six other voters asked for a vote by "Yes" and "No" ballot on Mr. Mahon's motion. Mr. Joseph Pierce made the motion that the check-list be used on Mr. Mahon's motion. Seconded. Motion not carried.

Count of Yes and No ballots on Mr. John Mahon's motion to postpone Article 24 until the Town Meeting of 1963: In favor — 108. Against postponement — 140. Amended article can now be voted upon. Mr. Junkins amendment not carried.

Article 24 was voted as read. (Mr. Cunningham's motion)

# ARTICLE 25

# **Brown Avenue Extension**

Article read by Moderator.

Mr. Chester Mullen made a motion to indefinitely postpone Article 25. Seconded.

Mrs. Virginia Blake suggested that traffic will be a serious problem at the end of the limited access highway unless Brown Avenue is extended.

Selectman Noel Salomon said that the town would have to face the fact that a "relief" road will be needed.

After much discussion Article 25 was indefinitely postponed.

# ARTICLE 26

## Snow Removal at Hampton Beach

Town Manager Kenneth D. Boehner made the motion to indefinitely postpone Article 26. Seconded.

Mr. Chester Mullen said that the cost of this article would not be excessive, and he thought that the Beach Business area should be cared for in the same manner as the Town.

Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett said that the Hampton Improvement Company pays for plowing streets in their section. Town equipment may do the work, but the company is billed by the town.

Precinct Commissioner John Foley said that there were about half a dozen places at the Beach that were open for business all year around.

Mr. Boehner said that the town would be willing to do this work, but if voted, more money must be appropriated as there is already a \$7,000. overdraft on snow removal.

Mrs. Warren Sawyer said that they paid \$100.00 per month for snow removed at their place of business on Lafayette Road, personally.

Motion to indefinitely postpone carried.

# ARTICLE 27

# Restoring Land to James W. Tucker, Jr.

Article 27 read by Moderator.

Mr. James W. Tucker, Jr. made the motion that Article 27 be adopted as read. Motion seconded.

Mr. Tucker showed a map of the land in question and explained that the land had been taken from him in 1939 because the Board of Selectmen at that time felt that a part of it was needed for parking. As it has not been used, after a passage of many years, he felt that it has not been necessary to the welfare of the town, and would like it returned to him.

Mrs. Wingate expressed the opinion that the town should right a wrong done to Mr. Tucker.

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner said that Mr. Tucker was awarded legal damages at the time the land was taken. A small part of the land is now a parking lot.

Mr. James W. Tucker, Jr. said that if the town should need any part of the land in question when, and if, Brown Avenue is extended, he will give the Town of Hampton a right of way through his land for nothing.

Mr. Russell McGuirk made the motion that Article 27 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. Not carried.

Article 27 was voted as read.

# ARTICLE 28

# Acquiring Marshland for Wildlife

Miss Ruth Stimson spoke in favor of Article 28, and made the motion that Article 28 be adopted as read. Seconded.

Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett said that he did not favor this article if it was in conflict with the plans of the Hampton Municipal Development Authority, and asked the opinion of Mr. Lougee or Mr. Hunter. Mr. Hunter said that there would be no conflict with the First Area to be developed.

Miss Stimson explained that the so-called "wet-lands" or marshes are a valuable asset. They prevent erosion, run off excess water, attract birds, furnish nutrients for shell fish, furnish tidal food supply for large fish, and act as a buffer for strong tides. Advance planning must be done immediately to conserve our God given resources.

Mr. Bertrand Roy made the amendment that the figure "350 acres" be changed to 1,000 acres. Seconded. Not carried.

Mr. L. C. Hackett made an amendment that findings on Article 28 must be in complete accord with purposes of the Hampton Municipal Development Authority. Seconded. (Later withdrawn)

Mr. John Mahon spoke in favor of Article 28 and cited the damage which has been done to the Lynn, Mass. marshes.

Conservation Officer Floyd Potter said that wetlands were extremely important for more than a bird sanctuary. The State of New Hampshire does not wish to be involved in political issues, but feels that the marshes are an important and valuable asset to the state.

Mr. Cunningham expressed the opinion that the land if developed would bring in many tax dollars.

Mr. John Bellerose said not all money received would be profit — that many tax dollars would have to be spent first.

Mrs. Deborah Kirwan asked what good the money would be if no natural beauty were left.

Mrs. Helen Mullen mentioned the needed drainage that is taken care of by the marsh lands.

Selectman Noel Salomon said that the time to study the question is right now, and moved the previous question. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 29 Zoning

Mr. Donald A. Ring moved adoption of Article 29 as read. Seconded. Motion not carried.

# ARTICLE 30 Zoning

Mr. Donald A. Ring moved adoption of Article 30.

Mr. Frank Fitzgerald made the following amendment: Seconded. "That Section A. of Article 30 be amended by adding 'in Residence A and AA districts only, except for non-conforming uses', so that Section A. of Article 30 shall read: By adding at the end of sub-section 1, Section 1, Article III, the following sentence: 'A swimming pool for the use of the occupants, and their guests, shall be considered accessory use in Residence A and AA Districts only, except for non-conforming uses'." Amendment carried.

Section A. voted as amended.

Mr. Fitzgerald said that the Planning Board favored Section B, and moved the adoption of Section B. as read. Seconded. Section B. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 31

### Zoning

Mr. Donald A. Ring moved adoption of Article 31 as read. Seconded.

Mr. Alfred Casassa said that the Planning Board did not recommend passage of this article. A non-conforming use could become permanent.

Mr. Karl Forward expressed the opinion that if Article 31 should pass it could circumvent the original intent of Zoning, and would not enhance the appearance of our town.

Motion to adopt Article 31 not carried.

# **ARTICLE 32**

#### Proposed Sale of Town Leased Land

Article 32 was read by the Moderator.

Mr. Howard Page made the motion that Article 32 be adopted as read. Seconded.

Mr. Page spoke in favor of Article 32. He feels that people owning property on leased land are second class citizens. Many would like to own their land. At present they pay Land Rent, Enhancement Tax on their property, and a Precinct Tax.

Selectman David Colt said that as long as the town owns the land it increases in value. Money de-valuates. Zoning is also easier to enforce on leased land.

Precinct Commissioner Fred Gagne said that people at the beach do not feel secure because they cannot own their land, and that is the reason for this article. He mentioned the large increase in Land Rent effective this year, and asked why this was necessary.

Town Manager Boehner said that a survey showed that the gross return of the Town of Hampton Leased Land was only 2.9% and that with the increased rates the return would be about  $4\frac{1}{2}$ %.

Mrs. Margaret Lawrence said that it would be much better for owners of cottages at the North Shore if they could own the land as they had personally spent a large sum of money to protect town owned land in the form of a breakwater. She also felt that people should be given a choice of whether or not they wished to own their leased lots, and that an impartial board should appraise the property. People also improve their houses more if they own the land under them.

Mr Howard made an amendment to Article 32 which added the sentence "A committee of five persons to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen." Seconded. Amendment carried.

Article 32 voted as amended.

# ARTICLE 33

# Sidewalk on Locke Road

As this article was not recommended by the Budget Committee it was moved and seconded that Article 33 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. So Voted.

## **ARTICLE 34**

Industrial District Turnpike (Zoning) Article 34 read by Moderator. 31

Mr. Hollis Shaw moved that Article 34 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 35

# Lift Station and Forced Main

As Article 35 was not recommended by the Budget Committee it was moved and seconded that this article be indefinitely postponed. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 36 Other Business

The following Resolution was proposed by Mr. William Elliot:

"Be is hereby resolved that these citizens assembled at the Annual 1962 Town Meeting go on record as requesting the Planning Board to begin plans at once for recommendations to be presented to the Hampton people for future facilities to house the Hampton Police Department."

Resolution Approved.

The following Resolution was read by Mr. William Elliot and unanimously voted by the assembly:

## WARRANT FOR SPECIAL TOWN MEETING Town of Hampton, State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said state qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School Auditorium at said Hampton, on Thursday, the 27th day of December, 1962, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subject:

(This meeting is held with permission of the Superior Court in and for the County of Rockingham, dated December 6, 1962, which gives this Special Town Meeting the same authority as an Annual Town Meeting.)

Article I. To see if the Town will provide police station facilities to replace the Hampton Police Station (previously located on the easterly side of Ocean Boulevard at Hampton Beach on land of the State of New Hampshire and recently demolished) and in that connection to consider and act on the following matters:

(A) To hear the report of the Budget Committee.

(B) To determine whether to construct one police station either at the Beach on the Town parking lot on the westerly side of Ashworth Avenue, or at Hampton Village on the Town land on the easterly side of Academy Avenue, or whether to construct two police stations, one in each of the aforesaid locations and to authorize the construction and original equipping and furnishing of police station facilities, including the construction of the buildings, furnishings and equipment, architectural and other fees, grading and any other items incidental to or necessary for the construction of said police stations. (C) To appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$135,000. to meet the cost of any new police station facilities determined upon and authorized at the meeting and determine how any such appropriation shall be raised, from taxation, transfer of available funds, by borrowing or otherwise, and if by borrowing, to authorize the issuance and sale of bonds or notes of the Town under the Municipal Finance Statute or any other enabling authority.

(D) To authorize the Selectmen to make determinations with regard to locating any police station facilities determined upon or authorized at the meeting, to hire architects and engineers, to secure final plans and specifications, to arrange for bids to be submitted and to award contracts for the construction and original equipping and furnishing of any such police station facilities; and

(E) To take any further action necessary for or incidental to the foregoing matters or any of them.

## REPORT OF THE SPECIAL TOWN MEETING HELD AT HAMPTON, N. H. ON THURSDAY, DECEMBER 27, 1962, AT HAMPTON ACADEMY JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Edward S. Seavey, Jr. at 7:30 P.M.

The Warrant for Special Town Meeting, and the return, were read by the Moderator.

### ARTICLE I

(Article I contained five sections, each voted separately)

(A) Report of the Budget Committee

The Report of the Budget Committee was given by the Chairman, David B. Drummond, as follows:

To the Special Hampton Town Meeting

December 6, 1962, the Superior Court in and for the County of Rockingham gave permission for the Town of Hampton to hold a Special Town Meeting at the Junior High School Auditorium on Thursday the 27th day of December to see if the Town will vote to provide Police Station facilities and in that connection to consider and act on Article I, Sections (A) through (E).

Notice of a special Budget Committee meeting, open to the public, to consider the article appeared on Thursday the 13th of December 1962, in the Hampton Union.

This special meeting of the Budget Committee was held in the Hampton Court House at 7:30 P.M. on Tuesday the 18th day of December 1962. The first part of the meeting was open to the public. Approximately 40-50 citizens of the Town of Hampton attended and listened to the report of the work that the Planning Board had done and also reports from the Town Manager and Selectmen. After much discussion, pro and con, on the subject the public meeting was adjourned at 9:30 P.M.

The Chairman of the Budget Committee then requested the Town Manager, Selectmen and the Vice Chairman of the Planning Board to remain so that the Budget Committee could question them at length. Then, at 10:00 P.M. the Budget Committee went into Executive Session to consider the article.

It is the recommendation of the Budget Committee that one Police Facility should be provided for the Town of Hampton.

(B) Mr. William Elliot made the motion that this body vote to construct one Police Station on the westerly side of Ashworth Ave. Parking Lot at Hampton Beach, and to authorize the construction and equipping as specified in Section (B) of Article I. Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. Elliot said that 70 to 80 per cent of the arrests made in the Town of Hampton are at the Beach, therefore it is more practical to build a Police Station in that area.

In response to questions, Town Manager Kenneth Boehner explained preliminary plans and said that if bids on construction are too high the size of the building will have to be reduced.

Town Counsel John W. Perkins said that the cost of the building and equipment could not exceed a Bond Issue. General Funds may not be used for this purpose. Much discussion.

Mrs. Louisa Berry moved the previous question limiting debate. Seconded. It was voted to limit debate by more than the required  $\frac{2}{3}$  vote. (Mr. Elliot's motion voted as read.) (C) Mrs. Louisa Berry made the motion that the town appropriate the sum of \$80,000. to be raised by direct taxation for a Police Station. Seconded.

Mr. John Mahon made the following amendment to Article I, Sub-section C:

"To appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$80,000. to meet the cost of the new Police Station facility as determined and authorized by this meeting under Subsection (B) of this article and

"To raise this appropriation of \$80,000. or less, from taxation and/or transfer of available funds." Seconded.

Mr. Carl Bragg asked "what available funds" as any surplus is always carried over to reduce the tax rate.

Mr. Mahon cited approximately \$17,000. interest on Sewer Bonds.

Chairman of the Selectmen Noel W. Salomon said that any surplus applied only to tax reduction. Interest is credited against estimated revenues. This is set up by the State Tax Commission, and approved.

Problems of the Police Department working with inadequate facilities were presented by Chief John A. Roden.

Mr. Chester Mullen expressed the opinion that we should undertake a program of education and recreation as is being done at Fort Lauderdale to combat the tendency toward rioting and delinquency at the Beach. He felt that instead of preparing to arrest more people, we should try to make it unnecessary to arrest so many.

Mrs. Louisa Berry, speaking about her original motion, said that by voting to raise the total sum of \$80,-000. by taxation in one year the tax rate would be increased \$4.00, but it would be all paid for. Bond issues build up interest. Perhaps a vote like this will help to curb reckless spending at Town Meeting.

Mr. William Elliot made an amendment to Mr. Mahon's amendment to Mrs. Berry's motion but the Moderator ruled that it should have been an original motion. It was not accepted.

Selectman Lawrence Hackett reminded the assembly that by Bond Issue for this amount of money the tax rate would only increase 39c, by direct taxation, \$4.00.

Mr. Mahon's amendment to the original motion was not carried.

Count on vote on Mrs. Berry's motion: In Favor — 70. Against — 57. Motion carried.

(D) Mrs. Louisa Berry made the motion that Section(D) be passed as read. Seconded. So Voted.

An amendment by Mr. Mahon striking out Public Pay Toilets was not carried.

(E) Chairman of the Selectmen, Noel W. Salomon moved that the assembly adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee. Seconded. So Voted.

The meeting adjourned at 9:20 P.M.





Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Library, Cemetery Association, Trustees of Trust Funds, Marsh Reclamation Authority and Sewer Bond Fund.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1961 - Dec. 31, 1962:

#### (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$1,051,384.83 in the year 1962.

#### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$5,943.47, plus a revenue surplus of \$6,536.38, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$12,279.85.

#### Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

#### Marsh Reclamation Authority: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the activity in the Marsh Reclamation Authority account during the year is included in Exhibit J.

#### Sewer Bond Fund Account: (Exhibit K)

A statement of the Sewer Bond Fund Account for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, is presented in Exhibit K.

#### HAMPTON TOWN REPORT

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### **Current Surplus:**

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$7,050.83, from \$142,452.45 to \$135,401.62 during 1962, as shown herewith:

## Town Warrant for 1963

### TOWN OF HAMPTON

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School Auditorium in said Hampton, on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, 1963, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Selectman for Three Years; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, for one year; four members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

(The polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$726,069.00.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, sell or otherwise dispose

of any real estate acquired through tax deeds, any sale to be at Public Auction.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to have the vacant town land at Plaice Cove bounded on the north by Lot 537 and on the south by lots 536 and 528 surveyed out into lots to be leased to private persons by the Board of Selectmen in the best interests of the town.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to ratify the policy of the Board of Selectmen, which was established around 1948, of charging a sewer entrance fee of \$100.00 for each sewer connection from one to five living units, and an additional \$100.00 for each additional one to five living units.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000. for the purpose of paying land and property damages for the acquisition of a strip of land approximately 100-110 feet wide running from Glade Path to Ocean Boulevard near the Hampton River Bridge for the purpose of a public highway: said highway to be generally as shown on the plan dated June 20, 1962 and prepared by Anderson Nichols, Inc., and filed in the Hampton Town Offices but subject to such revisions of said plan as may be made by the Selectmen of the Town of Hampton at the time said highway is laid out and to authorize the Selectmen of the Town of Hampton to acquire said land by purchase or condemnation, or otherwise, and to proceed to lay out said highway in accordance with the Revised Statutes Annotated as amended and to determine how any such appropriation shall be raised, from taxation, transfer of available funds, by borrowing or otherwise, and if by borrowing, to authorize the issuance and sale of bonds and notes of the Town of Hampton under the Municipal Finance Statute or any other enabling authority; and to take any other action incidental to or connected with the foregoing matters or any of them.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$7,500. as the Town's share toward the construction and development of a Seacoast Area Airport, provided the sum of \$62,500. is raised and appropriated by other area communities not later than April 1, 1964, and to authorize the Selectmen to confer and consult with Federal, State, and neighboring Town Officials in all matters pertaining to the construction of an area airport. Such payments are to be made at the rate of \$1,500. each year without interest with the first payment being due not earlier than 1964.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows:

Amend Article V, by adding the following new section:

"Section 10. No exterior wall shall be built closer than four feet from the side or rear lot lines, or any other building on the lot unless such wall shall have a minimum fire resistance rating of two hours. Common walls shall have a minimum fire resistance rating of four hours. The fire resistance rating of all materials used in the construction of such walls shall correspond to the standards established by the National Board of Fire Underwriters."

ARTICLE 11. On petition of Joseph E. MacArdle and twenty-one other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system for all future town elections, regular or specials, as provided by Chapter 59 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes.

(This Article appears on the Australian Ballot)

ARTICLE 12. On petition of George A. Smith and eleven other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000. to build a Public Pier in Hampton Harbor from which no services will be sold. These funds shall be used for no other purpose than as stated above.

(This Article appeared in the Warrant for 1962, but it was voted to postpone discussion and decision on it until the Annual Town Meeting of 1963.)

ARTICLE 13. On petition of Paul Brant and twentytwo other legal residents of the Town of Hampton; to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000, for the purpose of providing a traffic light at the intersection of Moulton, Winnacunnet, and Park Avenue, roads. The purpose of such light to further the control of heavy traffic, unlawful rates of speed and various other harmful driving practices. It is felt, due to the shortage of policemen, particularly during the summer months, that such a measure is the least expensive and best way of coping with the situation. Said light could, if desired, be used as a "Caution" light in the lighter traffic season. We thank you for your consideration of this matter. We hope for and expect positive results.

ARTICLE 14. On petition of Donald G. and Alyce M. Hanson of Ashworth Avenue, Hampton Beach, State of New Hampshire and twenty-one other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for the purpose of building a storm drainage system on Ashworth Ave. from the town parking lot to a point near J. St. Hampton Beach, New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 15. On petition of Bernard A. Barteau and nine other legal voters of the Town of Hampton: To see if the Town will vote to re-zone a portion of land on the West side of Landing Road adjacent to the new Beach Highway, from the General Zone to a Business Zone. Said land now owned by Toppans and Barteau.

ARTICLE 16. On petition of Ruth S. Bragg and eleven other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see

if the town will vote to establish a park on the "East End School House" lot, so called.

ARTICLE 17. On petition of Ruth G. Stimson and 146 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see: whether the voters of Hampton are willing to rescind Article 7, Section 3, passed at the 1960 Town Meeting which read: "On Petition of Donald A. Ring and twelve other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the Town will vote to convey for the sum of \$1.00 to the Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority any and all marsh land owned by the Town of Hampton and located within the area, such conveyances to be made by the Selectmen for and in behalf of the Town, upon the approval of each final plan as described in Sections 12-14 of Chapter 412 of the Laws of 1959."

ARTICLE 18. On petition of Ruth G. Stimson and 146 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see: if the Town of Hampton will vote to set aside for wildlife and conservation purposes any and all town-owned marshland, east of U. S. Route 1, (excluding marshland in proposed Project 1 area of Hampton Municipal Development Authority) so that a portion of Hampton's salt wetlands may always remain a part of the state's heritage in its natural state, under the joint supervision of a Hampton Marsh Conservation Committee and the U. S. Dept. of Interior (Fish & Wildlife Service), or similar state agency.

ARTICLE 19. On petition of Harold E. Fernald, Jr., and eighteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see: If the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. (fifteen hundred dollars) for the celebration of the 325th Anniversary of the Town of Hampton to be spent by the Selectmen in cooperation with the Old Home Day celebration of the Hampton Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association, Incorporated. ARTICLE 20. On petition of Harry L. Tufts and nine other legal voters of the Town of Hampton: To see if the Town will vote:

A. To adopt the provisions of Chapter 330, RSA, as amended requiring the licensing of plumbers.

B. To create a board of three members for the examination of plumbers, said board to be appointed by the Selectmen and to consist of a master plumber, who has been engaged for at least five years in active plumbing business in the State, the plumbing inspector, and a journeyman plumber who has had at least five years active service and they shall serve without pay. One member to serve for one year, one member to serve for two years, and one member to serve for three years and thereafter each member shall be appointed for a three year term.

C. To provide for an inspector of plumbing to be appointed by the Selectmen for a term of one year or until his successor is appointed but no person shall be appointed plumbing inspector until the licensing board shall examine and pass the applicant. The licensing board shall examine and pass upon all applicants in accordance with the provisions of said Chapter 330 RSA except upon the adoption of this ordinance all active full time owners of plumbing business within the Town shall be considered master plumbers and shall be entitled to be licensed as such and any person who shall personally register his name and address with the licensing board and provide satisfactory evidence that he had been engaged as a master plumber for at least five years active service prior to the passing of this ordinance shall be entitled to receive a license as a master plumber without examination.

D. To adopt the following regulations:

(1) All plumbing work within the Town shall be performed under the supervision of a master plumber and all plumbing work both in the rough and finished work must be inspected and approved by the master plumber before the plumbing inspector is called for inspection and the master plumber shall be responsible for all the work done under his supervision.

(2) All plumbing shall be inspected in the rough and finished work by the plumbing inspector and no part of any plumbing shall be hidden from view until inspection and approval by the plumbing inspector.

(3) All plumbing work not approved by the plumbing inspector shall be corrected within two working days. If the work is not corrected within the time limited the plumbing inspector shall immediately file a complaint in the municipal court.

(4) Plumbing may be done by a person on premises owned by him without being licensed but if any new fixtures are added or any change made or any plumbing work done, the new fixtures, changes or work must be inspected and approved by the plumbing inspector.

E. To adopt the State Plumbing Code as made by the State Board of Health in accordance with Chapter 330 RSA.

F. To revoke all plumbing regulations passed prior to adoption of this ordinance, except any plumbing regulations as set forth in the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted March 8, 1949 and as subsequently amended, and the inspection by the plumbing inspector shall be in addition to the inspection by the building inspector as provided in the aforesaid Zoning Ordinance.

G. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and shall be subject to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every violation thereof, and his license may be revoked by the Examining Board provided for in this ordinance.

H. The unconstitutionality of any provision of this

ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, shall not invalidate the remainder of this ordinance, or the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances."

I. This ordinance shall take effect on its passage.

ARTICLE 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
