

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN AND TOWN MANAGER

On January 1, 1967 the fiscal year ended with a revenue surplus of \$33,547.24, and a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$370.29. This resulted in a budget surplus of \$33,917.53. Funds have been reserved for all incompleted projects.

Perhaps one of the most important questions which will be presented to the voters at Town Meeting is revaluation. A revaluation insures that every taxpayer pays his fair share of taxes-no more or no less. The problem in New Hampshire is more acute because of the heavy reliance which is placed upon the property tax. New Hampshire ranks 50th in State aid to local government.

The last revaluation was in 1954 and at that time \$482,458.81 was raised in property taxes. In 1966 \$1,686, 360.74 was raised in property taxes. Before long \$2 million will be paid annually in Hampton property taxes.

Since the last revaluation the gross assessed valuation of Hampton has increased from \$14 million to over \$23 million. The fair market value of all property in Hampton is estimated at \$75 million. It is not reasonable to assume, in addition to their other duties, that part time selectmen can assess fairly \$75 million worh of property.

Town Clerk's Report

March 8, 1966

HAMPTON, N. H.

The Annual Town Meeting was held at the Junior High School and was opened at ten o'clock in the forenoon by Moderator Edmund Langley, Jr.

Prayer was offered by Monseigneur Matthew J. Casey, as follows:

Prayer for the Civil Authorities of Our Country by:

Archbishop Carroll

We pray thee, O almighty and eternal God, who through Jesus Christ hast revealed Thy glory to all nations, to preserve the works of Thy mercy, that Thy Church, being spread through the whole world, may continue with unchanging faith in the confession of Thy name. We pray Thee, O God of might, wisdom and justice, through whom authority is rightly administered, laws are enacted, and judgement decreed, assist with Thy holy spirit of counsel and fortitude the President of the United States, that his administration may be conducted in righteousness, and be eminently useful to Thy people over whom he presides; by encouraging due respect for virtue and religion; by a faithful execution of the laws in justice and mercy; and by restraining vice and immorality. Let the light shine forth in all proceedings and laws framed for our rule of government, so that they may tend to the preservation of peace, and the promotion of national happiness, the increase of industry, sobriety and useful knowledge and may perpetuate to us the blessings of equal liberty.

We recommend likewise to Thy unbounded mercy all our brethren and fellow citizens throughout the United States, that they may be blessed in the knowledge, and sanctified in the observance of Thy most holy law; that they may be preserved in union, and in that peace which the world cannot give; and after enjoying the blessings of this life, be admitted to those which are eternal.

William Elliot led the assembly in singing of America with Mrs. Jeanne Higgins as accompanist.

Aides in charge of the public address system were Jonathan Treat, Kim Shepard and Lois Daland of the Junior High School.

Polls were declared open.

The Moderator read Articles I and II and the return. He announced that as the Warrant had been published and posted that he would forego reading the entire Warrant, but would read each article fully in turn.

Article L.

The motion was made by Douglass E. Hunter that this article be accepted as read. Seconded by Howard S. Danner, Jr.

Voted in the affirmative.

Article II.

The motion was made by Roland Paige that Article II be adopted as read. Seconded by Howard S. Danner, Jr.

So voted.

BUDGET

David Drummond, Chairman of the Budget Committee said that the total budget approved was \$910,030 which includes special articles X and XI. The amount of money needed for these 2 articles is \$19,000 which deducted from the total budget leaves \$891,030. The basic budget is within \$1,000 of last year. Mr. Drummond moved that the sum of \$891,030 be raised and appropriated for Article III. Seconded by Robert Bridle.

Note: The entire report of the Budget Committee is recorded on next pages.

Town Manager Boehner told the assembly that because of excessive snow removal costs more money was needed for that purpose. Over \$9,000 will have been used by the end of March. Unless the budget is increased it will be necessary for the Selectmen to delete or transfer funds from some other appropriation. The Town Manager cannot pay bills unless money is transferred. Other appropriations may have to be cut.

Wilfred Cunningham asked if it was the State's responsibility to clean the beach. Mr. Boehner replied that according to the State's interpretation of the agreement made in 1938 it was the duty of the town.

There was much discussion on Sewer and Highway appropriation. Mr. Drummond requested people "not to panic". He said that if necessary the Budget Committee would meet the Selectmen and take care of the situation if it was found necessary at a later date.

Mr. Drummond's original motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$891,030 was passed.

Article IV.

Borrowing Money in Anticipation of Taxes

Noel Salomon moved that Article IV be adopted as read. Seconded by Wilfred Cunningham. Passed in the affirmative.

Article V.

Selling Real Estate Aquired by Tax Deed

Noel Salomon moved that Article V be adopted as read. Seconded by Douglass E. Hunter. Voted in the affirmative

Article VI.

Expenditure of Federal Grant in Aid

The Federal Grant in Aid is for the completion of sewer construction contract number 21 and the extension of sewers in Leavitt Avenue and part of Hutchinson Drive.

Manager Boehner explained that sewer contract number 21 included Ocean Boulevard in the area at the base of Great Boars Head and north. First Street to Nineteenth Streets, Gentian Road area. If Article VI is voted, the lower portion of Hutchinson Drive, and Leavitt Avenue may be done. The Federal government withheld \$40,000 and will not pay the town for lift stations until these areas are extended. Because of water pollution in the Meadow Pond-Gentian Road section of town, the town could be required to sewer these areas by Court order. In any section of the town where there is a pollution problem people may be required to connect their homes to the town sewer as soon as it is possible. Where there is no problem they are not ordered to do so unless a health menace occurs.

As of April 1 there will be an added \$500 assessment on property where the sewer passes as it is considered more valuable.

Wilfred Cunningham moved that Article VI be adopted as read. Seconded by Herbert Trofatter, Sr.

Russell McGuirk made an amendment to Article VI to strike out "Hutchinson Drive" and add Winnacunnet Road. Seconded by Mr. Shea. This amendment was withdrawn.

Manager Boehner said that Mr. McGuirk had a right to ask for this amendment as many of the older sections of town have waited for years for town sewer. He felt that future sub-dividers should take care of their own sewer installations. It would be practical for the town to float a Bond Issue and finish the "town proper" with regard to sewers.

If contract 21, plus Leavitt Ave. and part of Hutchinson Drive is completed, the \$40,000 will be released and may be used to further sewer construction or to reduce the tax rate. It is the choice of the voters.

Harold Towle asked how the figure of \$33,631.48 was determined.

Reply: That is excess of money received that has not been used. Mr. Cunningham's motion was passed in the affirmative.

Article VII.

Revaluation of Property

David Drummond moved that Article VII be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Constance Kelley. So voted.

Article VIII.

Waterlines and Hydrants at Seabrook Beach

David Drummond asked if Article IX could be taken up before Article VIII. The Moderator did not think this was necessary.

Attorney Wilfred L. Sanders, Jr. moved adoption of Article 8 and spoke in favor of it. He stated that there was a serious water problem in the part of Seabrook Beach owned by the town of Hampton, and that he was representing the people of Seabrook Beach. The town of Seabrook will not sell water to the people in this area. There are approximately 105 lots of land and 60 houses in the section under discussion. The people have wells, but the water is not good and in some cases in danger

of contamination because of drainage. The Hampton Water Works Company is privately owned, and there are definate regulations regarding extension of water lines. They cannot spend the money required to put water the other side of the bridge. The town of Hampton derives a considerable income from property taxed in this area. Mr. Sanders said that he felt the town of Hampton had a moral obligation to help the people who own property at Seabrook Beach, for if the town had not taken back this land by legal means—it would still belong to the town of Seabrook, and would have water.

Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett stated that he felt that there were other sections of town that deserved consideration with regard to water before Seabrook Beach, which has been primarily for summer residents. He suggested that the people there form a Water District and pay for their own water lines. He said that following this request for public water there will be request for public sewer installation. Being across the river from the main part of town causes difficult problems. He asked the assembly to consider the matter carefully.

Colonel Reynolds of Exeter Road said that many citizens there had dry wells for several years, but the town has not extended water lines to help them. Residents of Exeter Road live there all year.

A number of people from Seabrook Beach spoke, telling of the need for good drinking water. Some who were not legal voters were granted permission by the Moderator.

Mr. Gerald French amended Article VIII by substituting the sum of \$25,000 in place of \$50,000 provided the lot owners at Seabrook Beach will raise an equal amount of money. Seconded by Louisa Berry.

Mr. Hackett warned against "co-operative deals". Mr. Drummond called attention to the fact that there was no time limit given for raising this money.

Mr. McGuirk suggested that instead of 'residents' or lot owners — the words "per lot contribution" be used. He made this as an amendment to the G. French amendment. Mrs. Berry withdrew her second to Mr. French's amendment. Wilfred Cunningham seconded the amendment in her place.

Wallace Robinson expressed the opinion that the \$50,000 invested would be repaid many times over as the property in this area is very valuable.

Seabrook they could have water.

Senator Douglass E. Hunter said that the town had spent considerable money to obtain this land and thereby were obligated to maintain it. Everything has been done that can be done to obtain water and the town of Hampton has a moral obligation to help the residents of Seabrook Beach.

Dr. Tighe testified that the water at Seabrook Beach was tested frequently but that it was false security. High sodium content makes it very bad for many people and it has a bad taste. All major companies who deliver water have been contacted, to no avail.

Howard Page moved the previous question. Seconded by Russell McGuirk. All were in favor.

Mr. McGuirk's amendment to Mr. French's amendment was defeated.

Mr. G. French's amendment was deafeated.

The original article was read again by the Moderator.

Tellers appointed: Roland Paige and Alfred Casassa. Results of hand vote; 134 in favor of Article VIII as read. 64 against.

David Drummond moved that the meeting adjourn until 2:30 P.M. for lunch. Seconded. So voted.

The meeting re-convened at 2:30 P. M.

Article IX.

Town Line Change

Attorney Sanders thanked the voters for their acceptance of Article VIII.

He moved that Article IX be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Lawrence Hackett. So voted.

Article X.

Sewer for Mill Road

Article X called for \$7,000 for this article but the Budget Committee recommended only \$6,000.

Mrs. Douglas Cowie moved the adoption of Article X as read. Seconded.

Robert Bridle moved to amend Article X to read \$6,000 instead of \$7,000. Seconded by Bertrand Roy.

Mr. Bridle's amendment was voted in the affirmative. Article X voted as amended.

Article XI.

Sewer for Trafford, Hurd, Carlson and Sanborn Roads
Mr. Chabot spoke for Elizabeth Syphers who was the
sponsor of Article XI, and moved adoption of Article
XI as read. Seconded by John Woodburn. So voted.

Article XII.

Sewer and Storm Drainage—Hackett Lane Area
The money for this article was not recommended by
the Budget Committee. David Drummond moved indefinite postponment of this article. Seconded by Noel
Salomon, So voted.

Article XIII.

Sewer System for Hobbs Road, Thomsen Road, Mace Road and Tobey and Gray Streets to High Street. The money for Article XIII was not recommended by the Budget Committee. David Drummond moved indefinite postponment of Article XIII. Seconded by Herbert Trofatter. So voted.

Explanation was made of Budget Committee recommendations:

- 1. Passes a request WITH APPROVAL.
- 2. Passes a request WITHOUT APPROVAL. (Which means that the Town Meeting may vote on the subject.)
- 3. DOES NOT RECOMMEND. In this case no action may be taken except indefinite postponment.

Article XIV.

Low Cost Housing

Donald A. Ring moved adoption of this article as read. Seconded by James Tucker.

Mr. Ring, sponsor of this article, said that this was not urban renewal. He spoke of the need for low cost housing for many retired persons. There would be a Housing Authority set up that makes the regulations. If people are unable to pay the price charged, the government makes up the difference. He quoted City Manager Violette of Portsmouth as saying that the two units they have built there are one of the best things Portsmouth ever did. A third unit is being built. We use money from the Federal Government for sewers and schools—why not help elderly people?

Robert Bridle made an amendment to Article XIV as follows: "To appoint a committee to study the feasiblity of adopting the provisions for a Housing Authority as set forth in Chapter 203 of the N. H. Revised Statutes, Annotated, and that the Selectmen be respectfully requested to include this Committee Report in next year's Warrant.

Lawrence Woolf moved that Article XIV be tabled, and also all amendments. Seconded by Mrs. Harriet Harris.

Article XIV and all amendments were defeated.

Presentation: At this time Roland Paige of the American Legion Post No. 35 presented the Town Clerk, Helen W. Hayden with a booklet entitled "A Brief History of the Flag and Seal of the Town of Hampton, New Hampshire". This was prepared by Mr. Harold Fernald of the Winnacunnet High School Staff for the Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association and American Legion Post No. 35 who gave it to the Town.

Article XV.

Planning Board to Review Sites for Non-Residential Uses

This article was sponsored by John P. Batchelder who spoke in favor and made the motion that this article be passed as read. He said that this was permissive legislation and would assist the town in aggressive economic development.

David Colt seconded Mr. Batchelder's motion. He expressed the opinion that it would be a mistake to allow the town to grow without control in business and industry. We should act now, and not wait until there are problems.

Mr. Bertrand Roy asked for an expression of opinion by the Selectmen.

Mr. Hackett favored industrial growth without regimentation Mr. Salomon favored Article XV.

Article XV was voted in the affirmative.

Article XVI.

Boundary of Land on Winnacunnet and Lafavette Roads

Philip M. Toppan sponsor of his article made the motion that it be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Wilfred Sanders, Jr. Mr. Toppan explained that he had

met with the Board of Selectmen and had agreed upon a boundary line.

Chairman of the Board, Noel W. Solomon explained that the Selectmen have the authority to do this, but that they would like to request ratification or approval of their decision.

Article XVI was indefinitely postponed by vote. (See Article XXI for approval of resolution presented by Board of Selectmen.)

Articles XVII, XVIII, XIX and XX all pertain to zoning and are on the ballot. (See result in Result of Voting.)

Article XXI.

Other Business

Six resolutions were approved by the assembly.

- 1. Appreciation to Mr. Harold and Mr. Roland Paige for their work on the History of the Town Flag and Seal.
- 2. Appreciation to the Budget Committee for their fine work. Both presented by Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett.
- 3. Appreciation to Noel W. Solomon for his six years service to the town as Selectman. Presented by Mrs. Louisa Berry.
 - 4. Mr. Solomon presented the following resolution:

Be It Resolved That: The intentions of the Board of Selectmen to re-locate the boundary on Winnacunnet Road and Lafayette Road between land of Philip M. Toppan and the Hampton Plaza Corporation as per plan exhibited at Town Meting, be approved.

5. Presented by Mr. Cunningham:

Resolved: Where past experience in the Town of Hamton has indicated that the development of subdivisions in Hampton without public water and sewers is not in the best interest of health and safety of the public, be it hereby resolved that the Hampton Planning Board be

instructed not to approve any new subdivisions unless the entire subdivision is connected to the public water and sewer systems.

There was some discussion on this resolution. Mrs. Louisa Berry cited recent development on Exeter Road which is "self-contained", and said that a development on Drakeside Road would probably never have public water and sewer.

The Moderator reminded the assembly that a resolution is merely an expression of opinion and as such is not binding. (This resolution was approved by a small margin.)

6. John Pierce Batchelder presented the following:

WHEREAS the Town of Hampton is concerned with maintaining proper protection for our commercial fishermen and the boating public

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Annual Meeting request the Board of Selectmen to assist the Seacoast Regional Development Association in its efforts to maintain the services of the Coast Guard at Hampton, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Governor of the State of New Hampshire and the Congressional Delegation.

Douglass E. Hunter moved that the meeting adjourn. Seconded. So voted. Meeting adjourned at 4:20 P.M.

Sumbitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Library, Cemetery Association, Trustees of Trust Funds, Hampton Municipal Development Authority and Sewer Bond Fund.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1965 - December 31, 1966: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1965 and December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$107,605.01 in 1966.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenue for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$33,547.24, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$370.29, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$33,917.53.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966 made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1966 is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

A statement of the District Court accounts for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit F.

Hampton Municipal Development Authority: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the activity in the Hampton Municipal Development Authority account during the year is included in Exhibit I.

Sewer Bond Fund Account: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the Sewer Bond Fund account for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966 is presented in Exhibit J.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit K)

A statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit K.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$142,440.96 to \$141,045.97 during 1966 as shown herewith.

TOWN WARRANT 1967

Town Warrant for 1967

TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School Auditorium in said Hampton, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, 1967, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by Non-Partisan Ballot one Selectman for Three Years; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, for one year; one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; one Library Trustee for three years; four members of the Budget Committee for three years; and one member of the Budget Committee for one year.

* Appears on Ballot

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year. (The Polls for the election of officers, and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and will remain open until eight o'clock in the evening of the same day.)

* Appears on Ballot

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$960,208.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, sell, or otherwise dis-

spose of any real estate acquired through tax deeds, any sale to be at Public Auction.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,000.00 for the purpose of a re-valuation of property in the Town of Hampton by the State Tax Commission, or to authorize the Board of Selectmen to hire a competent appraisal firm approved by the State Tax Commission. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to declare that there exists a need for a housing authority to function within the limits of the Town in accordance with Chapter 203 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. (To be voted by ballot at the meeting.)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the rollowing regulations regarding public dumps:

- 1. Any public dump within the limits of the Town of Hampton owned or maintained by the Town shall be open at such times and under such conditions as the Selectmen may from time to time determine.
- 2. Any legal resident of the Town of Hampton or any person owning real property in said Town shall be permitted to use any public dump under the terms and conditions herein set forth.
- 3. Any legal resident of real property owner of the Town of Hampton shall be entitled to obtain from the Selectmen, without charge, a permit to use said public dumps in accordance with Section 1 hereof, and any permit so issued shall expire on the first day of May following the date of the issuance.
- 4. Any person, firm or corporation engaged or employed by any legal resident or property owner

of the Town shall be entitled to obtain a permit without charge to use said public dumps for the sole purpose of removing rubbish from the property of the owner or legal resident by whom said person, firm or corporation may be engaged.

- 5. Any person, firm or corporation not a legal resident or real property owner of the Town of Hampton shall not be permitted to enter or use any public dump within said Town without the payment of a fee based upon the following schedule:
 - \$1.00 for each entry per pleasure vehicle;
 - \$2.00 for each entry per commercial vehicle of less than 2 ton capacity;
 - \$5.00 for each entry for commercial vehicles greater than 2 ton capacity;
 - 6. Dump picking is prohibited.
 - 7. Any person violating any of the provisions of this by-law shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10.00 for each offence. The Selectmen of the Town of Hampton shall prosecute all violations upon notification by any Town employee of a violation.
 - 8. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 9. On petition of Wallace B. Robinson and fifteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, and also legal voters of the Hampton Beach Precinct:

To see if the Town will vote, effective as of December 31st, 1967, to accept conveyance of all the property of purposes and functions of the said precinct in effect the Hampton Beach Precinct, to assume all precinct liabilities, and to agree to carry out and perform the as of December 31st, 1967, this vote, if in the affirmative, to be effective if the Precinct so votes.

ARTICLE 10. On petition of John J. McDonald and sixty-seven other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following bylaw in accordance with the authority granted in Chapter 21:39 and 466:39 and any other applicable chapters of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955 as amended:

* Appears on Ballot

DOGS

It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of a dog to permit his dog to run at large without a leash except upon his own property or while hunting under the control of his owner or keeper.

The police shall pick up all dogs on public property in violation of the above provision and upon written complaint of the owner of private property the police shall pick up all dogs on said private property.

The police upon picking up any dog shall immediately make a formal complaint against the owner or keeper of the dog in the District Court.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this by-law shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10.00 for each offense.

All fines shall enure to the police department for the enforcement of this by-law.

ARTICLE 11. On petition of Potter C. Palmer Jr. and twenty other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Belmont Circle.

(Not recommended by Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 12. On petition of Henry LaDuke and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see

if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to install a storm drainage system on Mary Batchelder Road starting at, or near, the property owned by Mrs. Charles Plastridge and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 400 feet.

(Recommended by Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 13. On petition of Robert F. Preston and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic.

(Recommended by Budget Committee in amount of \$500.00.)

ARTICLE 14. On petition of Gerald C. Claridge and twenty-one legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,000.00 for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Hutchinson Drive and Oak Road. (Not recommended by Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 15. On petition of Douglass Hunter and ten legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will vote to sell to St. James Lodge of Hampton for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) a triangular piece of land 37' x 70' x 78' more or less, to which they have no access, the State having purchased the remainder of the lot for the Exeter-Hampton Expressway.

ARTICLE 16. On petition of Virginia M. McGovern and nine other legal voters of the Town of Hampton:

"We, the undersigned, wish to submit a special article by petition for the Town Warrant favoring \$268.95 for the Community Action Program".

(Not recommended by Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings as follows:

Amend Article V, Section 7, Electric Wiring, by striking out all of the same and substituting in place therefor the following:

"Section 7. All wiring shall conform to the National Electrical Code 1965 by the National Fire Protection Association and further described NFPA No. 70".

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

1966 ANNUAL REPORT OF HAMPTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In compliance with its enabling legislation, R. S. A. Chapter 36-A, the Hampton Conservation Commission submits the following report to the Board of Selectmen and Citizens.

During the year three meetings were held at the Municipal Court Room to consider the following:

- 1. Possible methods of sanitary disposal of refuse to prevent water pollution of adjacent wetlands.
- 2. Study of disposal methods used in neighboring Maine, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire towns and cities.
- 3. The economics of incineration of local or regional basis.
- 4. The stagnation of marsh water and resulting mosquito breeding problem along Rte. 1-A on Hampton-North Hampton boundary.
- 5. The Commission's position on possible use of a part of Hampton's Conservation Area in salt marshes for a regional airport.
- 6. The continuing need to mark any public access or rights-of-way to salt and fresh water areas in Hampton. Identification on town maps is a start, but a sign on the actual land would be preferable for tourists and residents.
- 7. Provision of Soil Survey Map copy of local wetlands for use of Planning Board-delivered in June 1966.
- 8. Legal wording for a scenic easement. At one session the North Hampton Commission at-

tended, and communication was maintained with neighboring Conservation Commissions.

The Hampton Conservation Commission reaffirms its thirteen 1965 recommendations to the Board of Selectmen. See pages 38-41 in 1965 Town Report. The Commission offered to discuss these with the Board, but no meeting was ever held.

It was a source of concern and regret to the Commission that the Board faied to communicate directly before its public efforts to secure a regional airport in a portion of the Conservation Area, established by vote of the citizens at March 1964 Town Meeting. So the Commission in a letter of November 17 to the Selectmen stated: "It is the responsibility of the Commissionin fact its moral obligation - to be eternally vigilant, lest any part of this designated area should be used for any purpose other than that of conservation." In consideration of the above, the Commission served notice of its opposition to the proposal that an airport be located on the Hampton marshes.

"The Commission seriously questions the legality of the proposal to take these acres for the above purpose by executive fiat. Is not the decisions of the voters of March 1964 binding? The Commission asks whether any part of the land set aside for conservation can be utilized for an airport or any other non-conservation purpose, without a referendum to the voters."

In view of the above, the Commission in 1966 herewithstates its great concern and strong conviction that the marshlands of the seacoast area of New Hampshire should be conserved, and wisely managed to conserve the wildlife, clam industry, feeder fish habitat, tidal ecology and scenic beauty of the marshes, and that this should be accomplished under whatever auspices, local, state or federal that can most effectively bring about these purposes.

The Commission also recognizes the complex problem of disposing of the community's refuse in a sanitary manner, both in the summer and winter, with such a fluctuating population. Open dumping on the Town's wetlands creates nuisance conditions and health hazards, according to the U. S. Public Health Service. To minimize or prevent water pollution, a goal in conservation, recreation and public health, any future disposal area in Town should not be located on a site where ground or surface water will intercept desposited refuse. The waer could be diverted to comply satisfactorily.

Centeral incineration at a minimum of 1400°F. to control smoke and odor, is not economically feasible on a local or regional basis. Incineration plant capacity may be estimated by dividing the population of a town by 1,000 to indicate tonnage capacity per day. Maximum summer garbage production plus one third extra for future growth distorts the size of any incinerator adequate for Hampon's tsummer needs and feasibility to build. To operate an incinerator on a 24 hour a day rate, at least 100 tons of refuse is needed to justify cost to taxpayers. Hampton's needs are too small to use an incinerator presently.

The Commission submits its 14th recommendation to the Board of Selectmen and citizens: Scientific evidence indicates sanitary land fill, which is refuse compacted and covered daily with gravel and is nuisance free, as the most feasible, healthful, refuse disposal method at present for a growing community with both year round and seasonal residents. Hill construction on the present refuse site is still a possibility.

Lastly, the Commission recommends to the Selectmen and interested citizens careful study of each land subdivision proposal submitted, to learn the soil classification of the proposed building sites. Indication of a high water table within four feet of the surface of the ground most of the year means that proper septic tank performance cannot be expected. Any public health problem resulting may be the financial responsibility of the taxpayers to provide public sewerage.
