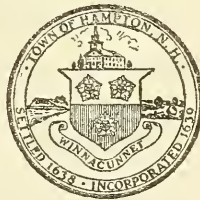

**LETTER OF  
TRANSMITTAL**

The Honorable Board of Selectmen  
and Citizens of Hampton

This 1969 Annual Report summarizes the activities of your municipal government for this past year and includes a financial analysis of the cost of these services. This, the 16th year of operation under the Selectmen-Manager form of government and the 330th year of incorporation as a town, has witnessed substantial growth and development. A more detailed description of activities is recorded in a performance review published in October each year and available at the Town Office.

The complexity of municipal operations makes detail sufficient for complete understanding of these functions impossible within this report, however, customary reports together with as much additional explanatory information as possible is being included to provide a more comprehensive picture.

Increase in population and the increased demand on the local property tax dollar is having a very direct effect on the growth and development of our community. A combination of these and similar facts and circumstances will undoubtedly make the next few years of growth very important in the resultant character of our community.

As a result there are several recommendations being made this year that will have a great deal of influence on our future growth. The individuals involved in the preparation of these proposals are convinced that these recommendations will result in

more balanced growth for our community.

Among these recommendations include several zoning change proposals to allow more realistic industrial development; the establishment of a housing authority which would establish a plan of action for community improvement; and a charter that would more tailor our organizational structure to the needs of this community. The charter, however, is not a consideration for this year's Annual meeting but a matter for consideration throughout 1970.

We trust that each voter will become familiar with these as well as other recommendations and vote, keeping in mind the future of our community. Although public hearings have been held for information and discussion, I would be happy to provide further information upon request.

I would like to extend my thanks to all town officials, town employees, and residents for their cooperation, understanding, guidance and assistance during this past year.

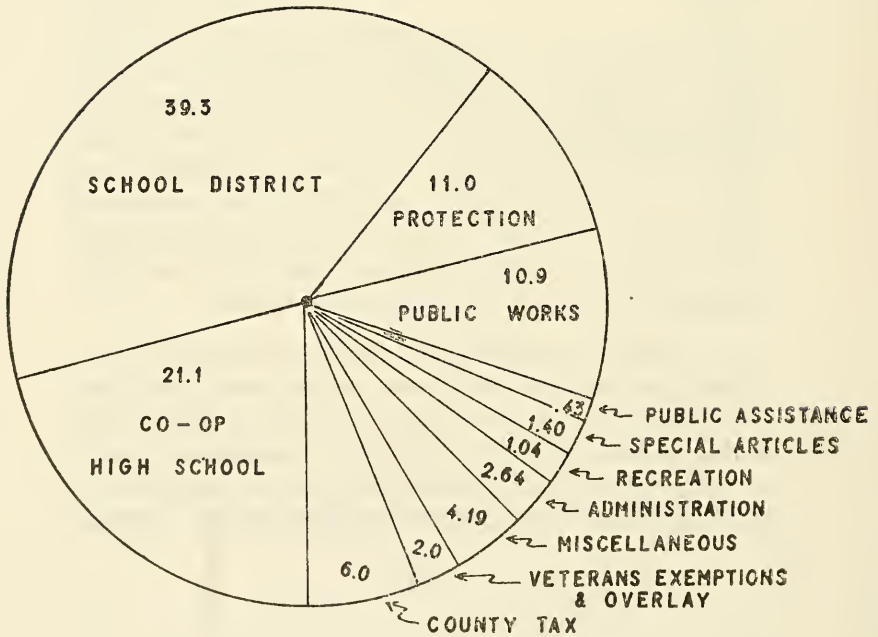
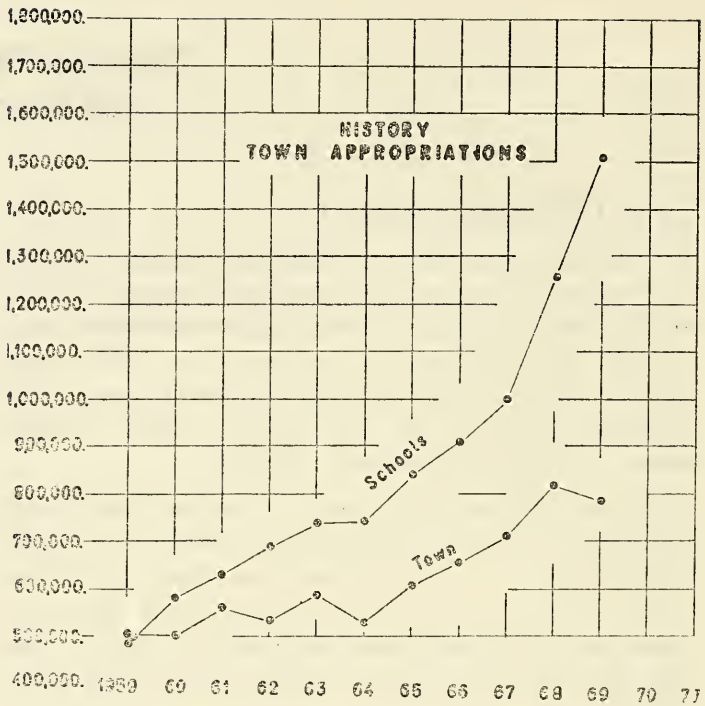
To the Citizens of Hampton:

This past year efforts continued towards stretching the tax dollar as far as possible, both in quantity and quality. The year's budget appropriations unexpended and returned for reduction of 1970 taxes totaled \$21,452. This amount represents uncommitted funds not spent in 1969 operations and not obligated or committed at the year's end.

Of the 234 towns and cities within the State of New Hampshire one town and ten cities appropriated more funds for municipal services than did Hampton last year. It can be seen from this and other comparisons that Hampton's population is not a realistic measure of our size, activities or services necessitated.

This past year demonstrated the need for continuing equalization of valuations both due to the high reliance placed on property taxes for payment of public services and the high value of this community (\$94.2 million), the large number of transfers and changes annually (2,135), and the large number of tax accounts (6,633) which include approximately 5,450 parcels of land, 5,250 buildings and about 223 personal property and stock in trade items.

Although we as selectmen realize that this type of a function can be carried on as in the past, it has been our determination that the basis from which fair and equitable property taxation is established should be done in the most responsible manner available to us. The value of this service is undoubtedly returned



to the town many times over.

The equally important function of building inspection was established on a thirty (30) hour per week basis in order to provide more effective supervision of building construction and alterations, and the enforcement of the town zoning ordinances and building code. In 1969, 269 building permits were issued totalling \$2,072,771 in value. Fees collected by the inspector and returned to the Town Treasury totalled \$4,329. In 1968, total building valued \$1,304,041, and returned fees of \$2,717 to the town.

The Church Street pumping station and force main project has been completed with the completed eligible project cost of \$251,653. Initially the town's share was expected to be 30% of the total project cost. Recent applications and added grants reduced the town's share to 20% and then to 10% from the above total project cost. The final Federal inspection has been made and we are now waiting for the final Federal audit.

Candeub, Flessig and Associates completed the General Plan for the town and delivered it to the Planning Board with summary copies available to interested town residents.

The continuing growth of our community is requiring constant alertness to the changing needs necessary for proper growth. We encourage every citizen to take an active part in learning about and participating in our local government.

The results of this year's survey indicate an increase in the number of alarms compared with 1968 while the actual fire loss in taxable property has decreased.

The fire prevention report for 1969 has recorded the following:

Complete wiring inspection	75
Complete building inspections	123
Garage and service stations (new construction)	3
Oil burner inspections (permits)	43
Public assembly (permits)	10
Business establishments — each inspected 3 times	

Two complete inspections of each school with a total of thirty-three (33) fire drills held during school hours.

There were fourteen (14) complete inspections of the Plimpton Nursing Home, and two classes given on the effective use of various types of fire extinguishers.

Invalid stickers were issued to fourteen (14) private residences. Homes were inspected and stickers were located on windows to indicate rooms containing the invalids.

A total of fourteen (14) sprinkler systems in business establishments were inspected.



During fire prevention week booklets and written material was distributed to lower grade school children, and demonstration of fire equipment was held at each school.

## TRAINING AND PLANNING

Four firefighters are attending the North Shore Community College in Beverly, Mass. Graduates of this course will receive an associate degree in fire science. In addition 925 hours of training was received by firefighters from the company training and drill program.

Sixteen (16) firefighters have successfully completed an advanced course in first aid sponsored by the American Red Cross. Eight (8) firefighters have received a total of sixty-four (64) hours of specialized training in fire related subjects at various schools throughout Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

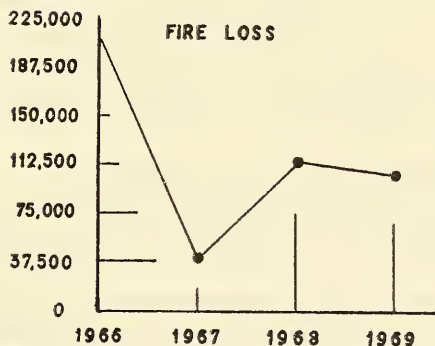
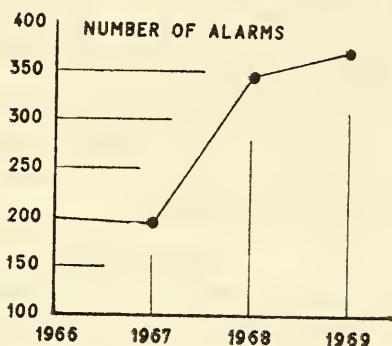
In addition to the training and fire prevention programs the Hampton Fire Department maintains and repairs over seventy-five per cent (75%) of all apparatus and fire alarm equipment. During the past year many on duty man-hours were spent in these endeavors.

I would like to take this opportunity to express our appreciation for the cooperation which we have received from the Department of Public Works, Police Department, Hampton Volunteer Ambulance Corps, and public utilities. ## **POLICE**

### **DEPARTMENT**

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

The administrative staff of the Police Department has changed over in its entirety since February 1969, except for Det. Sgt. Neil Prakop. Subsequently, changes have been made in many areas regarding the operation of the department.

Lt. Clayton E. Bousquin, Executive Officer, came to this department in May of this year from the New Hampshire State Police.

Sgt. Charles A. Garland, who has been with the department since October 7, 1966, was promoted to his present position as a result of competitive examinations within the department.

#### **TRAINING**

All new Regular and Special Officers, hired within the last year, attended a five week in-service training school. This school consisted of basic law enforcement courses and extensive firearms training school.

Det. Sgt. Neil Prakop attended the Federal Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs School. This was a regional school, which was held in Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Six members of the department attended a one-day school on Automobile Skid and Control, which was held in Hopkinton, Massachusetts, by Liberty Mutual Insurance Company of Boston, Massachusetts.

At present, every regular member of the Hampton Police Department is attending either Northeastern University or the University of New Hampshire, part

time, because of the constant demand for more professional police service. The men are attending these schools under federal grants, on their own time, with the Town of Hampton supplying the transportation.

#### BUREAU OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION

There has been a very sharp increase in the criminal field in the past year. Our biggest problem, to date, has been in drug abuse. The records show a 90% increase over the preceding year. To cope with this situation, we have requested more officers for 1970. This increase is reflected in both adult and juvenile cases. Since it is felt that education, and not massive arrest, is the basic answer to this problem, this department has lectured to about twenty school and civic groups and has tried to make them aware of the problems at hand.

#### COMMUNICATIONS

Under the Highway Safety Program Act, a State Police Radio was purchased at a total cost of \$272.00, with the Town of Hampton realizing a savings of \$312.00 by purchasing this radio under this act. The radio will be used for direct service to Concord, New Hampshire, for immediate information regarding police activity.

The teletype service, purchased this year per budget request, was discontinued three months after installation. It was determined that this type of com-

munication was not effective and efficient enough for the department at this time.

### EQUIPMENT

A certain amount of equipment has to be purchased each year in order to provide the best protection for the residents of the Town of Hampton and for the police officers in all details. With this in mind, two new cruisers were purchased and equipped as follows:

1. Marked plainly as before.
2. Spotlights to assist at accident scenes.
3. Strobe lights (one cruiser). More effective during inclement weather.
4. Pull-over and snap-on traffic vests (fluorescent), which were donated by a citizen of Hampton.
5. Hand lanterns and flashlights.
6. Fully equipped traffic safety boxes, consisting of flares, crowbars, axes, ropes, first aid kits, etc.

### SUMMARY

By facts and figures, Criminal Activity, Accidents, Complaints, Court Appearances, and all other police functions are on the rise. Only through the fullest cooperation and direct efforts of all concerned can we keep abreast of the present day situation.

***PUBLIC WORKS  
DEPARTMENT***

Expenditures: \$346,146      Personnel: Regular 27

In June of 1969 the Highway Department and the Sanitary Engineering Department were consolidated into one department now known as the Public Works Department. The department is divided into four sections which include the Waste Water Treatment Plant section; the Highway Maintenance and Construction section; the Solid Waste Collection and Disposal section; and the Maintenance, Inspection, and Quality Control section.

Personnel of the WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT section perform annually regular and preventive maintenance on over 76 electric motors and 31 sewerage pumps. Major overhaul was performed on four pumps this last year.

The main plant processed 329.5 million gallons of waste water and 284 tons of sludge.

The increase in demand of chlorine in the waste water effluent required the conversion of the chlorination units from 500 lb. units to 1500 lb. units this past year. The flow meter was also converted from three million to seven million gallons per day. Thirty-nine tons (78,000 lbs.) of liquid chlorine were utilized in 1969.

One member of this section attended the Southern Maine Vocational Institute in South Portland, Maine, where he received a 13 week course of waste water treatment instruction.

In the HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION section all general highway maintenance and construction activities are planned and performed. During the year two drainage areas were improved by the placing of six-foot culverts and the reconstruction of a total of 1,550 feet of road. The Nylus Brook area was reconstructed with town road aid funds and the Drakeside Road area with locally appropriated funds. A storm drainage system was also completed in the Taylor Street area and on Birch Road.

This department also maintains and plows over 65 miles of roads, replaced approximately 130 street signs, maintains town parks and intersections, sweeps and paints streets and parking areas, as well as many other projects of this nature.

The SOLID WASTE section is involved with the collection and disposal of all solid waste materials. In 1969, 35,246 cu. yds. of rubbish was collected, an increase of 2,000 compacted yards over 1968.

This section also includes the part time personnel used for 11 summer weeks for the purpose of hand sweeping the paved areas inaccessible to the street sweeper in the beach area. They are also responsible for emptying rubbish barrels and cleaning Seabrook Beach, White's Island, North Beach and Plaice Cove parking lot and beach. This effort entailed a total of 4,259 man hours in 1969. The numerous complaints normally received surrounding this service were absent this past year, and a number of favorable comments were received. This condition is attributed to a more effective organization made possible through the reorganization of the Public Works Department.

The MAINTENANCE, INSPECTION AND QUA-



LITY CONTROL section involves the motor vehicle maintenance, the maintenance and inspection of all alterations and new construction of sanitary sewers, and the cleaning and maintenance of the storm drainage systems and catch basins.

This year 237 catch basins were cleaned with a mechanical Sani-Vac catch basin cleaner, approximately 2,000 feet of storm drainage line was cleaned and inspected, and an additional 125 catch basins were hand cleaned. During inclement weather conditions a system of storm drainage inspection was established in an added attempt to alleviate or reduce the storm water damage experienced in the past. One or more inspections were also made this past year at each of the 60 sewer entrance locations into the town sewerage system. In addition 200 sewer mains or laterals were located by this section for contractors, water, gas or telephone companies.

Cleaning and flushing manholes and mains at the beach takes four men three weeks to accomplish each year. Also, 4,409 feet of sewer line was flushed in the uptown section this past year.

This section is also responsible for responding on a 24-hour basis to unusual or emergency conditions surrounding sewer or storm drainage needs.

Safety is continually being emphasized in departmental operations and activities. Hard hats are being worn when needed, safety belts are being worn over outer clothing in areas of operation such as night snow removal and summer rubbish collection at the beach, and first-aid kits have been purchased, equipped and placed in all Public Works vehicles.

## *ANNUAL*

### *TOWN MEETING*

The Annual Town Meeting was held in the Junior High School Cafetorium March 11, 1969.

The Meeting was opened by Moderator H. Alfred Casassa at 10 A.M. and Election Workers duly sworn in.

MOTION by Mr. Roland Paige to waive reading of the entire warrant. Seconded. So voted.

MOTION made by Mr. Roland Paige to have the Polls remain open for voting until 8:00 P.M. Seconded by Selectman Hackett. So voted.

THE INVOCATAION was given by Rev. Donald Rankin of the First Congregational Church, who also offered a prayer for Douglass E. Hunter and his family.

ARTICLES I and III were read by the Moderator. These appear on the Australian Ballot.

#### ARTICLE III. POWER TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES.

Mr. Roland Paige moved adoption of Article III as read. Seconded by Mr. Russell McGuirk. So voted.

#### ARTICLE IV. TAX DEEDS FOR REAL ESTATE

Motion was made by Selectman Lawrence Hackett to amend Article IV by adding the word "accept" following the comma and before the word "sell." Seconded by Selectman Vanderpool.

Mr. Russell McGuirk made further amendment to add the words "or otherwise" after the word "deeds." Seconded. Article IV was voted as amended and will read: "To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, accept, sell, or otherwise dispose of any Real Estate acquired through tax deeds or otherwise."

## ARTICLE V. BUDGET

Mr. David Drummond, Chairman of the Budget Committee, gave the Budget Committee report as recommended.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham made the motion to adopt the Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee in the amount of \$1,111,985. Seconded by Mrs. Margaret Lawrence.

(The above amount does not include Special Articles.)

Selectman Walter Vanderpool made an amendment increasing the Budget figure by \$26,000 which would make the total sum \$1,137,985. The increase for Highway maintenance and new equipment. Seconded. So voted.

## ARTICLE VI. AUDIT OF TOWN'S INSURANCE PROGRAM

Mr. Fred A. White, Jr., moved that Article 6 be adopted as read. Seconded by Mr. Wesley Davis.

Mr. D. Reynolds moved indefinite postponement of Article 6. Seconded by Mr. Frank Freeman. So voted. Article 6 defeated.

Mr. David Drummond moved passage of Article 9 as read. Seconded by Mr. Fred A. White.

Mr. Robert Bridle moved that Article 9 be amended by changing the figure to be paid to \$4,000. Seconded. Not passed.

Mr. Robert Bridle moved that Article XI be voted as read. Seconded. So voted.

Town Manager Cole explained that the primary reason for regional planning membership is to be eligible for HUD funds.

Selectman Lawrence Hackett made the following amendment to Article 15:

“the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company to remove at their expense any line, wire, or poles on a three months notice from the town if it is felt by the Selectmen that it is in the best interest of the town.”

Seconded by Mr. Bernard Barteau.

A second amendment was offered by Miss Ruth Stimson as follows:

“After a public meeting in Hampton within 60 days from date to explain the request for the easement.”

This is only for information. Seconded by Mrs. Margaret Lawrence.

Both amendments passed.

Article 15 was passed as amended and reads:

To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen, in their discretion to grant rights of way, and to sign and execute a deed or deeds to Exeter and Hampton Electric Company to construct and maintain a line or lines of poles and wires over parcels of land owned by the Town, [after a public meeting in Hampton within 60 days from date, to explain the reason for the requested easement—] the first parcel being located on the northerly side of the road of the Treatment Plant and acquired from Homer A. Johnson by deed dated March 2, 1962, and recorded in Rockingham County Registry of Deeds, Book 1617 page 388. The second parcel being the “Treatment Plant” lot so called, and acquired from Charles H. Brown by deed dated July 31, 1933, and



recorded in Book 890, page 432; and the third parcel acquired from Tower Realty, Inc., by deed dated Feb. 27, 1965 and recorded in Book 1755 page 303. The proposed right-of-way is in part coincident with an existing sewer line and is shown on a certain plan entitled "Proposed Right of Way of Exeter and Hampton Electric Company across Land of the Town of Hampton, Hampton, New Hampshire" by John Durgin, Civil Engineers, Scale 1 inch - 100 feet, January, 1969. [The Exeter and Hampton Electric Company to remove at their expense any line, wire, or poles on a three months notice from the town if it is felt by the Selectmen that it is in the best interest of the town. Poles to be placed at their own risk, and the town not to be responsible for any damage to poles.]

Amendments are enclosed in brackets: [ . . . ]

#### ARTICLE XVI. PURCHASE OF COAST GUARD STATION

Mr. David Drummond made the motion that Article 16 be accepted as read. Seconded by Mr. Fred A. White.

Mr. James McCool amended the motion to delete the word "deed" from the second paragraph, and "rent and sell." After the word "lease" add "not less than five years and not more than ten" (second part of the first paragraph).

Rev. Donald Rankin offered a second amendment as follows:

That a committee of seven voting members consisting of the three Selectmen and four others to be appointed by the Moderator today, immediately after adoption of said article, plus three non-voting members (the Town Manager, Chairman of the Budget Committee and the Town Counsel). The purpose of said committee is to study every sug-

gestion, idea, and offer, for said land and building and to report said information to a special town meeting to be held no later than October 1, 1969, called for the purpose of determining the use of said land and building. The final decision as to use of land and buildings shall be made by the voters of Hampton at this special meeting. Seconded.

Mr. Russell McGuirk made the amendment that authority be granted the Selectmen by this town meeting to rent the Coast Guard Property on a month to month basis, with one month's notice, until the Special Committee reports and the town votes on what disposition is to be made. Seconded by Mr. Cunningham.

Mr. McGuirk's amendment was voted in the affirmative.

Article 16 was passed as amended by Rev. Rankin and Mr. McGuirk.

In response to a request Mr. Drummond summed up the action already taken on the Budget.

The amount of \$1,190,364 voted would add about 78c for every thousand dollars of valuation.

The Hampton School District vote would add \$2.40 per thousand.

The Winnacunnet Cooperative High School

(Hampton's share) will all about \$1.15.

Mr. Roland Paige made the Resolution that the best wishes of the assembly be sent to Douglass E. Hunter who has served our community faithfully in so many capacities. This was unanimously voted.

Note: As Mr. Hunter was unable to read mail the Resolution was sent to Mrs. Hunter.

Selectman Lawrence Hackett came forward with a suggestion in conjunction with the School Department. It might be possible to take Centre School for a Municipal Building and allow a new school to be built on land now owned by the Town on Academy Avenue and Winnacunnet Road.

Superintendent of Schools Paul O'Neil said that the School Department would be glad to cooperate with the town.

It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 9:15 P.M.

Reasons given for the added line were as follows:

1. Increasing demands for electricity. Capacity has tripled in last six years.

In 1952 total customers	3324
-------------------------	------

In 1968 total customers	5523

Not only the number of meters, but the added uses for electric power have increased.

Energy use has increased 3½ times in the Beach Area; 6½ times in the Town proper.

It is doubling every seven years.

Peak Load or greatest use has increased 3½ times since 1953.

2. There is increasing difficulty in getting power into the northeasterly part of town when the load is heavy at the Beach in the summer. It is not advisable to add more circuits to the Lafayette Road or Beach Sub-Stations.

The site for a Sub-station in the northeasterly part of Hampton has already been purchased. It is necessary to relieve loads on present sub-stations, and to keep up with the growth of Hampton.

Engineer Durgin explained problem in connection with installation of power lines. Options to be obtained, road crossings to be avoided as much as possible, trying to use present easements as much as possible. He showed how the proposed lines would go on a large Town Map. There was discussion concerning the use of buried cable.

The officials of the Exeter & Hampton Electric Company assured the assembly that there is nothing in their planning that has any bearing upon the proposed power plant in Seabrook.

The meeting was very informative and all questions answered.

The Moderator declared the Meeting closed at 8:30 P.M.

Disposition of Coast Guard Property

In accordance with the vote on Article 16 of the Warrant for Annual Town Meeting of 1969 a Special Town Meeting must be held not later than October 1, 1969.

The Coast Guard Study Committee appointed at Town Meeting held a Public Hearing on Wednesday evening September 3rd at the Junior High School to obtain opinions and ideas from the public regarding the disposition of the above property.

The Committee were as follows: Chairman, Oliver Colvin, Robert Preston, David Reynolds, Linwood Taylor; Selectmen: Edmund Langley, Jr., Walter F. Vanderpool, Robert Danelson, Jr.; Non-voting members: Town Manager, Norman C. Cole, Budget Chairman Fred A. White, Jr., and Town Counsel John W. Perkins.

The Chairman told the assembly that the Committee viewed the problem with three possibilities:

1. The Town to retain ownership of the land in question and use it at their own expense.
2. Lease or rent the land.
3. Sell land outright. (There would be tax revenue from property built upon the land.)

Many possibilities were discussed, including Police Station, Fire Station, State Police Barracks, Park and use by Y.M.C.A.

Dividing the land into lots and leasing in the manner of other town-owned land was suggested.

A plan for sale of land and the building of Condominium Apartments was shown. (This was at the expense of Chairman Colvin.)

The opinion of the majority of those present seemed to be in favor of the town retaining the property.

The Committee will make recommendations and the matter will be voted upon at a Special Town Meeting on Wednesday, October 1, 1969.

## ***LIBRARIAN'S REPORT***

Statistics compiled at the Lane Memorial Library for 1969 indicate the library's continued growth in cultural services offered to the community, services which are available to all, from the toddler to the senior citizen.

Services to youth include the Magic Green Carpet Story Hour, held each Wednesday morning from 10 a.m. to 10:45. The program is a combination of records, films and picture-book stories, and any child old enough to stay happily is welcome to attend. The Summer Reading program had 55 children participating and was climaxed with a party at the library. The Summer Festival of Films was held for nine weeks with 20 films used and a total attendance of 350 children. For all of the youth programs a total of 96 films was borrowed from the State Library for 92 different programs with a total attendance of 3,281 children. Circulation figures for 1969 show that 13,145 juvenile books were loaned.

The library staff are ready to assist every member of the community whenever possible. Through inter-library loan with other libraries in the area and from the resources of the Bookmobile and State Library, it is possible to borrow materials not available in our own library. The library now has added recordings and pamphlets to its list of circulating materials as well as a substantial collection of large print books for the handicapped. The adult circulation for 1969 shows 6,716 non-fiction, 2,665 periodicals, 900 records and 18,960 adult fiction. This increase in circulation is only possible because Hamp-

ton borrows heavily from the Bookmobile. In fact Hampton had the dubious honor of being the largest borrower in 1969 in the entire state. The library cannot hope to continue to offer adequate service to the community unless there is a substantial increase in the book budget.

The interest of Ocean-side Grange, the Garden Clubs, and Scouts has also been most beneficial. The library hopes to continue to offer increased quality and quantity of service. This will only be possible through the increased interest and support of the community.

## **CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

In compliance with its enabling legislation, R.S.A. Chapter 36-A, the Hampton Conservation Commission submits the following report to the Board of Selectmen and citizens.

Items considered during 1969 by the Hampton Conservation Commission were:

1. Sponsorship of public meeting with illustrated talk and discussion on "Who Is Managing Our Environment?" by Floyd Barker, U.N.H. Natural Resources Coordinator.
2. Request to the N.H. Water Resources Board and the Special Board in regard to a policy statement on the position of both boards on any requests to fill marshland in Hampton between now and July 1, 1971.

This was a joint request with the Town Conservation Commissions of North Hampton and Rye, N.H., and a copy sent to Governor Walter Peterson.

3. Representation at the Governor's Conference on Nuclear Power—Its Benefits and Risks in April, 1969.
4. Representation at a Hampton Falls talk by Rep. Thomas Urie on conservation and development of tidal and inland wetlands.
5. Attendance at Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant hearings and public education efforts to help citizens understand implications of the request. Participation in request for Attorney General

to represent the public's interest in the matter.

6. Opposition to H.B. 344, which originally proposed to amend R.S.A. Chapter 483 to exempt the Hampton Municipal Development Authority from provision of statute relative to excavating, dredging and filling tidal waters.
7. Request to a N.H. Legislative Committee to urge passage of legislation to cope with problem of oil pollution along N.H.'s short coastline.
8. Participation in the National Estuarine Pollution Study and preparation of report for Congressional use.

It's been quite an active year in one way, although rather quiet as far as meetings are concerned. We've been vigilant of our legal and moral responsibilities. The 1970's may encourage even more interest in environmental quality and conservation of our country's natural resources, including the coastal salt marshes.

Your Visiting Nurse Association has been in operation since July of 1969.

To date we have made 1,157 active calls. We started in with one full time nurse and a part time Supervisor nurse. In August our office was staffed four days a week, and by December we found it necessary to hire another part time nurse.

In the fall we assisted at two Clinics. The Measles Clinic was held in October and 63 children from kindergarten through eighth grades received the vaccine. In December we held the German Measles Clinic for kindergarten through first grade, and 213 Hampton children received the vaccine. The other towns in the Seacoast Area were also served. There is a great shortage of the German Measles vaccine so the State designated the age group to receive this. When more is available we plan to continue the immunization program.

The largest number of our patients are in the Medicare age group, though we have made 76 visits to new mothers and their babies. Many of our patients have cardiac problems or are CVA victims. We provide many and varied services such as baths, injections, dressing changes, any nursing ordered by your Doctor and health instruction for all age groups. If we can be of help to you or any member of your family do not hesitate to call us (926-2066).

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cafetorium of the Hampton Academy Junior High School on Tuesday the tenth day of March 1970, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

\*

*Article 1.* To choose by NON-PARTISAN Ballot, one Selectman for three years, and one Selectman for one year; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, and one Collector of Taxes for one year; four members of the Municipal Budget Committee for three years, and one member of the Municipal Budget Committee for one year.

\*

*Article 2.* To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year. (The Polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)

*Article 3.* To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes up to One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000).

*Article 4.* To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to accept, administer, sell, or otherwise dispose of any Real Estate acquired through tax deeds, or otherwise; any sale to be at Public Auction.

*Article 5.* To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Municipal Budget Committee, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,364,705.00.

*Article 6.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to acquire properties located in Hackett Lane and Moore Avenue now subject to periodic flooding, to resell the buildings for relocation, to regrade the properties and place prohibitive restrictions upon said parcels for further building.

*Article 7.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 in additional support of the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic. (\$1,000 in General Budget).

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

*Article 8.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 for the purpose of installing a water line to service the Industrial Park in the vicinity of Towle Farm Road and Interstate Highway 95.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

*Article 9.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,250 as the town's share of regional planning studies to be conducted by the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These monies will be used for financing planning studies which must be approved by the Regional Planning Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. (Based on 25c per capita).

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

*Article 10.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the purpose of

purchasing a parcel of land owned by Mr. Eugene Leavitt, and located east of the town's present dump and further described on a plan prepared by Chester Leach, C.E.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

*Article 11.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raze the old Coast Guard station building and clear the land.

*Article 12.* On petition of Lloyd C. Hallett and 40 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the continuation of the sidewalk on the west side of Mill Road to Emery Lane. This will be a total distance of 680 feet. This would then move the children's crosswalk from the crest of the hill (near the water tower) and curve on Mill Road, to the intersection of Emery Lane and Mill Road.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

*Article 13.* On petition of Thomas E. Clay and Katherine Clay and 27 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$81,000 for the purpose of installing a sanitary sewer system in the area of Norton Road, Hobbs Road, and Mace Road.

(Not recommended by Budget Committee)

Town Warrant to be voted upon by the citizens of said town at the Annual Town Meeting to be held in Hampton on March 10, 1970.

That the sum of money recommended by the Budget Committee for the Police Department Account #111 Wages, be changed from \$151,507 to the sum of \$163,000. This amount will be used for wages, increases, earned by the police force of this town. To maintain a police force which we have now and the caliber of men, the only way that we can show our gratitude for them is in their pay envelopes. We cannot expect men to perform their work as it is being done now, and hope to have them stay with us and get below living wages. The Police Department of this

town returns more in revenue to our treasury through good police work than any other department.

## ARTICLE V-B

### Mobile Home Park Development

Section I. The owners or agents of any tract of land proposed for mobile home park development shall submit to the Planning Board a plan for the use and development of all or part of the tract as a mobile home park. The Planning Board shall review the plan in accordance with procedures prescribed and thereafter shall prepare a report stating reasons for approval or disapproval. If approved, specific evidence and facts shall be shown that the plan of use and development of all or part of the tract as a mobile home park meets the conditions set forth below:

a. That the mobile home park and the buildings and appurtenant facilities shall be in a single ownership, or under management or supervision of a responsible lessee, or subject to such other supervisory lease or ownership control as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance relating to mobile home parks.

b. That the mobile home park site proposed contains an area of not less than sixty thousand (60,000) square feet.

c. That the plan clearly defines the mobile home spaces and the traffic pattern for vehicular parking and circulation.

d. That each mobile home space has an area of not less than two thousand five hundred (2,500) square feet and a lot width of not less than forty (40) feet. However, where overnight transient facilities are to be provided, ten (10%) per cent of the total number of mobile home spaces may have a lot area and width less than that specified above but in no event shall the lot area be less than one thousand (1,000)



square feet or have a lot width less than twenty-five (25) feet. Overnight transient facilities shall be restricted to a maximum stay of fifteen (15) days per mobile home.

e. That mobile homes be located to provide at least a twenty (20) foot clearance between mobile homes or additions attached thereto. Patios or unenclosed porches, patio covers and overnight transient facilities may be excluded from this provision.

f. That no mobile home is located closer than ten (10) feet to any other building or structure or to any perimeter park property line other than that which abuts a public street.

g. That no mobile home be located closer than twenty (20) feet from the property line which abuts upon a public street.

h. That all mobile homes' spaces abut upon a driveway of not less than thirty (30) feet in width, which has unobstructed access to a public street.

i. That driveways and walkways within the mobile home park shall have a permanent dust-free surface.

j. That service buildings to house toilet, bathing, and other sanitation facilities and utilities be provided as required by the State Board of Health.

k. That the mobile home park shall be screened from adjacent properties by a suitable fence or wall, or suitable planting not less than six (6) feet in height.

l. That the mobile home park shall have not less than twenty (20) mobile home spaces available for occupancy before any certificate of occupancy is issued.

m. That the plan be consistent with the intent and purposes of this Ordinance to promote public health, safety and general welfare.

Section 2. Before approving a plan under this section, the Planning Board shall determine that the proposed use will not adversely affect the present or future character of the surrounding property and prescribe such additional conditions as may be necessary to secure the objectives of this Ordinance.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

**Article 35.** To amend the Zoning Ordinance Article I by deleting Paragraph 4 and changing Paragraph 5 to Paragraph 4, Paragraph 6 to Paragraph 5 and Paragraph 7 to Paragraph 6.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

**Article 36.** To amend the Zoning Ordinance Article III, Section 3a by removing the following:

In a Seasonal Business and Recreational District, no building or land shall be used for the sale of intoxicating liquors or intoxicating beverages of any kind, whether by the bottle, by the can, by the glass or otherwise.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

**Article 37.** To amend the Zoning Ordinance Article VI, Section 2, to read as follows:

Section 2. The Building Inspector at the time of the issuing of a permit by him shall collect from the applicant a fee based on the following scale:

\$3.50 per \$1,000 based on a fair estimate of the total cost of construction or alteration, but in no case shall the fee be less than \$3.50. In any case where, in the opinion of the Building Inspector, the total cost of the alteration or new construction shall amount to less than \$100, the Building Inspector shall waive the inspection and the fee.

The Building Inspector shall collect all fees as provided herein and deposit to the Town each month the total sum collected.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

*Article 38.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available in the construction of sewage collection and disposal facilities, and pass any vote relating thereto.

*Article 39.* To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen :

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Library, Cemetery Association, Trustees of Trust Funds, Hampton Municipal Development Authority and Construction Account W.P.C. Project - Sewer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1968-  
December 31, 1969: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1968, and December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$65,269.99 in 1969.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$28,392.61, plus a revenue surplus of \$18,781.85, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$47,174.46.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1969, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit K)

A statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1969, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit K.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts

of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$151,377.15 to \$162,647.14 during 1969 as shown herewith:

Due to the vast increase in the volume of transactions, we feel that the present system of record keeping is inadequate to furnish financial information when required.

It is recommended that serious consideration be given to improving the present system by using the double entry system of bookkeeping incorporating a revenue ledger, appropriation ledger and a general ledger.

It is also recommended that a full-time position of Treasurer-Bookkeeper to maintain these records be given serious consideration. This would enable the Town Officials to obtain financial information when required.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.



We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hampton for their assistance during the course of the audit.
