Once again, it is my privilege to submit the Annual Report of the Town's activities for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1970.


The goal of Town Officials and dedicated Town employees, again this past year, has been to provide the best possible Municipal services in the most economical manner. This aim has been accomplished through dedication, improving methods, more comprehensive planning as well as evidenced by the Capital Improvement Program, training and cooperation.

This report contains as much information as can reasonably be provided in order to give a comprehensive picture of 1970 operations. More detailed information may be found in the 'Review of Performance' published in October of each year, copies of which are available at the Town Office. We would also be happy to answer any question from any citizen.

The 1970 Audit Report will be published in the 1971 Town Report. This will necessarily be the procedure in future years. According to the State Auditors, our community has outgrown our traditional early audit provided in past years. When compared on the basis of valuation or total business, Hampton is the second largest town and the eleventh or twelfth largest community (including cities) in the State of New Hampshire.

Sincere appreciation is expressed to all of those persons who have donated many hours to serve this community on Boards, Commissions, Associations, and Committees contributing to our proper development and growth. The value of these services to our community cannot be measured.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Hampton:

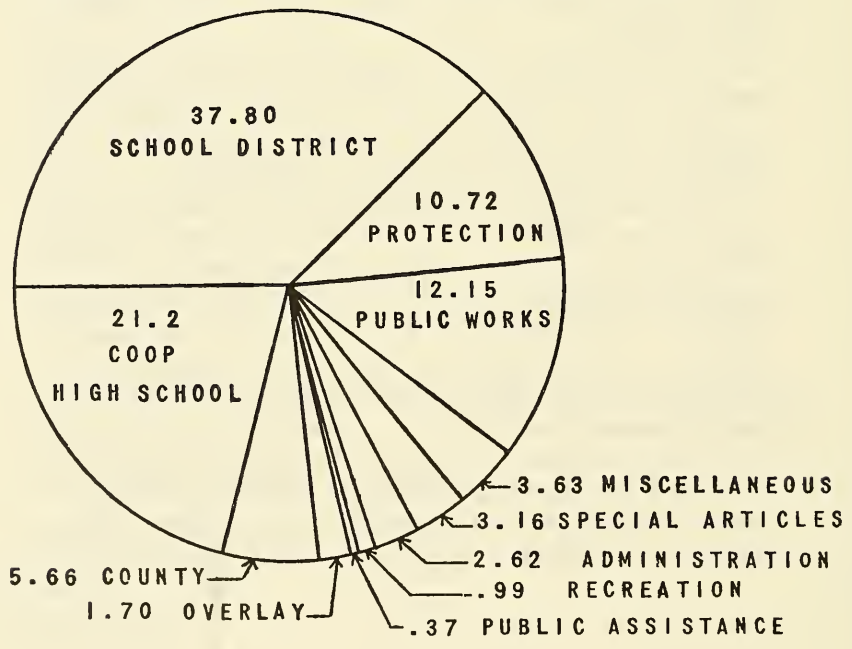
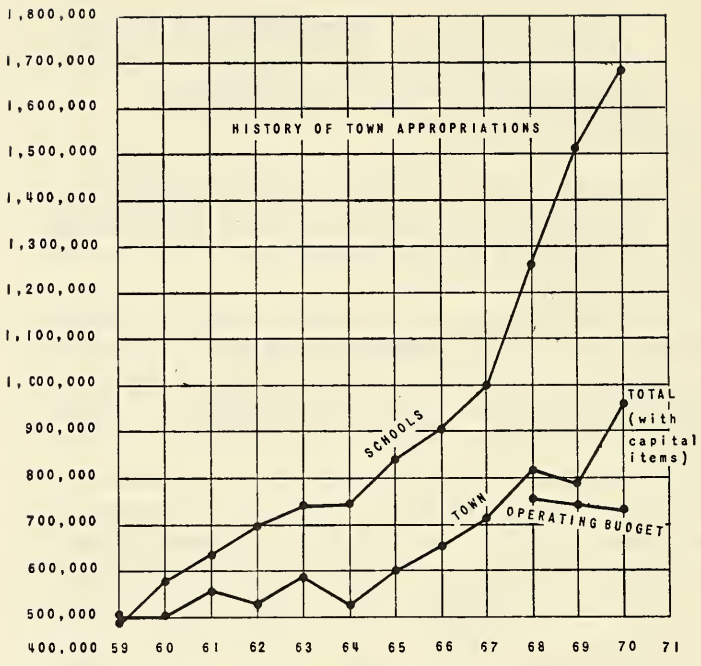
This year's Board of Selectmen have attempted to increase the services provided by the Town by becoming directly involved in the administration of the various functions of local government.

The year started out by taking from the budget recommended by the Budget Committee a sum of money equal to 5% of the total as directed by the Town Meeting. The 5% taken out of the budget by Town Meeting vote totalled \$68,705 and came from the following accounts: \$3540 from Police Department equipment account; \$2000 from Fire Department training and fire prevention; \$970 from street lighting; \$500 from Civil Defense; \$7530 from Traffic Signal Light; \$18,900 from Public Works – truck and tarring & resurfacing; \$33,000 from Winnacunnet Road Resurfacing; \$1,265 from Libraries; and \$1,000 from Tree Spraying.

As can easily be seen, most of the amounts taken out last year cannot be reflected as a savings in operations, but rather will reflect the deferring of necessary services and items to future taxpayers.

The operating budget has increased at a remarkably low rate in 1969 and 1970 (8% and 6.6% respectively). The proposed increase by the Selectmen in the operating budget for 1971 is 15.7%. The operating budget is that portion of the total approved budget necessary for providing the daily services provided by the town as opposed to those items of a Capital Improvement nature.

Over this same period of time, since 1968, the cost of living has increased substantially annually, as has the cost of materials and operations. In addition five additional firefighters have been added, three police



officers have been added with three more proposed this year, one person is requested in the Public Works Department, a full-time assessing officer, a building inspector, and a dog officer have also been added during this period. Furthermore, a retirement system for Group I employees, regional planning, a visiting nurse program, fire alarm reconstruction and a proposed fire prevention program are all reflected as additional services during these years. With all of these added costs for increased services an average annual increase of 10% over the past three year period seems to be a rather remarkable achievement.

During the year considerable effort was directed toward the completion of major public works construction projects such as the Mace Road sewer project, the Warner Lane sewer project, the Hackett Lane Storm Drain project and the Winnacunnet Road Reconstruction project. These projects reach a total expenditure approximating \$380,000. Sewer General Planning also required much attention. Cost of all of these projects will substantially increase over initial estimates because of State Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission requirements, minimum wage rates established by the Labor Commissioner and increased construction costs due to delays, revised requirements and increased cost of materials.

The operations conducted out of the Martel House (assessing and building inspection) have more than established their value to the town. In income alone both positions have individually performed their functions in a manner that has added revenues to the town treasury well in excess of the expenses of operating the offices. The true value, however, is more realistically realized in common and uniform basis from which all taxpayers will pay their fair share of the services provided by the town as well as better guidance and control in building construction and alteration.

In April of 1970 the method of computing lease

land rentals was revised in order to make the revenues received from leased land equivalent to the taxes that would be received if the land were privately owned and taxable. This action will add substantially to town revenues.

Tax bills were also sent to the deed holders of the thirty-two lots originally under the 99 year lease with the Hampton Beach Improvement Company. Since these lots were not being leased by the Improvement Company and the matter of title was questionable and would require a court determination at the end of the lease – some 27 years away, we decided to initiate this action, placing the town in the most advantageous situation possible under the circumstances. This action will increase revenues the first year (1970) by seventeen thousand dollars.

The Capital Improvement Program, in the process of development for the past two years, has been implemented with this year's budget. A five year program of major needs has been compiled and arranged by the Planning Board from the list of needs submitted to them from all sources. This program is a continuing function and will be revised, updated and extended annually in order to provide the comprehensive, orderly realistic and economical program needed to assist this community in meeting its major needs.

The progress of this community in the future will, of necessity, depend substantially upon an attitude of mutual trust and confidence between the people and their elected and appointed officials. Without this relationship the increasing difficulty in local operations will increase beyond proportion causing more expense, more restrictive, complicated and time consuming service and less overall local effectiveness.

The Hampton Fire Department is pleased to report two major changes during 2970 which have contributed to increased efficiency in apparatus and manpower.

The standard 56 hour work week has proven most effective, with responsible officers in charge of each shift.

Re-assignment of apparatus to box alarms has increased initial response of manpower making it possible to attack fires in their incipency. Using this procedure, it has been possible for on-duty personnel to control the majority of reported fires this year.

On August 1, 1970 Lieutenant Alfred Dow was assigned as fire prevention officer, and submitted the following report for the last six months as follows:

Complete building inspections	50
Garage and service stations (new construction)	1
Oil Burner inspection (permits issued)	35
Public assembly permits issued	8

Two complete inspections of each school and a total of eighteen (18) fire drills held during school hours.

Six (6) complete inspections of Plimpton Nursing Home. A class was given to employees on the proper use of various types of first aid fire appliances.

Invalid stickers issued to six (6) private residences after complete inspection.

Four (4) sprinkler systems in business establishments were inspected.

During fire prevention week, a film on home fire escape plans was shown to the lower grades, and a babysitting film was shown to the home economics class

in the Hampton School System. Booklets were distributed on this subject to all class students.

Training and Planning

The company training program, supervised by Deputy Fitz, Captain H. Stickney, and assisted by Lieutenant Bruce Dow has increased the effort of in-service training. A total of 1,437 hours were devoted to all phases of fire oriented classes.

In addition to this drill school four permanent firefighters are continuing their studies at Northshore Community College, to earn an associate degree in fire science. Their courses include fire prevention and inspection, and introduction to fire protection.

Eight firefighters have attended a nine week course on Emergency Care and Transportation of the sick and injured at the Exeter Fire Department.

Two firefighters attended a twenty (20) hour course in basic firefighting at Brentwood, N.H.

Four firefighters attended training at Lily Pond Civil Defense Training Center in Guilford, N.H. The course included training in leadership and fire prevention.

The department had four new personnel join its ranks this year, one firefighter with considerable experience and talent, two men with basic knowledge of fire department operation, and one with no firefighting experience.

All new personnel have performed well, and are expected to continue to advance with proper training and leadership.

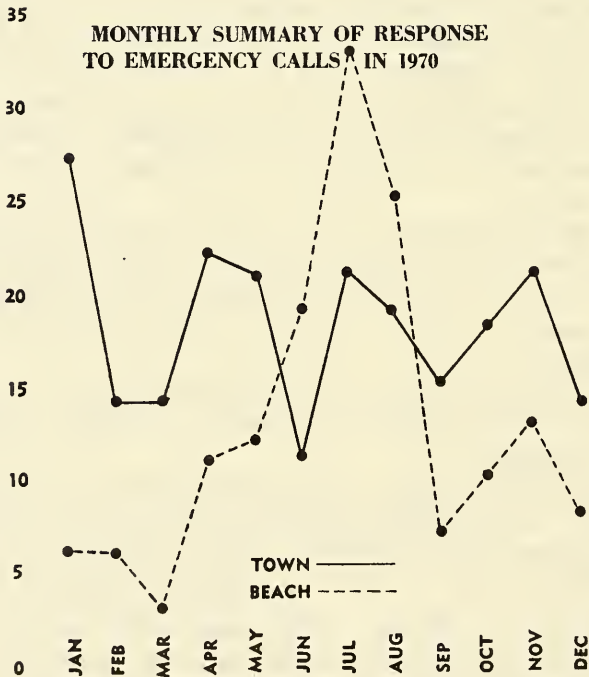

We will continue our efforts to extend these services to the ever increasing demands of a rapidly growing community.

service, volunteer agencies, and other concerned citizens have enabled the Fire Department to perform their services more effectively in times of emergency.

We will continue our efforts to provide the highest degree of services for protection of life and property for our community in the coming year.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

ADMINISTRATION

During 1970 changes were made within the Police Department and these changes have resulted in more thorough and effective law enforcement work.

Sgt. Charles A. Garland has been filling the position of Executive Officer for this Department.

Sgt. John J. Nickerson, who has been with the Department since December 1967, was promoted to his present position. He is in charge of the midnight shift.

There have been three new regular police officers hired to fill the three new positions authorized by the Town in 1970.

BUREAU OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION

Again this year we realized an increase in criminal complaints, the number of complaints being 141 more than in 1969. In order to combat this increase I have assigned two Detectives, Normal L. Brown and Paul J. Cronin, to this Section. This is working out very well with more arrests being made, better investigations and more criminal complaints closed.

Since we have the capability of testing narcotics now with the purchase of a drug testing kit we have had to drop only two cases in court compared to approximately 50 during 1969.

A new compact camera outfit was purchased for this Section and now we have the same photography capabilities as larger departments.

We have continued our efforts in attempting to reach and educate people concerning narcotics. During this year we have talked to more than 800 children and adults in the Seacoast area.

JUVENILE

There has been a large increase of Juvenile arrests over the previous years. The number of the more serious offenses such as narcotics, robbery and burglarly involving Juveniles is on the increase.

Although a great many Juveniles have been brought into Juvenile Court there have been many lesser offenses settled in the homes by our Juvenile Officer.

TRAINING

During 1970 we had two regular police officers attend a five week State Police Academy. Officers are also now attending Northeastern University in Boston and St. Anslem's College in Manchester.

There was an eight week in-service training school which was attended by all of our r new special officers and new regular officers conducted by the Hampton Police Department.

SAFETY

We have been in the process of establishing a safety program for all school children. When this is completed and put into operation it is believed that not only the children but also adults will benefit.

Numerous surveys have been conducted throughout the Town which resulted in many safety signs being erected. It is hoped that these additional signs will further reduce accidents.

SUMMARY

Statistics show an increase in all aspects of law enforcement in this community. We are doing our utmost in combating this increase and only with the continued assistance from the citizens of this Town will we be able to effectively fight these problems.

PUBLIC WORKS

Expenditures: 375,025

The Public Works Department is divided as follows:

Waste Water Treatment Plant; Solid Waste Disposal; Maintenance, Inspection and Quality Control; and Highway Maintenance and Construction Section.

WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Regular and preventative maintenance was performed on all plant equipment, which is a continuing process each and every year.

In 1970 we processed 350,226,000 gallons of waste water and 334 tons of solid waste (sludge). Our average summer daily flow was 1,657,000 gallons; our peak daily flow was 2,535,000 gallons.

Chlorinating our effluent is a continuing 24 hour a day process. This year our plant utilized 48 tons (96,000 lbs) of chlorine.

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

Solid waste disposal is one of the most demanding jobs in the Public Works Department, and presents substantial difficulties in keeping men willing to undertake this type of work.

Solid waste is increasing for two primary reasons - the volume of waste per individual due to increase in the number of disposables, and the increase in our population.

Below is a three year comparison of compacted cubic yards of rubbish collected:

The operation of the dump was taken over by the Public Works Department in June, 1970. For essentially the same cost as contracted, the department has

succeeded in operating the dump in a manner that has been a credit to the town, reducing the nuisance almost completely.

MAINTENANCE INSPECTION & QUALITY CONTROL

During this year 155 catch basins were mechanically cleaned. In conjunction with this an additional 422 catch basins were hand cleaned and inspected. During inclement weather a system of storm drainage inspection is carried out by this section in order to insure proper operation of our storm drainage system.

This section rebuilt 4 catch basins and relaid approximately 50 feet of existing drains. The open drainage ditches at Cuss House (Park Avenue) and the ditch from Locke to Landing Road on Winnacunnet Road were reconstructed.

The Little River road storm drain was extended requiring 385 feet of 12 inch pipe and 2 catch basins. The High Street storm drain was extended 162 feet with 6 inch pipe and 1 catch basin.

Three hundred feet of 8-inch main and 98 feet of 4-inch laterals on Winnacunnet Road were constructed this year.

There were 120 sewer entrances into the Town Sewerage System this year requiring one or more inspections. In addition 125 sewer mains or laterals were located for contractors, water, gas, or telephone companies.

Ten manholes were reconstructed and 110 manholes were checked and cleaned during the year, along with flushing of the sewer mains at the beach. In addition to this 8 manholes, and 2,000 feet of sewer main was flushed on the Richard and Elaine Street easement.

This section is responsible for the inspection of all sewerage lines laid in town. They are also responsible to respond on a 24-hour basis to unusual conditions surrounding sewer or storm drainage plug-ups.

This section also takes in our mechanic and helper, they are responsible for the maintenance and preventative maintenance of our 35 pieces of equipment, 8 plows and 4 wings. Due to age, wear and constant use of our equipment this task is no easy one.

During 1970 our mechanics helper attended night courses in motor vehicle repair.

HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION

A Town Road Aid (TRA) "A" project was completed. This work consisted of rebuilding 2,350 feet of North Shore Road.

All town guard rails and fences were repaired and/or painted. 50 new guard rails were installed.

All town crosswalks and stop lines at intersections both uptown and beach were painted along with all parking spaces under the control of the town.

The sidewalk from the Hampton National Bank to

the corner of Lafayette and High Street was reconstructed. The following Hot Top sidewalks were reconstructed this year, Nudd Ave; Highland Ave; and River Ave. A new Hot Top sidewalk was constructed on Mill Road.

Again street signs have been a problem. Sixty-nine (69) street signs were replaced; 9 new stop signs; 12 slow children signs, and 2 yield signs were installed. Numerous no-parking and traffic control signs were replaced. At this writing sixty (60) additional street signs are missing or broken due to malicious vandalism.

Approximately 23 miles, or one-third of the total highway mileage in town are scheduled for seal coating each year. This was accomplished by a contractor with the necessary special equipment. The roads are prepared before sealing by this section.

Part-time personnel are used to assist this section in maintaining 7 (including Tuck Field) parks and five (5) intersections. Mowing, trimming and raking and other maintenance activity require full-time attention during the summer months. The repair and resurfacing of one tennis court, the painting of the field house and the rebuilding of the baseball diamond at Tuck Field under the supervision of Park personnel were the major accomplishments in upgrading of these facilities this year.

The Public Works Department records show that the Town received 65 inches of snow requiring removal last year. The department supplements its 5 pieces of snow removal equipment with an average of 12 contracted or hired pieces. The total cost of hired equipment last winter was only \$10,476.05 as compared to \$25,081.00 the preceding year.

Your Public Works Department will continue to provide the required services to the town with the monies allocated, always having in mind economy, and endeavoring to get the most that we can from the tax dollars we receive.

ASSESSOR REPORT

The continued growth of the Town of Hampton is evidenced by an increase in total community valuation of approximately 1.5 million dollars. The valuation of taxable and exempt property of some 94.2 million dollars in 1969 rose to over 95.7 million in 1970 for the 6,574 tax accounts. The following table summarizes this growth.

Significant legislative actions were the granting of tax exemption to certain elderly persons and the repealing of many types of personal property taxes. The abolishment of such taxes as stock in trade, factory machinery, road building equipment, etc. reduced the Town's tax base but the new business profits tax returns the money lost, based on 1969 assessments for the repealed taxes plus a ten percent growth factor for 1970.

The law granting elderly exemption results in further erosion of the tax base. While few persons would question the need to grant relief to senior citizens on fixed incomes, the method chosen leaves much to be desired. Elderly exemptions, as well as veteran's exemptions, should be funded on the State level, rather than from the pockets of all other taxpayers.

The following tables indicate the sources of most

of the revenue from which the Town provides its services.

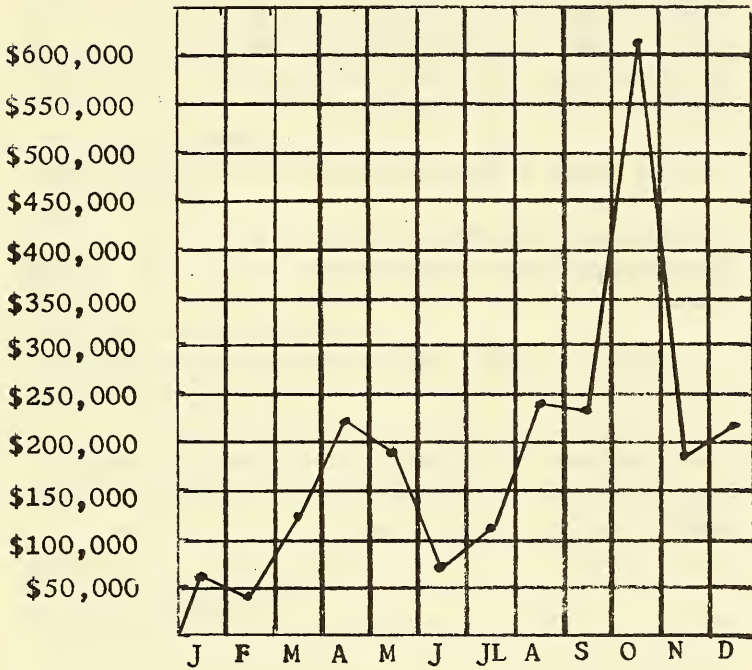

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In compliance with its enabling legislation, R.S.A. Chapter 36A, the Hampton Conservation Commission submits the following report to the Board of Selectmen and citizens.

Items considered during 1970 by the Hampton Conservation Commission were:

1. Welcoming of new member, Mr. Peter Randall.
2. House Bill 15 of 1970 Special Session of the General Court was supported. It concerned a definition of Tidal Waters and their serving of a public purpose. It was passed, signed, and went into effect on May 4, 1970 and establishes jurisdiction over dredge and fill operations.

3. Support of U.S. House Bill 14845, which would amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, and authorize federal funds to match state ones to protect estuaries and coastal lands.

Congressman Wyman indicated willingness to support this bill.

4. Report on New England Coastal Zone Management Conference in Durham. It was emphasized that there is urgent need to authorize a natural coastal zone program to encourage state protection of New England's valuable asset. There are tremendous demands for residences, recreation, fish resources, industries, businesses, waste disposal, and exploitation of offshore sand and gravel deposits.

5. Correspondence with Mr. John Long on H.B. 15, jurisdiction over filling salt marshes.

6. Testimony at Tidal Wetlands Study Commission hearing in Newington, and filing of report requesting; 1971 legislation establishing Salt Marsh Conservation Areas with public purpose and a written opinion from Attorney General on constitutionality of R.S.A. Ch. 412 and 358. These are the enabling legislation of Hampton Municipal Development Authority, and

possibility of rescinding these chapters, which are in direct opposition to newer conservation statutes in N.H.

The Commission, State Planning Director, and Commissioner of Resources were requested to help save N.H.'s salt marshes, as a part of the state's natural resources.

7. Request to Tax Collector for a list of all marsh properties acquired by tax deed since 1955. (Not yet received).

8. Request to Governor and Council to fund Special Board under H. Bill 15.

9. Request to N.H. Commissioner of Resources to meet with the Conservation Commission (change of occupant in mid-summer). Mr. Gilman mentioned future possibility of a Coastal Zone Council, but declined to meet until new legislation is drawn.

10. Desirability of annual aerial photo of local marsh areas to record filling or other changes.

11. Participation at August hearing in Hampton on Battcock request to fill 7.5 acres of salt marsh along Expressway.

The Commission opposed filling and favored compensating the petitioners under H. Bill 15 provisions. The Special State Board denied the request.

12. Gift of 5 acres of saltmarsh by Mrs. Mary L. Garland of North Hampton in memory of her father, Thomas Ira Batchelder.

13. Opposition to Apartment House building on Landing Road, with marshland out back and no sewer connection.

The meeting of N.H. Conservation Commissions was attended at Bedford. A State Association was formed. If the local Commission joins in 1971 the dues would be \$80.00 per year for a town the size of Hampton. The purpose is "to aid Commissions in better discharging their duties under R.S.A. 36A through information, communication, legislation, and report on

violations as filling and dredging statute to proper agency.”

It would be an advantage to be able to join this State Association in a legislative year especially. The 1971 General Court will be asked by the Tidal Wetland Study Commission to amend Ch. 483-B to more specifically define “tidal” and “coastal waters”, and to establish a N.H. Wetlands Authority. It appears worthy of support by conservation-minded citizens.

It was indeed gratifying to have been able to purchase a portion of the needed children's books this

year. Unfortunately the price of books continues to climb, and each year we can buy less with the book dollar.

The library has benefitted greatly from the interest of various community organizations, and this interest is reflected in better community service. The many hours of volunteer assistance given by the Friends of the Library have been deeply appreciated. The efforts of this group in many areas of the library has been of great benefit generally, and specifically in the Children's Room. The group earned the money and purchased 4 new sections of shelving, and is currently continuing this project. The Hampton Rotary and Oceanside Grange have each contributed \$100 towards the purchase of new books of special interest which might be too costly for the regular book budget. The Garden Clubs have contributed magazine subscriptions as well as floral arrangements and landscaping. Miss Ruth Stimson has done an attractive wall display each month. Mrs. Lloyd Farrell has contributed many hours of volunteer typing, which has finally completed the cataloging project.

Services offered include: adult film programs, adult reference, inter-library loan, books for shut-ins, service to handicapped, children's film programs, children's story hour, summer reading program, aid to visually handicapped, reference service, recordings, pamphlets, clippings and picture file.

SEACOASTS HOME HEALTH ASSOCIATION

The Seacoast Home Health Association is in its second year and our volume of patients has increased to the point when in June 1970 another nurse joined our staff on a part time basis; so we now have one full time nurse and two part time nurses.

In November we had a Rubella Clinic at which time we vaccinated 550 children. Because of the availability of the vaccine we were able to do ages 1 through 12. Most of the children done at this clinic were pre-schoolers as the older children had been done at our previous clinics.

Since July 1970 our organization has seen great changes in Medicare benefits being paid. This is not due to any change of law but rather a more strict enforcement of the law. This has limited our Medicare patients as most of them are no longer covered for our services and we are providing them at no charge in many instances. Our income from Medicare has been cut from approximately 80% coverage to less than 20%. As you can see this has made for a bad financial situation, especially when about 70% of our patients are of Medicare age. A person can only be covered by Medicare now when he is acutely ill, and then only for a short period of time. This does not mean that we do not make the calls it merely means we make the calls free unless the patient can pay in full or part of our charge. We continue to make our calls until the Doctors or nurses feel the patient is able to take care of himself satisfactorily. No one is ever refused our service. This applies to all age groups not just the over 65 group.

Our nurses check up on the progress of all children

from our area attending the Crippled Children Clinics to make sure they are progressing, as well as to answer any questions and reassure the parents. We have about 30 children in our area who receive assistance through this clinic.

Since the start of the organization we have made a total of 3225 calls, 375 being to new mothers and babies. Our nurses find these very rewarding visits and the new mothers appreciate our concern.

We sincerely hope that anyone in the area of Hampton, Hampton Falls, North Hampton and Seabrook who feel we could be of help to them will give us a call at 926-2066. We are here to be of service to the community.

STUDY COMMITTEE

The undersigned Committee was appointed under Article 20 in the Town Warrant of 1970. The purpose was to consider whether the Town and The Hampton Beach Improvement Company could agree upon a plan by which persons holding lots under the Improvement Company might acquire rights extending beyond the term of the Improvement Company; and to report to the next Annual Town Meeting, with or without recommendations.

The Committee has held many meetings over the course of the year and has consulted with the Selectmen, the Town Manager and representatives of the Hampton Beach Improvement Company.

The Committee has explored the legal and economic consequences which may occur at termination of the Hampton Beach Improvement Company lease in 1997, the problem of mortgage financing of properties in the meantime, and possible courses of action by the Town.

Due to the complexities of the situation the Committee finds that at least Another Year of Further Study and Negotiation is required.

The Committee recommends that it be continued through 1971 and report at the 1972 Town Meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The Annual Town Meeting was held in the Junior High School Cafetorium March 10, 1970.

The Meeting was opened at ten o'clock in the forenoon by Moderator H. Alfred Casassa, and Election Workers duly sworn in.

The assembly took part in the Salute to the Flag, and the Invocation was given by Monsignor Matthew J. Casey.

The Moderator read the Return attached to the Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

MOTION by George Headardt to waive reading of the entire Warrant, as it had been published and posted according to law. Seconded by Selectman Edmund Langley, Jr. So Voted.

MOTION by George Hardardt that the Polls for Voting remain open until eight o'clock in the evening. Seconded by Fred A. White, Jr. So Voted.

Moderator Casassa read Articles 1 and 2 of the Warrant. These Articles appear on the Non-partisan Ballot.

ARTICLE 3. BORROWING MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES.

MOTION by Selectman Walter F. Vanderpool to adopt Article 3 as read. Seconded by Fred A. White, Jr. Unanimously voted.

ARTICLE 4. SELLING REAL ESTATE ACQUIRED THROUGH TAX DEED.

AMENDMENT by Miss Ruth Stimson that the words "or otherwise" in the last line of Article 4 be stricken from the Article. Seconded by Mrs. Gerda Small. The amendment passed with only one person in opposition. MOTION by Mr. Richard Ford that Article 4, as amended, be passed. Seconded by Mr. Robert Mondor. Article 4 was passed as amended.

ARTICLE 5. BUDGET

Chairman Fred A. White, Jr. gave the report of the Budget Committee, as recommended. The Gross Budget is \$1,410,955. The Budget without the Special Articles is \$1,364,705.

The Budget Committee felt that it was more practical to approve an amount of \$100,000. for sewers in the regular budget, rather than approve Special Articles in various areas. Mr. White said that the Budget Committee had not cut any services.

MOTION by Mr. Ansell W. Palmer that the Budget as presented by Chairman White be adopted, and the amount of \$1,364,705. be raised and appropriated. Seconded by Mr. Wilfred Cunningham.

Discussion followed. Mr. Robert Kimball reminded the assembly that there was still an adjourned School District Meeting with an increased Budget, as well as the town share of expense of the Winnacunnet Cooperative High School. Two thirds of the Tax money goes for schools, and people should consider the whole picture.

Chairman White said that the town is faced with an increase of tax rate as follows:

\$2.70 per thousand for town expenses.

2.00 per thousand for the Hampton School District.

1.50 per thousand for Winnacunnet High School.

.50 on the County assessment

total ---- \$6.70 estimated increase

Mr. Fred White said that it would cost half a million dollars to complete the sewer project for the entire town. The Budget Committee feels that \$100,000 a year is a good beginning for a five year program. Federal Funds are available for Force Mains, Pumping Stations and Lift Stations.

MOTION by Mr. Bertrand Ray that Mr. Palmer's motion be amended to take up the Budget "item by item". Seconded by Mr. Harold Towle. NOT PASSED.

Discussion.

Mr. Roland Paige asked to know the priorities for sewers.

Selectman Edmund Langley, Jr. replied as follows:

1. Mace Road
2. Winnacunnet Road
3. Surfside Park
4. Edgewood Drive
5. North part of Lafayette Rd.
6. Plaice Cove
7. Locke Road
8. Balance of High Street
9. Completion of Boar's Head
10. Little River Road
11. 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Streets

(should have been done with other numerical streets. Money ran out)

12. Mill Pond Lane

Town Manager Cole explained that last year it was voted to complete the first sewer plan, FIRST: Thomsen Road, Hobbs Road, Mace Road, Norton road and Ridgeview Terrace.

AMENDMENT by Mr. Richard Ford to reduce the sub-total Budget of \$1,364,705. to \$1,296,000. (approximately %5) with the stipulation that the Selectmen may cut where they see fit – with the exception of salaries. Seconded by Mr. Francis Croteau.

Much discussion followed particularly in regard to the Assessing Department.

Selectman Langley praised Mr. Huntsman's work highly. He said that for the first time there were complete records of taxable property available.

Mrs. Helene Joiner said that she wished Selectmen would be present at Budget Hearings to answer questions.

MOTION by Mr. James Fallon that the meeting be recessed until 2 p.m. Seconded. So Voted.

CONTINUING ON ARTICLE 5. BUDGET

More discussion.

Mr. Tony Smith moved that the Salaries of the Selectmen be cut by \$3,000. Seconded by Mrs. Whitman. NOT PASSED.

TOWN COUNSEL JOHN W. PERKINS said that it is up to the Selectmen to administer the Budget. The stipulation regarding salaries must be stricken from the record in Mr. Ford's motion. Mrs. Louisa Woodman moved the previous question.

People wished more discussion, so she withdrew her motion.

Mr. Ford did not wish to leave out the words "except salaries" in his amendment.

Mrs. Louisa Woodman made an amendment to Mr. Ford's motion that the words 'except salaries' be eliminated from his amendment to the Budget Article.

Seconded by Mr. Wilfred Cunningham. SO VOTED.

Mr. Ford's amendment making the Budget figure \$1,296,000 PASSED AS AMENDED.

ARTICLE 5 PASSED with the figure of \$1,296,000 to be raised and appropriated. Mr. Richard Stone asked that the Moderator take the sense of the meeting on the subject of sewers. How many want \$100,000 spent on sewer extension? OPINION OVERWHELMINGLY IN FAVOR OF NO CUT IN SEWER APPROPRIATION.

ARTICLE 6. PURCHASING PROPERTY ON HACKETT LANE AND MOORE AVENUE.

Mr. Victor Lessard moved that Article 6 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Mr. Ashton Norton. Alternatives were discussed. Mr. O. Raymond Garland asked the valuation of the 8 houses affected. Reply: \$100,630. Mr. Lessards' motion was passed.

ARTICLE 7. ADDITION MONEY FOR MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC.

There is \$1,000 in the regular budget for this purpose. Article 7 is a request for \$1,000 in addition. Recommended by Budget Com. Mr. David Reynolds moved that Article 7 be accepted as read. Seconded by Edward Dunahm. SO VOTED.

ARTICLE 8. WATER FOR INDUSTRIAL PARK.

Attorney Wilfred L. Sanders, Jr. spoke in favor of Article 8. He said that we need to broaden the tax base in Hampton. Business needs water where it is located. Industry in Hampton will not lower taxes, but it will help to hold the line.

Mr. Sanders then made the following amendment to Article 8: "That Article 8 be amended by placing a comma after 95 and adding the following: however, such sum shall not be expended until a business or industry has made a firm commitment to locate in said Industrial Park Vicinity, and further, such sum will be expended only upon approval of the Board of Selectmen upon the recommendation of Hampton Industrial Development Committee." Seconded by Mr. Cousens. Long discussion.

Mr. Sanders' amendment to Article 8 was amended by Mrs. Louisa Woodman to add "The funds for the water line to be spent within 5 years or returned to the town to reduce taxes. Seconded by Robert Bridle. Mr. Robert Bridle moved that the factories or business that comes to Hampton must reimburse the town as business locates here.

Seconded by Ronald Bridle. Mr. G. Dignam moved the previous question.

This amendment did NOT PASS. So Voted.

Judge Perkins said that when the water line goes in it then belongs to the Water Company.

Article 8 as amended by Wilfred L. Sanders, Jr. and Mrs. Louisa Woodman was voted upon.

The Moderator called for a Poll of the House. Tellers appointed were George Hardardt and Roland Paige.

RESULT OF VOTE ON ARTICLE 8 AS AMENDED: YES - 157. NO - 125.

Passed as amended.

ARTICLE 9. REGIONAL PLANNING

Mr. Wilfred R. Cunningham moved adoption of Article 9 as read. Seconded. SO VOTED.

ARTICLE 10. LAND FOR THE DUMP

Mr. Victor Lessard moved to indefinitely postpone Article 10. Seconded by Mr. Edward Dunham.

Discussion, and complaint concerning the dump followed.

Manager Cole said that it was not fair to people living in the area to have the dump so near their homes. Need land.

Motion to indefinitely postpone was DEFEATED.

MOTION by Mr. W. Cunningham to adopt Article 10 as read. Seconded by Mr. Frederick Carleton. SO VOTED.

ARTICLE 11. DISPOSITION OF COAST GUARD

STATION

MOTION by Mr. Roland Paige that Article 11 be adopted as read. Seconded by Mr. Francis McNeil.

Numerous opinions were expressed regarding use of the Coast Guard Station or land.

Mr. Robert Mondor moved the previous question. Seconded. SO VOTED. Mr. Paiges motion was defeated.

ARTICLE 11 NOT PASSED.

ARTICLE 12. CONTINUATION OF SIDEWALK

MOTION by Mr. Kenneth Malcolm that Article 12 be voted as read.

Seconded by Chief Paul Long.

Article 12 was PASSED with only 3 persons voting in opposition.

MODERATOR EXPLAINED THAT ARTICLES 13, 14 and 15 were not recommended by the Budget Committee, and must be indefinitely postponed. (Money included in Budget).

ARTICLE 13. SEWER FOR MACE ROAD, NORTON ROAD AND HOBBS ROAD.

MOTION by Mr. Wilfred Cunningham that Article 13 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Mr. F. Carleton. SO VOTED.

Mr. Russell McGuirk appealed the ruling of the Moderator.

Upon vote of the assembly the voters denied Mr. McGuirk's appeal.

ARTICLE 14. SEWER FROM ELMWOOD CORNER TO 332 WINNACUNNET ROAD.

Mr. W. Cunningham moved that Article 14 be indefinitely postponed.

Seconded by Mr. William Elliot. SO VOTED.

Mr. Russell wished to go on record as reserving the right to appeal decision of the Moderator.

Article 14 was indefinitely postponed.

ARTICLE 15. EXTENDING SEWER LINES NORTHERLY ON MILL ROAD.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved indefinite postponement of Article 15. Seconded by Mr. William Elliot. SO VOTED.

Mention was made of wells of the Hampton Water Works Co. in the above area, and drainage of sewer in their direction. Mr. V. Lessard suggested that the Board of Health look over the situation.

ARTICLE 16. DRAINAGE FOR HACKETT LANE AND MOORE AVENUE.

Mr. V. Lessard moved adoption of Article 16 as read. Seconded by Mr. Ashton Norton.

Price given for the above work in 1968 was \$85,787.50.
Question – is \$80,000 enough?

MOTION by M . A. Norton to increase the amount of money in Article 16 to \$88,000. Seconded.

It is necessary to drain over land belonging to the Boston and Maine railroad to do this project. Permission must be obtained from them.

MOTION by Mr. Robert Bridle that a firm commitment from the RR for permission to use their property be obtained before any funds be expended. Seconded. SO VOTED.

Mr. Norton's amendment increasing amount of money to \$88,000 was passed.

ARTICLE 16 PASSED AS AMENDED.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham urged all voters to attend School Meetings. Sixty-four per cent of the money raised in Hampton goes to Schools.

ARTICLE 17. PAY FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT

This article was NOT recommended by the Budget Committee.

Mr. W. Cunningham moved indefinite postponment of Article 17.

Seconded by Mr. Kenneth Malcolm. SO VOTED.

ARTICLE 18. PROVISION FOR INJURED POLICE OFFICERS

Mr. Francis McNeil spoke in favor of Article 18, saying that the pay in the Police Department was insufficient. The purpose of Article 18 is to protect police officers families.

Mr. John Dineen spoke in favor of this article.

Mr. R. Bridle asked if full pay would include workmen's compensation.

Mr. David Reynolds replied that the Emplouer had to pay full wages.

Generally there is an agreement with the employee to re-imburse the town. Time of payment does not exceed one year.

Mr. Gerald French asked if the Fire Department had been considered.

Selectman Langley reminded the voters that passage of Article 18 would establish a precedent.

MOTION by Mr. John Dineen that Article 18 be passed as read. Seconded. SO VOTED.

ARTICLE 19. SALE OF LIQUOR IN RESTAURANTS

Mr. George Hardardt moved that Article 19 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. SO VOTED.

MODERATOR Casassa announced that Articles 20 through 37 appear on the Non-Partisan Ballot.

ARTICLE 38. APPLYING FOR AID FOR SEWAGE FACILITIES.

MOTION by Mr. W. Cunningham to adopt Article 38 as read.

Seconded. SO VOTED.

ARTICLE 39. OTHER BUSINESS

Mr. Fred A. White, Jr. wished the assembly to express appreciation to the ladies of the Baptist Church who prepared the lunch, and to the young people who assisted with the microphones.

MOTION to adjourn was made by Mr. F. Carleton. Seconded by Mr. Moore. SO VOTED. Meeting adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cafetorium of the Hampton Academy Junior High School on Tuesday the ninth day of March, 1971, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by NON-PARTISAN Ballot, one Selectman for three years; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, and one Collector of Taxes for one year; four members of the Municipal Budget Committee for three years, and one member of the Municipal Budget Committee for one year.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year. (The Polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to accept, administer, or sell any Real Estate acquired through tax deeds; any sale to be at Public Auction or by requesting sealed bids therefor with reserve.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Municipal Budget Committee, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,478,914.00.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,900 as the town's share of Regional Planning studies to be conducted by the Southeast New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These monies will be used for financing planning studies which must be approved by the Regional Planning Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. (Based on 60 cents per capita.)

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing a parcel of land owned by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lamprey, and located east of the town's present landfill and further described on a plan prepared by Chester A. Leach, C.E.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be known as the Industrial Water Fund for the purpose of installing a water line to service the proposed Industrial Park in the vicinity of Towle Farm Road and Interstate Highway 95. (Funds appropriated in 1970 to be deposited in a savings account until adequate access to area can be obtained, but not for more than four more years.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the purpose of installing a Burglary/Robbery alarm system at the Town

Office.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 in additional support of the Great Bay Association for Retarded Children to be utilized at the Great Bay School and Training Center in Newington, N.H.

(Submitted without recommendation)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to order a 1250 G.P.M. fire pumper, and to further see if the town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed thirty-nine thousand nine hundred dollars (\$39,900) through the issuance of notes upon credit of the town, and will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate, and issue such notes, and to fix the rate of interest, and all other terms thereof, and to take such other action as may be required to effectuate the purpose of this vote in accordance with the provisions of Municipal Finance Act, RSA Chapter 33 and any amendments relating thereto. (The purpose of this article is to allow the Town to order the fire pumper which will require in excess of one year for delivery. A request will be made next year under the Capital Budget Program to appropriate these funds.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

Article 12. On petition of Daniel H. Bryant and 13 other legal voters to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for the purpose of installing a blinking caution light at the intersection of High Street known as Five Corners.

(Submitted without recommendation)

Article 13. On petition of Kenneth C. Woods and fifteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$16,000 to extend the sewerage system along Winnacunnet Road from the Elmwood Corner to 332 Winnacunnet Road.

(Not recommended by Budget Committee.)

Article 14. On petition of Robert W. Bridle and 33 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900 to print the new assessed revaluation of resident and non-resident property taxes, with address of the owners. The last such book having been printed in 1956. These books to be completed not later than October 1st, and a copy of same to be delivered to the home of every resident taxpayer as soon as possible upon delivery to the Selectmen's office. Three hundred extra copies to be available on the first come basis at \$2.00 each, for other interested parties.

Article 15. On petition of Lucille P. Batchelder and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the town will appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to defray the costs of Seacoast New Hampshire Call-Me Inc.

Hutchinson and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the town will vote to convey all its right, title and interest, and to remove the dedication of a street as shown on sub-division plan of lots for John E. Hines and John J. Walsh, Hampton, N.H. filed May 8, 1953 by John W. Durgin, Civil Engineers, described as follows: Beginning at a point at the land of Marion Elwell at the Southwesterly corner of Lot No. 26, thence running South 26 deg. 37' West a distance of 49.75 feet to land of Ray P. Hutchinson (Lot No. 15); thence turning and running North 26 deg. 54' West a distance of 66.51 feet to a point; thence continuing by said Hutchinson land

on a curve with a radius of 25 feet a distance of 39.27 feet to a point on Birch Road; thence turning and running along said Birch Road and Pine Road in an Easterly direction a distance of 65 feet to a point on the Westerly sideline of Lot No. 26; thence turning and running along said Lot No. 26 South 26 deg. 54' East a distance of 60 feet, more or less to the point of beginning. Said dedication being included on the above entitled recorded plan but not being used as a road now or planned on in the future.

Article 17. On petition of Samuel A. Towle and forty-two other legal voters of the Town of Hampton; to see if the Town of Hampton will vote to adopt the following article:

Citizens of Hampton believe that it was the intention of Hampton's greatest benefactor, the "Honorable Edward Tuck", that the Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association Inc., would always be part of our Town's heritage and would be preserved by the Town. Therefore, it is proposed that the Town adopt and accept said Historical Association and the Association shall hereafter be exempt from payment of Town Taxes.

Any funds received by said Association shall be retained by the Association and shall be used to maintain and improve said property.

Said Association shall be self-governing and shall be responsible for all obligations incurred. This Association may not dispose of any land or buildings without permission of the Town.

The President of the above Association shall be required to file a report once a year with our Board of Selectmen. This report shall become part of our Town Records.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to convey to Mrs. E. Ruth Perkins of Dearborn Avenue, Hampton,

the following described tract of land: A certain parcel of land situated in the Town of Hampton, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, and located about 925 feet Southerly from Ann's Lane and about 375 feet Easterly from Dearborn Avenue but not abutting on either of the above mentioned ways. This parcel is more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the Southeasterly corner of the parcel being conveyed said corner being also the Northwesterly corner of a certain parcel of land being conveyed at this time from the Grantee to the Grantor. Thence along the following courses and abutters:

Northwesterly 84 feet, more or less, along a continuation in the same direction as the Northeasterly boundary of aforementioned land being conveyed from the Grantee to the Grantor and along other land of the Grantor. Northeasterly 27 feet, more or less, along other land of the Grantee. Southeasterly 74 feet more or less, along other land of thyGrantee. Southerly 26 feet, more or less, along other land of the Grantee to the point of beginning.

All to be as shown on a certain Drawing entitled "Sketch of land in Hampton, New Hampshire, E. Ruth Perkins and Town of Hampton", dated March 1971 to be filed herewith.

The said E. Ruth Perkins, to convey to the Town of Hampton the following described tract of land:

A certain parcel of land situated in the Town of Hampton, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire and located about 950 feet Southerly from Ann's Lane and about 425 feet Easterly from Dearborn Avenue but not abutting on either of the above mentioned ways. This parcel is more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the Easterly corner of the parcel being conveyed said corner being also the Southwest corner of land now or formerly of Robert W. Fitz, et al. thence along the following courses and abutters:

Westerly 80 feet, more or less, along other land of the Grantor, Northerly 51 feet, more or less, along other land of the Grantor. Southeasterly 79 feet, more or less, along other land of the Grantee to the point of beginning.

All to be as shown on a certain drawing entitled "Sketch of land in Hampton, New Hampshire, E. Ruth Perkins and Town of Hampton" dated March 1971 to be filed herewith.

The purpose of the two above conveyances is to straighten out the Northerly end of High Street Cemetery line and the two tracts containing exactly the same, namely 1,960 square feet. A plan showing the two tracts is on file in the Hampton Town Offices.

Article 19. On petition of Robert V. Lessard and 18 other legal voters: to see if the town will vote that the purchase of any piece of equipment costing four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars or more should be voted only by a Special Article.

****Article 20.** On petition of Fred A. White, Jr. Francis Fitzgerald and 108 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to place the following question before the voters as provided by RSA Chapter 41:8 "Are you in favor of increasing the Board of Selectmen to five (5) members?"

***Article 21.** To place the following question before the voters as provided in RSA Chapter 156-A "Are you infavor of the adoption of the Fire Prevention Code (1970 Edition) as proposed by the Planning Board?"

***Article 22.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell by private sale the land just west of Bashby Road, and South of the Exeter-Hampton Expressway by requesting sealed bids therefor, with reserve.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey a right-of-way from Academy Avenue over town land north of the Lane Memorial Library, for the purpose of ingress and egress to land occupied by the Hampton National Bank. (No expenditure for the construction of said right-of-way will be required by the Town, and the right-of-way will terminate in the event the land is required for any future Town use as determined by the Board of Selectmen.)

***Article 24.** To see if the Town will enact a By-Law in accordance with R.S.A. 31:39 for the care, protection, preservation and use of the public parks and beaches of the town as follows:

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE USE OF HAMPTON PARKS AND BEACHES.

Alcoholic beverages are prohibited.

Sleeping during nighttime hours is not permitted.

Plaice Cove and Seabrook Beaches are closed to all public use between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m.

Fires shall not be permitted on the beaches. Fires are permitted on town parks only after securing permit from the Fire Department.

Dogs are not permitted on town beaches, in the water, or on town parks with the exception that properly leashed dogs may be permitted on town parks as long as they are properly controlled, and do not constitute a nuisance.

All waste and trash must be placed in containers provided or removed with owner.

In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all reasonable requests made by lifeguards and park supervisory personnel.

No mini bikes or other motorized vehicles are permitted on town parks or beaches.

Residents and taxpayers of the Town of Hampton

shall have priority in use of tennis courts.

PENALTY

Any person violating any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$15.00 nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars for each offense.

EFFECTIVE

If any section or part of a section, or paragraph of this By-Law is declared to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections, or part of a section or paragraph of this By-Law, it shall not invalidate the remaining sections of this By-Law.

***Article 25.** To see if the Town will vote to amend the regulations regarding public dumps which were adopted March 14, 1967 by striking out paragraph 5 thereof and inserting in its place a new paragraph 5 as follows:

5. Any person, firm, or corporation not a legal resident or real property owner of the Town of Hampton shall not be permitted to enter or use any public dump within said town.

***Article 26.** To see if the town will vote to amend the Town of Hampton By-Law adopted by the Town Meeting in March 1967 as amended, which controls the running of dogs at large without a leash by amending the penalty provision to read as follows:

Any person violating any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be subject to a find not less than fifteen dollars (\$15.00) nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) for each offense.

***Article 27.** On petition of George S. Downer and 19 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton: to see if the town will vote ~~to~~ amend its lease with the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, Inc. to allow alcoholic

beverages to be sold in first-class restaurants after said restaurants have complied with the regulations of the State of New Hampshire Liquor Commission and have been duly approved and licensed by the State of New Hampshire Liquor Commission.

***Article 28.** On petition of Paul I. Surprenant and nineteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the Town of Hampton will vote to amend its lease with the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, Inc. to allow malt beverages (beer) to be sold in grocery stores after said stores have complied with the regulations of the State of New Hampshire Liquor Commission and have been duly approved and licensed by the State of New Hampshire Liquor Commission.

***Article 29.** On petition of Arnet R. Taylor and twenty-four other legal voters in the Town of Hampton: to see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted March 8, 1949 and amended at subsequent Town Meetings to rezone from the Business District to RESidential A District, the following area:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Lafayette Road at the junction of the northerly side of Drakeside Road, then proceeding in a northerly direction along said Lafayette Road for a distance of three hundred feet to a point, thence turning and running westerly parallel to Drakeside Road to the Land of the Boston and Maine Railroad, thence turning southerly and following the land of said Railroad to and across said Drakeside Road a distance of 300 feet from the southerly sideline of Drakeside Road to a point, thence turning and running easterly parallel to Drakeside Road to the westerly side of Lafayette Road, thence turning and running northerly to the point of beginning.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

***Article 30.** To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and

amended at subsequent Town Meetings; to add to Article V, Section 8, the following:

In all districts where neither public water nor sewer serves a given lot, the minimum total area requirement will be 40,000 square feet, notwithstanding other provisions of the Zoning Ordinance.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

***Article 31.** To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to change Article VI, Section 1 by substituting the following in place of paragraph two: The owner of such property shall apply to the Building Inspector, such application to include the following:

(a) A detailed plan of the proposed work.

(b) An accurate plot plan showing to scale the size and location of all the proposed structures and all the existing structures on the site, and distances from lot lines, and it shall be drawn in accordance with a certified boundary line survey. In the case of demolition, the plot plan shall show all structures to be demolished and the location and size of all existing buildings and structures that are to remain on the site or plot. The foregoing will not normally be required in the case of an addition which has less than 30% of the existing building area on the ground and in which case the requirements may be waived by the Building Inspector.

(c) A parking plan in accordance with Article IV-B. The Building Inspector shall inspect all buildings or structures during construction or alteration to see that the provisions of this ordinance are complied with, and he shall be responsible for enforcement of the plumbing code of the State of New Hampshire, revised laws 1942, and enforcement of the National Electrical Code, as published by the National Board of Underwriters, and whenever, in his opinion, the provisions of this ordinance are not complied with, he shall order such work in violation to be stopped until the violation has been remedied and shall forthwith report such violations

to the Selectmen for appropriate action.

(Recommended by Planning Board)

***ARTICLE 32** To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, to add to Article VI, Section 2, the following: Any person who commences work on the erection or alteration of any building or structure without first obtaining a building permit in accordance with the preceding section shall be subject to the penalties as provided in Article 1, Section 2 of this ordinance, however, the Building Inspector may, in his discretion, allow the late filing of a building permit application in accordance with the preceding section and a double permit fee shall be paid upon approval of said building permit application.

(Recommended by Planning Board)

***Article 33.** To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to add Section 12 to Article V as follows:

Section 12. Certificates of Occupancy.

1. Occupancy Permits for Existing Units. No home, apartment, tenement, dwelling unit, or other premises shall be let, leased, or otherwise permitted to be occupied for residential and/or dwelling purposes between the period from October 15 in each year to May 1st in each year, until and unless a Certificate of Year-Round Occupancy has been issued by the Building Inspector to the recorded owner of such premises. All other dwellings shall be used only on a seasonal basis between May 1st and October 15th and for periods not exceeding three successive days between October 15 and May 1st.

This article shall not be applicable to premises occupied by the record owner thereof or members of his family on the effective date of this article if said premises are then being occupied for year round habitation, but notwithstanding anything hereinbefore set forth in this paragraph, the provisions of the National Building Code shall control and take precedence.

2. The owner of such property shall apply to the Building Inspector for a Certificate of Occupancy on the form provided for that purpose.

3. In considering and approving such application, it shall be the primary concern of the Building Inspector to preserve the public health, safety and welfare. To this end, the approval of any such application shall include appropriate conditions and safeguards in harmony with the general purpose and intent of this ordinance and particularly with regard to the following:

(1) Safe and adequate ingress and egress.

(2) Minimum habitable living area to meet requirements for new construction.

(3) Adequate construction to provide sufficient protection from the elements.

(4) Proper installation of heating, plumbing, water, sewerage and lighting facilities in accordance with the National Building Code and National Electric Code.

4. At such time as subject dwelling conforms with appropriate Town and State Health laws, sanitary laws and regulations, building code, fire and life safety codes and Zoning Ordinance the Building Inspector shall issue an appropriate certificate of occupancy.

5. The Building Inspector may revoke any certificate of occupancy, should the premises or the occupancy no longer conform to the requirements of the Town or State health and sanitary laws and regulations, the Building Code, the Zoning Ordinance, or any other applicable law. Notice of revocation shall be mailed to the record owner of the premises at his last known address or posted on the premises if there is no last known address, at least seven days prior to actual revocation. If the premises or the occupancy thereof are made to conform prior to revocation, the certificate of occupancy shall continue in full force and effect.

6. The Building Inspector shall issue a certificate of occupancy in or within 5 days from receipt of proper application therefore if the premises conform to the proper requirements. Pending issuance of the certificate of occupancy the Building Inspector may issue a temporary certificate of occupancy when it appears from application submitted by the record owner that the premises would meet the proper requirements. Such temporary certificate of occupancy shall continue in full force and effect until issuance or denial of a certificate of occupancy. If after the issuance of a temporary certificate of occupancy, a certificate of occupancy is denied the record owner, the issuance of the Temporary Certificate of Occupancy in the first instance shall not be construed in any manner so as to make the continued occupancy of the premises lawful.

7. Definitions.

(1) Premises shall mean any home, apartment, tenement, dwelling unit or other structure designed or used for habitation.

(2) Record owner shall mean that person or entity who from the records of the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds, is the title holder of the premises.

8. Validity.

Partial invalidity of any section, or part thereof, of this article shall not affect the validity of the remainder thereof.

(Recommended by Planning Board)

*Article 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
