The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Hampton:

This Annual Town Report summarizes the activities of your Municipal government for the year ending December 31, 1971. The activities described herein reflect the manner in which policies established by the Town at Town Meetings and the Board of Selectmen, as representatives of the people of the town, were carried out during the three hundred thirty-second year of incorporation as a Town and eighteenth year of operation under the Selectmen-Manager form of government.

The most dramatic development this past year has been the desirability of Hampton as a location for multi-family housing accommodations. The number of dwelling units for which building permits have been issued, combined with those projects now planned by developers, together with the apparent rapid change in character of our Beach Seasonal Business and Recreational District into year-round accommodations, is and will continue to have a very large impact upon the character and growth of this community.

Although the proposed changes to the Zoning Ordinance will help if enacted, these proposals exclude the area of town that has the highest potential for change in character. The guidelines established, or lack thereof, will be something that continues to provide a base from which the community must proceed. The soundness of this base will not only be reflected in future operations, the resultant character of the community, but the cost of operations as our tax rate develops.

This community is entering an era when a very high degree of ability, dedication, professional skill and leadership, and public concern; interest and responsibility will be required in order to maintain a rational, upright course to keep our community as the desirable habitation we all now enjoy. Growth can be a deteriorating process or it can be an opportunity to develop. Development will result only as people willingly set aside personal gain and goals in favor of the community goal and interests.


Let us all work together with renewed enthusiasm meeting the challenge that lies ahead.



# To The Citizens of Hampton:

The acceleration in our population increase together with the complexities of local government resulting from this increased density is pointed out this past year when within a two weeks period of time building permits were requested for multi-family dwellings totalling 382 units. This can also be seen from the one hundred percent increase in value of construction as determined through the issuance of building permits by comparing the two million three hundred thousand in 1970 with the four million five hundred thousand value of construction permits issued in 1971. In addition building requests are now pending on a possible additional two hundred sixty multi-family dwelling units. Considering only this in our past years' development would make our growth somewhat outstanding. Together with this growth our community is faced with comparable challenges that must be met on a continuing basis.

Some of the efforts of this past year are briefly recorded here for your information whereas some of the efforts will be forthcoming as programs and requests for this present year and future years to come. Considerable planning has been accomplished through the Capital Improvement Program which ultimately is translated into dollars and cents in a Capital Budget.

This year's Capital Budget has again been developed from consideration of our capital needs, arranged in priority and scheduled on a financial program that will have a uniform tax effort. The program as scheduled for 1972 and the years thereafter, without considering any increased tax base, revenues, or savings in maintenance or operating costs, would have the effect of increasing the tax rate by about thirty-five

cents. The programs under consideration for this years budget are the uptown fire pumper, the sewer construction program (\$100,000 per year), Landing Road Interceptor, Lafayette Road Interceptor, Secondary Treatment Design, Town Hall (including District Court, Juvenile Court, uptown Fire Station, and offices now in Town Hall and Martel Building) and Police Station alterations and expansion. We feel that this program is one of the major vehicles whereby we will be able to maintain the Municipal portion of our tax/service effort on a reasonable basis.

A chart showing a history between 1968 and 1971 of the



budget (operating and capital), and the source of funds for the budget is included in this report. It should be noted that twice during this period the cost of the town's (as opposed to the School District and Cooperative School District) operations had the effect of reducing the tax rate. It is assumed that the ideal would be for the rate to increase at the average cost of living rise with new or increased sources of revenue paying for added services needed. Following is a five year history of the tax rate:

One of the reasons the chart comparison, on the preceding page of this report, is quite remarkable is the low rate of the operating budget increase considering the added services implemented during this period. An assessor, building inspector, five firemen, six policemen, one public works employee and a dog officer were all added to the town payroll. Furthermore, the town began supporting a retirement system, Regional Planning activities, home health nursing activities. reconstruction of our fire alarm system, and a fire prevention and inspection program. Also a capital improvement budget was implemented with 100,000 per year being allocated for sewer construction as well as funds for other major fixed needs. The cost of living, construction and operations over this period is also a factor that must be considered. Even though the picture shown is remarkable, it is evident that the funds allocated were not sufficient to support the programs desired. If we are to retard the tax rate increase, sufficient funds must be allowed on an annual basis to allow for the flexibility necessary to maintain our operations on a programmed and efficient manner. Otherwise the tax rate increase will be disproportionately high.

Major projects undertaken during this past year include the following:

(1) Sewer General Plan. Contract was signed March 15, 1971 with the report due January 10, 1972. Total

- cost of this project could reach \$30,250 for the borings, survey and report.
- (2) Surfside Park Sewer-Design Phase. Contract signed July 7, 1971 with design completed November 7, 1971. Cost of design, surveys, borings and cadastral work could reach \$12,650.
- (3) Winnacunnet Road Sewer Construction. Construction commenced September 13, 1971 and was completed the first of November. The cost of this project was \$41,650.
- (4) Landing Road Interceptor Design. Contract was signed May 19, 1971 with the cost of design, surveys, borings and cadastral work up to \$13,000.
- (5) Warner Lane Sewer Construction. Construction commenced on July 16, 1971. Project was completed this fall. Total project cost reached \$66,000. Ledge excavation costs of \$17,000 resulted in excess costs on this project.
- (6) Hackett Lane Storm Drain Construction. Work commenced in June and has continued according to contract requirements. Final installation of pumps and pumping station hardware will complete project. Project estimated cost will approximate \$82,000.
- (7) Winnacunnet Road Reconstruction. This is a town road aid project utilizing State matching funds. Design has been completed by the State Department of Public Works & Highways. Right-of-way work is now under way by the town. Project is now scheduled for construction in the spring of 1972 at an estimated project cost of \$186,000.
- (8) Lafayette Road Interceptor Design. Contract was signed in December, 1971. Design, surveys, borings and cadastral work could approximate \$10,100. This project is as a result of the Sewer General Plan findings and a continuation of the Landing Road Interceptor Project.

The preliminary results of the Sewer General Plan very clearly points out the need for a well planned comprehensive program of community development that precludes the community from growing and developing in a haphazard manner. The consequences of continuing in a similar manner as in the past could be very detrimental to the orderly growth of the town. More continuity must be developed between the Town Meeting, Budget Committee, Planning Board and Selectmen if proper development both physical and financialis to be forthcoming. The problem isn't knowing what should be done, its getting the financial programs approved that would implement the programs.

The reconstruction of the Landing Road and Lafayette Road Interceptors are now critical needs for this community. This system services nearly the entire uptown area and is now inadequate to handle the load existing on the line. In order to receive State and Federal aid (90 to 95%) we must undertake secondary sewerage treatment. These needs will be reflected in this year's financial program.

Municipal accounting procedures were considerably updated this year when the town agreed to purchase a 36 Modular Accounting Machine. This year is the first year that the Selectmen's accounts have been maintained by the Selectmen through the Town Manager's office, and is also the first year that precise records have been able to be maintained and balanced. This accounting machine simultaneously writes checks, posts ledger cards, prepares a Warrant, and provides a proof of checks and postings. Besides reducing the work required to be performed by the Town Treasurer by eliminating the duplication of records maintained by the Treasurer and the Town Office, the entire bookkeeping procedure can now be completed with precise accuracy in just one-third of the time that was previously required to perform the same functions. Although there are still refinements that can and should be made, the transition to a badly needed substantial and adequate bookkeeping system was implemented this year. Further refinements are needed and proposed for this coming year. These refinements are proposed by the addition of a bookkeeper who would also relieve financial administrative burdens from department supervisory personnel and be available to assist the Tax Collector and others on a part time basis.

The change in policy relative to the administration of

town leased land has resulted in substantial advantage and increased equity in the overall administration of the financial distribution of expenses for services rendered. The lease rental provisions within the lease signed between the Town and the individual lessees on all town-owned land with the exception of those under the 99 year lease between the Town of Hampton and the Hampton Beach Improvement Company is now based upon a scale that more favorably compares to the amount of rent that would be collected were this land privately owned and taxes were being paid by the private owner. The rental charge is now established and equal to the number of dollars that results from multiplying the current assessed valuation of the land times the last current prior years tax rate. This rental charge is due on April 1 of each year. In addition, the policy was established that the 32 lots in question within the area leased to the Hampton Beach Improvement Company under the 99 year lease be taxed. The reasoning behind the adoption of this policy was the consideration that this course of action would (1) provide an immediate source of revenue to the Town that would, over the duration of the remaining portion of the lease be equal to the value of the property under which the title was in question, and (2) that this course of action would, over the time remaining in the existing 99 year lease, settle the question as to title to this property and thus eliminate an unavoidable, expensive legal action against the 32 individual property owners. The commitment made to the Tax Collector for these lots, some of which were subdivided, totalled \$17,087.19. The current administration of leased land is felt to be quite equitable for all parties involved whereby each property, whether owned or leased is paying their fair share of the total services being rendered the town. There will be an article in this years Warrant that will establish this policy.

We will continue to do the best we can for the community with what funds are appropriated by the Budget Committee and Town Meeting, but we feel the current problems are but minor compared to the many problems that lie ahead, unless we as a town start appropriating the necessary funds now to implement these programs instead of thinking we can do all of the necessary projects without increasing the tax rate. In the final analysis the taxpayer through the Town Meeting will

determine in which direction they want the Board of Selectmen to go. The Board hopes the voters want the town to progress and not regress and will so indicate by a positive approach to our mutual problems.

Inspections relating to occupancy inspection programs:

The summer inspection program began on May 17, 1971 with six regular firefighters working in teams of two during off-duty time. These inspections required complete scale diagrams of the buildings, location of heating appliances, gas, electrical and water service, complete listing of ownership, and amount of people allowed in each unit used for habitation. Recommendations were made during this inspection for compliance with State and local regulations and laws. In many instances two or three reinspections were scheduled for the same properties before the violations were resolved. Our teams inspected sixty (60) buildings which contained eighty (80) occupancies in the resort area from Ashworth Avenue and Ocean Boulevard South to the south side of D Street.

Five licenses were issued for places of assembly that served liquor.

In addition to the above inspections, a foot patrol was established within the resort area on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights from 9:00 P.M. to 1:00 A.M. to check places of assembly, hotels, motels and rooming houses to assure

compliance with fire and life safety regulations during business hours. During this time all alleys were checked for accumulation of rubbish and other hazards that might cause a fire.

The total number of paid man-hours for summer inspections in 1971 was 975 hours at a cost of \$2,415.02. The remaining money voted for inspections was programmed for winter rental inspections for the balance of the year which included 21 buildings housing 50 living units. I believe that this program of inspection of buildings will reflect a general upgrading of existing facilities and building construction, together with a continued proportional decrease in fire loss in future years. This goal can only be achieved if the community is receptive to a continuing effort on an expanding basis as population and construction growth dictates.

# Training and Planning

A continuing program of training is well established within the Department. At the present time we have three qualified permanent firefighters accredited in the State Training Program. All permanent personnel have received certificates from the National Red Cross in advanced first aid, and we have programmed more formal education of supervisory personnel for the coming year. A total of 270 man hours of seminars and lectures during off-duty hours have been given with 95% of the personnel attending.

All personnel received 880 hours of inservice (on duty) training from January to December. The subjects covered include hydraulics, use of ladders, hose evolutions, hand tools, forcible entry equipment, resuscitator, building inspection, pump procedures, first aid and many other items too numerous to mention.

During this year the training division has written a procedure for every sprinklered building in Hampton, and has revised and improved our fire attack procedure used so effectively by this Department.

It is becoming more apparent as each year passes that the money invested in training and education of firefighters is returning a high dividend reflected in greater efficiency and decreasing amounts of large loss fires.

This report of 1971 reflects an ever increasing responsibility on your Fire Department in all phases of fire protection and life safety.

Rapid population expansion and building construction in our community demands expansion of all of our services, and increases our problems in maintenance of equipment, extension of fire alarm services, increased inspection and fire prevention programs, and replacement of damaged equipment used in emergencies.


As in past years, the Department has accepted the added responsibilities and will perform with the highest degree of efficiency consistent with the demands of our community.

#### ADMINISTRATION

Three additional police positions were added to the regular department#hisyear. Funding of these positions was in part by the U.S. Government Highway Safety Agency.

Promotion of three personnel to the rank of Sargent was made after competitive examinations were held. Robert E. Mark and Paul J. Cronin were promoted and in charge of a patrol shift and the Bureau of Criminal Investigation respectively. Joseph E. MacDonald was promoted and became the first full-time juvenile officer for the community. This position was partially funded by the Governors' Commission on Crime & Delinquency.

#### BUREAU OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION

For the year 1971 there was a decrease of 55 criminal complaints. At the same time 38 more complaints were solved than the previous year.

The following figures show a comparison of the listed activities over a four year period:

Arrests for drug violations increased from 97 in 1970, to 219 in 1971. Prosecution of the more serious violations for sale of drugs increased from five (5) in 1970 to nineteen (19) in 1971.

Continuing education in the drug field has been maintained by making the services of the department available in schools, community groups, as well as on an individual basis.

# **JUVENILE**

Again this year, we experienced a tremendous increase in Juvenile arrests, although our Juvenile Officer, Sgt. MacDonald, was able to clear the majority of these arrests within the homes, with the cooperation of the families of the young people involved.

#### TRAINING

During the past year three regular officers were sent to a five week training course at the New Hampshire Vocational Training Center in Portsmouth. This school covered all aspects in Law Enforcement. A six week In-Service Training School for all regular and special officers hired was held. Two officers attended an FBI School for one week on fingerprinting and classification of latent prints. Also, a First Aid Course was completed whereby 11 officers now hold an Advanced First Aid Certificate.

A continuing in-service training program on new procedures, new laws and the never ending Supreme Court Decisions is being maintained.

Patrolman Don A. Barnard and his dog, "Duke" were sent to a five week State Police K-9 Training School. The addition of this dog has greatly increased the effectiveness of this Department.

Many of our officers are attending Northeastern University in Boston and St. Anselm's in Manchester. The knowledge that these men receive has been very beneficial to this Department.

## SAFETY

Although this past year there was an increase of 38 accidents investigated, there was a decrease in the number of accidents involving personal injury. Our efforts in safety were recognized this year when the Town of Hampton was awarded a Pedestrian Safety Award for the year 1970.

During 1971 numerous surveys were conducted which resulted in many traffic signs being erected for the safety of all. This was done in cooperation with the Public Works Department.

Our Safety Officer, Sgt. MacDonald, gave many safety lectures and conducted numerous safety campaigns with the schools in Hampton.





#### SUMMARY

Statistics show an increase in most aspects of Law Enforcement in this community. We are doing our utmost in combating this increase and only with the continued assistance from the citizens of the Town of Hampton will we be able to effectively fight these problems.

I would like to thank the Selectmen, the Town Manager, the Chief of the Fire Department and the Director of Public Works for their cooperation during the year 1971.

#### PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Your Public Works Department consists of four (4) major sections: Waste Water Treatment Plant; Solid Waste Disposal; Maintenance Inspection and Quality Control; and Highway Maintenance and Construction.

# WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT

In 1971 we processed 430,826,000 gallons of waste water and 286 tons of solid waste (sludge). Our average summer daily flow was 1,763,000 gallons; our peak daily flow was 2,537,000 gallons.

Chlorinating our effluent is a continuing 24 hours a day process. This year we utilized 41 tons (82,000 lbs) of chlorine.

Regular and preventative maintenance was performed on all plant equipment, which is a continuing process each year.

## SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

Solid waste disposal (rubbish collection) is one of the most demanding jobs of the Public Works Department, and presents substantial difficulties in keeping men willing to undertake this type of work. Although the statement may seem to be repetitious in that I include it in my report each year, I will continue to do so as long as it is a fact.

Solid waste is continuing to increase, below is a four (4) year comparison of compacted cubic yard of rubbish collected:

1968 - 33,124 1969 - 35,246 1970 - 37,180 1971 - 42,171

Your Town Dump is continuing to be operated in a manner that has been a credit to our community, reducing the nuisance factor almost completely. We will strive to continue in this manner. This year we purchased a dump vehicle for \$26,220, and 10,473 cubic yards of gravel was used to cover the dump.

## MAINTENANCE INSPECTION & QUALITY CONTROL

During the year 400 plus catch basins were cleaned by hand and approximately 2,000 feet of storm drain line were cleaned and inspected.

This year this section rebuilt 6 catch basins, 6 manholes, and relaid 30 feet of existing drains.

The Lafayette Road storm drain was extended requiring 600 feet of 12" pipe and 4 catch basins.

There were 150 sewer entrances into the town sewerage system, each requiring two or more inspections. In addition 170 mains and/or laterals were located for contractors, water, gas, or telephone companies.

During the year 153 manholes were cleaned along with the flushing of our sewer mains, at the Beach and uptown. I might add here that due to increase in winter rentals at the Beach a year-round sewer flushing program has become necessary.

This year 4,143 feet of sewer mains were cleaned, surveyed and/or sealed. This work was accomplished by Penetryn, augmented by town employees.

This section is responsible for the inspection of all sewerage lines laid in town. They respond on a 24 hour basis to unusual conditions surrounding sewer and storm drainage plug-ups. This section was called out 37 times on sewer plugups, water breaks near sewer lines, and innumerable times for storm water flooding.

This section includes our mechanic and helper, they are responsible for the maintenance and preventative maintenance of our 38 pieces of equipment, 11 plows and 6 wings.

Maintenance of all town buildings is done on a continuing basis. This section is also responsible for janitorial services of all buildings. This year we replaced one section of wall in the Town Offices, new jack posts in the Martel Building, a new foundation under the front porch of the Martel Building and the back steps of the Town Office.

All town crosswalks and stop lines were painted twice this year, in addition we are now painting "Slow Children" in the roads at all of our schools.

The sidewalk at the intersection of High Street and Lafayette Road (Lane Block) was reconstructed this year.

Again, as always, street signs have been a big problem, 203 street signs were replaced this year. Numerous No Parking and traffic control signs were replaced.

This section has had added to its responsibility this year the supervision and enforcement of the driveway entrance permit requirements as passed by ordinance of the Board of Selectmen. This year 49 driveway permits were issued requiring three or more inspections per driveway, plus assistance in completing the driveway permit application.

Approximately 92,641 feet were seal coated in 1971. This was accomplished by a contractor with the necessary special equipment. All roads were prepared for sealing by this section.

The Island Path parking lot was extended 180 feet by 300 feet or 54,000 square feet. All work involved was done by this section except for the hiring of a grader.

Part time personnel are used to assist this section in maintaining seven (7) (including Tuck Field) parks and five (5) intersections. Mowing, trimming and raking and other maintenance activities require full time attention during the summer months.

Our records show that the town received 76 inches of snow this year. We supplement our 5 pieces of snow removal equipment with an average of 12 contracted or hired pieces. The total cost of hired equipment for 1971 was \$12,022.94. A three year comparison is as follows:

1969 - \$25,081.00 1970 - 10,476.05 1971 - 12,022.94

Our storm records show eleven [11] rain and freezing rain storms requiring the use of extensive amount of salt. This year we used 1,015 tons of salt.

Your Public Works Department will continue to do the best job we can, with the men and tools we have to work with, always keeping in mind that which is for the best interest of our town.



## BUILDING INSPECTOR



The Building Inspection Division consists of 2 full-time personnel, the Building Inspector and Health and Code Enforcement Officer (Assistant Building Inspector). The second position is completely funded under the Emergency Employment Act.

The total cost of construction for the year 1971 was \$4,527,692, an increase of \$2,214,745 from 1970. There were 434 building permits issued. The chart below shows a breakdown by months:

Twenty-two (22) building violations were discovered during the year 1971 representating a total valuation of \$26,205.00. This represents over 75% decrease in building violations during the same period in 1970.

Building permit fees collected for the year 1971 were \$16,466.50. Fees collected for the year 1970 were \$8.273.00.

The Building Inspector is a member of the New Hampshire Building Officials Association and attended the annual Municipal Building Officials Conference held at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst which provided 26 hours of concentrated instruction, tours and discussion relating to the building profession.

The Building Inspector attends all Planning Board meetings and Zoning Board of Adjustment meetings.

Implementation of the Certificate of Occupancy Ordinance relating to rentable property within the Town of Hampton is progressing satisfactorily in conjunction with the Fire Department inspection program.

This office will continue to improve its operations to better serve the needs of the community as in the past.

The third full year of operation of this office began with the appointment of Howard Promer to succeed Richard Huntsman as Assessor on January 25, 1971.

In 1971, the tax base increased in excess of two million dollars of assessed valuation over the prior year, as indicated in the following table.

A long-range program has been instituted to improve the services and purposes of this office through more detailed records. Already implemented is a system for better, neater and more readily accessible filing of tax maps. Other aspects of the program which are in progress at present but not yet completed include updating of property record cards to in-

clude a history of the owner's title and the compilation of a street directory for office use to facilitate more rapid replies to inquiries pertaining to locating properties by house numbers. Along thisline and in conjunction with the Town Engineer, this office was designated by the Board of Selectmen in 1971 as the agency for the assignment and correction of house numbering.

At the 1971 Town Meeting, it was voted to publish a listing of individual property valuations. Using the information compiled for the Assessor's office by the Town's data processing service bureau, the listing was published and made available to the public in November.

The inflationary real estate market has resulted in an erosion of the 100% valuations established during the 1968 revaluation of the Town. Of prime consideration to this office is the need for sales ratio studies to return present valuations to the full market value level. The record keeping procedures currently being undertaken will help implement this task in the near future.

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The Annual Town Meeting was held in the Junior High School Cafetorium March 9, 1971.

The Meeting was opened by Moderator H. Alfred Casassa, and the Invocation given by the Reverend Donald J. Rankin of the First Congregational Church.

By vote of the Annual School District Meeting in 1970 the Election of School District Officers is to be at the same time as that of the Town Officers, with separate Warrant, and separate Ballot. The Moderator of the Hampton School District. Carl C. Bragg, is also the Assistant Moderator of the Town.

Moderator Bragg read the Warrant for Election of School District Officers, and the Return. Articles 1, 2, 3, and 4. (RSA 197, Section 1 and 2)

Moderator H. Alfred Casassa read the Return of Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

MOTION by Mr. George Hardardt that the reading of the entire Warrant be waived, as it had been published and posted, was seconded by Selectman Walter Vanderpool and voted in the affirmative.

MOTION by Mr. George Hardardt that the Polls for voting remain open until 8:00 o'clock in the evening, seconded by Mrs. Helen Mullen was also voted in the affirmative.

The Moderator explained that Articles #23 through #33 appear on the Australian Ballot. Zoning Articles appear on the Ballot by State Statute. Others at the discretion of the Selectmen. He asked the approval of the assembly.

MOTION by Mr. G. Hardardt that Articles #20 through #33 he placed upon the Australian Ballot. Seconded by Selectman Vanderpool. So Voted.

No subject will be reconsidered except immediately following a vote, and before the next Article is taken up.

ARTICLE 1 and ARTICLE 2 are voted by Australian Ballot

# ARTICLE 3 BORROWING MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES.

Selectman Francis H. Fitzgerald moved that Article 3 be adopted as read. Seconded by Selectman Fred A. White, Jr. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 4. POWER TO SELL REAL ESTATE

Selectman Francis H. Fitzgerald moved that Article 4 be adopted as read. Seconded by Fred A. White, Jr. Mr. Peter Randall offered a substitution to Article 4, as follows:

"To see if the town will vote its approval for any sale of property acquired through tax deeds, except to the original owner or his heirs or assigns (the intent of this amendment is to require voter approval for the sale of any property acquired by this town through tax deed) Seconded by Miss Ruth Stimson.

Mr. George Hammond made an amendment to the substitution that the words "through public auction only" be added before the word 'intent'. Seconded by Miss Ruth Stimson. **So Voted.** 

Mr. Randall's substitution was read as amended. Tellers appointed: Roland Paige and Rev. Donald Rankin.

In favor: - 72 Opposed: - 47 Article 4 **passed** as amended.

#### ARTICLE 5. BUDGET

Mr. Ansell W. Palmer, Chairman of the Municipal Budget Committee gave the Report of the Committee, in full.

Gross budget recommended by the Municipal Budget Committee for 1971 expenditures is \$1,486,564 including three special articles: Regional Planning, Purchase of Dump Land, and a Town Office Burglary Alarm System, for a total amount of \$7,650. The anticipated income for 1971 is \$507,564. The net balance of the recommended budget over the anticipated income is \$979,000 which must be raised by taxes.

Some Capital Outlay Items listed in this year's budget are:

New Rubbish Packer \$14,000
Sewer Construction 100,000
Dump Vehicle 34,000
Special Article for Dump Land 2,000
Mrs. Janet Fitzgerald moved that the Budget be accepted as presented.

Seconded by Selectman Fred A. White, Jr.

Mr. White thanked the Budget Committee for their work, and explained the manner of preparation.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham made an amendment to "Advertising and Associations" increasing the amount to \$8,495. Seconded by Mr. Gordon Hollingworth.

Chairman Ansell Palmer said that the amount requested was cut by the Budget Committee in the hope that business people at the beach would contribute more to the Chamber of Commerce.

Vote on Cunningham's amendment:

Tellers: Mr. R. Paige and Rev. D. Rankin

In favor: - 100 Opposed: - 83

## Amendment Passed.

Mr. V. Lessard made the motion that the amount for new equipment be reduced from \$34,000 to \$20,000. Seconded by Mr. Wright.

Following discussion, Mr. V. Lessard moved the previous question.

Seconded my Mr. Edward Dunham. So Voted.

Tellers for vote on Amendment:

Mr. R. Paige and Rev. Rankin

In favor: - 63 Opposed: - 96

#### NOT Passed.

Mr. Wilson P. Dennett asked that the \$1,250 cut from the appropriation for the Visiting Nurse Association be put back into the Budget.

Seconded by Mrs. Barbara Neal.

Tellers: Mr. Paige and Rev. Rankin

In favor: - 73 Opposed: - 70

#### Amendment Passed.

Mr. Arthur Moody moved the previous question on Article 5 as amended.

Two thirds vote required. So Voted.

Article 5 was voted as amended in the amount of \$1,482,964.00

#### ARTICLE 6. MONEY FOR REGIONAL PLANNING

Selectman Francis Fitzgerald spoke in favor of Article 6 and said that this Region is composed of 18 towns, 10 of which are participating. It is advisable for a town to belong to the Regional Planning organization in order to be eligible for Federal Funds and State Grants. The Town may also draw upon the services of the Regional Planner for help. Mr. Fitzgerald moved the adoption of Article 6, seconded by Mr. Fred White. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 7. PURCHASE OF LAMPREY LAND

Article 7 read by the Moderator. Manager Norman Cole explained that the town has a comprehensive plan to acquire land for sanitary land fill. Last year 2.2 acres was purchased. The land in question is 2.8 acres easterly of that purchased last year. Sanitary land fill is the most desirable manner of taking care of rubbish as long as land is available. Mr. Cole moved that Article 7 be adopted as read. Seconded by Mr. Bertrand Roy. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 8. CAPITAL RESERVE FUND -

## INDUSTRIAL WATER FUND

Selectman Vanderpool explained that \$40,000 was appropriated for a water line to a possible Industrial District in 1970. It was not used, and that amount was carried in the General Fund. According to law it cannot be invested. Article 8 was proposed so that it may be transferred to a Capital Reserve Fund in order to derive interest for it, for 4 years only. He moved adoption of Article 8 as read. Seconded by Mr. Wilfred Cunningham.

Manager Cole proposed the following amendment: "after 95, "further such sum will only be expended upon recommendation of the Board of Selectmen and approval of the Industrial Development Committee.

Seconded by Selectman Fitzgerald. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 9. BURGLAR ALARM FOR TOWN OFFICE

Selectman Fred A. White, Jr. moved adoption of Article 9 as read.

Seconded by Mr. Kenneth Malcolm.

Motion was made by Mr. James Fallon that Article 9 be amended to increase the amount budgeted by \$300 to include protection by fire.

Seconded by Mr. K. Malcolm (Total \$1050)

Nearly unanimous vote in favor of amendment.

Article 9 passed as amended.

# ARTICLE 10. ADDITIONAL SUPPORT FOR GREAT BAY ASSOCIATION

Submitted by Budget Committee without recommendation.

Mr. Morton Page moved adoption of Article 10. Seconded by Edward Dunham.

So Voted.

# ARTICLE 11. ORDER A 1250 G.P.M. FIRE PUMPER (recommended)

This is a Bond Issue and requires a 2/3 vote.

Manager Cole moved passage of Article 11. Seconded by Mr. W. Cunningham.

Fire Chief Paul Long has recommended this piece of equipment for the past three years. It cannot be obtained until 1972 as it takes nine months to a year after ordering.

This article passed almost unanimously.

#### ARTICLE 12. CAUTION LIGHT AT FIVE CORNERS

Mr. Frank Nownes said that he agreed with the intent of the Article, but felt that a "blinking light" will not solve the problem. He suggested a traffic island at Five Corners. He amended Article 12 by adding the words "for the purpose of raised islands." Seconded by Mr. Arthur Moody.

After some discussion Mr. Vanderpool moved the previous question.

Seconded. So Voted. Mr. Nownes amendment was not passed.

Mr. Fred White moved that Article 12 be indefinitely postponed to allow the Board and the Chief of Police to study the question and bring in recommendations next year.

Mr. A. Moody said that the amendment to indefinitely postpone should be defeated.

Mr. Stephen Peiker made a substitution that \$1200 be used for traffic control of Five Corners as the Board of Selectmen see fit.

Seconded by Mr. James Fallon. Mr. John Taylor moved the previous question. Seconded. **So Voted.** Mr. Peiker's substitution was defeated.

The vote on Mr. White's amendment was 88 in favor, and 88 opposed.

The Chair voted to Indefinitely postpone.

Tellers counting this vote were: Mr. Peter Randall and Mr. Roland Paige.

# ARTICLE 13. SEWER FOR WINNACUNNET ROAD

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved indefinite postponement of this article, as money for this purpose is already voted in the budget.

Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 14. PUBLISHING OF ASSESSMENT RECORDS (Price \$1900)

(Submitted without recommendation.)

Motion by Mr. Ronald Bridle to adopt Article 14 as read. Seconded by Mr. Theodore Clough.

Board of Selectmen feel this Article should not pass. Amended by Mrs. Alton Brine to charge residents \$1.00 and non-residents \$2.00 per copy. Seconded. Mr. Howard Promer, Assessor, expressed the opinion that money spent for such a purpose was money thrown away. The Hampton Assessor's office needs additional record keeping equipment and we need a Street Book and a Title History which are not presently available.

Discussion. Mr. Peter Randall moved the previous question. Seconded. So Voted.

Tellers: Mr. P. Randall and Mr. Roland Paige Article 14 was voted as amended 118 in favor, and 74 opposed.

# ARTICLE 15. \$2,000 FOR SEACOAST NEW HAMPSHIRE CALL—ME INC.

This Article was not recommended by the Budget Committee, therefore it was indefinitely postponed.

#### ARTICLE 16. SALE OF LAND TO RAY P. HUTCHINSON

Article 16 read by the Moderator

Mr. Hutchinson showed a plan and explained his problem. The town has a dedicated strip of land, and Mr. Hutchinson would be glad to buy a strip of this land to prevent having to move his house. He moved passage of Article 16 as read. Seconded by Mr. Victor Lessard.

Manager Cole made an amendment "that the town reserve a right-of-way for a 20 foot easement through the property in question." Seconded by George Hardardt. (Hines and Walsh developed this area)

An Affadavit was given to Manager Cole this morning and recorded with the Town Clerk, stating that the proponents use the area as access to their property over this dedicated strip of land.

Judge John W. Perkins was asked if the Town had a right to convey this land to anyone. He replied that it was intended for a right-of-way and so mapped. If the town abandons this purpose the title goes back to the original owners.

Mr. Cole withdrew his amendment and Mr. Hardardt his second.

Mrs. Louisa Woodman amended Article 16 to read: "That the town removes its dedication from a portion of the right-of-way as shown on the plan displayed at Town Meeting, the same being a strip of land 19.27 feet wide, more or less, left of, and parallel to, land of Hutchinson, provided that said Hutchinson will pay the cost of re-location of any town drainage now located on the so described piece of land." Seconded. So Voted.

Discussion.

Mr. G. Hardardt moved the previous question. Seconded. So Voted.

Mrs. Woodman's amendment was passed. Article 16 **passed** as amended.

# ARTICLE 17. EXEMPTION OF TAXES ON HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION PROPERTY

Mr. Samuel A. Towle, President of the Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association, Inc. spoke in favor of this Article, and moved that it be adopted as read. Seconded by Mr. Arthur Moody. Discussion. Mr. Roland Paige moved the 'previous Question.' Seconded. So Voted. Article 17 was passed unanimously.

# ARTICLE 18. EXCHANGE OF LAND TO STRAIGHTEN HIGH STREET CEMETERY LINE

A sketch of the proposed two conveyances of land was shown. "Sketch of Land in Hampton, New Hampshire, E. Ruth Perkins and the Town of Hampton" dated March 1971. Mr. Roland Paige explained that the purpose was to straighten the High Street Cemetery Line. He moved that Article 18 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

# ARTICLE 19. PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT TO BE BY SPECIAL ARTICLE

Mr. Victor Lessard spoke in favor of this article, and moved that it be adopted as read. Seconded by Mr. Hubert Marney. The Selectmen advised Mr. Lessard that even if this article passed it would be merely advisory, not binding. The Budget procedure now used is good. This article did not pass.

duties efficiently, accurately, and honestly for a period of 9 years:

WE HEREBY request that this resolution be entered in the minutes of this Meeting and forever kept in Town Records as a public recognition of a job "Well Done."

**Signed:** Walter F. Vanderpool, Fred A. White, Jr. and Francis H. Fitzgerald, Selectmen of Hampton, New Hampshire.

Unanimously approved.

Mr. Robert Kmball said that in a number of Town Meetings around the State people were voicing their disapproval of a State Sales and/or Income Tax. He proposed the following resolution:

Mr. Arthur Moody moved that the Resolution be Indefinitely postponed.

Seconded by Mr. S. Peiker. So Voted.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HAMPTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR 1971

The past year has been a busy one for the Conservation Commission although much of our effort has been directed to one major project: the creation, distribution and compilation of a natural resources survey.

Details of the survey were released prior to the 1972 Town Meeting and copies are available from the Commission. But briefly, the survey indicated that Hampton Residents are concerned with the preservation of the local natural environment, particularly the tidal wetlands.

Approximately 1600 questionnaires were distributed throughout the town and 396 were returned, nearly 25%. A return of 13% is considered good by expert poll takers.

On questions asking if the town should seek to acquire and conserve the marshes, if a local ordinance should be passed to prohibit dredging and filling of the marsh, if specific boundries should be drawn to indicated maximum expansion of public facilities on the marsh and if the marshes should be zoned as flood plains, an overwhelming majority (76%) said yes.

Asked if marshes should be permitted to be filled back 75' from existing highways 77% said no. A like 77% favored requesting the abolition of the Hampton Municipal Development Authority, a state-enabled authority charged, in its initial plans, with filling some 60 acres between Hampton River and Hampton Beach for a seasonal housing development. Established primarily in the legislatures of '59 and '61, the Authority has expended some \$30,000 in town funds for planning and engineering studies but the Authority has been dormant since the mid-1960's and in more recent years has not made annual reports to the town regarding its actions.

When asked if the town should acquire upland open space

for future use as parks, cemeteries, schools or recreational facilities, 72% said yes. 78% l'avored increasing the minimum residential lot size to one acre, and 79% l'avored acquiring scenic easements along the Taylor River and Hampton River to preserve those shorelines.

Only 52% thought the town should have a garbage and rubbish sorting program, but 67% favored a waste recycling station in Hampton and 78% believe the town should investigate the possibilities of a regional solid waste treatment plant and its costs. 84% favored a sticker system to control the use of the town dump and 60% favored increased boat launching sites on Hampton River. 77% believe that the zoning ordinance should be changed to require buried utility wire in future developments and 81% feel that land should be taxed according to current use rather than the present method of assessing according to highest potential value.

While 70% were satisfied with the cleanliness of the town, 78% believe that the town should do more to preserve and identify its historic sites and landmarks. 88% said that the town should not sell or lease anymore land east of Rt. 1-A.

Since the people have so indicated their desires on conservation matters as indicated by the survey, the Commission believes that all town officials should reassess their current thinking on the subjects covered by the survey and the Commission looks forward to working with other town officials in carrying out the thoughts suggested by the questionnaire.

As has been the practice of the Commission in the past, we have been represented at numerous local and state public hearings. Of primary importance was the tidal wetlands bill heard in the last session of the Legislature, which we supported, and the hearings for the widening of I-95 which we opposed. The Commission was also represented at several conservation oriented conferences and seminars held throughout the state.

The Commission has been in correspondence with the Coast Guard and the General Services Administration regarding Coast Guard owned land at Hampton River near the Smith and Gilmore pier. It is hoped by the Commission that the town might acquire this strip for use as a public boat launching site on the river.

For the first time in several years, the Commission met with the Board of Selectmen for a discussion of conservation oriented issues of interest to both. The Commission intends to have further discussions with the Selectmen and with other town boards in the hopes that environmental concerns will play a greater roll in future town planning and development.

The Commission welcomes, comments, criticism, questions and suggestions from Hampton Residents on conservation matters.

The Seacoast Home Health Association, now in its third year, serves the towns of North Hampton, Hampton, Hampton Falls, and Seabrook.

We are very fortunate to have a cooperative, conscientious, and competent staff which includes:

Mrs. Frances Geary of Hampton Falls (part time)

A contract has been recently signed with the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center providing "speech therapy" for the few cases where it is needed.

Due to the increase in work Mrs. Cowdrey and Mrs. Larribee became full time nurses January first 1972.

Although our fiscal year does not coincide with that of the towns we serve (ours is July first) the following figures will help to evaluate the need for Visiting Nurses in the Seacoast Area.

Starting in May of this year we have been conducting a monthly Well Child Clinic that is sponsored by the State of New Hampshire. Here the children in the area can get a free physical examination and complete immunization. This is specifically for pre-school children, though we have finished immunization for some children just entering school, when the need was apparent. This type of clinic is greatly needed in our area as proved by the following:

At present we are following 109 children and have discharged 36 others who have received all their immunization and reached school age. During physical examination the physician has discovered defects in fourteen of the children that were serious enough to warrant referal to other state clinics, ie. Crippled Children's Clinic, Heart Clinic, etc. Twenty-three mothers have been referred to the Family Planning Clinic which is set up in Exeter and is also State sponsored.

We are following 9 patients in the area who have TB or are contacts, doing tuberculin testing and ordering medications as needed. These calls are made monthly to insure that the patient returns to the TB clinic for regular x-rays and adequate follow-up.

When this organization was formed the State of New Hampshire felt that there was a definite need in the Seacoast Area. They therefore allocated \$6,500, the first year to help us get started. Last year we received \$5,000 from the State. This year we have been advised that no more funds are available from that source. The income from Medicare has also been cut from approximately 80% coverage to less than 20%, and many of our patients are of Medicare age. With the increasing population in the Seacoast area, and no more help from the State it has been necessary to ask the four towns involved for larger appropriations.

No call is refused for inabilty to pay.

This is a vital Community Service, and we are here to help you.

# **TOWN WARRANT FOR 1972**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cafetorium of the Hampton Academy Junior High School on Tuesday the seventh day of March 1972, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

(Motion will be made to postpone business meeting, beginning with Article 2 through 17, 19, 20, 21, and 34, until 10 a.m. Saturday, March 11, 1972 at the Winnacunnet High School Auditorium. Articles 18, and 22 through 33 appear on the Australian Ballot and will be voted upon March 7th 1972.)

Article 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot, two Selectmen for three years; one Selectman for one year; one Town Clerk, one Treasurer, and one Collector of Taxes for one year each; four Members of the Municipal Budget Committee for three years, and one member of the Municipal Budget Committee for one year; and to choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

(The Polls for the election of officers and Australian Ballot Articles will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock of the same day.)

#### Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to:

- (A) Appropriate the sum of \$380,000 for the purpose of financing, constructing and equipping a new Municipal Building to house the functions now conducted in the Uptown Fire Station, Martel Building, Town Offices, Court Facility, and Uptown Public, reception and communications center, including land acquisition, easements and rights of way as may be required. The sum of \$380,000 to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes of the Town, not exceeding the sum of \$380,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annoted and any amendments thereto) and any other enabling authority;
- (B) Authorize the Selectmen to issue and sell such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest to be paid thereon as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hampton, New Hampshire.
- (C) Authorize the Selectmen to acquire land or interests in land, to enter into agreements and contracts and to take other action necessary to complete the said Municipal Building project and to apply for and to accept state or federal grants in aid of said project; and
- (D) Any other action in connection with the foregoing matters or any of them.

### Article 3. To see if the town will vote to:

(A) Appropriate the sum of \$440,000 for the purpose of improvement, replacement and extension of the present sewerage interceptor line from its intersection with the Exeter Road to the sewerage treatment and disposal plant, including land acquisition, easements and rights of way as may be required, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or

notes of the Town, not exceeding the sum of \$440,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annoted and any amendments thereto) and any other enabling authority;

- (B) Authorize the Selectmen to issue and sell such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest to be paid thereon as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hampton, New Hampshire.
- (C) Authorize the Selectmen to acquire land or interests in land, to enter into agreements and contracts and to take other action necessary to complete the said sewerage interceptor line project and to apply for and to accept state or federal grants in aid of said project; and
- (D) Any other action in connection with the foregoing matters or any of them.

### Article 4. To see if the town will vote to:

- (B) Authorize the Selectmen to issue and sell such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest to be paid thereon as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hampton, New Hampshire;

- (C) Authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreements and contracts and to take any other action necessary to complete the said secondary treatment facilities project and to apply for and to accept state or federal grants in aid of said project; and
- (D) Any other action in connection with the foregoing matters or any of them.

#### Article 5. To see if the town will vote to:

- (A) Appropriate the sum of \$95,000 for the purpose of financing and constructing the expansion and refurbishing of the cell block facilities of the Hampton Police Station, including land acquisition, easements and rights of way as may be required, the sum of \$95,000 to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes of the Town, not exceeding the sum of \$95,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and any amendments thereto) and any other enabling authority;
- (B) Authorize the Selectmen to issue and sell such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest to be paid thereon as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hampton, New Hampshire;
- (C) Authorize the Selectmen to acquire land or interests in land, to enter into agreements and contracts and to take other action necessary to complete the said Police Station project and to apply for and to accept state or Federal grants in aid of said project; and
- (D) Any other action in connection with the foregoing matters or any of them.

Recommended by the Budget Committee Recommended by the Planning Board Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to accept, administer, or sell any Real Estate acquired through tax deeds; any sale to be at Public Auction or by requesting sealed bids therefor with reserve.

**Article 8.** To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Municipal Budget Committee, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,705,170.00.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,000 for the purpose of purchasing a parcel of land owned by Mrs. Beatrice C. Mason, and located east of the Town's present Town Office building and further described on a plan prepared by Chester Leach, C.E.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,913. as the town share of Regional Planning studies to be conducted by the Southeast New Hampshire Planning Commission. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey certain lots originally included in the lease from Hampton to the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, Inc. dated April 1, 1898, said lots being more particularly described as follows: Block L, Lots 3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10; Block M, Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 23; Block N, Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 15, 16; and Block O, Lots 1, 2, 12, 15, as shown as Plan of Lots belonging to Hampton Beach Improvement Company from 1 to Q Streets prepared by W.T. Ross dated October 19, 1929 and recorded in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds, to persons claiming said lots under certain deeds from the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, or their successors, heirs, and assigns; provided such persons or their successors, heirs, and assigns shall pay all taxes assessed on said lots for the tax years commencing April 1, 1970

and each year thereafter until the expiration of said lease on April 1, 1997, said conveyance to be made by quitclaim deed by the Selectmen to said persons or their successors, heirs and assigns at the expiration of said lease.

Article 17. On petition of Gretchen B. Baillargeon and 18 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton: to see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate and procure adequate ambulance service for the town: This Committee to include the Chief of Police, the Fire Chief, The Selectmen, and former Corp Members. This Committee to report to the Selectmen in a month their findings.

**Article 18.** On petition of Wilfred Cunningham and 10 other legal voters to see if the Town will vote to elect a Tax Collector for a term of three years.

Article 19. On petition of William A. Baillargeon and nine other legal voters: to see if the town will vote to establish a minimum base pay rate for regular officers of the Hampton Police Department who have completed the required probationary period. This minimum base pay rate to become effective on April 1, 1972, and to be as follows:

Patrolman: \$150.00 per week Sergeant: \$170.00 per week

Article 20. The sponsor of this article is the Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association, Inc.

We, the undersigned, legal voters of the Town of Hampton, do hereby respectfully petition the Selectmen to include the following article in the 1972 Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting:

To see if the Town will request the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of no more than five (5) members for the purpose of preparing a program for the American Revolution Bicentennial Celebration in 1975 and 1976. This committee will report no later than the Town Meeting of 1973.

Signed by: Harold E. Fernald, Jr. and ten other legal voters.

Article 21. On Petition of Peter E. Randall and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton: to see if the Town shall pass the following resolution: In view of the provisions of State Statute 483-A, paragraph 4-B, which says "All State, County and local law enforcement officials are directed to be watchful for violations of the provisions of this chapter and to report all suspected violations to the Board." be it therefore resolved that our local law enforcement officials, including the Board of Selectmen, Police and Building Inspector be directed to enforce this law regarding the dredging and filling of marshlands and other wetlands with renewed vigor and that they request a cease and desist order be issued by the Special Board constituted under this law unless a permit issued by that Board is posted prominently near any dredging and filling of wetlands or any other violation of 483-A.

**Article 22.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 23 of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the Department of Housing and Urban Development is authorized to provide financial assistance to local public housing agencies in providing low-rent housing by leasing dwelling units in existing privately owned structures; and

WHEREAS, said Section 23 provides that the provisions thereof shall not apply to any locality unless the governing body of the locality has by resolution approved the application of such provisions to such locality.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the qualified voters of the Town of Hampton as follows:

That there exists in the Town a need for low-rent housing at rents within the means of persons and families of low in-

come as defined in the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, which need is not being adequately met by private enterprise; and the application of the provisions of Section 23 of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended to the Town of Hampton is approved.

Article 23. On petition of Linda Cowie and sixteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to adopt the following by-law in accordance with Section 31:39 and any other applicable Chapters of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955 as amended:

### Domestic Animals at Large.

1. Definition. For the purposes of this by-law, the term "Domestic Animals" means any horses, cattle, hogs, or sheep.

2. Keeping of Domestic Animals from Running at Large. Any persons owning or possessing any domestic animal in this town shall at all times keep such domestic animal in a safe and suitable enclosure so that it may not run at large.

3. Notification of Owner. The police shall notify the owner or keeper of any domestic animal found at large in violation of

section 2 if:

(A) The domestic animal is found on public property; or (B) Upon written complaint of the owner or lessee of

any other land upon which such domestic animal is found.

- 4. Return of Animals by Owners. Upon receipt of notice of an animal being at large as provided in section 3, the owner or keeper of such domestic animal shall immediately return such animal to a safe and suitable enclosure as required by section 2.
- **5. Penalty.** Any person who violates the provisions of section **2** or section **4** shall be fined not more than twenty-five dollars for each such violation.
- **6. Disposition of Fines.** All fines collected pursuant to section 5 shall inure to the police department for the enforcement of this by-law.

Article 24. On petition of Leon L. Sicard and twenty-eight other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the town will vote to amend the zoning ordinances of the Town of

Hampton adopted March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent TownMeetings, by removing from the Residence A. district and adding to the Seasonal Business and Recreational District the following described area: Beginning at a point located 400 feet northeasterly of the Hampton Beach Expressway and 500 feet northwesterly of Landing Road, thence proceeding southeasterly parallel to and 400 feet distant northeasterly from the northeasterly side line of the Hampton Beach Expressway to the southerly sideline of Tide Mill Road; thence following the southerly side line of Tide Mill Road to the present residential "C" seasonal district bound; thence south westerly along the residential "C" seasonal district bound to a point 400 feet southwesterly from the Hampton Beach Express-way; thence northwesterly parallel to and 400 feet distant southwesterly from the southwesterly side line of the Hampton Beach Expressway to a point 500 feet northwesterly of Landing Road; thence northeasterly parallel to and 500 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly side line of Landing Road to the point of beginning.

Not recommended by the Planning Board

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to change Article I, Section 4 by deleting paragraph one (1) and renumbering paragraphs 2 through 6 to paragraph 1 through 5 respectively.

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: To change Article III, Section 2, paragraph three (3) by deleting the words "Apartment Houses", and capitalize the word "Tourist"; to add paragraph six (6) to Article III, Section 2 as follows:

6. Multi-family dwellings in all districts except the Seasonal Business and Recreational District shall be permitted

only in conformity with the requirements herein provided under Article V-C:

and furthermore to add Article V-C as follows:

Article V-C

Multi-Family Dwellings

Section 1. Multi-family dwelling units shall be subject to the approval by the Planning Board. Procedures shall be governed by the regulations governing the subdivision of land, adopted by the Planning Board of the Town of Hampton, as amended.

Section 2. Site Plan. In addition to requirements of the regulations governing the subdivision of land adopted by the Planning Board, a site plan shall be submitted to the Planning Board showing all structures, roadways, pathways, parking areas, recreation areas, utilities, exterior lighting installations and landscaping on the site, all existing structures and usages within 200 feet of the site boundaries, and any other elements as may be deemed essential by the Planning Board.

**Section 3. Units per Structure.** Maximum number of units per structure shall be 24.

**Section 4. Frontage.** Notwithstanding the provisions of Article IV, Section 3A, there shall be a minimum of 100 feet of frontage on a public street.

**Section 5. Distance Between Buildings.** No building shall be closer than 40 feet to any part of any other building or to any lot line.

# Section 6. Driveways and Parking.

- **A.** No driveway or parking lot shall be closer than 25 feet to the front of any building nor 10 feet to the side or rear of any building. Distance requirements for driveways providing access to these structures shall not apply in the case of an enclosed garage or carport.
- **B.** All driveways and parking areas shall conform to construction specifications for new town subdivision streets.

Night lighting shall be designed so as not to cast glare on neighboring property.

Section 7. Recreation Space. There shall be provided on the site of such development an area or areas devoted to the joint recreational use of the residents thereof. Such recreation space shall consist of not less than 400 square feet of space per dwelling unit. Each such recreation space shall be developed with passive and active recreation facilities; driveways and parking areas shall not be included as recreation space.

Section 8. Basement Apartments. Basement apartments including any apartments any portion of the living space of which is below grade level are prohibited.

Section 9. Area and Height Requirements. No multi-family dwelling shall exceed 35 feet in height. There shall be a minimum of 3000 square feet of lot area per dwelling unit.

Section 10. Utilities. Multi-family dwellings are subject to being serviced by public water and sewer.

#### Section 11. Definitions.

**A.** Multifamily dwelling. Any building or structure containing three or more dwelling units.

B. Dwelling Unit. One or more rooms arranged for the use of one or more individuals living together, as a single housekeeping unit, with cooking, living, sanitary and sleeping facilities.

Article III, Section 3-A, Paragraph 1 will now read "any use permitted in a Residence B District including multi-family dwellings."

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to change Article III, Section 4, paragraph three(3) to read as follows:

3. Trailers, Trailer Camps, Mobile Homes, or Mobile Home subdivisions shall be permitted only in the General District and only in conformity with the requirements provided under Article V-B.

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to change Article IV-B, Section 2, paragraph two (2) to read as follows:

2. Multi-Family Dwellings - 2 spaces per living unit.

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to change Article V-B, Section 1, by deleting the words "sixty thousand (60,000) and replacing them with the words "one hundred twenty thousand (120,000)"; and to change Article V-B, Section 1, by deleting the words "two thousand five hundred (2,500)" and "forty (40)" and replacing them with the words "five thousand (5,000)" and "fifty (50)".

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meetings of March 8. 1949. and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: to Amend Article III, Section 3, paragraph number three (3) by eliminating the period and adding the words "provided that no new filling station be located within a radius of 1000 feet of an existing filling station." A filling station is defined as any area of land with structures thereon that is used for the sale of gasoline or diesel oil for motor vehicle fuel and oil and other lubricating materials."

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual

Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: To change Article I, Section 2 by deleting the words "\$20.00" and replacing them with the words "one hundred dollars (\$100.00)"

Recommended by the Planning Board

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings: To amend Article III, Section 6. Residential C Seasonal District to read as follows: In the Residential C. Seasonal District no building or land shall be used for any purpose except a single or double family residence and one private garage accessory thereto. The letting of rooms to five or less lodgers or tourists in a single family residence, or to ten or less in a double family residence by the owner or tenant tereof shall be permitted.

Recommended by the Planning Board

**Article 33.** To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

**Article 34.** To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent Town records.

# SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Library, Cemetery Association, Trustees of Trust Funds and the Hampton Municipal Development Authority.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970: {Exhibit A-1}

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated

therein, the Net Debt of the Town decreased by \$72,389.34 during 1970, from \$448,421.22 to \$376,031.88.

# Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

# Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and Expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$32,404.95 plus a revenue surplus of \$47,268.33 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$79,673.28.

# TREASURER

# General Fund:

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1970, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

## Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of outstanding bonded indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1970, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

# GENERAL COMMENTS

# Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$18,389.34 in 1970, from \$157,578.78 to \$175,968.12, as shown herewith:

# Unredeemed Taxes:

As indicated in Exhibit C-2, unredeemed taxes due the Town at December 31, 1970, on account of the levies of 1967 and 1966 amounted to \$2.711.36.

Inasmuch as the statutory two-year redemption period provided by R.S.A. 80:32 has expired on these tax liens, the Collector should execute tax deeds to the Town on all real estate which is involved.

## Uncollected Taxes:

At December 31, 1970, there remained uncollected delinquent taxes amounting to \$1,013.48, on the Collector's tax warrants for the levies of 1968 and prior years, as shown herewith:

In accordance with good business practices, the Selectmen should review the Collector's unpaid tax lists for the above levies to determine the collectibility of delinquent taxes contained therein. All taxes, which in the opinion of the Selectmen have become uncollectable, should be abated in the ensuing year in order to clear the records of the Tax Collector. The inclusion of such items in financial reports tends to misstate the current financial condition of the Town.

## <u>Double Entry, Mechanized Accounting System</u> Recommended:

Due to the present volume of financial transactions which must be recorded, the present single-entry, manually kept accounting system of the Town has become inadequate for the purpose of furnishing accurate and reliable information as required.

We strongly recommend that immediate consideration be given to the adoption of the double-entry system of bookkeeping. This system should include general ledger proprietary accounts, as well as detailed revenue and appropriation ledgers. To facilitate and accelerate the accounting process, it is further recommended that machine accounting equipment be utilized. The use of such equipment would permit the simultaneous preparation of such records as vouchers, checks, employees payroll earnings records and check stubs, and related journals. In addition, because such equipment includes automatic devices for the control of information being recorded, accuracy will be improved and clerical costs will be stabilized. We consider the use of mechanized bookkeeping equipment to be of inestimable value, and practically indispensable for the accounting and proper control of the Town's financial activities.

# Debt Register:

The treasurer should adopt the use of the standard form of the Note, Bond and Coupon Register, in accordance with the provision of R.S.A. 33:12.

# Treasurer's Surety Bond:

It is recommended that the Treasurer's surety bond be increased from \$55,000.00 to \$78,000.00. The latter amount would be more proportional to the total funds received by this official.

# Change Cash Funds:

The Town Clerk and Tax Collector should each be provided with a change cash fund, in accordance with accepted business practices. The implementation of this recommendation will eliminate the necessity of withholding cash from tax collections and receipts of motor vehicle permit fees for the purpose of making change. Consequently receipts from these sources could then be remitted intact to the Treasurer, as required by law.

## Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hampton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

When calling the Fire Department for an emergency, don't hang up as soon as you give your name and address. The dispatcher answering your call may need more information.


